Today, pie is served as a breakfast must in some parts of New England. Along comes somebody and tells us that our breakfast of just coffee and doughnuts, melba toast and fruit, cereal and milk, are not healthy enough an American breakfast repast, for they are not heavy enough. There is that group that insists that a certain amount of hunger stimulates the mind and that the worker who doesn't eat a hearty breakfast gives better thinking from his desk. They add that an abundant breakfast might prove dangerous since any activity calls for easier digestive workings. Stomach ulcers are cited as the prevalent complaint of this age, and this proves something about improper eating. They add that

the cold turkey breakfast that appealed to granddad might be an ulcer to you if you are under mental stress, are worrying about family troubles, financial difficulties, because such a mental workout affects your stomach and that, added to improper eating, leads to the popular stomach ulcer. Then they come up with the plea for bigger breakfasts to aid the war effort, for who can work in a war plant and give his best on a breakfast of a prune and a cup of coffee. Indigestion or lack of digestion, what can one do you ask? Our advice is to consult your ration book and see how many times you could follow grandfather's breakfast with ham, beefsteak, fried pork chops, and you have the answer.

## AMERICA'S FIRST TAX BILL

Back in 1797, the tax question might have been more simplified, but it placed an assessment on holdings that was collected by the government and probably caused as much unpleasant discussion as our intricate tax bills of the present day. America's first tax bill on houses, lands and slaves, was for two million dollars from the country and was apportioned to the states in various amounts. Perhaps certain states criticized their levy, since argumentation is not just a modern mental workout. They started the bill with an assessment of 20 cents on every \$100 for property not over \$500 in value, 30 cents for property valued over the \$500. This climbed to \$1 on every \$100 for every dwelling house valued at more than \$30,000. The amount of 50 cents was the fee for every slave. The simple dw., for dwelling, sh. for shall, C. for collectors, Ds. for dollars, as put down in the first tax bill, was within the range of understanding of those in grade school. The figuring did not take long though done by candlelight and with the quill pen perhaps, without the attendance of an attorney an dan adding machine. The story is told about a clerk in a bookshop coming across Professor Einstein, the discoverer of the theory of relativity, glancing through a guide to incometax procedure. When the clerk asked him if he wished to buy, the famed mathematician said, "Good heavens, no. It is terrible enough to have to figure out the tax without having to read a whole book about it."



Many Texas fighting men were included among the 513 veterans of Bataan and Corregidor who were freed from a Jap prison camp on Luzon by last weeks daring Ranger raid. Most are now in army hospitals, recovering from illness and other results of their treatment while in the hands of the enemy. Soon they will be back in Texas, enjoying a well-earned rest and reunion with their loved ones. Their rescue is dramatic proof that Uncle Sam never forgets his nephews in enemy hands. While they were behind Jap or Nazi barbed wire, they receive relief supplies from the National War Fund's War Prisoners Aid and from the Red Cross. And at the first opportunity they are restored to freedom. The Japanese have a long record of barbarism against American prisoners of war—a record

that began with the infamous "death march" after the surrender of the tiny island fortress in Manila bay. But most recent reports indicate that, as the war goes against them, even the Japs are wise enough to change their tactics. Apparently realizing that they will soon be held accountable for their treatment of prisoners, the Japanese army has begun to permit more relief supplies to reach concentration camps, and at the same time inaugurate a more humane attitude toward our men.

No one would be foolish enough to credit them with any sudden feeling of human compassion—for the change is obviously brought about only by realization that if they treat prisoners well they, themselves, will receive better treatment upon defeat—but, whatever the reason, the news is good for the thousands of Texans whose husbands, sons and friends are in Nipponese hands.

Reports of the National War Fund from neutral representatives also indicate that Americans held in German prison camps east of Berlin are being moved to the interior, where the prisoners will not be endangered by the fighting as the Russians continue their advance. This may mean that some will wait a few months longer for liberation, but it also means that many will live who otherwise might be killed by shells or even by Nazi hordes fleeing the onrushing Russian troops. Prisoners are never safe during periods of confusion, so relatives should be encouraged by reports that German prison camps are being moved to the interior.

Neutral representatives of War Prisoners Aid and other National War Fund agencies will continue to visit Americans behind their barbed-wire barricades, and to look out for the interests and the morale of our men captured by the Nazis. And, after victory, the National War Fund will continue to give aid to every prisoner of war or former prisoner until he has been returned to the United States.

Such work on behalf of our men in enemy hands is made possible through funds raised in the recent nation-wide National War Fund campaign. County War Chest leaders who worked so hard to make the drive a success and the tens of thousands who contributed so generously now have the pleasure of knowing that their work and their gifts are helping to save American lives, and to make life easier for the heroic American fighting men shot down over enemy territory or captured in hand to hand battles.

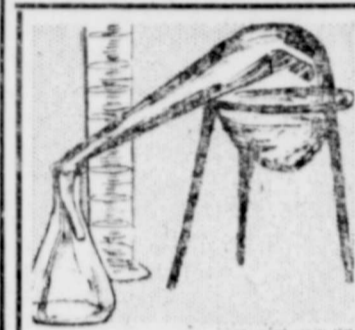

## Japs Highly Prized Philippines' Ores

When deprived of the Philippine Islands, Japan will lose large tonnages of iron ore, chrome ore and manganese which her steel industry needs the American Iron and Steel Institute reported today. The islands also are rich in other natural resources. In 1940, Japan obtained 1,310,805 net tons of iron ore from the Philippines, the entire production of iron ore in the islands. In seven months of 1941 iron ore shipments to Japan totaled 954,300 tons.

Presumably since the Japanese occupation in early 1942, tonnages approximating those of 1940 and 1941 have been shipped to Japan, along with manganese ore which prior to the Japanese invasion was shipped almost entirely to the United States. In 1944 shipments of manganese ore from the Philippines into the country were around 50,000 tons. The commercial mining of chrome ore, which is used in the making of alloy steel, started only about 15 years ago in the Philippines. In 1938 around 74,000 net tons were exported, of which 60,000 tons were shipped to the United States, 8,000 tons to Canada and 2,000 tons to Japan. One of the principal produc-

ing areas is the Zambales Province of Luzon.

Four companies produced most of the 1940 output of iron ore in the Philippines. They were the Philippine Iron Mines, Inc., in the Larap Peninsula, in Camarines Norte; Samar Mining Company, Inc., in Herani, Samar; Paracale Iron Mines in Camarines Norte; and Gold Star Mining Company, Inc., in Mogpog, Marinduque. The total ore reserves of the four companies are estimated at around 8,000,000 tons, according to a prewar report of the U. S. Department of Commerce.

### All Seed Of Texas Hybrid No. 12 No Disadvantage

of the grains of the popular Texas Hybrid No. 12 seed corn have come to the Experiment Station from several seedmen. Agronomist John S. Rogers, in charge of hybrid seed corn work for the Station states that these misgivings on the part of the planters are not justified inasmuch as the performance of Texas Hybrid No. 12 is quite as good or even better under certain conditions than other strains having larger grains. The hybrid vigor of this strain has proved quite satisfactory and the yield according to Experiment Station tests is around 20 to 25 percent greater than the best open-pollinated varieties. Consequently, growers should not be prejudiced against this hybrid because of seed size, as there is every reason to expect a good stand of vigorous, healthy plants, provided a good quality of seed is purchased. There may be some inconveni-

ence with the planting of small seed in that special planting plates may be necessary, but this should be more than compensated for by the fact that smaller seed will plant a much greater acreage per bushel than larger seed. Rogers explains that hybrid corn makes its increased yields because of its inherited yielding ability and he also adds that because the supply of all types of Texas hybrid seed corn is very short this year, it is doubly important that all hybrid seed be utilized regardless of seed size.

The official citation read, "for meritorious achievement while participating in heavy bombardment missions in the air offensive against the enemy over Continental Europe. Westmoreland has been promoted from a Second Lieutenant to a First Lieutenant as of January 17, 1945. He received his Bombardier wings in April, 1944, at Midland, Texas.

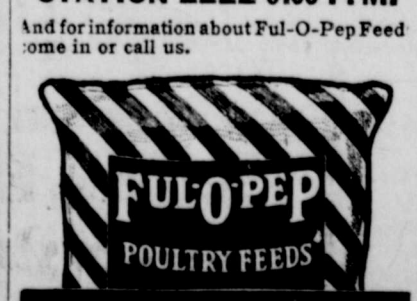

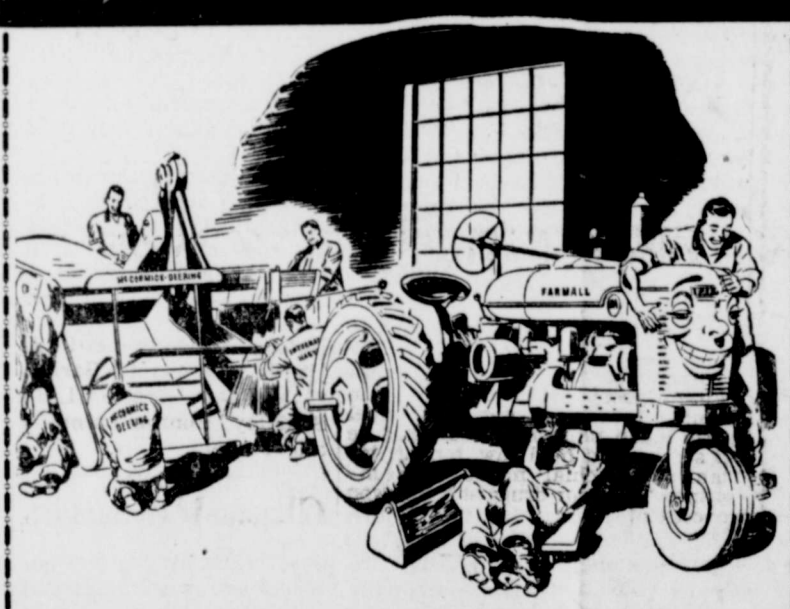

# Cotton Is Big Money Crop In Texas and South

Unaccustomed as you may be  
to public speaking, a large part  
of your problem has been solved.

King Cotton, the crop that ac-  
counted for over 35 per cent of  
the total value of Texas crops  
this season and is the most im-  
portant agricultural raw ma-  
terial for the State's industries  
and commerce, has named a cab-  
inet to help him supply speak-  
ers and organizations with inter-  
esting, authentic information.

John Leahy, College Station,  
director of the Cotton Research  
Committee of Texas, heads the  
"cabinet", which is the Speak-  
ers' Committee of the War Cot-  
ton Production Committee of  
Texas.

Speakers can obtain timely  
information, or even complete  
speeches, for programs before  
service clubs, chambers of com-  
merce or any other interested  
group merely by writing to  
Leahy.

Aiding Leahy's group in sup-  
plying that speaker can use with  
confidence is an editorial com-  
mittee which includes represent-  
atives of the Texas Experiment  
Station and Extension Service.  
And, there also are some plain  
laymen on the committee, to see

to it that no speech contains any  
10-dollar words that might be  
unfamiliar to the ordinary speak-  
er or audience.  
"More people grow cotton,  
handle and use it, and talk  
about it than anything else our  
State produces," Leahy says,  
"and cotton is always a timely  
and important subject of inter-  
est to any group in Texas."

"Most speakers and organiza-  
tions, however, do not have the  
time or facilities to dig up the  
great mass of information that  
is available as a background for  
discussing cotton subjects and  
the general importance of cotton  
and cottonseed to our State. We  
feel, therefore, that our com-  
mittee will meet a definite need  
for a clearing house from which  
any person or group can secure  
information."

Final step to help speakers is  
the activity of another section of  
the War Cotton Production Com-  
mittee of Texas.

"If you can talk, you can talk  
about cotton," Leahy says. "Fur-  
thermore, you and your audi-  
ence will know you know what  
you are talking about."

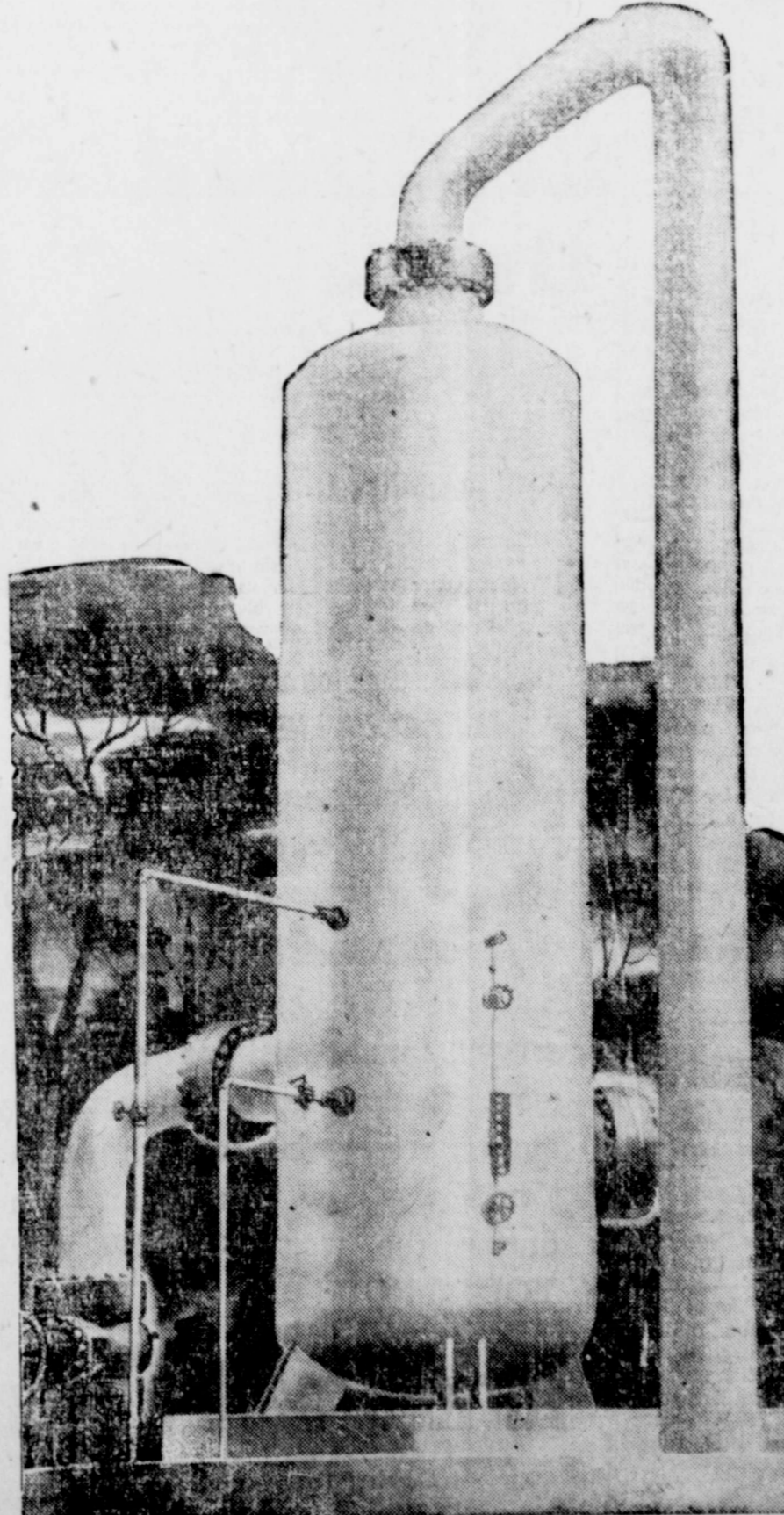
