## One Business Failure

Only one business failure was reported in Texas in 1944: 672 new domestic corporations were chartered and 169 foreign corporations were chartered, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Liability of the sole commercial failure was \$8,000, and liability of the nine failures during 1943 was \$27,000 each, the Bureau statisticians report.

In 1943 Texas chartered 444 new domestic corporations, and 107 foreign corporations. New domestic firms were capitalized in 1944 at \$11,211,000, as compared with \$9,196,000 in 1943.

I know only too well that words cannot bring comfort to your heart in these hours of loss. However, as your boy's division commander, I want to tell you that all of us who remain in the division grieve with you in the loss of our comrade.

Your son, Private First Class Marion A. Bryan, 38537904, was killed in action 15 December 1944 during our advance near Sarre Union, France. He was buried in Meurthe-et-Moselle, France, after an appropriate service at which a Protestant Chaplain officiated. 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## HORSE RACING

Comes the suggestion to run the Kentucky Derby without spectators, without betting, but run the derby. Why not go to the extent and run it without horses. The ban on horse racing caused quite a stir for the moment and some unfavorable comment. Perhaps certain quarters are still fuming, but somehow the show didn't last as long as one might think. It may be that when war demands are cited in such lines of entertainment and business enterprises, the general public wisely accepts them, hoping for more unity at home and abroad. As for betting, that can be done on anything at any time, any place, if a man is a gambler and wants to take chances. The contention that horse racing improves the breed of horses is no doubt true but this ban was enacted to improve a situation in the race of man.

## BOY SCOUTS OVER HERE

The Boy Scouts of America stand as a symbol of American youth. "Hitler's Youth" is an organization symbolizing German training. The former pledge themselves to vitalize democracy in the United States, the latter, after compulsory labor and military service, become enemies of democracy. Our Burkburnett Scouts are examples of what time and training and the ability to teach, can produce, when character and co-operation are the assisting factors. These Scouts grow into manhood recognizing the word "service", are good citizens because they are dedi-

cated in early years to the rights and responsibilities of this post. German youths under Hitler, stress enslavement to the principles of dictatorship, politics for the prejudiced, a wildness of fanaticism for a cause that brings ruin and shame to self and to country. The simple devotions of our scouting laws of reverence toward God, of tolerance, of clean living, the furtherance of humanitarian projects, of kindness to all creatures, the knowledge of human brotherhood, are the Boy Scouts measures for character building. What a difference in the oaths and laws of our national youth organization and the German band. Our country builds today on these boys for her tomorrow's statesmen. Fashioned on such lines, the future of this great land is bright.

## MILITARY TRAINING

The proposal of Congressional legislation for peacetime military training is opposed by educators and appeal have been made that Congress postpone any action until the war ends. Whether compulsory military training would lead to regimentation and suppression of free thought enjoyed in a democracy, whether a year of training before college would change plans for college afterwards, are arguments against it. Military heads can't influence those against such training. They suggest that disciplined standing armies didn't save Europe and would it offer us security. It is stepping aside from traditional methods, it is a challenge to pacifism, but for those who wish for preparedness from henceforth, view it as necessary. The proposal finds two sides in Burkburnett.

## Scouting To Return To Philippines

In line with its theme for the year, Scouts of the World—Brothers Together the Boy Scouts of America will help restore the Boy Scout Movement in the Philippine Islands when they are liberated. Ten thousand dollars granted to the Boy Scouts by the "God Bless America Fund", in memory of the Late Brig. Gen. Theodore Roosevelt, one of its trustees, will be used to initiate the work.

The "God Bless America Fund" was created by Irving Berlin to receive and dispose of all of proceeds arising from the composer's song, "God Bless America". Its trustees now are Chairmen Herbert Bayard Swope, consultant to the War Department, Commander Gene Tunney, USNR, and Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Jr., who succeeded to her late husband's position as trustee.

For many years the Boy Scouts of America gave direct supervision to Scouting in the Philippines. Later with its help Boy Scouts in the Islands launched their own local administration.

Scouting in the Philippines was a subject close to the heart of General Roosevelt, who was at one time Governor of the Islands. The late General Roose-

vell, who died July 12th of exhaustion induced by overwork at his field camp in France, was Vice-President of the Boy Scouts on whose National Executive Board he served 25 years.

At the time they were invaded the Philippine Islands had 36,201 Cubs, Boy Scouts, and adult leaders.

## Red Cross Assists Soldiers' Families

Facilities for aiding the families of servicemen and veterans are maintained by the American Red Cross in nearly all of its 3,757 chapters. Called Home Service, this branch of Red Cross activity last year helped 3,500,000 service men and their families solve problems that might otherwise have robbed the men of their fighting efficiency and threatened the security of their homes.

At the end of the world girdling system of communications that makes this Red Cross service possible is the serviceman's home town or county Red Cross chapter. Of the other is the Red Cross field director who follows him right up to the battle line, and the Red Cross hospital workers, who continue to keep him in touch with his family, even if he is wounded or ill.

And when he is discharged

and returns home, Red Cross Home Service continues to serve him by helping him understand and become adjusted to his status as a veteran. Last year 350,000 ex-servicemen and their families received this Red Cross service.

**Ernie Pyle's Slant on the War:**  
**Navy Lands Troops on Sicily According to Plans**  
Some Anxious Moments Were Experienced by Convoy Crew

By Ernie Pyle

(Editor's Note): This dispatch was written and first published when Pyle was with the G.I.s landing on Sicily. He is now on his way to cover the boys in the Pacific war zones.

WITH THE U. S. NAVY ON WAY TO SICILY.—As long as this ship of ours sails the high seas, even after every member of the present crew has been transferred away, I'm sure the story of the searchlights will linger on in the wardroom and forecabin like a written legend.

It is the story of a few minutes when the fate of this ship hung upon the whim of the enemy. For some reason which we probably will never know the command to obliterate us was never given.

Our great, bad moment occurred just as we had ended our long invasion voyage from North Africa and stopped at our designated place off the south coast of Sicily. Our ship was about three and a half miles from shore, which in the world of big guns is practically hanging in the cannon muzzle. Two or three smaller ships were in closer than we but the bulk of our invasion fleet stood far out to sea behind us. Our Admiral had the reputation of always getting up close where he could have a hand in the shooting, and he certainly ran true to form throughout this invasion.

We'd been stopped only a minute when big searchlights blinked on from the shore and began to search the waters. Apparently the watchers ashore had heard some sounds at sea. The lights swept back and forth across the dark water and after a few exploratory sweeps one of them centered dead upon us and stopped. Then as we held our breaths the searchlights, one by one, came down with their beams upon our ship. They had found their mark.

**Caught By Lights.**

All five of them stretching out over a shore line of several miles pinioned us in their white shafts as we sat there as naked as babies and just as scared. I would have been glad to bawl like one if it would have helped for this searchlight business meant the enemy had us on the block. We not only were discovered, we were caught in a funnel from which there was no escaping.

We couldn't possibly move fast enough to run out of their beams. We were within simple and easy gunning distance. We were a sitting duck. We were stuck on the end of five merciless poles of light. We were utterly helpless.

"When that fifth searchlight stopped on us all my children became orphans," one of the officers said later.

Another one said, "The straw that broke my back was when the anchor went down."

A third one said, "The fellow standing next to me was breathing so hard I couldn't hear the anchor go down. Then I realized there wasn't anybody standing next to me."

We got all set to shoot at the lights but then we waited. Our Admiral decided there was some possibility they couldn't see us through the slight haze, although he was at a loss to explain why all five lights stopped on us if they couldn't see us.

We had three alternatives—to start shooting and thus compel return fire; to up anchor and run for it; or to sit quiet like a mouse and wait in terror. We did the latter.

I don't know how long the five lights were on us. It seemed like hours. It may have been five minutes. At any rate at the end of some unbelievably long time one of them suddenly blinked out. Then one by one, seemingly erratically and with no purpose in mind, the others went out, too. The last one held us a long time as though playing with us. Then it too went out and we were once again alone in the blessed darkness. Not a shot had been fired.

**Assault Boats Land.**

Assault boats had been speeding past us all the time and a few minutes later they hit the beach. The searchlights flashed on again but from then on they were busy fanning the beach itself. It didn't take our attacking troops long to shoot the lights out from close range.

**Navy's Landing Job at Sicily Finished**

By the end of the first week after the Sicilian invasion there was almost no indication of warfare along our beach front. The German radio told us every night that we were getting bombed, but actually a stupefying peace had settled over us.

Hour by hour we could feel the ship slide back into her normal ways. The watches were dropped

down to "Condition Three," which is almost the peacetime regime. The wearing of white hats became optional once more. The men went swimming over the side, and fished with rod and reel from the fore-cabin head. The captain had time on his hands and played gin rummy with me when I got worn out with writing. Finally liberty parties were let ashore for sightseeing.

**JESUS AND THE TWELVE**

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 10:1, 5-8; 11:1, 25-30.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you.—John 15:14.

Service for Christ has not always been as impressive and effective as it should be because it has lacked conviction and spiritual power. God did not intend it to be the weak and faltering thing that it often is, because of our failure to go God's way.

The sending out of the twelve had special significance, and yet it brings forth principles which have a bearing on the service of every believer in Christ.

**The Servants of Christ—**  
**I. Have a Divine Commission (10:1, 5-8).**

The twelve disciples had already been called to the Lord's service. Now they were to be prepared for the service which was ahead. It was a time of commissioning and empowerment for service.

God calls men today to serve Him. In fact, there is a very real sense in which every Christian is called to serve. Let no one try to excuse himself from that responsibility and privilege.

To some comes a special call to leave their accustomed daily work and launch out into a broader service for Christ. When that time comes, we may go forth with the assurance that the power of a divine Saviour goes with us. The twelve disciples had some special powers which we do not have and do not need. God suits the power to the need, and that means that in every circumstance we may look to Him with assurance, and go on.

One of our difficulties in dealing with such matters as spiritual power is that we interpret the things of the realm of the spirit by physical standards and measurements. We are so quick to say "I cannot" on the basis of our logical human reasoning, when an appreciation of the power of God which is operative on our behalf would make us say with confidence, "I can." But, sadly enough, having left God out of our reckoning, we find that it is indeed true that we cannot.

Serving Christ means doing so in His power, and with His grace upon us. Nothing less will do! Nothing more is needed!

**II. Declare a Divine Revelation (11:1, 25-27).**

The messenger's responsibility and importance are largely determined by the nature of the message he has to convey. Particularly it is that true where the message must pass through his personality and thus be proclaimed. The nations of the earth choose their most able men to be their ambassadors and grant them their full power.

The glorious thing about being a messenger for God is that we carry no ordinary communication. What we have to present is far above the most important message any earthly ambassador could possibly have to carry.

We, the children and servants of God through Jesus Christ, have something direct from the throne of God. He has revealed it (v. 25), and it seemed good in His sight to give it to those who had the childlike faith to believe Him.

God's revelation is hidden from those who are wise in their own conceits, who are too proud to come by way of humility and faith. Thank God, some of the wise and mighty of this world have been willing to become as little children and learn at the feet of Jesus.

The encouraging thing about it is that the door is open to the simplest believer to trust God, to take the revelation of God's truth in His Word, and give it out with grace and power.

**III. Extend a Divine Invitation (11:28-30).**

"Come"—what a blessed word for the needy and sinful! They are not to be shut out by their sin, nor to be hindered by their weakness. The door is open, and the invitation is to come. Why not respond?

To whom are they to come? To Jesus. There are times when men can help us, when friends or church officers or the pastor can give us an uplifting word of counsel and encouragement. But for salvation, for a real lifting of the burden from the shoulders of those "that labor and are heavy laden," there is no one like Jesus.

We are privileged to invite people to Jesus, knowing that if they "learn" of Him (v. 29), they will not only have their loads lifted and find rest, but will enter into a blessed yoke, fellowship with Him in life and service.

His is a wholesome or a kindly yoke. That is the meaning of "easy" in verse 30. It is not always easy to serve Christ, but being yoked with Him in a kindly fellowship of service makes the burden light.

The world is full of tired and discouraged people. We who know Christ have the adequate answer to their need. Shall we not go in His name to present the truth to them and invite them to come to Christ?

## Pneumonia Strikes In Winter Months

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused over 2,800 deaths last year in Texas, a reduction over the previous year but still too high. It is more prevalent during the winter and spring months.

Pneumonia is usually caused by a germ called the pneumococcus, which many of us have lurking in our throats ready to start trouble when our resistance to it is lowered.

We can keep up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue and avoiding unnecessary exposure to extreme weather conditions. When we go out into the cold, additional wraps should be sufficient to protect us. Keeping the temperature of our homes as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encountered in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we go out.

Another method of prevention in pneumonia is not to neglect a cold, for the common cold often results in pneumonia. A person with a severe cold should stay at home and call his physician as a precautionary measure. Then he should follow his physician's advice until the cold has disappeared.

The successful treatment of a pneumonia case often depends upon beginning treatment very early. That is why a physician should be called at once in such cases. A patient may really have beginning pneumonia when he thinks it is only a cold. If the physician's advice is sought for the cold he will have an opportunity to start treatment early if pneumonia occurs in such cases.

## Business Loans Under G. I. Act

The necessary machinery for processing applications by veterans of World War II for business loans under the Service-men's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill of Rights) has been set up in the Dallas Loan Agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, L. B. Glidden, Manager of the local Agency, announced today.

Mr. Glidden's statement followed an announcement from Washington, D. C., that the Veterans Administration had designated the Reconstruction Finance Corporation as an Agency to review applications to banks by veterans for the guaranty of business loans. Under the program, RFC will recommend to the appropriate office of the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs whether that office should approve or disapprove such applications.

Loans applied for may be used in purchasing any business, supplies, equipment, machinery or tools to be used by the veterans in pursuing a gainful occupation. The Government may guarantee repayment of such loans to the extent of 50 per cent, but not in an amount exceeding \$2,000 as its maximum guaranty.

Thus the veteran who qualifies for a business loan may obtain a guaranty for 50 per cent of any loan up to \$4,000. He may, of course, obtain from his banker a loan of greater amount, for instance, \$6,000; but the guaranty is limited to \$2,000. In loans of less than \$4,000, the Government guarantees half; thus, in a \$3,000 loan the guaranty amounts to \$1,500, not more.

Mr. Glidden outlined the following essential steps for veterans desiring guaranteed business loans:

The veteran should first contact his local banker.

If the veteran is unable to obtain a loan from his local banker, he should then apply to his nearest RFC Loan Agency for a loan. The address of the appropriate agency for this region is 301 Cotton Exchange Building, Dallas 1, Texas.

"Banks desiring to assist veterans in this program may obtain the necessary regulations and loan application blanks from the local regional office of the Veterans Administration," Mr. Glidden said.

"The requirements of the Law are what the veteran must be found qualified by training or experience to engage in the type of business for which he seeks a loan, the property sought to be acquired is reasonable in price and suited to its intended purpose, and that the venture is likely to succeed.

"Since the Act does not provide for loans to run businesses, the lender will want to know whether the veteran has sufficient funds for this purpose, as well as ability, dependability, business experience, and business character, to assume a reasonable likelihood that the veteran's contemplated operations will be successful. The lender will also want to know whether the veteran has been in such business before entering the service and the nature of his service experience and training.

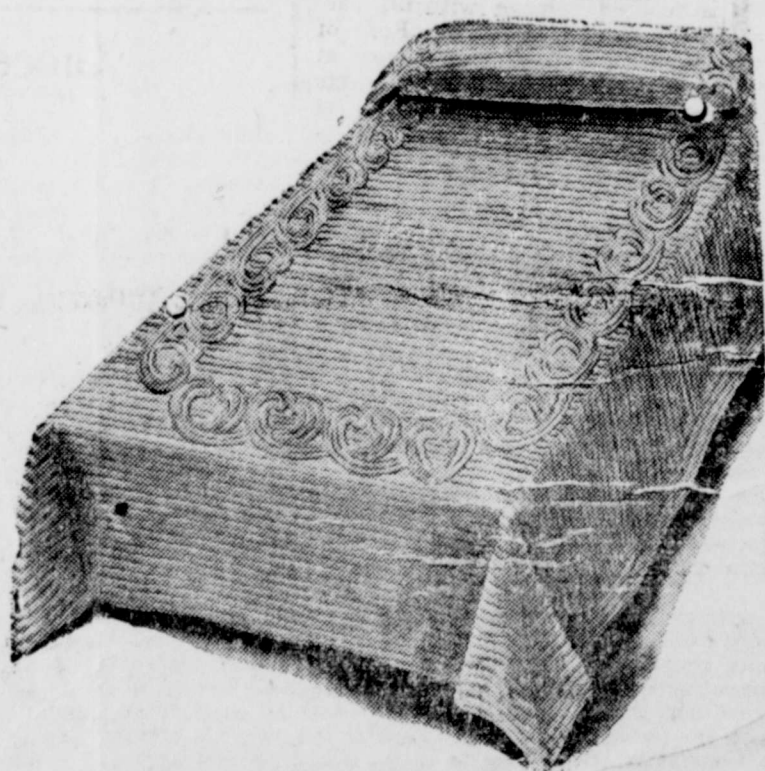

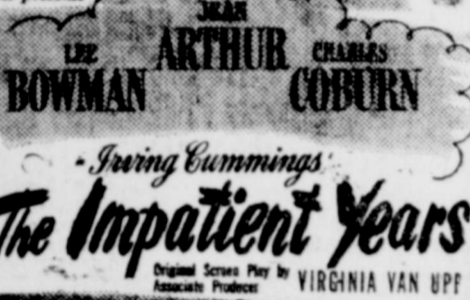

## Short Cuts to Better Gardens

Many a Victory Gardener has learned a lot from experience in the past three years. Various knacks, devices, and methods have been found helpful in making vegetable and flower growing easier, more efficient, and more enjoyable. Here are a few of them picked up here and there.

There's the quick trick of making furrows for very small seeds by laying the rake handle flat on the ground parallel to other rows and pressing it lightly into the soil. The soil, of course, must be of fine texture and well prepared. The shallow depression left by the handle is just the right depth for lettuce, carrot, and other tiny vegetable and flower seeds which should not be planted more than a quarter-inch deep. The row can then be speedily covered by gently raking a thin layer of soil over it and tamping it down.

Mixing small seeds with a handful of sand or fine soil before sowing is a good idea. This method keeps the seed from blowing around and also from being sown too thickly.

Do you suspect the presence of that crafty nuisance, the cutworm, in your garden plot? The pest frequently hides in the soil and nips off young plants at the base during the night while you sleep. Tomato and pepper plants are often victims as well as other transplanted seedlings. To combat this enemy, a paper "collar" is a handy device. Cut a strip of flexible cardboard

## Many Texas Schools Receiving WFA Assistance

Approximately 2,185 Texas schools now are receiving War Food Administration assistance in serving well-balanced lunches daily to school children and participation should increase steadily for the next two months, Dan L. Boyd, WFA's District Representative has announced.

Prior to the first of the year 1,983 schools were serving lunches to 209,769 children compared to 1,440 schools and 125,341 daily lunches at the same time last year. During January, 202 additional schools have applied for WFA assistance in getting lunchrooms into operation and the applications are being processed.

Peak participation for the year is expected during February and March, Mr. Boyd said. State sponsoring agency for the Texas Community School Lunch Program is the State Department of Education, with county and individual school boards sponsoring local lunchrooms and assuming complete operation of the community program.

In turn, community sponsors serving well balanced lunches are partially reimbursed by War Food Administration through appropriation from the Congress, the amount of local reimbursement depending on type of lunch served and the need for financial assistance, Mr. Boyd said.

## Farm Income Higher

Farm cash income in Texas was about five per cent higher in 1944 than in 1943, according to Dr. F. A. Buechel, economic analyst for the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Income was \$1,143,425,000, Dr. Buechel reported. Increase in income over 1943 was derived almost entirely from greater production and moderately higher price of wheat in the northern section of the Texas plains.

The moderate increase in production and sharp increase in price of fruits and vegetables in the citrus area of the Lower Rio Grande Valley were also partly responsible for the gain.

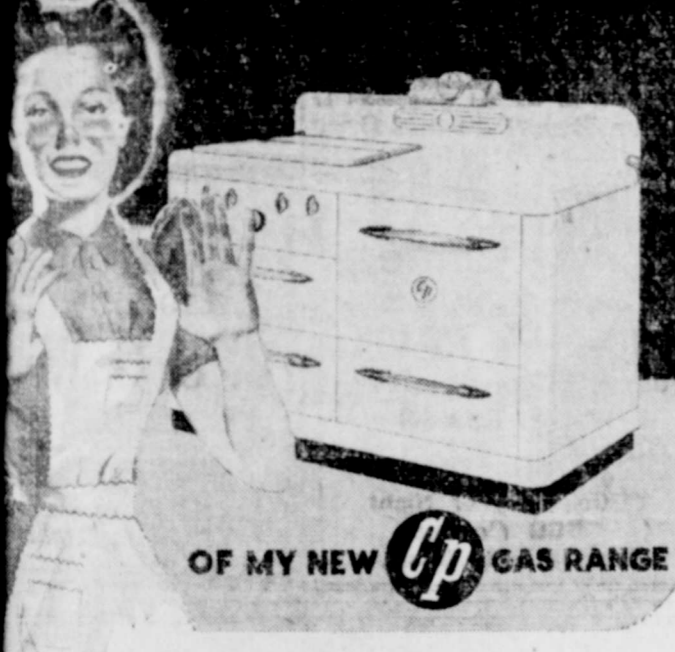

### Price Fixing

Lancashire is the name of a county in England, studded with many milling towns, some large, some small. Liverpool, once the world's leading cotton market, is in Lancashire. In fact, the very word Lancashire, from long usage in the colorful language of tradespeople, has come to mean the English cotton textile industry, just as Detroit means the automobile manufacturing business to us.

Lancashire used to be prosperous. Her mills are small in contrast to what Americans think about when they speak of a cotton mill, but they long provided work and income for thousands of thrifty subjects of the Crown, until something went wrong. Now Lancashire is having her troubles and is just beginning to learn what they are. At the bottom of them is government tinkering and price fixing.

### Seeking Solutions

Some time ago the British cotton textile industry sent an investigating committee to the United States to find out a few things. The committee had three facts in hand: (1) American mills were turning out better cotton cloth than the English mills, (2) American goods were selling everywhere for less than the British could afford to accept, and (3) American mill workers were twice as well paid as the English.

It seemed bad enough that better goods at lower prices were taking away England's used-to-be, world-wide markets. It was worse that Lancashire's labor troubles increased on account of too many half-paid workers. Mill owners couldn't get along without the workers but couldn't pay them what they were worth. The problem was to find out how Uncle Sam kept Lancashire fenced in.

### They Found Out

Here are some of the things they learned: English mills are small and have about one process apiece while American mills are large and perform a lot of different processes. The English laborers did considerable work by hand, such as American mills do by machinery to gain volume. English mills turn out less material per man-hour than American mills; from 18% to 67% less.

In America a small number of workers supervise the operation of a large number of machines, spinning, weaving and finishing, all in one big factory. In Britain cotton is spun in one factory, woven in another and finished in a third. Lancashire producers of cotton cloth buy and sell endlessly among themselves. Each operator does his part and ships his unfinished work to some other mill.

### Government Fixing

"One point in Lancashire's problem," says the London Times, "is the harsh necessity for some of the most inefficient firms to be eliminated." The government fixes prices and ignores incompetence so poor operators can make a profit. In other words, John Bull holds an umbrella over a frozen price structure that would melt down to an honest level under the warm sunlight of competition.

Competition sharpens the wits of American management. Investors and their business executives know that continuous operation is cheaper than batch work; know there is more to be earned with low prices and small margins than by big profits on a few sales. They know volume production requires good equipment which, in turn, helps workers do more and earn more. Fixed cotton prices in America will finally give us a dose of Lancashire.

### Rotation Increases Yield

"I now make a bale of cotton to the acre in my rotation where I only made one-third of a bale before I started using the rotation of small grain-lepedeza-Austrian winter peas followed by cotton."—Shelton T. Carter Georgia Farmer.
