## Watch Your Flock Closely For Culls

No matter how well managed a flock of chickens may be, there usually are going to be a few culls among them. These poorer birds, if allowed to remain within the flock, may eventually reach the stage where they are unmarketable — a total loss to the poultry raiser. Therefore, it is to the poultryman's advantage to keep close watch over his flock to pick out birds that are going out of condition and take them to market early enough to gain some salvage value out of them. If culls are discovered while they are still in good flesh, they will usually bring a high enough price to pay for the investment you have in them, if not more.

**A Common Error**  
Neglecting to do this is one of

the common errors of poultry raisers everywhere. Often they are so pressed by other farm work that they feel they can't spare the time to examine their flocks periodically for birds that have slowed down. In their own interests, every poultryman should devise some means to correct such a situation for it may make a great difference in the poultry income for the season. Of course, we know sick birds having flesh of poor quality should never be sold. Be doubly sure that the culls you sell will be acceptable as meat to the consumer.

Some of the defects to watch for are leg or wing weakness, gray eyes or blindness, extremely pale or yellow head and face, hanging crop, baggy abdomen, and general listlessness. Birds such as these may eventually become so thin that they are valueless if allowed to remain with the flock, whereas they might bring a substantial price on the market if sold as soon as the defects are noted.

The same can be applied to the loafing layer. Poor layers cost nearly as much to feed as do the hens in full production and they give nothing in return. Detecting

the non-laying hen is another job that may require close scrutiny and some time, but certainly it is worth the extra effort in view of the saving in feed. Birds that stop laying during the summer can be identified by their pale, dry, shrunken combs, and loss of feathers.

**Allan Shivers Seeks Office Lieut. Gov.**

Senator Allan Shivers, only ex-serviceman in the race for Lieutenant Governor, focused attention on war veterans when he opened his campaign recently in his hometown, Port Arthur.

"I exchanged ideas with fighting men many times in the hard days overseas in Africa, Italy, France and Germany. I know the anxiety and disappointment so many veterans feel today, and I understand and appreciate their problems that are also my own problems," the Jefferson County senator stated.

Although only 38 years old, Senator Shivers is dean of the Texas Senate because of his 12 years service there. The Gulf Coast counties of Jefferson, Hardin, Liberty and Orange made him the youngest senator ever to take the oath of office when he was first sent to the state capitol to represent them in 1934.

"My past 12 years experience in the state senate enables me to preside over that legislative body which is one of the main duties of Lieutenant Governor", Senator Shivers pointed out.

Listed as his aims when elected Lieutenant Governor, Senator Shivers named consideration of war veterans problems, higher salaries for teachers, better farm to market roads, reorganization of the pardon and parole system of the state.

Burkburnett Independent School District had more than \$60,000.00 cash receipts from all sources to operate the 1945-46 term.

Consolidation with Clara Common School District No. 9 has taken place since. Likewise consolidation with Fairview Independent School District has taken place. This will mean more in increased revenue than additional expense will entail.

News item in Wichita Daily Times of July 16, 1946, states that on Monday, July 15, 1946, the State Board of Education voted a \$35.00 per capita payment for the State's 1,500,000 scholastics, as against last year's \$30.00, and a \$6.00 supplemental apportionment to this year's \$30.00 apportionment, with the recommendation that these additional funds be used in the 1946-47 budget.

**City Faces Major Teacher Shortage**

Wichita Falls public schools will enter the 1946-47 school term with a major shortage of teachers if the present rate of filling vacancies continues, according to Supt. H. D. Fillers.

Apparently the shortage will persist despite action by the state board of education Monday in Austin in voting a \$35 per capita payment for the state's 1,500,000 scholastics for next year out of the available fund, and a \$6 supplemental apportionment to this year's \$30 apportionment with the board's recommendation that the supplemental funds be used in the 1946-47 budget. The action, in part, was designed as a step in curing the migration of qualified teachers to higher paying professions.

Statutory limit for scholastic apportionment is \$37 per capita, or the limit of the available fund, whichever is less.

The boost in per capita payment is expected to alleviate somewhat financial conditions for next year, but will in no way affect the present school tax rate. The school fund is expected to show a small balance at the close of the fiscal year Aug. 31. Fillers said, in spite of the fact that repairs are being made this summer at practically all of the city's schools. Material shortages have caused postponement of additional repairs needed at several of the school buildings. —From the Wichita Daily Times of July 16, 1946.

We believe it is unnecessary to vote additional taxes at this time in order to be able to raise teachers' salaries. That adequate funds for this purpose will be forthcoming from State aid and the additional revenues from sources as above indicated. That even more State aid will be forthcoming by 1947-48 for the reason all State candidates are advocating it.

Vote against the proposition. Hold on to the State aid to which we are entitled and to which we contribute anyway. Do not break faith with the taxpayers of the Clara and Fairview Districts by voting to raise their tax rate when such raise is obviously unnecessary and untimely.

### Vernon McDaniel For State Representative

Vernon McDaniel of Wichita Falls, 27-Year resident of Wichita County and a member of the United States Marine Corps during the war, today outlined his platform for State Representative from District 111, Place 2, subject to the July 27 Democratic Primary.

His statement follows: "I believe that by serious application of my efforts as state representative from Wichita County I can be of service to my neighbors and to the State of Texas.

"For 27 years Wichita Falls has been my home. My financial means have always been modest, comparable to those of the broadest group of our citizenship.

"Realizing that our state government is a vast and complex function, I can more appropriately convey my position as a state legislator by enumerating some of the things which I will not accept or participate in:

"First, I will not practice demagogic catering to popular ideas for the sole purpose of getting votes.

"Second, I will not accept sponsorship by any group or organization not representative of all of our people.

"Third, I will not be high-pressured or stampeded into voting against my convictions, nor will I cast a vote without a reasonable knowledge of the consequences of my actions.

"Fourth, I will not be a party to practices generally prevalent in the state capitol, designed to defeat constructive legislation by parliamentary red tape.

"Fifth, I will not be deaf to any sincere suggestion or recommendation prompted by proper motive.

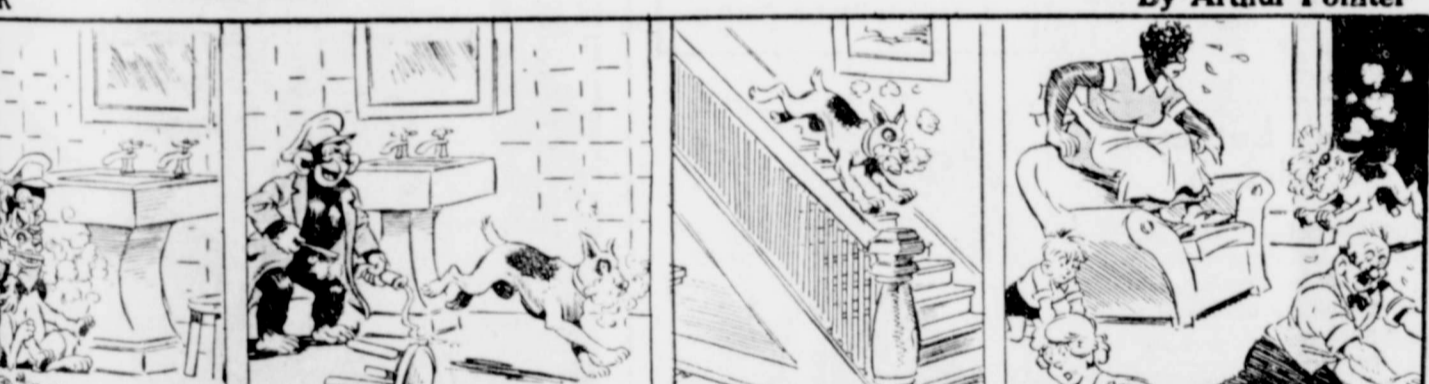

Rocket Ascended Over 44 Miles, Above Stratosphere

In the United States, the first man-made object to pass beyond the stratosphere was a rocket fired secretly at White Sands, New Mexico, on October 25, 1945, says Collier's. Developed by the GALCIT organization of the California Institute of Technology, this rocket, the starting weight of which was 680 pounds, was propelled by liquid fuel to a height of 235,000 feet, or over 44 miles, according to the radar equipment that measured its flight.

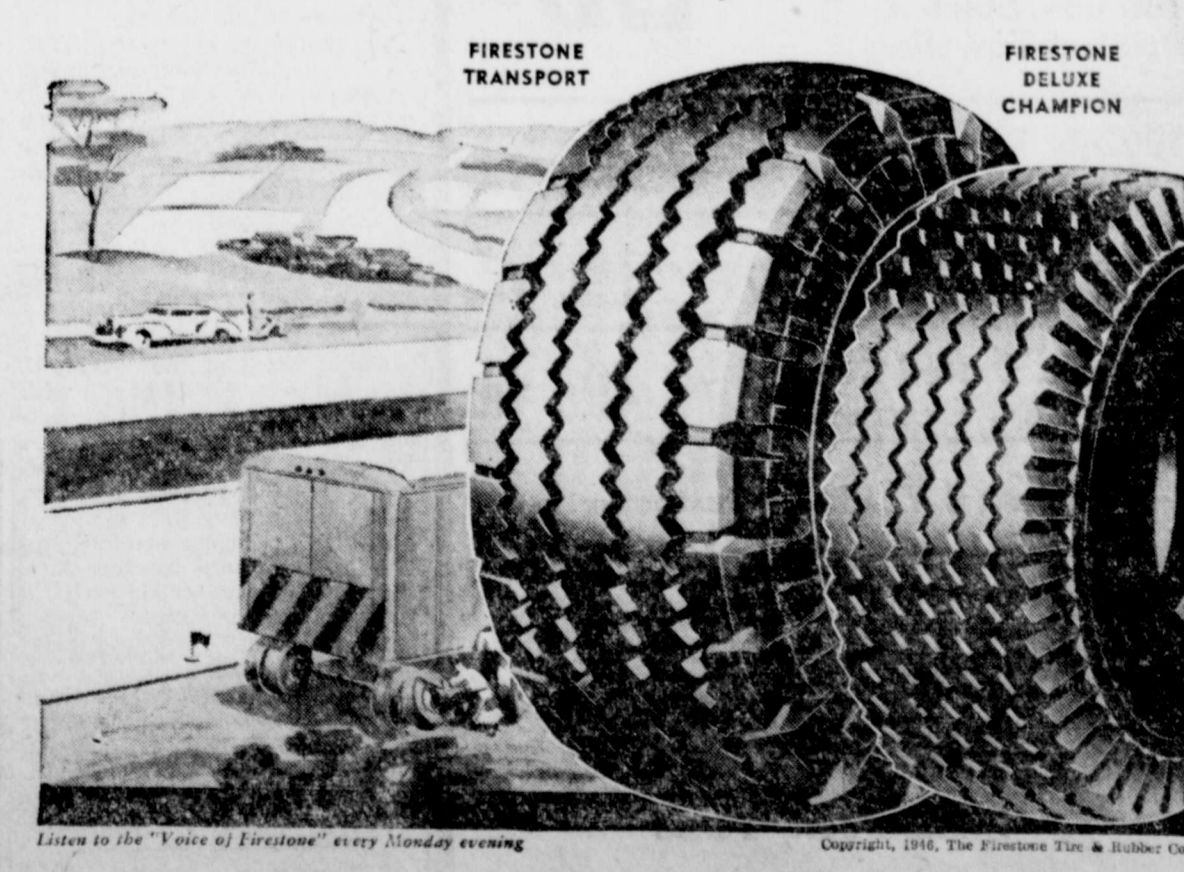

#### TOMATO CONSERVE

- 2 quarts chopped tomatoes
- 1 orange
- 2 lemons
- 8 cups sugar or 5 cups sugar and 3 cups corn sirup (light or dark)
- 2 cups seedless raisins
- 1 cup English walnut meats
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Scald, skin, core, and chop sound, ripe tomatoes. Cut orange peel in paper thin slices. Cook tomatoes, lemon juice, orange pulp and peel until tomatoes are reduced to a pulp. If convenient, let stand overnight. Add sugar and raisins, preferably Sultanas, and boil rapidly until thick. Add nuts and salt. Pour, boiling hot, into hot jars; seal at once.

### Outlook for Canning Jars and Supplies Bright This Year

Styles change usually for no good reason except that we women get tired of things, often for no good reason. Our grandmothers were different. When they liked something, they used it until it wore out and they had some things which didn't wear out. That is why so many of you can boast of owning Mason Fruit Jars which your great-grandmother took with her in the covered wagon when Granddad accepted the advice, "Go West, young man." You, of course, treasure those old jars even though they have no special cash value, and you have found their streamlined descendants dependable, but you may have decided that you would like to see how a different style jar and cap becomes the food you plan to put up this season.

#### Supplies Plentiful

Supplies of jars and caps should be plentiful for the first time in four years. Nobody is offering revolutionary designs but Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director for Ball Brothers Company, which made Mason Jars for your grandmother, has been telling us about a two-piece metal Vacu-Seal cap with dome-shaped white enamel-lined lid. It seems that the domed lids "tell you" when they are sealed. (They click when vacuum pulls them down.) However, before deciding to adopt this style cap, you should check your jars because all brands of two-piece metal caps seal on the top of the jar and won't work unless the finish of that top is perfect. The flexibility of the metal lid and the pliancy of the sealing compound permit two-piece metal caps to be self-venting. This is why the bands are tightened before the jars are put into a canner for processing and should not be tightened again. The bands are taken off the jars the next day after the canning is done and left off. Bands are not bought every time new lids are needed as lids are sold in packages of one dozen. The same is true of complete caps (lid and band).

The Glass Top Seal (glass lid, metal band, and rubber ring "war baby") is still with us but not in huge quantities. When using Glass Top Seals, care must be taken to leave the metal bands loose during processing, otherwise too much pressure may build up in the jars and cause breakage or even explosion. Nothing seems so much in vogue at the moment as the time-tested one-piece zinc cap with white liner. This trend may be a style revival but we think it more likely due to the fact that zinc caps could not be made during the war and that "the water wasn't missed until the well ran dry."

#### Wide-Mouth Jars Back

Wide-mouth Mason jars are back on the market. Here the choice of caps is between one-piece zinc and two-piece metal Vacu-Seal.

The usual quantity of all-glass lightning type jars—the ones with

glass lid held in place with wires—will be available. These jars, always high-fashion in the Eastern states, come in both standard and wide mouth.

All jars with standard opening are being made in half-pint, pint, quart, and half-gallon sizes. Wide-mouth jars are in the same sizes except there are no half-pints—never were.

When buying new jars, Miss Kimbrough advises that, when possible, one select the style preferred but buy pints for corn, peas, lima beans and meats, quarts for other vegetables and fruits, half-pints for marmalades, jams, etc. and for baby foods. Half-gallons are nice for pickles; large families may need them for fruits too, but it is far better to use smaller jars when preserving vegetables and meats, because they are easier to process enough to prevent spoilage.

#### Tell Your Dealer

Although all jars of standard style and size are being made, it may not be possible to find each style and size in every market. This is because dealers have learned what sells best in their trade territories. Transportation charges are so high on less than carload shipments of glass that even if manufacturers were organized to sell direct to the consumer, the cost of a few dozen jars would necessarily be dear, but any enterprising woman can usually persuade her dealer to arrange with a wholesale house to include what she wants when he places an order for a car of jars. Naturally this cannot be last minute business, so if you want an "exclusive style," the retailer should be told about it weeks, in fact months, in advance. It pays to buy home canning supplies when the dealer first puts them out, as it is a time-wasting nuisance to have to stop in the midst of canning to go to the store for jars, caps, or rubbers.

The rubber story is about the same as it was last year. The best ones are red and all are synthetic, but don't let that worry you because synthetic rings seal as well as those in which natural rubber is used.

All in all, the jar and cap outlook is bright. All styles are good. If you buy a nationally known brand and use it according to the manufacturer's instructions, you can put up your quota of fruits, vegetables, and meats, with the assurance of sealing satisfaction.

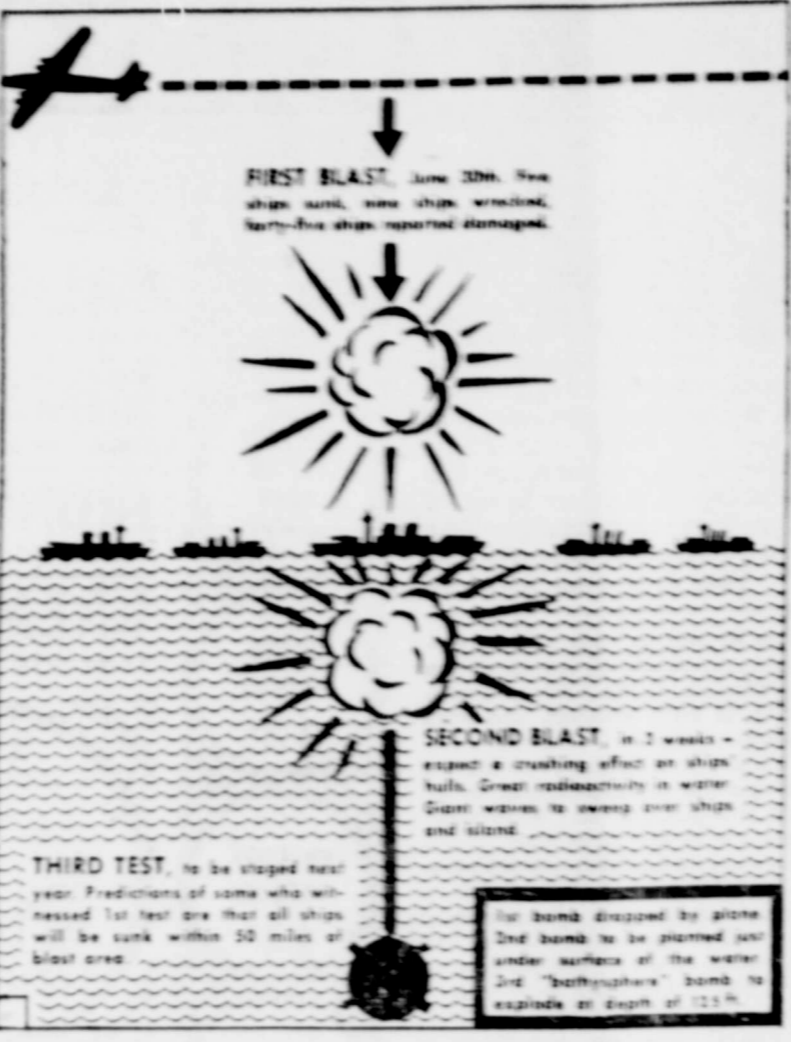

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for July 21

JESUS AND TRUE WORSHIP

LESSON TEXT—Deuteronomy 8:11-14. 10:20. Isaiah 40:31. Mark 12:28-34. MEMORY SELECTION—God is a Spirit, and they that worship him must worship in spirit and truth.—John 4:24.

The one true God is worthy of the wholehearted worship of all men. The second commandment, which we studied last week, forbids all and every idolatry and thus requires exclusive worship of God. It really means something in the life of a man to worship God in sincerity and truth. It makes life worthwhile both here and hereafter.

I. Worship Balances Life (Deut. 8:11-14). Prosperity is usually thought to be a blessing. We fear depression and poverty. The Lord through Moses warned his people that prosperity was dangerous. It still is, because material things have the power to so satisfy the natural desires of man as to make him forget his spiritual needs.

II. Worship Protects Life (Deut. 10:20). One of the most mischievous mistakes of the life is the idea that man is the maker of his own money. Only God can give man the power of hand and heart, of muscle and mind, which brings forth wealth, and then he can only draw it out of God's resources in mine or field or sea.

III. Worship Strengthens Life (Isa. 40:31). The Christian life is not an easy one to live. After all, who wants it easy? There is, however, full provision by God for the power needed to live a life as victorious and exultant as that of the soaring eagle. That power is for those who "wait upon the Lord" (v. 31).

IV. Worship Completes Life (Mark 12:28-34). Here was a man, who, by the testimony of Jesus was "not far from the kingdom of God." He was very near to a full devotion to God in Christ. He knew "all the answers," but he did not follow the teaching which he knew to its proper and blessed conclusion.

It is terrifying to think how close a man can come to entering into eternal life, and yet miss it altogether. It prompts the writer of these notes to ask you, the reader, very earnestly. Have you entered into eternal life through Jesus Christ? "Almost" will not avail; you can be almost saved—and eternally lost.

The true nature of worship is revealed in this lesson as a loving dependence on God at all times and in all circumstances. We recognize him as the one who can supply our every need, spiritual and temporal. We accord to him quick and full obedience. We find in him such complete satisfaction that we cannot withhold our love and his love from our fellow men. We worship him!

**Undulant Socialism**

A sick republic, like a human invalid, passes through a crisis in the course of almost any protracted illness. After the crisis, the patient rallies toward recovery or sinks with alarming haste toward the end. Whatever is to be done after a crisis must be accomplished with dispatch, or it is too late. The English government passed through a crisis approximately a year ago.

Since England's current administration proclaimed itself owner and operator of the coal mines, Britain has been viewed popularly as Socialistic—one of the collectivist nations. Not all the individuals in the Empire are socialists. Large elements are not. But this large minority is being forgotten. Curtains are being drawn. The crisis is over and England has gone left.

**A Long Time Dead**

There is something strangely final about it when a free people turns its course toward State Socialism. Liberty never comes back without a revolution and then it's not the same. Such is the testimony of recorded history. Industrially, England is a coal country and private enterprise lost its last stronghold on the enchanted island when King Coal surrendered.

Now the ailment that prostrated John Bull has been communicated to Uncle Sam. The symptoms are unmistakable as undulant fever; wave upon wave of collectivist power, with a show of growing intensity. Our government has taken over our coal mines from their owners because of work stoppages through strikes—strikes by the best paid group of mine workers on earth.

**Here's the Pattern**

I think perhaps the workers ought to have had an increase in pay, which they no doubt could have obtained without striking. Nevertheless, they struck and government took over the business long enough, at least, to close a new contract giving an increase of \$1.85 a day per man and a royalty of 5c a ton on coal to give their union a "welfare" fund. The new "welfare" fund has no relation to the union's sick and accident fund, already large.

The new contract will raise the price of coal 25c to 30c a ton and build up the "welfare" fund at the rate of 25 million dollars a year. The Senate has approved the executive department's right to impose this contract on the mine owners when they take their property back. This is an attack of the undulant socialism.

**Works Like This:**

Government can now control the cost of coal to the owner of a mine. By fixing labor's wage, a ruler can make coal production cost whatever suits his fancy. Government already controls the price of coal to the consumer through the workings of the OPA. The neck of the coal industry is in a legal nut-cracker and government has the power to choke it to death at will—that, or take it over entirely.

With the sanction of Congress, which I hope never comes, federal officials can do to any industry what they are doing to coal. Each assault on freedom will be one more attack of the dread disease, undulant socialism. It works like the fever which, scientific men say, can be cured in rare instances if vigorous treatment is begun in the early stages.

**Moffett Clarifies  
Soldier Vote Bill**



The Burkburnett Star has received the following statement from Senator George Moffett, who is a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from this district:

"It has come to my attention that one of the candidates for Lieut. Governor, who comes from Houston, has repeatedly published statements in this part of Texas, that he was the author of the bill providing for free soldier voting. I think the facts should be explained. This member of the House of Representatives from Houston, introduced

and passed through the House a bill which would have provided for a free vote for those in uniform. His proposal did not include ex-service men and women who had been discharged. I introduced a bill (constitutional amendment) in the Senate, which passed through both branches of the Legislature and was adopted by the people at an election on August 25, 1945. This bill extended the free voting privileges not only to the members of the armed services while they were still in uniform, but also to those honorably discharged, for a period of eighteen months after their discharge, and that the reason that ex-service men and women can vote in this years election, without a poll tax.

I have been the author of more bills and constitutional amendments, that have actually passed and become the law, than any other member of the Legislature. I expect to continue to use my efforts for the best interests of the people of this district, and the state of Texas."

**Strike—At Whom?**

Financial reports make interesting reading to people who know even a little bit about what they mean. To some, they look drab because they are printed mainly in figures; many students never have learned to enjoy studying figures. Just the same, dull old numerals tell the truth in a romantic way to those who love cold facts of struggle and adventure.

Late in May it was my good fortune to have with me an annual report of one of America's largest corporations when I had to spend three hours on a day train. In the back of my mind as I rode along, was a lurking fear that I might reach home a day (maybe a week) late because of labor troubles, just then coiling to strike. My dread threw a bright light on the figures in hand.

**Division of Wealth**  
The company about which I was reading plays an important part in the lives of more than a quarter of a million people: 100,000 employees and 100,000 stockholders. Two out of every five of these people drew wages while three out of five received dividends. The average share owner got less than \$100 a year. The average employee took home more than \$2,500 a year.

Daily newspapers for days had reported threats of strikes in the plants of the firm I was studying, also on the lines of the railroad I was riding, and in many other industries. Question: If all the employees of all the companies strike for what they want and get it, who will pay the difference? How will they pay it? These questions have answers and they're not secrets.

**Enter Apple Conductor**  
The train stopped for a few minutes under the sheds of a big town station and a railway newsboy came through with fresh afternoon papers. On page one, under Washington date-line, a wire story told how OPA would grant higher prices on automobiles. Nearby was another item about a 10% boost in shoe prices. Then I remembered that bread and milk and meat all had gone up recently.

Whether you ride or walk or only eat, the price gains catch you. Wages are inside the cost of every manufactured thing, and the consumer pays. It is too obvious to deserve proof. Not long ago officialdom was sounding off freely about how wages in Detroit could be boosted without charging higher prices for automobiles but it didn't work out that way. Why?

**Strikes Are Weapons**  
It is because strikes are not tools. The official theory was right: Wages can go up without boosting prices but production has to be increased if it happens, and strikes don't increase production. Sudden wage increases of 18% to 30% have to come from somewhere, but where? A stockholder drawing \$500 a year can't offer much of a boon to a \$2,500 wage earner.

Strikes can't take something from the owners of a company that the owners don't get. That leaves nobody to pay the higher wages but Mr. Consumer whose family drives the car, wears the shoes and eats the food. A large majority of consumers are themselves workers. In the absence of increased production, a strike is a boomerang. It hits the consumer who is the worker himself.

## Boy Writes Of Bombing

David Eugene Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. President of Burk Burnett, who in the Atomic Bomb-

ing of Bikini Atoll, sends first-hand information concerning the bombing.

**DEAR FOLKS:**  
 I have waited until today to write you for I thought I would probably know a little more to tell today, and I was right. Of course, you'll probably read more in the papers than I tell you, but here it is.

We were eighteen to twenty miles from the blast when the atomic bomb was dropped. Although it wasn't very great, we could feel the heat of the blast. Two minutes after the bomb had exploded we saw the cloud rising into the air. It was very awe inspiring. I don't know how to explain it so that you could see the picture I saw, but I'll try. One of the newsmen made a pretty good report on the appearance of the cloud that was form-

ed. It looked like a giant cauliflower that has been scrubbed snow white. That is actually what it looked like to me, except this cloud was alive. It was boiling all the time. After several minutes I could see the smooth, creamy looking pink and brilliant red in the cloud. That is about all I can say about it and that doesn't even start to describe it.

A few minutes ago the Japanese cruiser Sakawa sank. That brought the total number of ships sunk to four. All the Battleships and cruisers around the Nevada were torn above decks. Last night we could still see several fires burning. This morning I can see no fires, so I suppose they have all been put out. The carrier Independence is in a mess. The island on it is entirely gone, the thing was burning and smoking until this morning. Now it is being towed out of the radio active water so that it can be inspected. I wouldn't even call it a ship now. It most certainly doesn't look like any ship I ever saw. It is unbelievable that one bomb could twist and tear

armor the way that it has. Nothing that happens from now on will ever surprise me.

We re-entered the lagoon last night. I have just heard that there are only two goats left alive on the Pennsylvania. The scientists believe these will die soon.

Just after the bomb was dropped it looked as if it might rain. I am very glad that it didn't. I have never witnessed and never hope to witness a rain of pure radium.

Well, I can't think of anything more of any interest, so I'll close. The way this test was handled was a miracle without the bomb. There were radio controlled planes and boats running around and whatnot. Well, as I said, I must close for now. Write me when you can, and give my love to everyone.

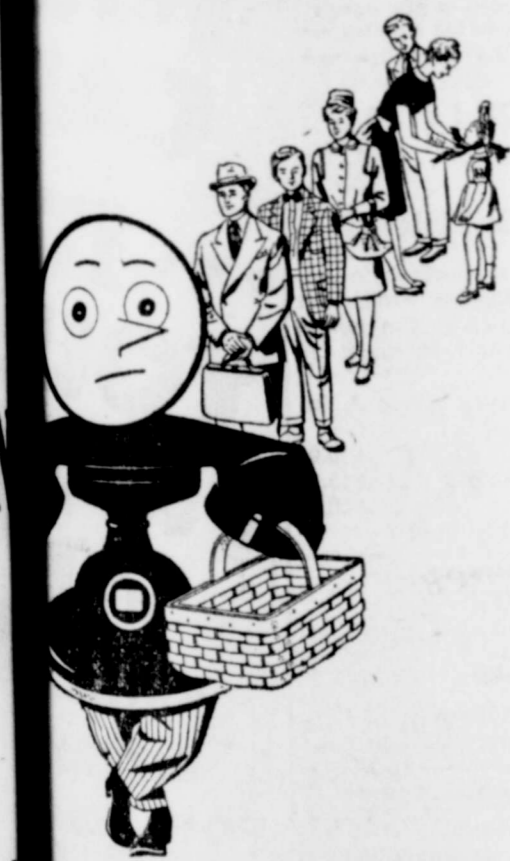

## DOGS CONTRIBUTE TO FAMINE RELIEF

### Pet Food Manufacture Cut Back to 80 Per Cent of 1945

America's dogs, like the American people, are doing their bit toward the alleviation of famine conditions abroad, reports the **Gaines Dog Research Center**, New York City.

As a step in meeting America's commitments of food supplies for overseas shipments, this country's pet food manufacturers have been cut back in their production to 80 per cent of what they put out last year. This means that Fido will get only four-fifths of his favorite prepared dog food he received during 1945. He had looked forward to larger portions of food with the return of peace, and is naturally disappointed in receiving even less than he did in the midst of war. But Fido is not growling—he is taking it like a good sport.

Reduction in the volume of prepared dog foods this year comes as a setback to the dog-owning housewife as well. For years, and particularly during the war years, she has been depending on dry dog foods for meeting the nutritional requirements of her household pet. Keeping a dog on meat-type food involves no more effort than giving him a drink of water. One merely measures out the required amount and adds warm water, milk, soup or gravy in the consistency preferred by the pet.

## For Meals of Distinction Serve Your Own Homemade Jelly

Homemade jelly adds distinction to any meal. Good jelly is made by cooking the correct amount of sugar with the juice of any full flavored fruit. Many juices can be used as is, but some require the addition of fruit acid or a solidifying agent called pectin and others need both acid and pectin.

Tart apples, blackberries, dewberries, cranberries, currants, gooseberries, grapes, sour plums, sour oranges, usually have enough of both acid and pectin for making jelly. Apricots, cherries, peaches, raspberries, pears, strawberries usually lack either or both acid and pectin, but make excellent jelly when combined with an equal amount of tart apple jelly juice or with commercial pectin. If pectin is used, the instructions supplied with it must be followed.

It is a good plan to can unsweetened fruit juice and make it into jelly as needed, because freshly made jelly has a much better flavor than that which has stood several months.

We are indebted to **Gladys Kimbrough**, Home Service Director for **Ball Brothers Company**, manufacturer of fruit jars, for a few notes which should be helpful to those who have not already mastered the art of making jelly of superior quality.

### JELLY NOTES

For natural jelly "like mother used to make," use fruits which under normal conditions contain enough pectin and acid to yield a good jelly.

For unusual jellies, combine the juices of such fruit as red cherries, strawberries, or apricots with an equal amount of apple juice or with a good commercial pectin.

Fruit should be hard-ripe for jelly making. Under-ripe fruit lacks flavor, that which is "cream and sugar" ripe won't jelly; however, some persons prefer to use half under-ripe and half fully-ripe fruit.

Cook fruits until soft but not mushy to extract the juice. Cooking is necessary in order to extract the pectin from the pulp. Cut apples in small pieces, skin, core and all. Crush small fruits before cooking.

Remove grapes from stems and caps from berries to prevent off-flavor.

The amount of water to add to fruits for cooking varies. Apples require enough to cover. Most juicy fruits need just enough to prevent sticking; however, a few, cranberries, for example, require more.

If you have no jelly stand and bag, tie two thicknesses of cheese cloth over the top of a deep enamelware kettle or a clean dish pan. Pour the hot fruit on the cloth and let drip free of juice. (The fruit from which the juice has drained may be put through a colander and used for making butter or jam.)

Don't make the mistake of using too much sugar. The general rule is three cups to one quart of juice, but currants and green gooseberries usually work out better if three and a half to four cups of sugar are used to each quart of juice.

Cane and beet sugar are equally satisfactory for making jelly. One-fourth of the granulated sugar called for in a recipe may be replaced with corn syrup.

Sugar crystals are likely to form in jelly if: (1) it is cooked too long, (2) too much sugar is used, (3) there is not enough acid in the juice, (4) it is left standing unsealed.

The needle shape crystals in grape jelly are caused by the tartaric acid in the grapes. These crystals seldom form in jelly made from unsweetened canned juice. Canned juice should be strained before using. Jelly made from fresh grape juice is less likely to contain crystals if the juice is left in the refrigerator for 24 hours before using. It should be strained to remove any crystals which may form in it. Gummy jelly is usually caused by overcooking or by long slow cooking.

Jelly may be cloudy if: (1) the juice is not carefully strained, (2) under-ripe fruit is used, (3) allowed to cool too much before pouring into glasses, (4) sauce pan is held high above the glass when the jelly is poured (this traps air bubbles). Jellies may "weep" if: (1) not cooked enough, (2) glasses are filled too full, (3) glass not clean above the paraffin, (4) paraffin more than one-eighth inch thick or does not touch sides of glasses.

Use regular jelly glasses as they are the right size and shape. Boil jelly glasses 20 minutes to sterilize—then drain dry. Cook jelly rapidly and in small batches, not more than two quarts at a time. Jelly must be cooked to the finish point. That's when it sheets from a metal spoon. This happens when instead of leaving the side of a tilted spoon in a stream, the last of the sirup divides into two large drops which meet and then slide off the spoon together.

Leave at least one-fourth inch space at the top when filling jelly glasses. Do not spill or splash jelly on the inside rim of the glass.

Use a sterilized spoon to remove bubbles or scum from jelly before it is covered with melted paraffin. When covering with melted paraffin, turn the jelly glass in the hand so that the paraffin will touch the sides of the glass all the way around. Never use paraffin more than once.

Cover jelly with metal lids and store in a dry place. Dampness causes spoilage.

Haphazard methods yield haphazard results whereas following reliable instructions gives reliable results in form of excellent jelly.
