# 10 ways you can help yourself to good telephone service

Telephoning is easy. But more depends on the user than people realize. What you do when making or receiving a call often has a lot to do with how satisfactory that call is. Here are ten suggestions:



Before you call, make sure of the number. If you're not sure of it, look in the telephone directory, and thus avoid wrong numbers.

2. Give the called party time to answer. He or she may be some distance from the telephone. A minute isn't too long.



Speak directly into the mouthpiece. About an inch between it and your lips is right for best results.



Move the switch hook slowly up and down to recall or signal the operator. "Jiggling" the hook rapidy often won't cause a signal to come in and is useless.

5. Replace the receiver carefully when you have finished talking. A receiver partly off the hook puts the whole line out of order.

6. Answer calls promptly. It's courteous to do so and often keeps the caller from hanging upthinking you're not at home.

Identify yourself when you call or answer. Not everyone recognizes you by your voice. Telling who you are saves time and sometimes embarrassment.

8. Space calls on party lines. If you have a series of calls to make, allow a few minutes between each one so others can use the line to call or be called.



9. Keep calls brief on party lines. Other folks on the line will appreciate your thoughtfulness and -who knows-may follow your good example.



Avoid calling in busy hours if possible. Switchboards are usually busiest during midmorning and late afternoon.

Nineteen forty-six was banner year for American farm machinery manufacturers and all reported prospects for 1947 are even better.

International Harvester enjoyed total sales of \$482,328,000 in its fiscal year ending October 31, 1946, and showed profits of \$22,326,000. Sales of trucks, parts and service accounted for 35.9 per cent of volume while production of farm implements and parts made up 17.3 per cent of the total.

Deere & Co. sales jumped to \$143,-900,496 in 1946, with profits of \$9,-665,579. With a cessation in war work, production of farm implements increased about 23 per cent, t was said.

Oliver corporation sales amounted to \$50,840,914 in 1946 with net earnings of \$2,003,999. Unit sales of farm items reached an all-time peak despite material shortages and labor difficulties. In anticipation of continued good business, Oliver plans improvements in production and distribution facilities in excess of \$7,000,000.



#### In The Record

At any rate, these unions have put down on the record their resentment and rejection of efforts of the Communits and "other political parties" to interfere with their affairs. Communists, they seem to imply, are just another political party, but let us not forget what ideology is followed by the Communist line, whether in a party by that name or in other parties. There's nothing American about their ideology nor

their long-range aims. It would seem the time has come for our two major political parties to do more than merely disown the Communists who have infiltrated their own ranks and the ranks of labor. Moreover, it might be a good time for the two major parties and for our leaders of labor to say that political action groups have no business interfering with the affairs of political parties.

#### Greater Threat

The extent to which Communist ideology has penetrated gradually the councils of labor is no doubt much greater than labor itself is aware. A prominent labor personality recently set down the profits of industry for 1946 as \$15,000,000,000. after taxes, and added that this represents a greater threat to the nation than does Communism.

Whatever industry's earnings will be for 1946, the figures will not be high enough. The poor showing in the first nine months of the year, as seen in the stalled output of the automobile industry and in the failure of many industries to make any profit at all, will not make large sums available for higher wages. The Profit Motive

Poor industrial earnings will not permit management to set aside funds for expansion and for badly needed working capital. Neither will lagging production bring a prosperity level that will help pay our tremendous war debt. No production brings no profits and no wages.

Americans dislike to see any groups discredit the profit motive. We like each man's prerogative to make a profit, whether he belongs on the side of management and ownership, or whether he is a wage earner. It is elementary economics that wage earners do not experience increased wages under conditions where there is no production. Surely the rank and file of Americans know this. We cannot believe that any loyal Americans would like for industry to be constantly in the red. But we know that the Communists






