### Blouse From One Yard of Fabric



HERE is a smart blouse that even the most inexperienced sewer can put together in a couple of hours. Very pretty too. Takes just one yard of fabric in size 12use flowered or plain rayon silk or satin. Bind the neck with a double facing of self material, which forms the ties; pinch-pleat the cap sleeves and fasten with a bow, attach sash ties to back-and there

#### Auto Wages

Emerging haggard and bewhiskered from the conference room after 17 hours of continuous negotiation between CIO-United Automobile Workers and General Motors officials, UAW Pres. R. J. Thomas muttered: "Considering everything, I think we've got a pretty good

strike, the pact did provide substantial wage and other concessions to the union, though falling short of UAW goals. Despite the long-drawn bickering, the company granted only 181/2 cents an hour instead of the 191/2 cents demanded, and the average G. M. wage was set at from \$1.12 to \$1.301/2 cents an hour, still below the Ford and Chrysler pay

By obtaining important concessions from the company, however, UAW officials claimed that the total financial gain would exceed the 191/2 cents an hour sought. Gains included adjustment of inequalities in wage rates in certain plants, improved vacation pay up to 41/2 per cent of gross income of employees of five years or more, double time the job, and equal compensation for

In winning substantial pay conpaid a heavy price in lost wages of between 138 million and 150 milestimated to have dropped 600 million dollars in unfilled orders while distributors lost 150 million dollars in sales commissions.

#### Production Prospects

With the settlement of the G. M. strike, the auto industry hoped to clear the decks for all-out production to meet the tremendous pentup demand for new cars. Because ny parts suppliers still have to the threat to full-scale output re-

In any event, the auto industry will be unable to meet the goal of six million cars set for 1946. With reasonably clear sailing, it is expected that three million passenger vehicles will be turned out during the remainder of the year.

#### Other Strikes

Despite settlement of the General Motors strike and the agreement between General Electric and the CIO-United Electrical Workers, strikes continued to cloud the postwar economic picture, with the dispute between International Harvester and the CIO-Farm Equipment Workers the most serious.

With International Harvester and the union deadlocked over the company's proposal that an 18 cent wage raise be conditioned upon government grant of an offsetting price increase, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson called upon management and labor to co-operate in the production of vitally needed equipment to meet the big crop goals. Unless farmers are able to step up the output, he said, this country will be unable to furnish sufficient food to avert mass starvation abroad.

# Where Is Your New Home

Right now the home you want to build is in the tree, the iron ore pits, the clay banks and the quarry.

Legislation, HH priorities, allocations, preference ratings, will not build a home. Neither will such legal juggling of a meagre supply of materials produce building materials. An HH priority may mean little more than a license to hunt home-building materials.

Lumber and building material dealers and contractors can build all the homes America needs—if building materials are available. But unless production of materials is unblocked, no one can build homes. Whether a house is labeled "Public Housing" or "Prefabricated Housing" or a "Privately Built Home"-all are bidding for the same supply of materials.

Here are the materials that must be produced. These are the materials in short supply which are subject to distribution controls through priorities:

Lumber-Millwork Concrete Block-Common Brick Clay Sewer Pipe-Face Brick Structural Clay Tile-Gypsum Board Cast Iron Soil Pipe-Gypsum Lath Cast Iron Radiation-Bath Tubs

What has happened that all these essential building materials are lacking? Have we exhausted raw material supply? Or plant production?

NO! But the irristible force of industry has run into an immovable body!

In the case of Brick and Tile, for example, it took the OPA six months to grant a price adjustment that allowed 125 of 400 closed plants to reopen. This action resulted in a 35% increase in production within the following three months.

Similarly, OPA's unrealistic pricing policies blocked adequate production of Gypsum board and lath, cast iron soil pipe, and clay sewer pipe for months.

Although price adjustments have been granted in the above-mentioned fields, lumber production still remains under wartime pricing formulas.

It is still more profitable for the lumber mill to cut items for export to foreign countries, or to cut logs into sizes used by industry than it is to manufacture lumber for home construction. Premium prices for industrial items have been granted in some instances during the war, but now that peace has come, price adjustments encouraging home construction lumber have not been made by OPA.

Price adjustments are needed to obtain maximum production of hardwood flooring, millwork, ceiling, siding, and plywood.

Recommendations have been made to the OPA repeatedly, but action is not forthcoming.

The Building Industry stands ready to build the homes Americans need. But until the production and flow of materials is unblocked by OPA, thousands upon thousands of homes for Americans and veterans will go unbuilt.!

Any government program that does not FIRST remove the obstacles blocking production of materials will simply add additional difficulties to the problem facing the building industry.

In one sentence, that's what I think about the so-called Full Employment Bill, already passed by the Senate and

If our congressmen fasten upon the Federal government an obligathey will be saying. "We represent a commonwealth of incompetents, unable to take care of themselves." America's vast resources, her enormous productive capacity, trained minds, skilled hands and huge markets will amount to nothing if our people lose their initiative, selfreliance and self-starters.

No man and no nation can revel long in liberty and shirk the responsibilities that go with it, for human freedom is a gift from above. How parallel to Guadalcanal has been the defense of representative, home front. Deafening weapons of the Axis powers failed to destroy this republic. American ingenuity, sharpened by hope of achievement; American skill, whetted by ambition to advance; America's power to produce, fused in the furnace of open competition: These won the noisy battles.

But the same things will not cure the plague of poisoned minds. That's another problem. Helplessness, dependence on the state and false philosophies are like tropical fever in the blood. If it has penetrated all the way to Capitol Hill, if we enact federal law encouraging the malady, then the case is serious indeed. The fate of the Full Employment Bill will determine whether the United States is becoming imbecile.
