HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows: "Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees

of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 15th day thereof*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the state of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Good Feed Brings High Egg Output

Good egg production reflects a high rate of feed consumption in your laying flock. Other factors being equal, chickens which are strong eaters and get a balanced diet will outproduce others that consume less feed or are on a diet lacking one or more of the essential elements.

A good poultryman will make certain that his flock gets a balanced ration containing the right kinds as well as right amounts of food nutrients. Proteins, carbohydrates, fats, minerals and vitamins all are essential to good poultry health and high production, and when there is a deficiency of any one of them a slump in egg output must be anticipated.

Daily Consumption
 A flock in high production will consume feed daily at the rate of 25 pounds per 100 birds for light breeds and 30 pounds per 100 for heavy breeds. At the peak of production the daily consumption may ascend to 30 pounds for the lights and 40 pounds for the heavies.

The amount and kind of protein in the feed is of particular importance because of the high protein content of an egg. Without sufficient protein the laying hen is hampered in manufacturing her eggs because of one of the essential raw materials is deficient in quantity. Protein should constitute 15 or 16 per cent of a laying bird's ration. It is desirable for part of the protein to be of animal origin (such as milk products, meat scraps, tankage and fishmeal) and the remainder to be of plant origin.

Calcium Requirement
 Calcium must have a place in your flock's feed to provide the layers with the material needed in egg shell formation. Chickens require it, too, to build sturdy bones. Starting and growing mash should contain an adequate amount of ground oyster shell or limestone to aid bone formation. When birds are in production an extra amount of clean oyster shell should be provided in hoppers because all laying birds do not require the same amount of calcium for egg-shell production, and even a good mash may not provide the calcium needed by some birds.

Grit may be fed in a section of the oyster shell hopper or in a separate container.

Water comprises the greatest part of any egg, so it should be available at all times. There should be ample room around the fountains to avoid crowding and to help keep water consumption at the desired level for all birds.
