## PAYING TOO MUCH

The cost of building is so terrific in many places that, even if materials were available, the average man can't afford to go into it at the present. It has been figured that building a six room house in Philadelphia cost \$9,000, in Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Cleveland it would be \$10,000 and in Washington, D. C., the same house would be \$15,000. In Detroit that house costs \$12,000 and back in 1940 you could have erected it for \$8,000. This increase is far too much altho we know a certain increase is necessary. There are a number of reasons why costs are higher but when certain union rules in various areas keep the laborer from putting in a full day's work for a full day's pay, then such an advanced building cost is unfair. It happens that there are cities where if an electrician or a plumber find the work going on along smoothly and finish installing their fixtures two hours early, they go home and the basic of pay is still for eight hours instead of six. With many veterans planning on building homes, we don't feel that they should have to suffer for such an unfair practice. A legitimate cost is expected but at least those ex-soldiers should investigate before they leap, for none of us of Burkburnett want THEM flimflammed.

War and Victory Bonds will now be known as United States Savings Bonds, Nathan Adams, Chairman of the Texas Advisory Committee, Savings Bond Division, U. S. Treasury Department, said today in announcing that the program for selling government bonds and stamps will continue.

He added, "We can be sure that these bonds are still the best and safest investment in the world, and if we consider only one benefit derived from the war financing program, this being the habit of saving, it would merit the continuation of the program."

The Chairman added, "The benefits of the war financing program are many, and in addition to creating the habit of systematic saving, it taught many of our citizens the value of personal security, and has helped combat the rising inflation."

## Social Security Board Makes Annual Report

Eleven specific recommendations for the expansion and improvement of the old-age and survivors insurance program have been made to Congress in the Tenth Annual Report of the Social Security Board, R. L. Surles, manager of the Wichita Falls Field office of the Board, reported today.

Heading the list is a recommendation, made repeatedly by the Board, that coverage of the program be expanded to include all gainful workers, including agricultural and domestic employees, public employees and employees of nonprofit organizations, and self-employed persons, including farmers. Mr. Surles said that the social and economic welfare of the area served by the Wichita Falls office of the Board will be strengthened whenever action is taken to extend the benefits of the system to the millions that are not covered now.

The Board has urged this action in the past, and now, in a

period of increased job turnover, we are impressed more than ever by its urgency, Mr. Surles continued. Aside from the fact that the Board has had appeals from many persons and groups now in noncovered employment for inclusion in the system, we have seen how periods in uncovered employment, such as those spent by millions of our men in the armed service of the country, can affect qualifications for benefits.

And I am glad to say, the Board has recommended—incidentally, for the fifth consecutive year—that credit be given to servicemen for their period of service in the armed forces. Limitation of coverage is recognized by the Board as the most serious continuing shortcoming of old-age and survivors insurance, Mr. Surles added.

THERE is not a woman in the length and breadth of America, at this moment, who is not putting up with some circumstance that is almost unendurable.

The world, for many years, has been very sick. We bore up pretty well when the fever was high and the symptoms so dangerous that it seemed as if we mightn't recover; now we're in for the trying, exacting, pettish, quarrelsome, bored, tedious time of convalescence, and it's going to take whatever we can muster of courage and character.

Young wives with small babies are absolute slaves these days, either tackling the herculean jobs of dishes and didies, playtime and mealtime, marketing and cooking, beds and dust, telephone and nose colds—all by themselves, or paying a good round dollar an hour for not too effectual help.

Mothers and fathers of boys just back from service are learning, with heartache, how deep the world-poisoning penetrated into the young hearts, how hard it is for the boys to take up civilian jobs, to fit themselves quietly into civilized living again.

Doctors are overworked to the dropping point. Business managers are harassed by the irreconcilable margins between ceiling prices and rising wages. Strikes are darkening thousands of households. Hospitals are full of physically wounded boys struggling back to life and to usefulness, and of boys more seriously wounded—wounded in soul and mind, who in puzzlement and darkness must somehow work their way toward the light.

So for goodness sake pick up your own share and carry it, and make light of it, and help us all get through! Don't complain that your husband never praises you, or that he doesn't tell you about his business, or keeps you short of money, or takes an interest in other women, or talks rudely to you when he's had a drop too much, or does—or doesn't do—a thousand other things that nag at you like midges all day and keep you from being happy.

Be happy. Accept the dark with the bright, and rejoice if you can lift your problems up and out of the great national sum total of trouble, and establish a household financially sound, affectionate, capable, harmonious. We need a million of them—we need 10 million—we could use 40 million.

If 10 million women suddenly waked up to their blessings, decided to ignore their trials or disadvantages or privations or unsatisfied desires, decided to shoulder the load and go straight ahead uncomplaining toward the goal of prosperity and happiness that is right ahead of us—how much faster we'd reach it!

Betty Van, for example. Betty is all hot and bothered because Van's mother lives with them. Betty has babies, aged five and three, and eight months.

"She is wonderful with the children," writes Betty, "and of course does a lot in the kitchen, and honestly I think I could be fond of her."

LAUGH OFF TROUBLES

Practically every woman in the country has to endure some difficulty. Sometimes it is a little thing, like a small, crowded apartment, or lack of help. Or it may be a crushing burden, like a mentally or physically sick husband, who has been ruined by war. There is a tension everywhere, a sense of bitterness among large groups, of frustration and disillusionment. Women who have only minor troubles should count themselves among the blessed.

Betty Van, for example, has almost everything; a good home, loving husband, three children. Her husband's mother lives with them, and helps a lot in the kitchen and with the children. This is all splendid, except that the old lady has a sad outlook on life. She wants to tell dreary tales of sickness and death, hardships and accidents. Betty is afraid she will depress the children, and make them morbid and neurotic.

Miss Norris assures Betty that there is little danger that youngsters three to five years old will be affected by gloomy stories. The little ones cannot understand, and wouldn't care if they could. At that age they are interested only in themselves. On the other hand, they will benefit greatly by their grandmother's care and instruction. Betty is fortunate to have such a willing and able helper, adds Miss Norris.

if she wasn't so gloomy, I'm afraid it will affect the children. She wants to talk of sick-beds and sorrows and what happened to her friends in the way of sudden death and dreadful accident, and every morning she sighs and reads Van the names in the list of deaths. Do you suppose my children will catch this dismal outlook; I am naturally cheerful and optimistic, and so is Van, but sometimes I'm afraid she will pull us all down to her level. And yet it would be frightfully hard to tell Granny that we wanted her to live elsewhere."

No, Betty, it won't affect the children, and it's for you rather to cheer the old girl up with attentive interest in her sad tales, and hopeful comment wherever you can put it in. You have in her a devoted cook and nurse, one to whom the children's safety is dearer even than to you, and any young mother you know would envy you.

We had a nurse years ago who used to take us to the nearby graveyard and let us play there, month out and in, while she worked on a special shroud that she was eventually to wear, and that was supposed to have some mystic merit. We took deep interest in the shroud and loved the gravestones where we played house, ship pirates, circus and everything else that suggested life and youth. It's a lucky man who has his mother under his roof, living in harmony with his wife, and keeping a loving watch on his children. Hold on to your luck!

Cautions About Bluing

Bluing is sometimes used in an attempt to cover or camouflage yellowness or dinginess caused by poor washing methods. Careful washing and rinsing to insure a white wash are effective. When bluing is used, it must be handled with care to avoid streaks and blue spots. Mix the bluing in the water just before using, and keep the clothes in motion while they are in it. It is safest to dip the garments in the bluing water a few at a time; never let them stand and soak.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

FEAST DAYS OF A PEOPLE

LESSON TEXT — Leviticus 20:7, 8; 23:4-6, 15, 16, 24, 27, 28, 34, 39-44. GOLDEN TEXT—The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad.—Psalm 126:3.

God wants His people to enjoy their religious life. Being in fellowship with Him is not something to dampen one's spirits, but rather to give joy and enthusiasm full liberty. Even with Israel in those early days when Christ had not come and they had only the promises and types of His coming, He arranged for regular religious feasts or festivals which brought the people together to worship Him.

One can well imagine the delightful fellowship as friends, acquaintances and especially relatives from various places went up to the feast together. Personal joy was heightened by the great spiritual joy which they shared.

The obvious lesson for us is that we who know Christ and have peace and liberty in Him should enjoy our Christian anniversaries to the full in a manner well-pleasing to Him. We need such occasions to renew our faith, to quicken our joy, and to cause us to remember God's grace and His blessings.

The first of the assigned Scripture passages does not directly relate to the feasts of God's people but rather speaks of:

I. The Holiness of the Lord (Lev. 20:7, 8).

God is holy and His people in their earthly walk are to show that they have been sanctified by Him. This involves a separation from worldly practices and an eagerness to do the will of God.

Keeping the statutes of God should be the delight of His people, not a burden or a trial. There is real liberty in conformity to law. Holiness makes for freedom and fruitfulness.

Now we turn to the consideration of the feasts of the Lord. In selecting the verses two of the feasts were omitted, so we shall include Leviticus 23:3, 9-12 with the others assigned.

II. The Feasts of the Lord (Lev. 23:3-6, 9-12, 15, 16, 24, 27, 28, 34, 39-44).

This is one of the great chapters of the book of Leviticus presenting both practical and prophetic teaching. The holy "feasts" and the "set times" of Israel (which we shall consider under the one heading of "feasts") were for their spiritual instruction and edification, but they also reveal God's prophetic purpose for both Israel and the Church.

1. The Sabbath (v. 3). This is not strictly considered one of the feasts but a set time—a holy convocation to be held after six days of labor. It is the type of the rest that God has in mind for His people. (See Heb. 4:1-11).

A word of admonition is in order regarding America's awful disrespect for and misuse of our day of rest—the Lord's day. Is it not time we did something about the desecration of Sunday?

2. The Passover and the Unleavened Bread (vv. 4-6). These could be considered separately but they are closely related. The Passover spoke of the Lamb of God who was to shed His blood on the cross, even as it pointed back to redemption by blood on that dark night in Egypt (Exod. 12:12, 13).

The unleavened bread speaks of holiness. This is not the result of "servile work" (v. 8), but a showing forth of faith in the offering of fire.

3. The Firstfruits (vv. 9-12). Just as the one sheaf was waved before the Lord as the earnest of the harvest, so Christ in His resurrection is the firstfruits of them that sleep in the grave. (See I Cor. 15:20-23.) Note that it was waved "on the morning after the Sabbath" (v. 11), which is the resurrection morning—our Sunday. What a blessed thought!

4. Pentecost (vv. 15, 16). Fifty days after the feast of firstfruits came a new meal offering; two wave loaves are presented before the Lord. This new meal offering speaks of the believing people of Christ, and so it came to pass that it was on Pentecost that the Holy Spirit was poured out on the Church (Acts 2:1-4), just fifty days after the resurrection of Christ.

5. Trumpets (v. 24). This looks forward to the day when God shall call His people Israel in the latter days. This will bring them together for the great day of

6. Atonement (vv. 27, 28). On that day Christ shall take away the sin of His people (Zech. 13:1), and they shall be prepared for the crowning and joyous feast of

7. The Tabernacles (vv. 34, 39-44). This was the great feast of ingathering of the products of the year. Israel then dwelt in booths to recall their days in the wilderness. It was a time of full rejoicing, when sorrow and crying were put away. It is the type of Israel's ultimate restoration and full blessing.

Such are the feasts of the Lord—delightful and faith-stimulating—for Israel and for us!

Household Hints

Put ground allspice, cloves, mace and nutmeg in shakers on the table and let the folks choose their own spices on their desserts.

To keep suede or kid gloves in good condition in a damp climate, put them in a dry mason jar and seal.

Soak such things as greasy overalls in a good soap solution and thereby make it easier for the washer to do its job.

The trouble with re-making knitted discards is their unraveling when cut, but that, too, can be avoided when you know how. Give better grade wool pieces a single crochet edge immediately after cutting, while unraveling can be stayed in lighter wool pieces with a row or two of machine stitching. Fleeced cottons should give no trouble.

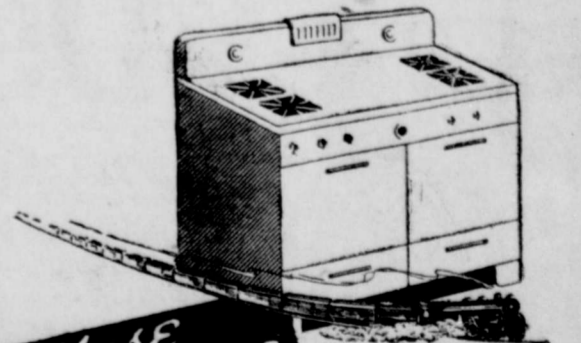

Gunnison invented a prefabricated house and worked out a plan to build it in mass production. His units were scientifically constructed, insulation built in, thoroughly modern in every detail. Individually, his house models are so different that a tourist might drive past 100 of them in a row and never guess that they were drawn by the same architect.

### Alike and Different

I could talk for hours about Gunnison houses. They come in eight sizes with great variety in looks. They are far better than any house possible to build of old-line materials in any community for the same money. They have everything from bathtub to garbage grinder, economy and convenience; a poor man's palace, amortized to \$1 a day. But the inventor sold to the U. S. Steel Corporation.—Why?

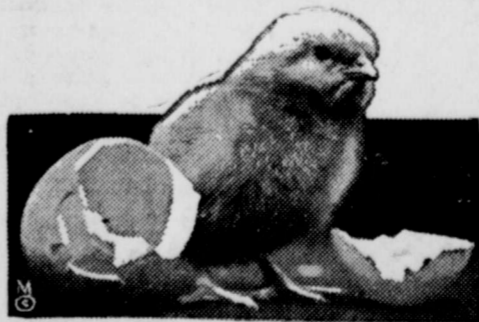

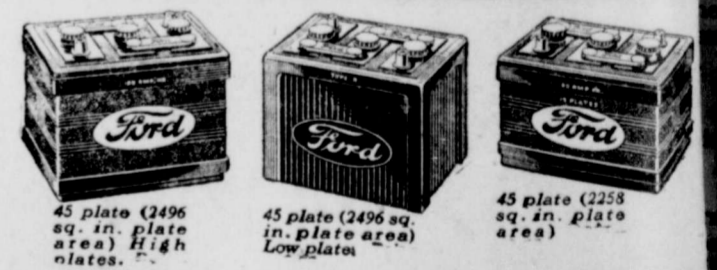
