Rev. Paul Kaiser, Pastor Grace Lutheran Church Died After Long Illness

O. Minick Makes Statement Race for Com.



Rev. Paul Kaiser, 56, active Lutheran pastor and popular citizen of this area for the past 28 years, died at 5:10 A. M. Thursday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arthur Ramming, Route 4, Wichita Falls, following a four month illness.

An energetic and missionary minded minister, Rev. Kaiser after loyally serving the Lutheran church of Clara for 27 years, and despite approaching eligibility for retirement, established in the past year the Grace Lutheran Church of Burkburnett. He served this missionary endeavor until his recent illness, prior to which he helped complete the plans for the construction of a new and beautifully designed church structure to be built in Burkburnett.

Born on Sept. 5, 1890, in Ohio and raised in Indiana, the son of a Lutheran pastor, Rev. Kaiser decided at an early age to devote his life to ministerial work. At the age of 13 he attended Fort Wayne Academy and College, a Lutheran preparatory school for the ministry in Indiana. Upon graduation he attended the Lutheran Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Mo., where he continued his studies for three years. He became an ordained minister in 1913 immediately accepting a call to Texas where he served two congregations at Sagerton and Albany.

In 1914 Rev. Kaiser married Marguerite Gallman of Wellesville, New York. Four years later he accepted the call to the Clara congregation which he had served until the past year.

Rev. Kaiser's theological activities have not been limited to this region. Since coming to Texas 33 years ago he has done valuable work within the Texas District, geographical division of the Lutheran church, and was at present Secretary of the North Texas Conference. He was especially known for his work with the Walthers League, the Church's international young peoples' organization. For the past years he has served as the North Texas Membership Secretary of this organization.

While in charge of the new congregation in Burkburnett Rev. Kaiser resided at 412 East Main St. At this location the congregation has purchased a lot on which the church will be built. Rev. Kaiser was interested in civil affairs, being an active member of the Lion's Club.

Funeral services have been arranged for Sunday afternoon at 4:30 at the Methodist Church in Burkburnett, the Rev. W. F. Klindworth of Dallas delivering the main funeral address. Other pastors will also participate in the funeral functions, among them will be Rev. Rackman of Waco and Rev. Birbaum of Vernon, president and vice-president of the Texas District respectively; Rev. Leimer of Clara will hold the service at the Owens and Brumley Funeral Home; Rev. Pieman of Vernon will officiate at the burial; and Rev. Beyer of Wichita Falls will furnish the music during the church service.

Surviving Rev. Paul Kaiser is his widow, Mrs. Marguerite Kaiser; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Ramming, Route 4, Wichita Falls; two sons, Kenneth and Donald, both of Burkburnett; his mother, Mrs. Emilia Kaiser and four sisters, Miss Hulda Kaiser, Miss Olga Kaiser, Mrs. Ralph Klare and Mrs. Martin Burbrink, all of Indianapolis, Ind.; two brothers, Karl Kaiser also of Indianapolis, and Otto Kaiser of Baltimore, Maryland; and one grandchild, Stephen Ramming, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ramming.

YARDMEN GET MORE

It costs \$6 a day to hire a yardman to mow a lawn, trim along the walks, spade up a place for tomatoes or roses, and clean out the garage. He doesn't have to know how to read and write. He doesn't have to have a hair cut. He doesn't have to wear clean clothes. You pay him \$6 and he does the job pretty much as he pleases, and if you don't like it, you can do the job yourself while he stalks off to the next job pocketing your \$6.

But if you hire somebody to teach in the elementary schools you expect to pay him, on the average about \$5 a day. If you hire a teacher in junior high school, you average about \$5 a day—figuring about twenty-five working days to the month for about nine months.

If your child had to have his tonsils taken out or needed to be vaccinated, you wouldn't think of sending him to a doctor who was not good enough to earn \$4,000 or \$5,000 a year. But here you turn the training of that child's brain over to people who are expected to be content with the pay of a yardman or a top janitor.

When a nine-months man in a janitor job finishes his nine months at cleaning up a public building, he can go fishing the other three months, or get a part-time job to eke out his living. But when the brain janitors of the teaching profession finish their nine months of school work, they are expected to spend the other three months in schoolwork or something else to improve their ability as brain janitors for our children.

Imagine asking a yardman for his degree in landscape architecture! Picture yourself demanding that your janitor knock off and take a postgraduate course at his own expense to come back to janitor work again with janitor's pay again.

INCENTIVE PAY

Of course, nobody takes up teaching to get rich, any more than a preacher does. And, of course, the teachers actually working for current salary averages are immeasurably better in ability and training than their wages would indicate. But the point is that these people, for the most part, entered the profession when this level of wages would support and compensate to some reasonable degree what we demand of them.

Preachers, by the way, are much better paid than teachers. Nowadays, \$3,000 a year and a house to live in seems to go with preaching in a city church. A good preacher is worth that, and there is no outcry about it when he is worth it. Little preachers in out-of-the-way places are shamefully paid, but the average preacher fares better than the average teacher.

Can we expect to have a first-grade school system in this fashion? What we want is a corps of teachers who are persons of distinction and personality. Do you mean to say that you are willing to turn your children over to anybody less than that? We are in the business of growing citizens. While these young citizens are in the formative stage, they attach themselves to some hero—some heroine. They pick some personality as a pattern. What kind of pattern will satisfy your ambitions for your child?

Thing about that a while.

For the past year Burkburnett Independent School District has operated on a State Aid Salary schedule. A beginning teacher with four years of college work or degree and no experience receives \$108.00 per month on a twelve month basis. After all deductions are made this teacher receives actual cash around \$90.00 per month. Teachers with degrees and ten years of experience, which is the top salary, receives \$119.00 per month for twelve months. After deductions have been taken, the teacher receives approximately \$100.00 per month.

WORSE TO COME

The fellow who thought meat would come easier after rationing, is practically eating his words. He isn't wallowing in beef roasts, baked hams, steaks, has difficulty getting fish, stands in line for chicken. The peacetime dinner table has become a vegetarian's delight in most centers and the prospects for increasing our national meat supply is not too good. Many packing plants have continued to close or lessened crews to take care of reduced business. Butchers who managed to keep going are sold out almost as soon as they get in a supply of fresh meat. But haven't heard tell of the health of anyone in Burk Burnett being impaired from lack of enough food. Most of us look pretty healthy around here.

SINGLE SALARY INSTRUCTION

The objective of the single salary schedule for school teachers is to provide equal pay for equal training and experience regardless of what school grade the teacher instructs. That is, a first-grade teacher with ten years of experience teaching plus a master's degree, draws the same salary as the high school teacher with the same qualifications. There are faults with this plan, but so far it comes nearest to being the best course of pay. Many have adopted a single salary method and its soundness finds others considering it.

The teachers of elementary grades have been given second rate to high school instructors and consequently, due to difference in pay, the elementary grades are second choice by teachers of ability. The student who prepares for high school and college should have instruction from the best. We try to train the child at an early age, to cor-

rect faults and start him on the right path. So too, the better the pay the better the teacher, and the better the teacher the better the child. This but another attempt to correct some of the faults of our present educational system.

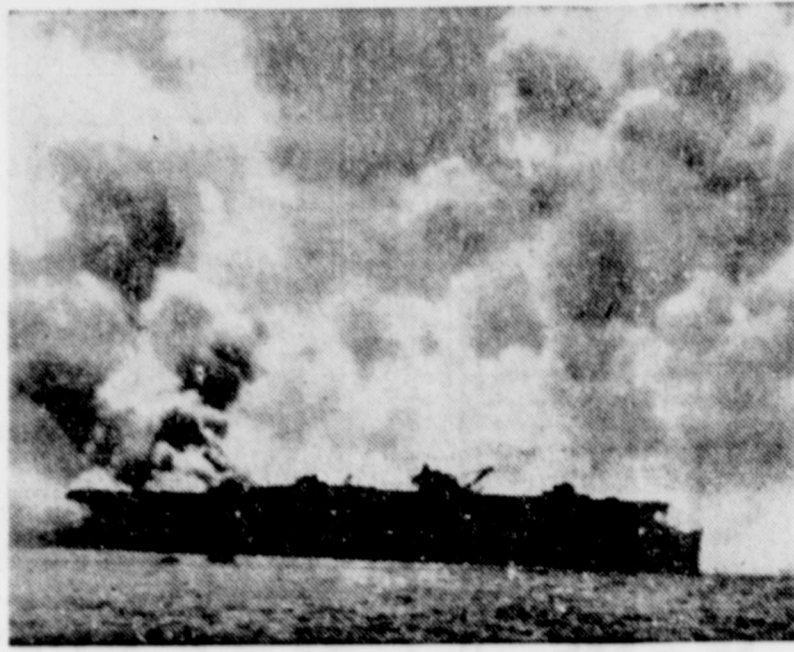

DIRECT FROM BIKINI: An Eye Witness Account Of Atomic Bomb Blast

ABOARD USS APPALACHIAN. OPERATIONS CROSSROADS—From a military standpoint the explosion of the fourth atomic bomb was a huge success but as a spectacle worth traveling 8,000 miles to see it did not live up to its advance billing. From the standpoint of efficiency and precision the plutonium bomb was dropped squarely in the target area. The advance weather predictions held true. It was dropped on time to the second. The air dunes were sent through the cloud area and shepherded back by their mother ships. The boat dunes were sent into the area of radio activity and brought back via radio control. The cameras clicked and the instruments built especially to measure the results of the blast worked.

But to those of us here aboard the Appalachian, who had been oriented and lectured day after day for the past two weeks, who had interviewed scientists and scientific writers, the bomb burst and the atomic cloud were a disappointment.

The recapitulation of the damage showed the troop transports Giliom and Carlisle sunk; the destroyer Lamson capsized; heavy damage was done to the submarine Skate, the light cruiser Pensacola, the carrier Independence, the Jap cruiser Sakawa, and the German pocket battleship Prinz Eugen. Light to negligible damage was caused on the Jap battleship Nagata, the battleship Nevada, the oiler No. 160 and LCM No. 1. Small fires were started and later extinguished on the destroyer Wilson, the Pensacola, the transport Briscoe, the Nevada, the carrier Saratoga and transports Niagara, Bladen, Banta, Butte, Cortland, Bracken and Faun and the battleship New York. Heaviest damage was caused on the Independence and the fire which burst into flames on her stern was more dramatic to watch than the bomb burst insofar as this writer was concerned.

Because the atomic cloud did not reach the heights achieved in previous drops was not considered as reflection upon the efficiency of the bomb. Reasons for the relatively low cloud given were that water absorbed much of the heat energy and the difference in atmospheric structure caused a slower rise.

It may be that those of us who stood along the starboard rail of the Appalachian were expecting too much. We had been led to believe from many sources to expect drama and adventure and excitement. Let me assure you there was no drama and certainly no excitement. I confess that as I pulled the polarized plastic goggles over my eyes as we heard the signal "bomb away" I did feel excited and tense as I awaited the blast. It came as I saw it, well above the horizon, a huge orange ball.

It might have been a fireworks display on the Fourth of July, although not near so dazzling. I watched the cloud appearing like nothing more than a huge cherry ice cream soda. Cream white on the surface but deep inside the hues were pink and rose, and it boiled and seethed up through a cumulous natural cloud which hid it from our view I felt a slight "pft" in my ears but felt no heat blast. Seconds later the sound of detonation came like a distant peal or roll of thunder that's all, but then we were 18 miles away.

Ten minutes after the blast the cloud had mushroomed up to a height of 26,000 feet and was approximately 12,000 feet across the

Lesson for July 14

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JESUS AND SUPREME LOYALTY TO GOD

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:3-6; Joshua 24:16, 22-24; Luke 14:25-27. MEMORY SELECTION—No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon.—Matthew 6:24.

The first three commandments bring man into the presence of God, where he is taught how to worship God in spirit and in truth. "The first commandment (Exod. 20:3) bids us worship God exclusively; the second (vv. 4-6) bids us worship him spiritually. The first commandment forbids us to worship false gods; the second forbids us to worship the true God under false forms" (Farrar).

We shall lose much of the value of our lesson if we confine the application of it to Israel. We miss the point if we think only of the gods of wood and stone which the heathen worship and fail to apply the truth to any and all idol worship of our day.

The loyalty to God of which our lesson text teaches may be summarized in four words. It is a loyalty of

I. Purpose (Exod. 20:3).

Jehovah means, "I will be what I will be," or "I am that I am," (Exod. 3:14). His very name declares God to be the self-existent, eternal one. How infinitely gracious then is the use of the word "thy" in Exodus 10:2! He—the great I AM—is my God, a personal God. It must be our constant purpose to worship him only.

There are many things concerning which we do not speak dogmatically. There are even Christian doctrines about which spiritual and earnest men may honestly differ, but regarding God we say with absolute assurance and complete exclusiveness—there is but one true God. If he is what he claims to be, if God is not to be declared to be a liar, then it is beyond the realm of possibility that there could be any other God.

Hear it, men and women of America who in an enlightened land and age bow down in heathenish worship "before the god of gold, the god of self, the god of wine, the god of success, the god of fame, the goddess of pleasure, the god of licentiousness." The one true god says, "I am Jehovah. . . Thou shalt have no other gods before me."

II. Performance (Exod. 20:4-6).

What is in the heart must show in the life. The second commandment calls for the undivided devotion and worship of man. It expressly forbids idolatry in any form. The injunction is twofold. (1) Men are forbidden to make any material likeness which to them represents a being to be worshipped. It matters not whether it be an image of what men believe God to be like, or the image of an angelic being, a heavenly body, in fact, "anything that is in the heaven above," or on the earth, such as a man or animal; or under the water, such as a fish. (2) If such objects have been made either by ourselves or others we may not bow down to them, nor render any service to them. Let us all examine our religious ceremonies and practices in the light of God's commandment.

Observe that obedience to this command brings rich blessing to "thousands" (v. 6), whereas disobedience is a curse not only to the man who disobeys, but also to his descendants.

III. Promise (Josh. 24:16, 22-24).

Before the aged leader of Israel came to the close of his life he called leaders of the people, whom he had led in the taking of the Promised Land, and urged them to continue in the way of faith and loyalty to God. They promised rather readily, but he made clear to them that God was not interested in lip service. They were to prove their promise by putting away all strange gods. This they agreed to do. Wherein they failed, they suffered defeat, and wherein they kept their promise, God blessed them. We may learn from their experience.

IV. Practice (Luke 14:25-27).

It is not always necessary to choose between our natural affections for those near to us and our loyalty to Christ, but if the time comes for that decision, Christ must come first without question and without hesitation (cf. Matt. 10:37). The word "hate" (v. 26) does not carry with it any thought of malice or personal dislike. We know from other scriptures that we are to honor our father and our mother (Exod. 20:12). The one who fails his own is declared to be worse than an infidel (1 Tim. 5:8). The point is that no personal loyalty or responsibility is to stand in the way of our devotion to Christ. Our own lives must be counted as a glad sacrifice to him as we take up our cross—in the crucifixion of self-will and devotion to his will (see Gal. 2:20; 6:14).
