But we are still on sugar rationing and it is predicted we will suffer a greater depletion during the next five years due to exporting to foreign countries. This past year Americans consumed but 75 pounds of refined sugar per person, compared to the pre-war consumption of 98. Additional supplies to Europe is to raise their sugar consumption, but with our population increasing within these next five years, less sugar will be available to housewives. Some bureaucrats look at this business in a different light than most of our readers.

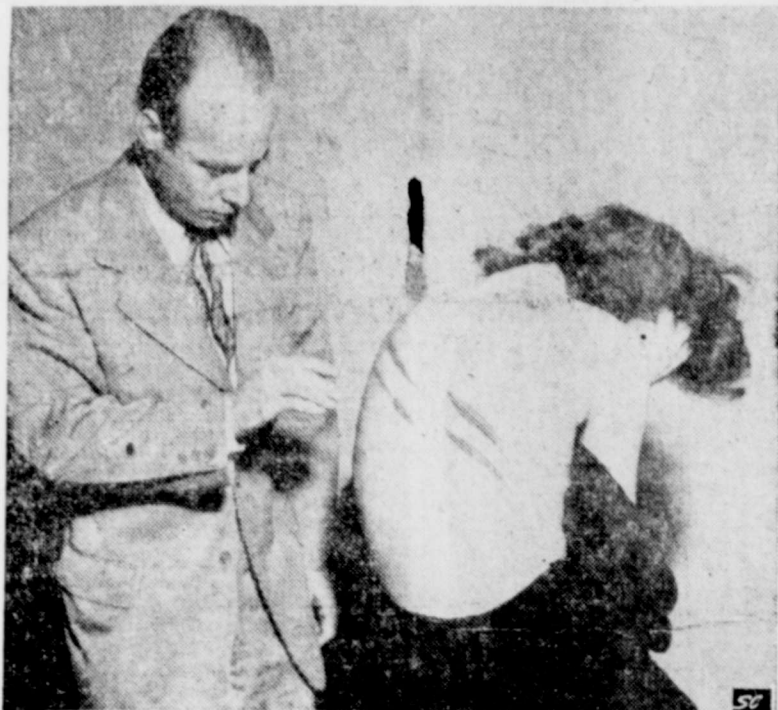

## Birthday Party For Jon Evans

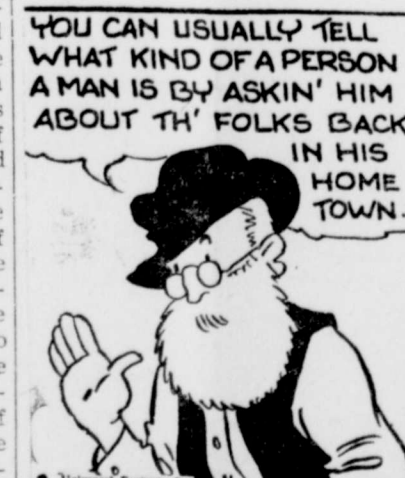

**F.B.I. Asks a Count**

In Europe the past summer I was  
 made to understand an important  
 fact. Consistently I was informed  
 by labor leaders, government of-  
 ficials, and industrialists in all of  
 the eight countries I visited that  
 the most disturbing element in each  
 nation was the Communist element.  
 In every country the confusion  
 wrought by the Communists was  
 quite disconcerting.

In England, Norway, Sweden,  
 Denmark, Belgium, Holland, and  
 Switzerland the Communist element  
 was not large in number. But it  
 was well organized. Apparently the  
 movement was receiving funds from  
 abroad in each country, for a cam-  
 paign all out of proportion to  
 actual size of the organization was  
 in progress. In France, although  
 the Communist party is not the lar-  
 gest, it has the best organization and  
 is recognized as the strongest single  
 party in France.

Confusion, today, is not confined to  
 Europe. In America we have been  
 having a lot of confusion. We are  
 facing the most serious industrial  
 problems in our history. Though  
 the war has been over for 15 months,  
 our industry is still dragging badly.  
 Production, in nearly every field, is  
 disappointing. But an abundant by-  
 product is confusion, and more con-  
 fusion.

Industry wants to produce, for that  
 is the only way it can make money.  
 Some of our largest manufacturing  
 establishments have actually lost  
 money instead of making money in  
 the past twelve months. Industry  
 is not pleased with this situation,  
 and I cannot believe they are pur-  
 posely trying to keep it that way.  
 Labor finds it difficult to live on cur-  
 rent income. Labor's need is wages,  
 and I cannot believe that labor as  
 a whole wants confusion, work stop-  
 pages, and light production.

Does the government want to hin-  
 der production? Surely it wants the  
 people to have food, clothing, trans-  
 portation, and housing. Yet, when  
 we have every reason to believe that  
 labor, industry, and government  
 want production, we are not getting  
 production. Despite the desire of  
 the three groups to avoid confusion,  
 yet we have confusion confounded.

**A Growing Menace**  
 J. Edgar Hoover, many years  
 head of the Federal Bureau of In-  
 vestigation, a trusted citizen and  
 public servant, is in a position to  
 understand perhaps better than any  
 other person what is happening in  
 America. In a speech on the West  
 Coast, September 30, he decried the  
 growing menace of Communism, de-  
 claring that "in the past five years  
 American Communists have made  
 their deepest inroads upon our na-  
 tional rights."

Their false preachments on civil  
 liberty mean that Communists want  
 the right to do as they please. Those  
 who seek to provoke prejudice and  
 stir up the public mind to angry re-  
 sentment against our form of gov-  
 ernment are a menace to the very  
 powers of law and order which guar-  
 antee and safeguard popular rights.  
 Said Mr. Hoover: "Communism has  
 spread Fascism and Fascism  
 spawns Communism. Both are the  
 antithesis of American belief in lib-  
 erty and freedom. If people of other  
 countries want Communism, let  
 them have it, but it has no place in  
 America." It is time to stand up  
 and be counted, indeed.

**Meat Control**

Collapse and failure recently of government control over an important commodity, required in the daily lives of the people, points up an important moral for Americans. In lettering bold and poster-size, amounting to handwriting on the wall, this moral shows that we are not ready for this kind of regimentation in peacetime. We may re-enact the plot again with new characters at some future time, but the result will surely be the same.

This we must know before more harm is done: A controlled economy is not compatible with American democracy. The real reason for complete failure of meat control lies in the fact that Americans have been brought up on a free market. They have found the greatest sort of freedom in this kind of economy. They desire no substitute.

**Few Old Cows**

Prices the government allowed for hogs and cattle on foot were not high enough to induce farmers to sell their animals. Early in October the New York Times sent a reporter into the heart of the Texas cattle country. Trailing buyers at Fort Worth for both major and independent packers, the Times reporter saw them bid OPA ceilings and come away with only a "few old cows" out of 5,700 head of beeves listed that day. Choice animals were "grabbed off" by traders at prices in excess of ceilings, while 7,000,000 beef cattle continued to roam the southwest Texas range.

Like any man who successfully invests capital and puts hard work into an enterprise, the cattle raiser is well taught about markets. But a controlled economy puzzles him first, muzzles him later. The farmer, like the manufacturer, has learned to watch markets; to buy and sell advantageously in an honest, competitive market. And in our land we have found that the consumer, who buys the food and manufactured goods at lower prices, is best protected by this same free market.

**Failure Recognized**

Why could a black market exist? The public wanted meat badly enough to pay more for it than the ceiling price. I am not condoning black markets, but it needs to be said that this one was a general revolt against price controls on meat during peacetime, when the public knew the country had more livestock than usual. The failure of controls was dismal, and the entire population recognized it.

Some folks, prompted by Communist thinking and desiring to destroy freedom of opportunity, blamed the failure on the packing houses. People who know nothing of the facts may believe the accusation. The facts are that prices packers could legally pay did not bring livestock to market. Neither did a few men in Congress cause the farmers to withhold hogs and cattle. It was not the "feebleness" of the law, but the law itself, that turned a free market into a black market.

Dynamic is the word for our American economy. It cannot be trampled down at one point and bludgeoned at another, at the whim of some far-away controller. Neither can you expect it to by-pass the bottlenecks of government control, using the laws of honest economics with which it is familiar—without disastrous results to the American way of life.

## Farm Bureau Notes Of The Week

Several weeks ago American Farm Bureau's Washington Office learned, from excellent sources, that the Director of Reconversion had asked United States Department of Agriculture to determine what effect President Truman's proclamation ending hostilities would have on commodity programs administered by the Department—so the proclamation was surprising as to timing, but not entirely unexpected otherwise.

Cessation of hostilities as of Dec. 31, 1946, means that the wartime price support programs on basic and Stegall commodities will end Dec. 31, 1946.

It means that restrictions on the disposal of government-owned cotton by CCC, prescribed in the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, will be reinstated on Jan. 1, 1949. These restrictions prohibit CCC from selling cotton below cost and limit sales to 300,000 bales a month and 1,500,000 bales a year.

As matters now stand, corn, wheat, rice, tobacco, and peanuts for nuts are to be supported until Dec. 31, 1958 at 90 per cent of parity and cotton at 92 1/2%. These are the basic commodities The Stegall program, which calls for support at not less than 90 per cent of parity, will also end Dec. 31, 1948. The Stegall list includes hogs, eggs, chickens over 3 1/2 lbs., live weight, turkeys, milk and butterfat, dry peas and dry edible beans of certain varieties, soybeans for oil, flaxseed for oil, peanuts for oil, American-Egyptian cotton, potatoes, and

sweet potatoes.  
 The Department's program for importing farm workers will continue until June 30, 1947, at least notwithstanding the president's proclamation.



## The SNAPSHOT GUILD

A TIME FOR RESOLUTIONS



Good pictures are a joy in any season. Correct camera care will help insure you better snapshots through the coming year.

**EVEN** if no whistles were to blow, no bells to ring on New Year's Eve, there would be no mistaking the advent of 1947 in the Van Guilder home.

Not with the lady of the house. Her annual reminder to me that it would be nice if this year—at last—I kept my darkroom clean and in order is as much a part of New Year's as noise-makers or confetti. Though often, I'm afraid, my good resolve lasts but little longer.

At that, she makes a better case than perhaps she knows. For cleanliness is a positive "must" in photography. And cleanliness, for the camera fan, begins with the care of his camera. "Camera housekeeping," someone's called it.

A good starting point in camera housekeeping is your lens—keep it clean. *NOT* by breathing damply upon it and wiping it with your necktie. It is all too likely your necktie may have a sharp piece of dust upon it which can scratch the carefully polished surface of the lens.

A better method is to arm your self with a narrow, camel's hair brush. Gently brush away any loose dust which has gathered on the lens. Then put a bit of lens cleaning fluid, similar to that used for eyeglasses, on a piece of cotton. Wipe the lens with this to remove any grease, and dry it with clean, lint-free linen or a lens tissue.

Dust can get inside your camera too, where it's attracted to the film. And dust on your film means tiny black specks in your finished picture. To guard against this there's nothing better than a carrying case for your camera; it not only keeps a camera clean but protects it from injury. Dust inside a camera can be best removed by using a narrow, soft brush.

It's wise, too, to have your camera cleaned and inspected by your photo dealer at least once a year. He'll check it for dirt, for tight leaks, and for mechanical failures in diaphragm or shutter. His care—and your own in keeping it clean from day to day—can help you make better pictures to make 1947 a happier new year.
