## WE'RE FACING A FEED FAMINE

The current feed shortage, already one of the most severe in our history, is getting increasingly worse. Some parts of the country face a feed famine. The next 75 days will be particularly crucial, though they will not see the end of our feed problems.

The American Feed Manufacturers Association has announced that commercial feed makers are suffering shortages of all ingredients and will be able to fill only about 50 to 70 per cent of their customers' demands in May. Some may be forced to close.

These shortages inevitably will be reflected in reduced supplies of milk, eggs, and meats. It is absolutely imperative that every feeder in the country recognize the delicate feed situation that will exist during the next 75 days.

The feed manufacturer, feed dealer, and farmer—and ultimately the consumers of milk, eggs, and meat are in the same boat, the victims of the same circumstances. Together with the Government, they must work the problem out through patience and careful planning.

## ANNOUNCEMENT OF POPPY DAY

Poppy Day will be observed in Burkburnett and throughout the United States on Saturday, May 25, Virginia McConnell, President of Oscar Frye Post No. 264 Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, has announced.

Memorial poppies to be worn in honor of the dead of both world wars will be distributed on the streets throughout the day by volunteer workers from the Auxiliary and cooperating organizations. Contributions received in exchange for the flowers will be used in relief and rehabilitation work for disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

The poppies are crepe paper replicas of the European wild poppy which bloomed on the battlefields of France and Belgium in both wars and which has become a world-wide symbol of remembrance of America's dead.

Poppies will be more generally worn this year than ever before, it is predicted.

With peace restored and the men coming home, every one will want to pay tribute to those who can never come back to us by wearing a poppy in their honor on Poppy Day.

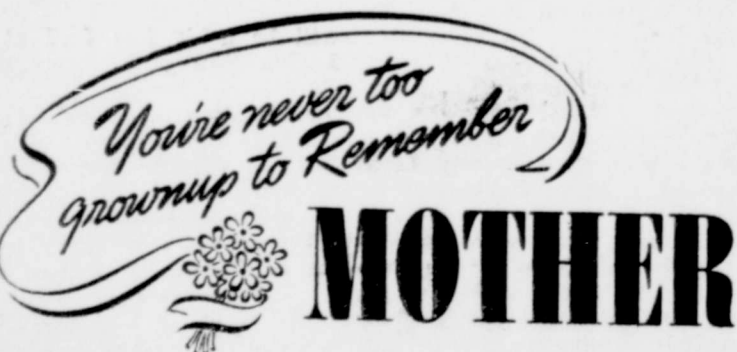

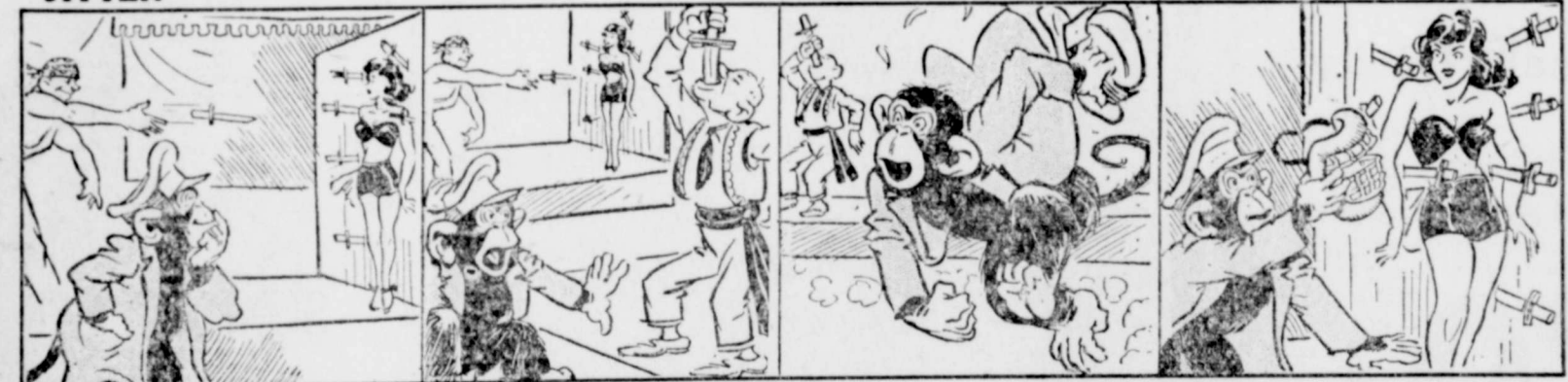

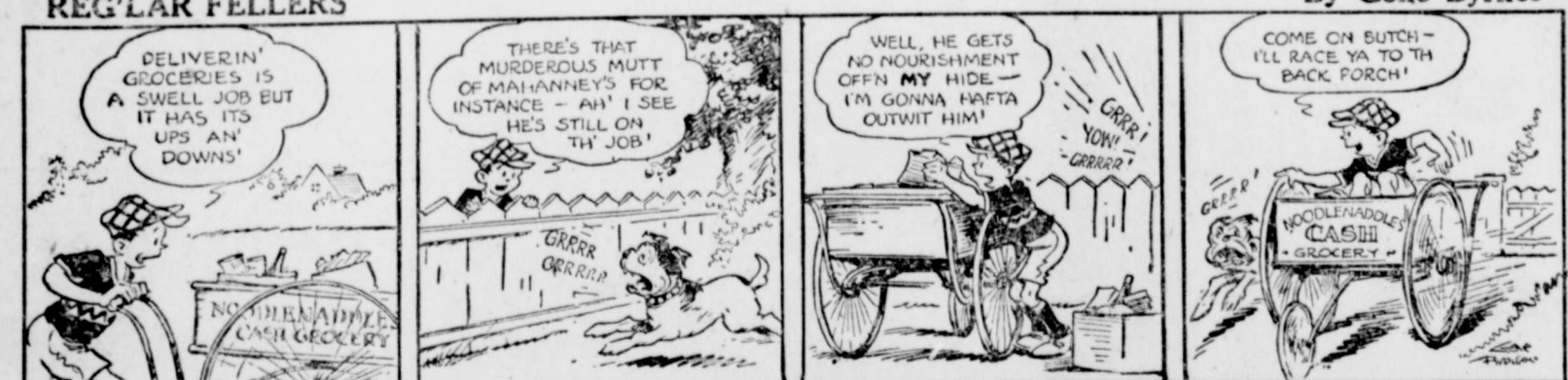

**The SNAPSHOT GUILD**  
IT'S UP TO YOU



It's the man behind the camera that counts. This picture, for example, is typical of the kind that can be made with inexpensive cameras.

ONE of the most pleasant things about photography is the thrill that comes from owning fine equipment. It's grand to have a fine precision camera with a fast lens—one that's ideally adapted to shooting fast action, or for picture taking when the light is weak—but one thing that most people never realize is that, for general snaphooting purposes, expensive equipment isn't at all necessary.

For instance, do you think that expensive equipment will fit you any better to "see" good compositions, or to use light more intelligently, or to better see pictures in the interesting little events that take place around your home every day? Of course not! There isn't a camera made at any price that can tell you how, when, or where to make a picture—or the best angle to shoot from when you do find a subject. So don't worry about equipment. Use the best camera that you have available, and then learn from experience and the work of others as you go along.

For example, try studying the pictures that appear in magazines, newspapers, and pictorial books. You'll find pictures of gardens, buildings, homes, people, animals, pets, close-ups, and, in fact, just about every type of picture you'll ever want to make, in such publications. Note carefully the different angles from which some of those shots were taken. Study, too, the lighting, the shadows, and the poses. By doing that you'll soon develop an "eye" for pictures, and you'll shortly be making pictures you thought were possible only with a highly precise, and a relatively expensive, new camera.

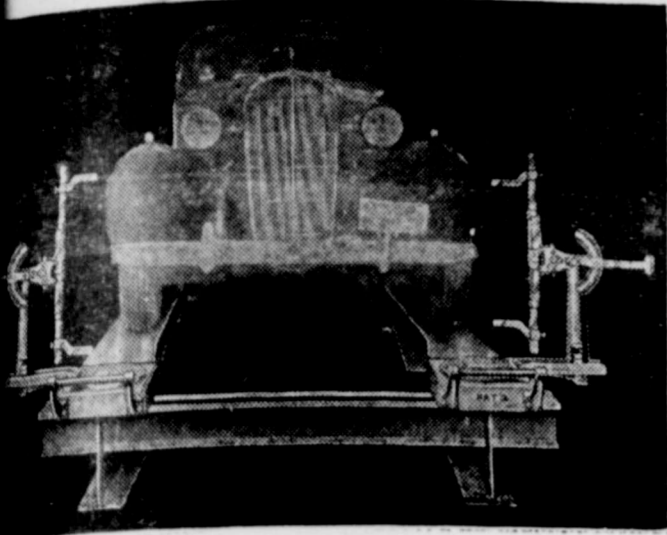

Ex-Service Men Open Garage Featuring Bear Equipment for Aligning Wheels

Wendell Goins and E. J. Tatum, both honorably discharged from the service last December, have opened a garage in a new building just North of Boyd Bros. store. These men bring Burk Burnett motorists a new service, a Bear machine for front wheel alignment.

Wendell Goins, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Goins, is a graduate of Fairview High School, one year at Hardin Junior College, one year at Texas Tech, and one year in Wichita Engineering, where he secured license as a Civilian Motor Mechanic. He was in the service 20 months, receiving his basic at Camp Hood, going overseas immediately with the 3rd Infantry Division. He was overseas 8 months, 54 days on the front lines and was wounded twice in that time. Mr. Goins is married and has one child.

E. J. Tatum, formerly of Big Spring, is a graduate of Brownwood High School, with three years in Daniel Baker College at Brownwood. Mr. Tatum was in the Navy two years, first at San Francisco, then to Jacksonville, Fla., and on to a station in Nevada. Prior to going into the service he was with the Chevrolet Motor Co. for 15 years in the mechanical department.

Both young men are sons-in-law of Carl Miller.

Service at Goins and Tatum Garage includes the Bear machine, Merrill Electronic Wheel Balancer, Sun Motor Tune-up machine and general repair work. **Washington News Letter**

By Congressman Ed Gossett

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23.—As I am in Texas this week, this letter is being written by my secretary from notes and suggestions which I left in my Washington office before my departure.

One important development this week was the government's curtailment of passenger and freight services by the nation's railroads as a result of a coal shortage due to the strike bound coal mines. This will force a general curtailment of all industry, and the complete shutdown of some basic lines. In our complex economy a coal shortage, a steel shortage, or a transportation shortage has wide effect on all of our people.

As I have said many times in the last few years, the power of labor union leaders over American economy is an insult to our democracy. The current coal strike is the most serious problem on the domestic front at this time, and unless it is settled soon our reconversion program will be paralyzed and production on all fronts will be bottlenecked.

We Americans have a habit of thinking that we, as the greatest nation and the wealthiest one, have everything we need within our own boundaries. World War II proved this to be entirely untrue. When the Japanese occupied the Pacific territories, we lost our largest sources of supply of rubber, tin, hemp, pepper, and other spices, to mention only a few items.

A good many of my friends at home have written me about the great waste of supplies and materials on the part of the armed services. While this is admitted, in confidence, by high-ranking military officials, and is common knowledge to many, the difficulty is that little can be done unless specific names, dates, places, items and destruction are observed. Otherwise, getting investigations and corrections of such waste is similar to prosecuting a person without being able to produce any evidence against him.

"This assistance is available to the farmers and ranchers of the District without any cost to them," states Mr. Pace, "and the help they can give in working out a plan on the cultivated, pasture and range land is something every farmer should take advantage of." The Iowa Park Work Unit Soil Conservation Service staff will consist of trained men in soils, agronomy, engineering and range work. Mr. Fred Parkey, returned veteran with the Marines, is in charge of the Unit Office at Iowa Park.

Mr. Pace says those landowners who are interested should get in contact with the office located in City Hall at Vernon, or office located in Iowa Park, or with any Agricultural Agency in County or any of the District Supervisors. The District Supervisors of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District are: Tom Pace, Iowa Park; Arthur Ramming, Rt. 4, Wichita Falls; H. J. Flusche, Electra, in Wichita County portion of District; and Claude H. Price, Thalia; and Phip Spears, Odell, from Wilbarger County portion of the District.

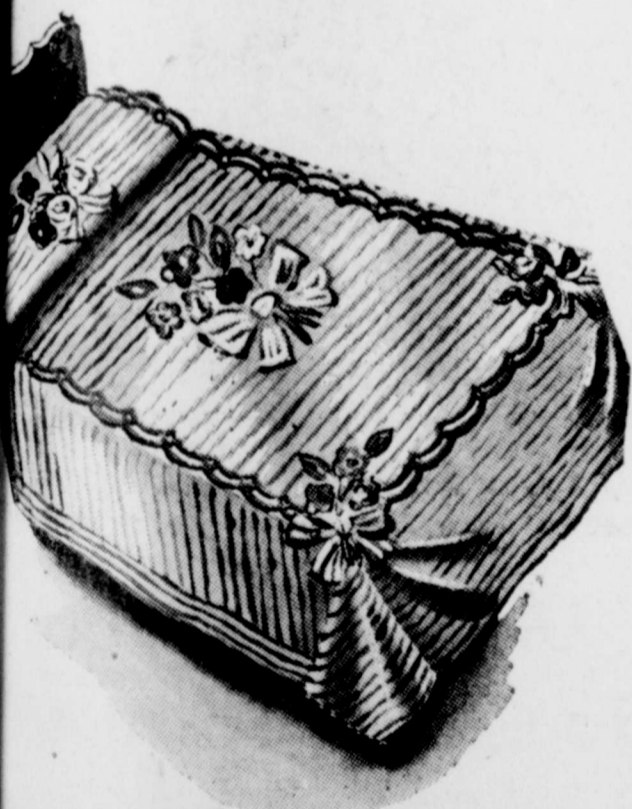

ARMY: Tighten Discipline

With the low state of discipline leading to loss of respect for American authority by the enemy and injury to our reputation among the Allies, Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, U. S. commander in Europe, ordered all unit commanders to look up on personnel.

OVERSEAS RELIEF: UNRRA Aid

Set up to provide relief for war-stricken areas, the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration furnished 4 million tons of supplies costing almost 700 million dollars up to December 31, 1945, but help extended constitutes only a drop in the bucket compared to overall requirements.

ITALY: Fascist Underground

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for May 12

LEARNING TO LIVE TOGETHER

LEARNING TEXT—Matthew 18:21-35. Q. What does it mean to be a disciple? A. To have love for one another.—John 13:35.

One world! Men have discovered in recent years that we do live in one world and that we must learn how to get along with one another, or we may find that we have destroyed civilization and one another.

God has always taught in his Word that all men are of one origin, and that despite their differences, they are to live in unity and peace. That would have been blessedly true if men had obeyed God and his law. So brought heaven and confusion.

Now in our day, when we should be far on the way to the attainment of God's purpose, we find men more inclined than ever to be suspicious of one another, grasping in their desires and purposes, and evil in many of their ways.

We have not yet learned to live together as nations. Let us set ourselves to the task of living together. Let us begin by dealing with differences. (Matt. 18:21-35)

This is the God-prescribed method for dealing with personal problems in the Christian church. That body in which love should reign is often rent by jealousies and personal animosities. If permitted to run on unchecked, they create divisions and even strife before the world, with all the disgrace it brings on the name of Christ.

Such matters are to be dealt with promptly. The aggrieved one is not to wait for the sinner to make the approach, but is to go to him and place before him the evidence of his guilt. Done in kindness and with love, this is frequently all that needs to be done. A man may thus win his brother, with no further ado or fuss in the church.

If he proves stubborn, the next step is to bring some brethren along and talk it over again. This evidence of their concern may break the stubbornness, or their prayers may win him. And if it does not work, the things said and done will have been witnessed by brethren who can faithfully report them to the church.

The final step is to bring the sinner before the church. Now he may see the seriousness of his offense and repent. If not, there is one plain duty: he is to be put outside of the fellowship of the church.

Does that mean that he is abandoned and forgotten? Certainly not. He is to be "as a heathen man and a publican." Does the church have any interest in such individuals? Indeed it does, for the primary business of the church is to win both heathen and publican to fellowship with Christ.

H. A. Measure for Determining Forgiveness (Matt. 18:21, 22). Peter's question was a practical one. He supposed the case of one who sinned repeatedly against one who had shown a forgiving spirit. Most of us need not suppose such cases, we have them before us.

We forgive and are ready to let it all be forgotten, when in the offender turns up with an even greater wrong, indignity or sin! Then there is weeping and apparent repentance, followed almost at once by another offense.

How long is this business to go on? The Jews said, "Three times, then let judgment fall." Peter, being a follower of Christ, went much further. He would forgive seven times. Well, that's a lot of forgiveness; let us recognize that. Most of us haven't even gone as far as the Jews, and Peter is way ahead of us.

But it is not enough! Forgiveness which has any limit set on it is not forgiveness at all. The very genius of forgiveness demands that we do not stand there with a measuring line or an account book, it must be from the heart, without limit and without restraint.

III. A Means for Attaining Greatness (Mark 10:25-45). To want to be truly great for God is certainly not a sin. In a world which was rejecting Christ and getting ready to crucify him, this mother wanted her two boys to have a place of honor in the service of Christ. So far, so good; but then came the thing which spoiled it all—selfishness.

To seek honor for oneself, or for those one loves in order that the ego might be inflated and self given a chance to show off, that is definitely unchristian.

If then it is right to seek proper greatness, how may it be done? Verses 43-45 tell us. It is by way of sacrificial service, the denial of self.

This world and its kingdoms say that the one who serves is inferior to the one who is served. In the kingdom of Jesus it is the one who serves who is greatest.

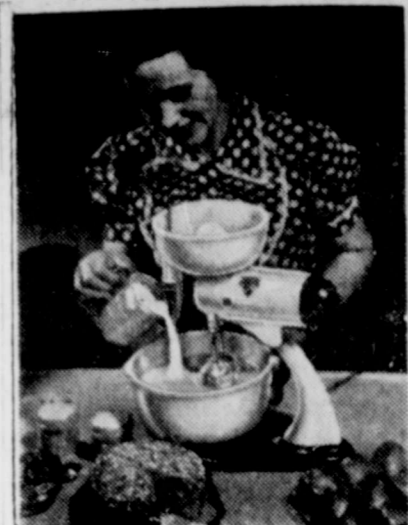
