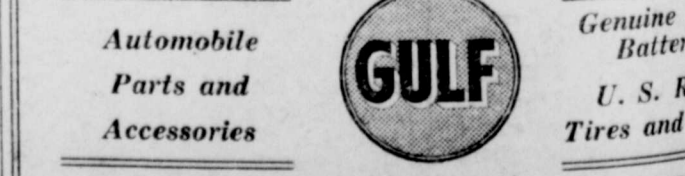
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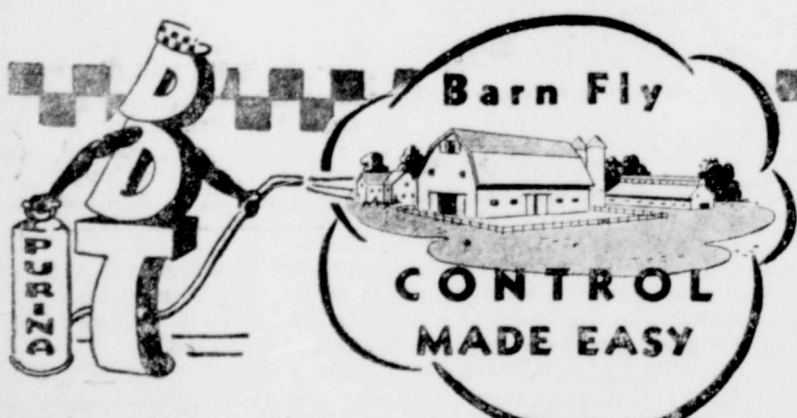

"NO NATIVE has ever seen all of Texas — and no visitor ever will."

A huge, incredibly rich piece of real estate, with more cattle than human beings, and ranches described in square miles rather than acres!

Texas derives its name from "tejas," meaning friend or ally. Six great flags have flown over the state — Spanish, French, Mexican, Republic of Texas, Confederate and United States. But no one nation built Texas, or developed it. It was built by the Texans, a breed apart. They conquered it, and they made it over to suit their taste. They did it with rifles, six-shooters and bowie

and corn and cotton in between. No one can predict when the "norther," a sharp, cold wind, will strike any part of the state. Nearly a million acres are irrigated, and such cities as San Antonio, Houston, Galveston and El Paso get their water from artesian wells. There are 230 kinds of fish in lakes and streams, and 4,000 different wild flowers blossom within its borders.

Between the twisted salt cedars of the Gulf coast and the desert reaches of ocotillo and sotol in the west, there are 12 million acres of commercial forests, 550 kinds of grasses and 100 varieties of cactus. There are alligators on the coast, horned toads in the desert, and rattlesnakes wherever you find them. Once 60 million buffalo grazed in Texas, and it still knows the armadillo, chaparral bird and road-runner.

Here is a land of forest and desert, of fertile fields and jagged mountains, of rolling prairies, sleepy rivers and wide Gulf beaches. And here Texans created Houston with its 50-mile ship channel to the Gulf; San Antonio's ancient houses with yard-thick adobe walls — and skyscrapers; Dallas, the city of the north; Fort Worth, the cow town; Austin, the capital; Galveston, picturesque port and beach; El Paso, with American energy and Mexican color. It is suitable that there should be added such as Randolph field, "the West Point of the air corps," and Fort Sam Houston, the army's largest post. Oil wells have brought scores of El Dorados to the state, and Texas natural gas is piped to Colorado, Kansas, Wyoming, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Illinois. If the gas ever runs out, plenty of coal remains.

Quotations like these tell the story of Texas: "Who'll go with old Ben Milam into San Antonio?" "I'm going to Texas — to fight for my rights," a Tennessean on his way to join Texas' War for Independence. "The Americans were so stubborn that not one of them would surrender," Gen. Santa Anna. "Ride like Mexicans, shoot like Tennesseans, and fight like the devil," the Texas Rangers. "Thermopylae had its messenger of defeat; the Alamo had none," inscription. "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!" Sam Houston. "The Republic of Texas is no more," Anson Jones.

The shrine of Texas is the Alamo where 182 men, including Travis, Crockett, Bowie and Bonham, refused to escape or surrender. At Goliad, a Texas force under Fannin surrendered and was massacred. At San Jacinto, the furious Texans, under Sam Houston, in 20 minutes shattered Santa Anna's army and won independence for Texas.

Texas, still in cowboy boots, has its great trading centers and seaports, its flying fields and oil derricks, its mines and fields, and cattle ranges. It retains its old flavor, but combines the glories of its past with new energies and new horizons. In agriculture, industry, culture and recreation, the Texas tradition of "biggest and best" is making new strides.

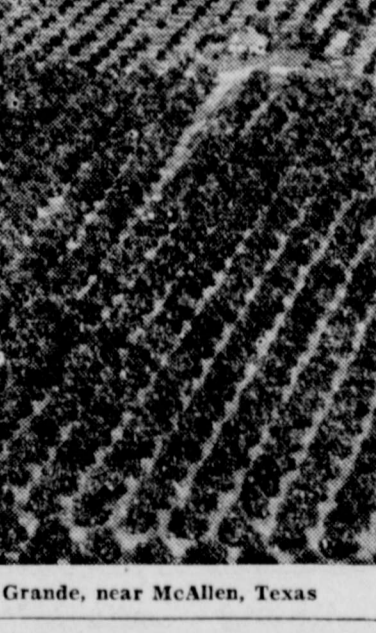

Control of Lice Means Healthier Thriving Flock

Body lice have come to be recognized as one of the costliest parasite menaces on the poultry farm. Yet these pests are relatively easy to control if the flock owner is persistent in his efforts to eradicate them.

Control of lice is of importance because their presence in large numbers lowers egg production and, if the mass of the parasites is great enough may occasionally cause the death of some chickens.

There are two generally accepted methods for exterminating lice. The simplest method is to apply a commercial nicotine preparation to the perches just before the birds go to roost. The heat of the fowl's bodies acts to release poisonous fumes from the nicotine preparation, the fumes having a deadly effect on the lice. The other method is by direct application of an anti-lice preparation to the individual birds.

Whichever method is desired, it should be borne in mind that the birds should be examined from time to time to see if lice are still present. While it may not be necessary to treat the birds every month, it is recommended that the flock be examined at least once or twice each month to determine their need for treatment. A farmer who examines his pullets before housing them in the fall may wait several months before checking again and then finds that his birds are so lousy they are not doing well.

In applying the nicotine preparation, the material is spread onto the perches from a self-applying container or with a small brush. Every roost and other likely spot for roosting should be painted. However, if lime has been applied to the droppings boards, nicotine should not be used. Care should be exercised to see that none of the birds is allowed to roost on an untreated area.

Mack Taylor to Run For Congress In 13th District

Wichita Falls Man Will Follow Platform of FDR If Elected

Issuing a formal statement of his political beliefs and projected policy, Mack Taylor, candidate in the Democratic primary July 27 as congressional representative from the 13th District, declared that, if elected, he will support "the Democratic party in every effort to forward the plans and policies of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Taylor's application for candidacy in opposition to Ed Gossett, incumbent, was filed last Thursday with M. L. Tittle, chairman of the Wichita County Democratic Executive Committee. The 13th Congressional District comprises Archer, Wichita, Baylor, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Knox, Montague, Throckmorton, Wilbarger, Wise and Young counties.

Considering in detail major and minor legislative problems now confronting congress, Taylor declared, "I follow General MacArthur in his recent assertion that all nations must renounce war as an instrument of national policy. This is the first and biggest of all public issues," he continued, "and it must be settled as the foundation of all other constructive national or international action."

Pointing out that the national destiny of this country is a matter to be determined by the congress and the people, Taylor said, "I hold that a reactionary Churchill or any other representative of a foreign power who comes to our shores to deliver an inflammatory, imperialistic plea for our cooperation should be ignored."

HIGHER SOLDIER PAY

In reference to the Selective Service Act, Taylor asserted that the present measure should be allowed to expire, but that voluntary enlistment should be encouraged by the establishment of a higher minimum pay bracket for enlisted men.

"Since we have the biggest and best navy in the world, the largest and best air force and the atomic bomb," he said, "I believe that all military personnel requirements could be met on a voluntary basis, doing away with the drafting of men, if the minimum enlisted man's pay was set at \$75 per month.

"I am in favor," he continued, "of distinction by insignia only."

Taylor has included in his platform the establishment of a positive, U. S. civilian control over atomic research, the atomic bomb and all other secret, U. S.-developed weapons.

"We want to take these things from the control of the Washington brass-hats," he said.

75-Cent Hourly Wage

Discussing the current labor scene, Taylor said he will support "to the fullest extent" all legislative action to establish a wage and hour law in support of a minimum wage of 75 cents an hour for a 40-hour work week, with time-and-one-half for all time in excess of 40 hours.

"This is but a subsistence wage in relation to present living costs," he said. "Consider the case of a laborer, the head of a family of five, who earns his minimum basic pay. At the end of a standard 40-hour he would gross \$30. Present withholding taxes average about 20 per cent of wages. Thus your laborer would earn a take-home pay of approximately \$24 a week. I, for one, wouldn't like to see the result of a man with a family trying to live on anything less than this amount," he said.

"Mack Taylor will also give his full support," the candidate continued, "to all legislation limiting certain present opportunistic labor practices of utilities and corporations. I have been told by employees of certain Texas utilities that these companies do not pay overtime in excess of 40 hours."

Turning to the consideration of present federal rent and price controls, Taylor expressed the conviction that rent controls should be maintained "until the present acute housing shortage is eliminated. This can be done by a positive government building program in cooperation with local private contractors. Once such a program is achieved, I believe that all rent controls should be abolished," he declared.

Farm Prices

"Regarding OPA food subsidies and controls, I believe the federal government should put a floor under farm prices that will be satisfactory to the farmer, and should remove farm price ceilings. I am convinced," he continued, "that this should be a basic policy, applicable as well to the oil production industry. I advocate the establishment of a per-barrel floor of \$1.58 and removal of all present OPA ceiling prices on independently produced crude."

Taking a stand for reduction of federal tax machinery, Taylor declared that the present plan requiring taxpayers to file estimates on future earnings should be abolished.

"I am also for the exemption from income tax payment of all married persons with annual incomes of less than \$5,000," he said.

Taylor stated emphatically that if elected, he would especially concern himself with the expansion of rural electrification projects, as well as a program to supply directly to all rural consumers "the surplus power now being generated at the \$55,000,000 Denison dam and the \$12,000,000 Mineral Wells dam.

"This current," he asserted, "is now being purchased for distribution by private power utilities at a price they are ashamed to make public. I propose to halt this practice, which is a matter of dollars and cents interest to every farmer and rancher in Texas.

"Get a Power Saw"

"Expansion of this program means that every farmer and rancher who have available a low-cost power source for refrigeration, lighting and machine operation," he said. "To the farmer, I say, 'Let's cut out the wood cutting and get a power saw.'"

In conclusion, Taylor said he believed the interests of farm, ranch and independent business in the 13th District could be better served in congress by the election of a successful, independent businessman, who from direct experience knows and can correctly evaluate such problems, than by the election of a lawyer."

Citing a recent Jackson Day speech by Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace, who deplored the harm done the Democratic party by "those who have joined in a coalition against progress," Taylor charged that Congressman Ed Gossett "has clearly indicated by his record that he is a mugwump of the worst sort.

"I also pledge myself," he concluded, "not to wear a Texas Regular necktie in Texas and in Washington, out of sight of my constituents, a Hoover cravat."
