Leslie King of Harrold In Race For Legislature

A few weeks ago I announced my candidacy for the Legislature in the 112th Floterial District representing Wichita and Wilbarger counties. In asking your support I think you are entitled to know something about me and my political beliefs.

My name is Leslie King and my home is Harrold Texas. There I was born. My father Dr. J. C. King was a Country Doctor who died in 1940. I graduated from the Harrold High School attended Abilene Christian College and University of Texas and from there I went as a private into the U. S. Army in which I served both at home and overseas. I have come back to my home to make a permanent citizen and I am asking your support in the belief that the highest responsibility for the maintenance and preservation of our way of life is dependent upon sound practical legislation.

We are essentially an agricultural community. Our life blood is the soil. All measures of soil conservation now available in the state must be encouraged and adequately financed through state co-operation and where found inadequate a comprehensive program of soil conservation must be inaugurated.

The farmer more than any other business man is dependent upon the chances of nature the rain, the drought, the unexpected season. Among other hazards, he is faced with the possibility of crop destruction by insects and pests. All he can do by himself is not enough. I believe that Texas, through our A & M College, should wage a concerted warfare upon agricultural pests and insects with the most modern chemicals the war has made available to us.

Nothing is more important to Texas than a program of health, and while I am firmly opposed to socialized medicine in any form, I do believe that the State should furnish co-operation to all counties desiring health programs, with particular emphasis on preventative medicine. The campaign against insects is one step in this direction. Such a program should be comprehensive enough that it would supply the same benefits to the rural householder as to the city dweller.

I believe firmly in a policy of good education, and the support of the public schools, will be one of my primary policies. To this end I believe in higher salaries for better teachers, in better equipped buildings, in more adequate transportation facilities for rural schools. Here lies the future hope of our democracy.

I believe in a policy of fairness and equality between management and labor. America needs no ruling class from either side. Every man's right to work and his essential privilege of collective bargaining must be maintained, and all parties of interest must be heard fairly, honestly and without prejudice. We must, at the same time, concern ourselves with the consumer, Mr. and Mrs. Plain America who are dependent upon both capital and labor to maintain their way of life.

I shall advocate and help develop an adequate system of good farm to market roads. To me this is a higher obligation than the building of new highways or new speedways of the state. We of an agricultural state must help develop the road of our farmer if we expect to remain one of the big food markets of the world.

I believe in a program of welfare and old-age assistance based entirely upon a policy of need. Need is an actual thing, and so far as possible, must be defined by law so as to insure equality of treatment, and to remove from every poor man's necessity so far as we can, discrimination and unfair practices. Welfare and assistance, to have any meaning, must mean that the needs of people are met.

I believe in a government of as your representative, I shall progress, but not of waste, and endeavor to be a guardian of the public funds of our state, spending them wisely where need and

Beauford Jester For Rural Roads

An all-weather road within half a mile of 95 per cent of the rural homes in Texas is the goal of Beauford Jester, the candidate for governor declared here, although, he pointed out, Texas already has the biggest farm-to-market road program in the nation.

These roads should be built by the state with federal help and maintained by the state without extra cost to rural people, he said.

Jester expressed strong opposition to the idea of farmers mortgaging their property in order to obtain benefits already enjoyed by workers and citizens of towns.

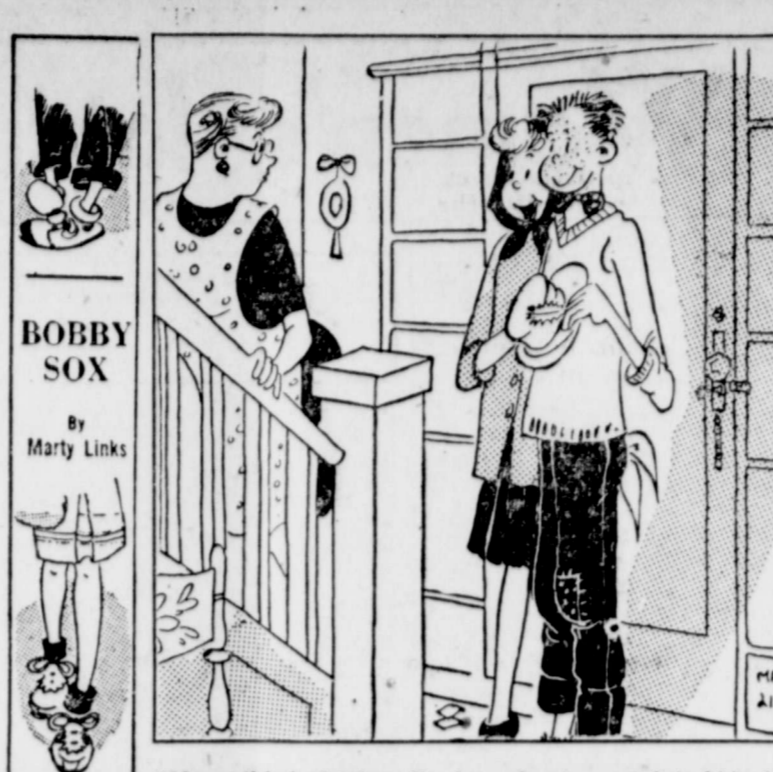

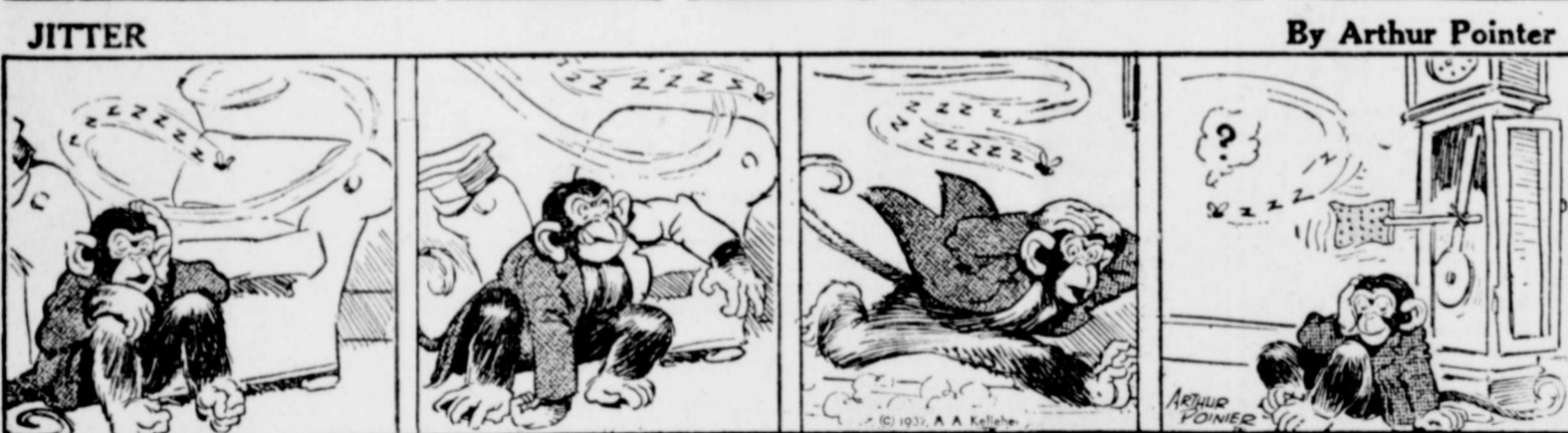

Eat Cake

Today's acute housing shortage was in plain view ten years ago. Experts in the business of building and equipping homes were writing articles and making speeches back in the 1930's forecasting what they called the building boom of the 1940's. They supported their predictions with sound reasoning and leaders in many equipment lines arranged to meet the demand.

A quick look at census figures, years before Pearl Harbor, would have convinced almost anybody that an unusually big share (say 20%) of the U. S. population would reach an age to be married between 1940 and 1946. Patently this would call for more places to live and, true to form under free enterprise, business men began getting ready quietly to serve this market, but war interfered.

Plans Not Executed. Wars always frustrate plans, and few were revised more in World War II than those of the building trades. Priorities on materials, general shortage of labor and the compelling urge for victory changed most things but the predicted need for more housing came right on schedule. It is even bigger than experts estimated ten years ago because war retarded building and accelerated marrying.

Plans made before the war for meeting this expected peak demand are still workable plans. If industry were free today as it was then, people who want homes would be getting them a great deal faster. I believe Herbert U. Nelson of the National Association of Real Estate Boards has proved that Washington bureaucracy is chiefly to blame for today's housing shortage.

Facts to Remember It's an old story that America has housing aplenty, and it was always true until right lately. France, England and other European countries that have endured regulation of home building since World War I have been short of housing meanwhile. Bureaucracy got a firm grip on American building during World War II and now hates to let go, shortage or no shortage.

The O.P.A. is the sorest bunion on the toe of our progress. Here is an illustration: Manufacturers of fir doors got caught behind increased manufacturing costs and asked O.P.A. for permission to raise prices 75c per door. It was refused. Result: No doors by mass production. Carpenters can build doors where they hang them, of course, at much loss of time and at several times normal cost.

Industry Is Ready. A similar man-made muddle built a bottleneck in window sash. There's almost no end to the roster of crippling rules in this one industry. Miles Colean, a thoroughly respected Washington economist, says that industries producing building materials are fully reconverted, full capacity restored. Still the most productive nation of history is handcuffed and can't house itself. Why?

A price-fixing agency, while proclaiming its loyalty to the people, has refused many small strategic upward revisions, thus halting production. Consumers do without things or pay amazing prices for makeshifts. It savors of the Marie Antoinette school of thought. On being informed that by reason of her extravagance her subjects had no bread, she said "Let them eat cake."

Mighty Fittin'—Those Old-Time Tomato Preserves

"How dear to my heart are the scenes of my childhood!" Memories of old oaken buckets belong to a vanishing generation but almost everybody has fond recollections of the favorite foods of his childhood. Every year a good many people write Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director for Ball Brothers Company, manufacturer of fruit jars, requesting a recipe for pickles or preserves "like my mother or grandmother used to make."

An Old Favorite

A recipe popular a half century ago appeared in an early edition of the Ball Blue Book. It reads: "To every pound of small yellow tomatoes allow one pound of sugar. Put the tomatoes and sugar together and to every seven pounds of sugar allow the juice of three lemons. Let stand together all night and in the morning drain off the sirup and boil. (The recipe doesn't tell how long, but 10 minutes should do.) Put in the tomatoes and simmer for twenty minutes after they boil. Remove the tomatoes and allow the sirup to boil until thick. Just before taking from the fire, add the lemon juice. Put the fruit in the jars and cover with boiling sirup. Seal immediately."

If a more modern recipe is wanted, you might try:

- 2½ pounds (peeled) small tomatoes
- 2½ pounds sugar
- 2 cups water
- ¾ ounce whole ginger
- 1½ lemon (sliced thin)
- ½ ounce of stick cinnamon

Boil together water, sugar, lemon and spices for fifteen minutes; add tomatoes, a few at a time, and cook gently until the tomatoes become bright and clear. Then

pour into shallow pans, cover and let stand over night. Pack the cold tomatoes into hot jars and strain the sirup over them. Process twenty minutes at simmering.

Recipe for Less Sugar

If you are wondering where you are going to get the sugar, as who isn't, here is your recipe:

- 2 pounds tomatoes
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups corn sirup, light or dark
- ½ cup water
- 1 lemon
- 1 small orange
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 2 pieces ginger root
- 6 whole cloves
- ½ cup raisins

Use small, firm, red, yellow or green tomatoes. Scald one minute. Dip into cold water. Skin but do not core. Combine sugar, sirup, water, lemon, orange (sliced thin) and spices, and simmer 30 minutes. Remove spices. Add tomatoes and boil gently until they are bright and clear. Add raisins. Cover and let stand over night. Pack cold tomatoes into hot fruit jars. Boil sirup until thick as honey and pour over tomatoes. Process 15 minutes at simmering.

THE STATE OF TEXAS, County of Wichita, Burk Burnett Independent School District.

On this 24 day of June 1946, came on to be considered a petition in writing signed by Mr. Paul Browning and 24 other persons, asking that an election be ordered by this board for the purpose hereinafter set forth: And it appearing to the satisfaction of the board that said petition is signed by at least twenty or more, or a majority, of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of the district who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the election petitioned for should be ordered:

It is, therefore, ordered by the Board of Trustees of Burk Burnett Independent School District that an election be held at City Hall in Burk Burnett Independent School District, on the 20 day of July, A. D. 1946, to determine whether the Board of Trustees of said district shall have power to levy and collect an ad valorem tax on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property in said district, for the maintenance of the public free schools in said Burk Burnett Independent School District and at the rate of not to exceed \$1.50 on the one hundred dollar valuation of tax-

able property in said district, such tax, if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1946, and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

Mr. W. A. Roberts is hereby appointed manager of said election and he shall select a judge and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, or more judges and clerks, if deemed necessary, which shall be held as nearly as may be possible in conformity with the general election laws of the State.

No person shall vote at said election except resident qualified property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

Those desiring to vote in favor of the Maintenance Tax shall have written or printed upon their ballots: "For Maintenance Tax," and those opposed to the proposition shall have written or printed upon their ballots: "Maintenance Tax."

Public notice of said election shall be given by posting notice of the same, signed by the Secretary of this Board, in three different places within the boundaries of the Burk Burnett Independent School District at least ten days prior to the date fixed for the election.

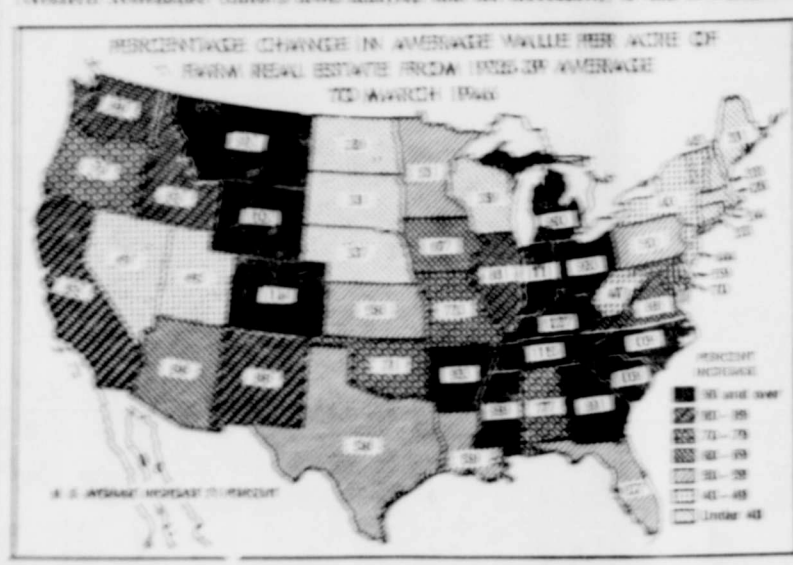
LONELY REEF... Far out in the Pacific, Bikini atoll holds the 97 ships of the "suicide fleet."

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for July 7

THE LAW IN JESUS' DAY

LESSON TEXT - Deuteronomy 6:4-9; Matthew 23:23; Mark 12:29. MEMORIAL SELECTION - Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets. I came not to destroy, but to fulfill. - Matthew 5:17.

Jesus Christ is the believer's final authority. He is both our Saviour and our Lord. He is our teacher, our guide, our pattern in all things.

Our introductory lesson tells us of the origin, interpretation and application of the law, then we go in later lessons to consider the Ten Commandments in the light of the teachings of Jesus.

It is appropriate to point out that, far from being outmoded, the Ten Commandments are really the basis of all moral law. They need a diligent restudy and re-emphasis in our day of disregard of moral standards.

Religion in the household (v. 7) should include the teaching of the Word, and the easy natural discussion of spiritual things in all the varying circumstances of home life.

II. The Law Fulfilled by Jesus. The law of God is eternal, never to be abrogated, never set aside. Christ himself, although we might properly say that he was in reality the lawgiver and thus had power and authority over the law, indicated his purpose in coming to be that of giving the law its full meaning, not of destroying it.

III. The Law Applied to Man. The moral law, which is God's law, is good and in its keeping man finds guidance for his life. Apart from Christ, however, he finds himself unable to keep the law.

Obedience to the commandments brings a man up to the very entrance upon that life, but to enter in he must have more than the "things" of the law; he must have the person who is "the door" to eternal life.

The young man who came to Christ was rich. His mind was obsessed with things. He had made it his business to observe the law, and had done well (v. 20), but his soul was not satisfied. He thought one more "thing" that he could do would accomplish his purpose.

The general attitude of the man was commendable. He sensed his lack of the vital something which would remake his life. He came to the right one—the Lord Jesus—with his question.

His failure to go beyond the things of the law to a faith in Christ, however, showed that he loved his possessions more than he desired to follow the Lord.

War On Rats to Reduce Disease

Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tape worm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health," Dr. Cox said, that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of special importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products.

Intestinal Worms A Major Problem In Poultry Raising

Intestinal worms constitute a major problem in poultry raising. There is scarcely a flock in the U. S. that is not affected by the worm problem. These intestinal parasites are common to every region, and the annual loss from them runs into millions of dollars.

Not all poultrymen realize the damage that intestinal worms can do their flocks. There has even been a prevalent opinion that worms are a natural and relatively harmless companion to domestic fowl. The truth is, they are unnatural and extremely harmful. They may cause stunted growth, reduced egg production, and even death.

Deadly Species

Some common intestinal worms of poultry are: large roundworm, tapeworm, capillarid, and cecal worm. Each of these can be deadly to young birds, if they are heavily infested.

The large roundworm is the most frequently observed species in chickens. The worm is 1 1/2 to 4 inches in length and about as thick as a pencil lead.

The common species of poultry tapeworms vary in length from those barely visible to big fellows, 8 to 10 inches. Tapeworms have flat, segmented bodies.

Another damaging intestinal worm of chickens is the capillarid, a tiny hair-like parasite 1/2 to 3/4 inch long. This worm burrows into the fowl's intestinal wall and causes severe inflammation.

Tiny But Destructive

The cecal worm occurs commonly in the ceca (blind sacs) of chickens and turkeys. This worm is only 1-3 to 1-2 inch long, but highly destructive. The cecal worm carries the organism that causes dread blackhead in turkeys.

Many poultry raisers have adopted a regular worm control program which is started when the birds are young. While they are on range, a monthly flock treatment for intestinal worms keeps most of the common species under control. Thus the growing pullets reach fall housing time unburdened by these worms.

Two or three times a year, an individual worming may be especially beneficial. This is recommended specifically for housing time when the birds are being handled. After worming treatments the flock should be moved to clean range or quarters.

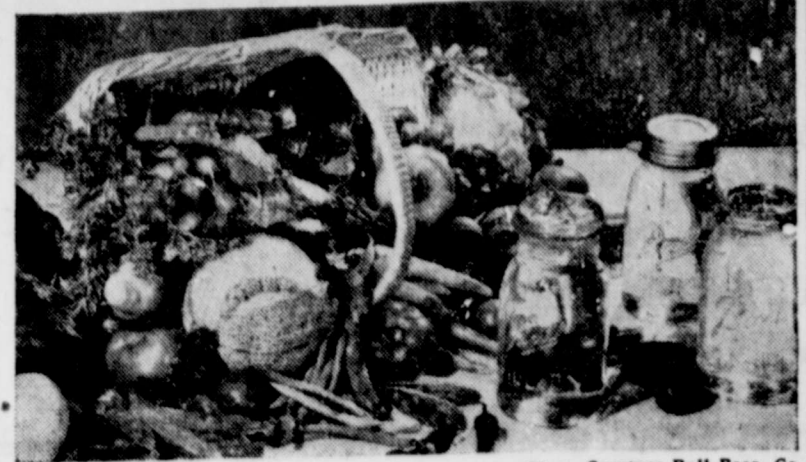

Superior Food Is Yours by Following Rules for Quality Canning

Ask ten women why they put up fruits, vegetables, jams, preserves, etc., and you may get ten different answers but they all add up to economy and flavor.

At present, high living costs are forcing many persons, particularly members of the so-called white-collar class, to accept merchandise of inferior quality or do without, but almost everybody can have vegetables of superior quality and

down. There must be room for water to circulate between the pieces and there should be from 1/2 to 1 inch space between the vegetables and the top of the jar.

Cover vegetables, after placing in jars, with water in which they were boiled or use fresh boiling water.

Use clean salt, add it before or after the jars are filled, or leave it out. It is put in for seasoning only.

If air bubbles form, run a knife down between side of jar and food.

Put the jars in a hot canner as soon as they are filled. Letting them stand around on the kitchen table invites spoilage.

Process all vegetables except tomatoes, which are really a fruit, in a steam pressure cooker for the time given in the recipe you are following. We recommend the use of a pressure cooker because, when in good working order and used according to instructions, it is by far the quickest and best way to can all low-acid vegetables such as beans, beets, peas, corn, etc.

Boiling for a long time in a water-bath canner is the next best way and is the one commonly used in the North Central and Eastern states. Water-bath processed vegetables (does not mean tomatoes—they are acid and should be done in water bath) should never under any circumstances be tasted until after they have been boiled 15 minutes. The same is true of those processed in a steam pressure cooker when there is the slightest question as to whether the cooker was in good operating condition or was operated correctly. The purpose of boil-before-tasting is to destroy any toxin which may have developed. The toxin won't be there to destroy if fresh produce has been carefully washed, prepared, packed, and properly processed.

Don't Lose Time
Waste no time between steps in gathering, sorting, washing, preparing, and canning.

Cover prepared vegetables with boiling water and boil five minutes (some vegetables, for example beets and sweet potatoes, require longer). Pour hot vegetables into clean hot jars. Don't cram them
