## John Clement Severely Injured In Auto Accident

John Clement, who was seriously injured in an auto accident near Bowie last Friday night, had not regained consciousness Wednesday at noon, according to Frank Clement, a brother who visited him in the morning. John is in the Bowie hospital, where he was taken shortly after the accident which happened near midnight.

He left Wichita Falls on the night of the accident about 11 o'clock alone. It is presumed he fell asleep at the wheel while driving. The car left the road at a curve near Fruitland, hit a post and skidded into a tree. The car, a new Pontiac sedanette, was completely demolished.

Mr. Clement was in such serious condition that doctors did not make X-rays until Wednesday morning. He is suffering from a concussion, but X-rays showed no other broken bones. Deep bruises and lacerations cover his body, particularly on his face, arms and legs.

At first doctors held little hope that he would live, but latest reports give him a fifty-fifty chance to pull through.

## Boy Scout Week February 7th-13th

The observance of Boy Scout Week, Feb. 7th to 13th on a nation-wide scale, says Dr. James E. West, Chief Scout of the Boy Scouts of America, has great value to boys. Boy Scout Week, he said emphasizes the romance and drama of Scouting.

In a statement for Boy Scout Week, marking the 37th anniversary of the original incorporation at Washington, D. C., Dr. West who was Chief Scout Executive from 1911 to 1943, says:

"Throughout the country Boy Scouts and their parents and friends are observing Boy Scout Week. Sometimes I am asked because of my long association with the Boy Scouts of America, starting in 1911, why Scout leaders place so much emphasis on this occasion.

"I always tell them that we do it because of its great value to boys. Very deliberately we developed the observance of this anniversary to create dramatic opportunities for boys to take part in a nation-wide celebration.

"From the start of Scouting we have conducted as a part of the program, spectacular features which create a desire on the part of boys to be Scouts.

"In our annual observance of Boy Scout Week we emphasize the romance and drama of Scouting in a way to impress boys and attract them to the program. We feel it desirable to do this annually because a new crop of boys of Scout age comes up each year. A new crop of boys does not absorb the experience of those who went before. We have to do it over and over again.

"I believe that the greatest responsibility that we as leaders in Scouting have today, as it has always been, is to think in terms of creating and maintaining an intense desire on the part of boys to be Scouts. The techniques of that are the techniques that we use in our Boy Scout Week observances.

"This is important not of course for the sake of mere numbers, but because of what Scout training means to the future citizens of America, because of the way in which Scouting does help boys to develop into men of character, trained for citizenship."

The second headliner event of the drive will be a "booster" shot-in-the-arm on Feb. 19th. Slated to take place on the fair grounds at Iowa Park, it will be a chuck wagon feed jointly sponsored by the Wichita Falls and Elertara Chuck Wagon Gangs. It will serve to bring together a gigantic jamboree of entertainment fair-minded folks from the area immediately north and south of Red River which the Texas-Oklahoma fair would serve.

Big gifts solicitation has occupied a handful of fair workers all this week. A report on their progress will be made on Monday at the kick-off luncheon. But the actual campaign still lies ahead. And its windup is scheduled for February 22nd. From the 10th to the 22nd of February, the only order of the day will be "work and report".

Fair officials stressed on the eve of the bombardment that an investment in the future of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair is a contribution to the development of the entire region in agriculture, livestock and industry. They also emphasized that the predominant aim of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair is to "tie-in the territory" with the fair serving as a melting pot where mutual efforts can bring about development and prosperity for the region as a whole.

A checkup in a place of authority reveals that contributions made to the fair expansion program are deductible for income tax purposes, in the manner and to the extent provided by law.

The \$30,000 which is being sought in the campaign will be used to better equip the T-O Fair to serve the region it now wishes to call its home territory. Included in its "face lifting" plans are a new quarter-horse barn, track and arena, a new industrial building, the fencing in of all extant properties, and general improvement of electrical circuits throughout the plant.

The hue and cry from now on through February 22nd among campaigners and crusaders for the project will be, "Tie-In With The T-O Fair." Checks should be made payable to Ira Campsey, Treasurer, Box 416, Iowa Park, Texas.

### INCOME TAX EVASION

Word comes from the Bureau of Internal Revenue to the effect that income tax evasion has gone sky high. The Federal Government estimates that the totals will reach \$3,000,000,000. It is double the amount of the evasions in past years. Uncle Sam is a suspicious old guy.

### HOMES FOR FAMILIES

The recent movements for "More and better homes" were intended to meet critical conditions. Huge crops of new babies presented problems that could not be ignored. Uncle Sam and Sister Sue got into the game of home building ahead of the real estate sharks.

Finally President Truman and Congress began guessing that it might be better to have more houses to rent, and so they interrupted the big racketeers who busted with the home-building game—they were getting rich too quick.

It is evident that within the near future veterans and civilians will be able to rent living quarters, and save their shirts without going into debt for the rest of their lives.

### THERE SHOULD BE TAX CUTS

It is pretty hard to understand how most of the small businessmen of the country are able to find enough money

left over, after their normal expenses are paid, to pay their income taxes. The rates are terrific—they are unreasonable. When businessmen get in a hole like our government they cut down expenses. But Uncle Sam slices off millions regularly, and keeps right on spending billions to help other countries all over the world.

The Commerce Department recently asked for a cut of 20 per cent in income taxes for small businesses. It also proposed that dividends be exempted from the basic income tax rate on the ground that the corporations themselves pay taxes on their earnings.

And, your Washington correspondent repeats that there is no hope for any substantial reduction in income taxes for a long time to come.

### BYRNES AND MARSHALL

No man in recent years has performed better services for his country than James Byrnes, who resigned as Secretary of State. Month after month he has been arguing in the interests of a confused World crying out loud for World peace. He has been firm and as patient as Job. Naturally, he feels that he has gone the limit with Russia and other countries, and in view of poor health he has retired.

The appointment of General Marshall has been loudly acclaimed and approved by all political groups in Washington. He is regarded as a worthy successor to Byrnes because of his magnificent record as head of military affairs and as a statesman. Marshall was picked because he is able, forceful, vigorous and persistent.

Senator Vandenberg who served with Byrnes, recently made an important address in which he predicted that General Marshall would designate representatives in the State Department to carry on the battle with Molotov and other dumb-bells.

There is considerable anxiety about the relations between the United States and Argentina, but Washington believes Marshall will hammer matters out to a peaceful conclusion. At the same time he will direct demands of our government on Russia and its Communist allies.

GERMANY: Polish Claims

Should the U. S. oppose Polish claims to the 40,000 square miles of former eastern German territory taken over by the Poles under the Potsdam agreement, this country faces a stiff fight with the Russian bloc.

Poland served notice of its determination to permanently affix the new territory at the deputy foreign ministers' meeting in London, called to lay the groundwork for the Big Four conference in Moscow in March to formulate a German treaty.

Nub of the disagreement lies in the Poles' contention that they were led to understand that they were given full sway over the territory at Potsdam. The U. S., on the other hand, holds that they were merely given temporary administrative control.

FEEDING THE FIVE THOUSAND LESSON TEXT—John 6:25-35, 56-58. MEMORY SELECTION—I am that bread of life.—John 6:48.

Bread! The cry of the hungry peoples of the world for bread has reminded us anew that it is the simple and elemental things of life which are of most importance.

Our lesson does not deal with the feeding of the five thousand, but the story of that miracle of our Lord is the background for the discourse on the bread of life which is assigned for our study.

The story of how our Lord multiplied the loaves and fishes of a small boy's lunch and fed the multitude presents him as the Creator and Sustainer of all things.

But he could not get away from them, for they followed him thither. Meeting them he gave them the instruction they so much needed as he effectively contrasted the temporal and earthly with the eternal and heavenly.

### Washington Newsletter - - -

By Congressman  
ED GOSSETT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 1 —"Should We Further Restrict Immigration" will be the subject of a radio debate on the American Forum of the Air program on Tuesday, February 11, 1947. It will be broadcast over the Mutual Network from Washington 9:30 to 10:15 p. m., Eastern Standard Time—8:30 to 9:15 Central Standard Time. On the affirmative will be myself and Omar B. Ketchum, National Legislative Representative, Veterans of Foreign Wars. On the negative will be Congressman Tmanuel Cellar of New York and Earl Harrison, former Commissioner of Immigration, now dean of the Law School, University of Penn.

This has been somewhat of a Sam Rayburn week in Washington. As speaker of the House of Representatives Mr. Rayburn was furnished an automobile and chauffeur. When demoted to Minority Leader in this Congress, Mr. Rayburn lost the use of said automobile. Congressman Frank Boykin of Alabama thereupon raised money among the Democratic congressmen to present Mr. Rayburn with a new car. This was given to him on Thursday in front of the Capitol.

On Friday night the Texas State Society had a dinner at the Statler Hotel honoring Sam Rayburn. Among others, this dinner was attended by six Cabinet members of the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Fred Vinson of Kentucky delivered the main address honoring Mr. Rayburn.

The House of Representatives this week passed a bill continuing war time excise taxes, which include 20 per cent tax on railroad tickets, theatre tickets, cosmetics, long distance telephone calls, jewelry, and furs, and \$9 per gallon tax on whisky. Incidentally, recent figures show that in 1945 the United States spent \$7,800,000,000 for alcoholic drinks, and \$3,000,000,000 for tobacco, while giving only \$1,035,000,000 for religious purposes. This is a sad commentary on our individual and collective morality.

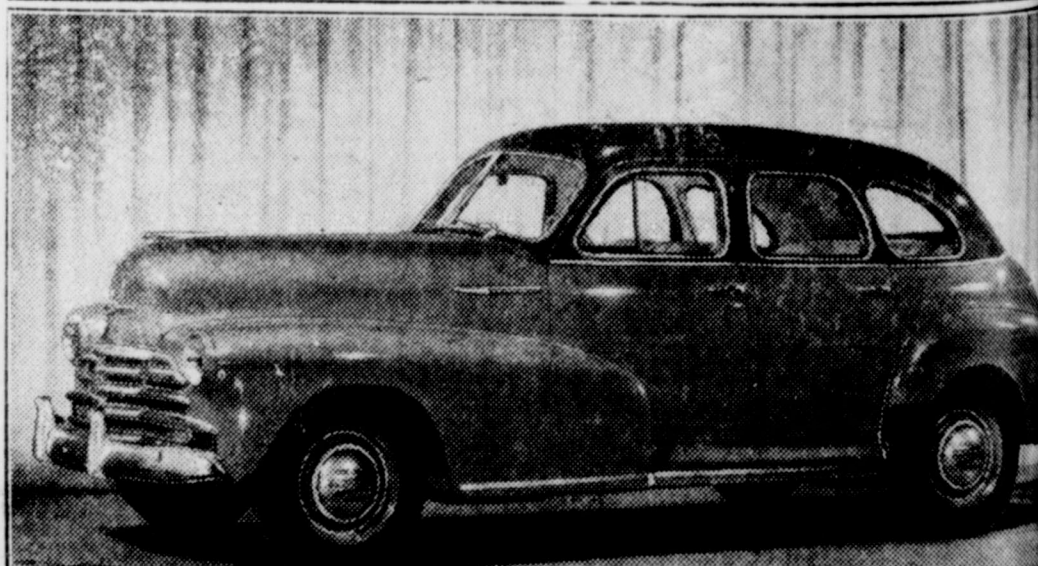
