Rat-Proofing Is Health Measure

In a preventive program directed against typhus fever in Texas, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has prepared for distribution through the State and Local Health Departments, a pamphlet explaining the importance of incorporation rat-proofing in the construction of new buildings.

"I am anxious to have this pamphlet in the hands of ever builder and prospective builder in Texas," Dr. Cox said. "Detailed drawings show how simply and cheaply fundamental rat-proofing can be incorporated in designing a building."

The booklet further explains how much less expensive it is to include rat-proofing in the construction, than it is to make a building rat-proof after it is already built.

"When we build new homes

in Texas, they should be for our families only. Rats should be excluded," Dr. Cox declared. "When a new home is not rat-proofed, the rats usually move in about the same time your family does. As long as this continues, typhus fever menaces your family and community."

The booklet may be procured from your local health department, or by writing the State Health Department, Austin, Texas, and every prospective home builder in Texas is urged to procure a copy before completing the plans for a home.

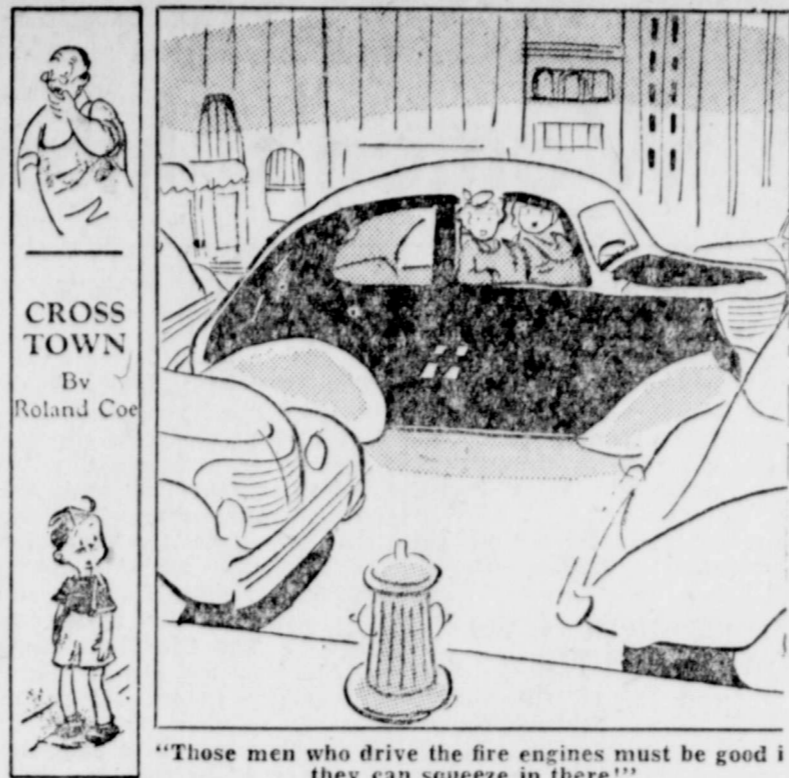

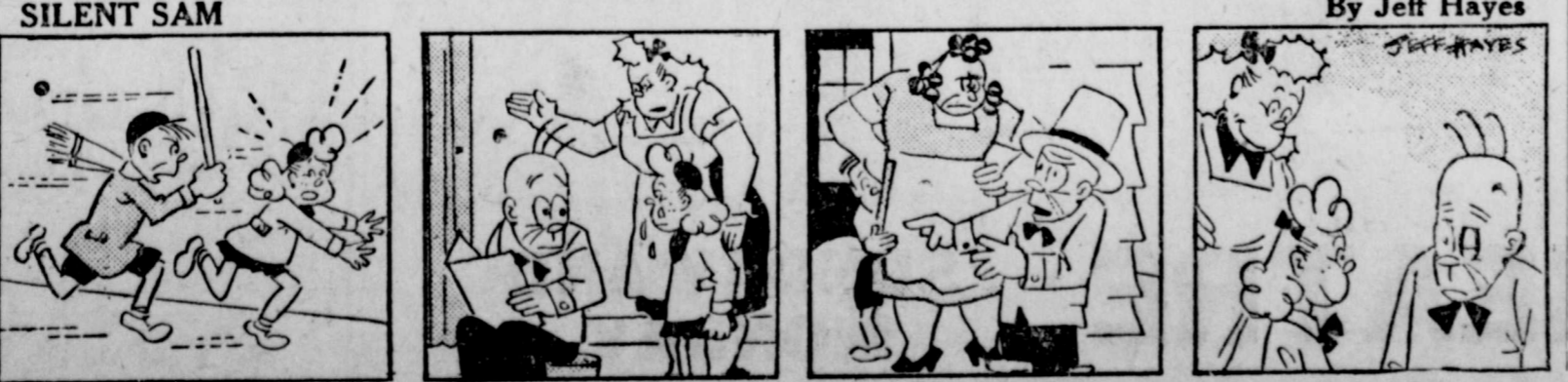

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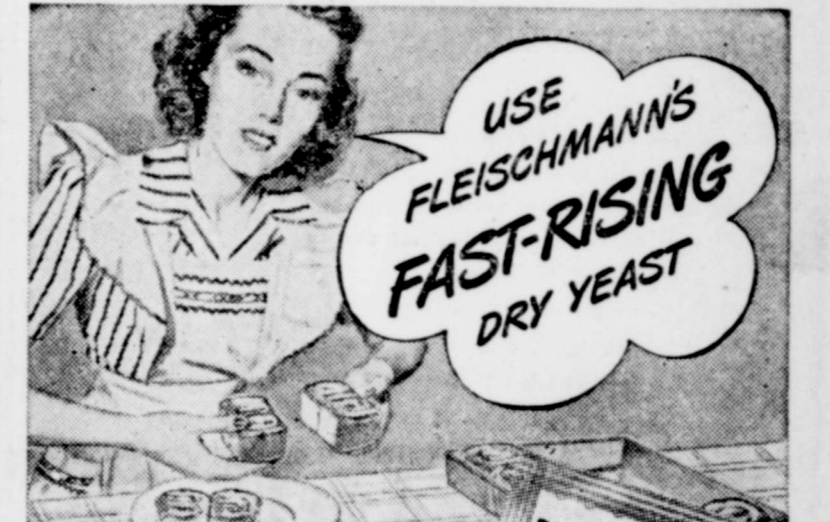

U. N. Move to Disarm

The war-weary old world seemed headed for substantial disarmament as Russia took the lead in the United Nations to force a reduction in militarization.

In the first U. N. step toward disarmament, members agreed to report on the strength of their armed forces at home and abroad by January 1. Originally, the Reds had asked that the report be confined to the number of Allied troops on foreign soil, but the U. S. and Britain were quick to call for count of forces at home as well.

WORLD CO-OPS: Trade Program

Growth of co-operatives as a force in world trade was illustrated with the organization of the International Trading agency in London to facilitate exchange of goods between 85,000,000 co-op members from 31 countries.

Surplus Goods: Raps Return

Demanding the institution of business-like policies in disposal of surplus war material, Sen. Harry Byrd (Dem., Va.) disclosed that a study of the senate-house committee on reduction of non-essential federal expenditures showed that the government was realizing only a third on domestic sales and "about a fifth on foreign transactions."

ARMY: Buck Occupation Quiz

Acting upon the urgings of Secretary of State Byrnes and Senators Vandenberg and Connally, his foreign policy advisers, the senate war investigating committee killed the projected inquiry into the conduct of U. S. occupation forces in Germany.

Lauds Women Doctors

Re-education of the public to break down any existing prejudices against women doctors is advocated by Dr. J. Roscoe Miller, dean of the medical school of Northwest university.

Watch Sharpers

Att. Gen. Tom C. Clark has alerted all U. S. attorneys to watch operations of swindlers throughout the nation who attempt to use veterans as fronts to buy illegally surplus property.

Watch Sharpers

The special alert followed the announcement by Clark that a federal grand jury in Los Angeles returned an indictment against two New Yorkers for allegedly having caused veterans to falsify their applications in purchasing automobile trucks.

PHILEMON: A LETTER ON CHRISTIAN BROTHERHOOD

LESSON TEXT—Philemon 4-20. MEMORY SELECTION—Now the Lord is that Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty.—II Corinthians 3:17.

Christian brotherhood! That may not sound like a dynamic influence destined to change the world, but that is just what it has done. We study today a letter written about a slave boy at a time when slavery was accepted as right, but it stated principles of Christian consideration and brotherly love which were eventually to overthrow slavery.

This letter, written by Paul and yet by the Holy Spirit, personal and yet eternal and spiritual in its application, is a model of letter writing, and equally a model of Christian brotherhood. It concerns one Onesimus, a slave who had deserted his master and probably defrauded him (v. 18). He had been converted and now was being sent back to his master.

I. "I Might Be Bold—Yet I Rather Beseech Thee" (vv. 4-9).

After a fine spiritual salutation (vv. 1-3), Paul enters upon an appeal to Philemon which is a model of tact and courtesy.

First he lets Philemon know of his prayerful interest in him. Paul had been praying for him, that's why he could say such a helpful word. Then he recognizes Philemon's goodness and his effective testimony for Christ. This was an excellent approach to the making of a request, and be sure that it was not empty or hypocritical flattery. We do well to recognize the fine qualities of our Christian brother, and we could profitably speak of them more than we do.

II. "Without Thy Mind I Would Do Nothing" (vv. 10-16).

Paul, the aged prisoner, had found in his new convert, Onesimus, a real helper. He would have liked to keep him. In fact, says he to Philemon, Onesimus could do for me the things you would want to do if you were here (v. 13).

III. "If Thou Count Me a Partner, Receive Him" (vv. 17-21).

Partners share the benefits and the burdens of their joint enterprise. Partners in the gospel, like Paul and Philemon, shared not only spiritual blessings, but also the responsibilities. Paul was presenting such an item to Philemon in the return of Onesimus. Something had to be done about the debt of Onesimus, his failure as a servant. Paul says, "Charge it to me, your partner."

Chick Chats

CASH IN ON HIGH WINTER EGG PRODUCTION

This is the time of year when sound management can pay real dividends if you have a flock of sturdy pullets in your laying house. With egg prices higher, it behooves you to do everything you can to coax a few extra high quality eggs out of every bird. To profit most from the high winter prices, there are two primary requirements you must fulfill: 1. Keep egg production at a good level, and 2. Take the very best care of your eggs from the time they are hatched until they reach market.

A healthy contented flock usually is a good laying flock. If your birds are receiving an adequate or poorly balanced ration if they're lousy to the point of discomfort, or if they're diseased or rundown you cannot expect much production. So it's up to you, through good management, to correct any condition that you may feel is cause for lowering the output of eggs. Keep the birds in a warm house where there are no drafts but where there is ample fresh air. See that the house is clean and sanitary. Watch your birds closely for signs of discomfort or lack of appetite. Put them on a diet that contains all the nutrients needed for good egg production. Don't crowd them, and make sure there is plenty of feeding space at the hoppers and that the drinking

fountains are big enough. After eggs are hatched, the care you exercise in handling them will probably determine how they are graded when you take them to market. Here are some pointers to remember about handling eggs:

Collect eggs often, three times per day if possible.

Nesting material should be clean and deep.

Do not allow birds to roost in nests at night — dirty eggs result.

Keep litter dry — this keeps eggs cleaner.

Store eggs in cool, moist place 45 to 55 degrees.

Use wire baskets; do not pack eggs in boxes or cases until cool.

Clean eggs with steel wool.

Pack eggs big end up.

Line cases with newspaper during cold weather.

Before taking them to market candle all eggs for poor shells, cracks and meat spots, separating them according to expected grade.

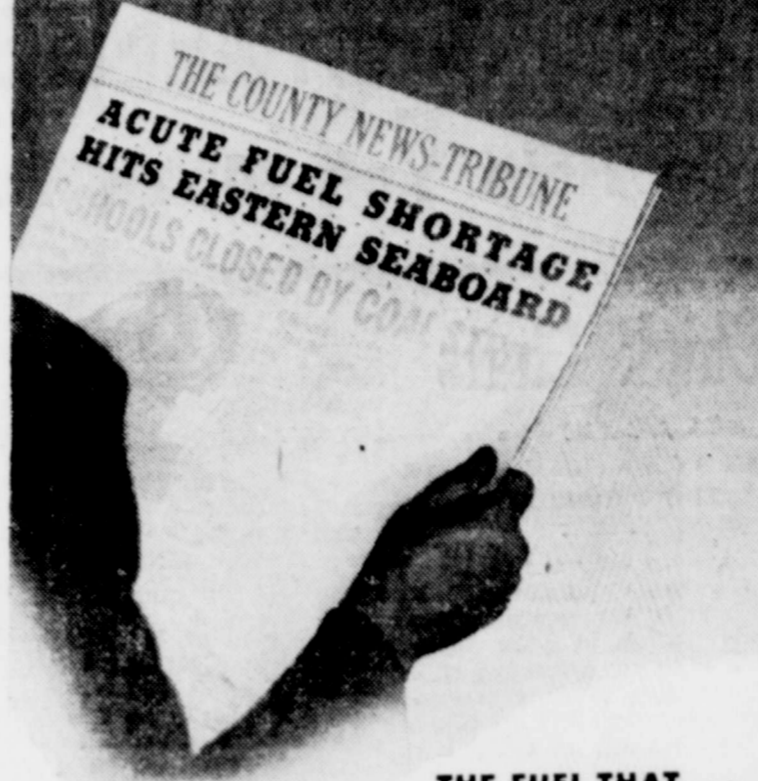
