Feeding a people is also a matter of combating an economic and political problem, which effects the destinies of other people.

Burkburnett History

As revealed by the files of the Star 10 years ago.

Reports from the Burkburnett Gin and the Farmers Cooperative Gin indicated that the total amount of cotton ginned in Burkburnett up to noon Wednesday was 1,075 bales. The estimates which will be lower than first given will probably reach 2,500 or 3,000 bales for the district.
