

never been scarce and pumping facilities were adequate to boost it on to town if there had been another line. Plans for laying additional line were interrupted when the war came on and pipe was not available. An eight inch line comes out from the pump nouse for about one mile where it was reduced to a six inch. The new six inch ties onto the end of the eight inch, giving two six inch lines coming into town, or almost twice as much water as could be pumped through be-With the added facilities in operation, Burkburnett citizens will have plenty of good water and full pressure no matter how much they want to use. Plenty of water will also be

available for\*fire fighting, should there be a need for it. In years past the stand pipe West of Town Hall was held in reserve at all times for fire fighting, and citizens had to be satisfied with



using water from the lines, di ectly from the pump station. That accounted for the weak pressure when too many hydrants in town were opened up. Quality and taste of Burkburnett water are excellent. Samp are regularly sent to be

Early in 1919, Tom, Chas. and Jim Boyd covered all tracks from their South Texas home, and cast their lot with the Burkburnett Boom. They all wore their World War uniforms here, and invested their savings in a new land of fine possibilities. They believed then, as they do now, in the old timers, in the fertility of these soils, in the many resources this land promised.

#### THE OIL BOOM DAYS

Quoting Chas.: "Work was all we knew. We were too doggoned busy to realize how little our lives were worth, but we just kept working night and day. You couldn't go to town at night—someone would break in and take what you had." And Tom: "I've looked down the business end of those dungeon guns several times. I've seen all day gambling games going on out in the field. I and my mule wagon worked that section every day." And Jim: "I worked all over the field helping lay pipe lines, and helped in the store at night." Merchandise was hard to get. There were several small wholesale stores along the tracks. They went from place to place, gathering up something to sell wherever they could find it. Rurh

#### During The Boom Days

Many times mud and slush were wagon bed deep, and mules and horses were the only transportation that could stand it. When going to Thrift you just had to cut across. All fences were down. Every draw and creek had toll bridges. Everybody went oil crazy. Gathering of crops was forgotten. The whole surrounding country was covered with tents, shacks, and some people lived in wagons. #### **Business Houes** Will Close Friday For Celebration



The evils of that period were greatly exaggerated, according to Uncle Tom and he persisted in proving that the town that was described as wide open was really milder than a lamb. The former chief of police retired soon after the boom days, and became actively interested in the real estate business here.

Throughout the boom Griffin maintained a force of at least 10 deputies, and the average was 15 assistants, but according to the veteran policeman there was actually less trouble and the romantic tales are grossly exaggerated. Uncle Tom died December 7, 1939.

#### DAIRY PRODUCTS: On Rise

Even higher prices for dairy products than recent increases granted to spur output were predicted by Stabilization Director Bowles if congress approves of a sharp cut in subsidy payments.

As a result of less stringent reductions, Bowles approved of a boost of 1 cent a quart for milk, 11 cents a pound for butter and 6 cents for cheddar cheese, but, he said, a bigger slash in subsidies would lead to an increase of 3 cents in a quart of milk and bring butter up to as much as 80 cents a pound.

The boosting of prices in the face of subsidy reductions would cost consumers \$250,000,000 a year. Bowles said. Thus, consumers would pay directly for increased prices designed to assure producers of fair returns instead of having the Meanwhile, representatives of the

IV. Prayer of Faith (Luke 11:1-4), pray in faith. He must know how to hold up the world to God, and get things from God for this needy world

There is no one who can teach us to pray better than Jesus, for he practiced what he preached. He prayed. It was seeing him pray that led the disciples to ask him to teach them to pray. Jesus taught his disciples a model prayer. This prayer opens with a recognition of God as Father, followed by a reverent petition that his name may be hallowed; that is, that he may have glory as his will is done and his kingdom established in the hearts of men. Those who have that attitude are ready to ask for the supply of daily needs, and above all, forgiveness of sin and deliverance from temptation.

Note that verse 4 is not the prayer of the unsaved for forgiveness and regeneration, for that is all of grace (Eph. 2:8). "The man outside (of the kingdom) gets his forgiveness with no condition; but once he is in the kingdom of the Son of God's love, he lives within the laws of that kingdom. Then he does not get forgiveness unless he is ready to forgive, unless he has forgiven " (Morgan).

The disciples thought of the kingdom in terms of "when"; they should have asked "what," or even better "who," for the kingdom was present and operative right then because the King was there,

That is the true meaning of "within" (v. 21), which really means "in your midst."
