Due to dangerously low level in the duck population, the Seniors. A wonderful evening hunter is under government restrictions limiting the season of 1946 to 45 days instead of the usual 80. The Department of the Interior states that the population of most species of wild ducks declined from a peak of 125,350,000 of 1944 to around 80,000,000 this year. If one questions the number he might start counting as these fly overhead. Many of us in Burkburnett have been hazarding a guess every time we see wild ducks in flight.

There nay not be enough of them to ause visible illeffects among the hickens, but the worms are here - and they're dangerous secause they multiply so rapidly, particularly during the summer ason that they soon may create vormy symptoms where none exists today.

Chickens become infected when they eat worm eggs in an intermediate host (insects) or from the soil, litter or feed. In the hicken these eggs hatch and produce more worms which conume feed taken by the bird, robbing her of food she needs. In time the newly hatched parasites law more eggs, and these are passed out through the bird's droppings into the soil where they may be picked up by another chicken. Thus, the cycle is completed..

Some types of worms are estimated to lay up to 50,000,000 eggs each, so if only a tiny fraction of these eggs lodge and hatch inside a chicken there is a strong possibility that a heavy infestation may develop unless the flock owner takes counter

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
