## Dr. Walter Roberts To Be Associated With Burk Clinic

Dr. Walter D. Roberts, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Roberts of Burk Burnett, will be associated with Dr. Harley C. Sullivan and Dr. Phillip A. Carpenter in the Burk Burnett Clinic beginning April 15.

Dr. Roberts was born in Burk Burnett in 1917. He received his early education in the local schools, and was graduated from the Burk High school with the class of 1934. He attended Hardin-Simmons University 1934-36, and the University of Texas 1936-38, receiving his B. S. degree in Pharmacy from the University.

During the year of 1938-39, Dr. Roberts worked as a pharmacist at the Central Drug Store in Galveston, Texas. He attended the University of Texas again in 1939-40, and entered the Medical Branch of the University of Texas at Galveston in the fall of 1940. In August 1943, he received his M. D. degree, and entered the Navy immediately, where he served a period of intern training at the United States Naval Hospital, Corona, California.

Following his intern training, Dr. Roberts was assigned as Senior Medical Officer at the Naval Training School, Texas Agricultural and Mechanical School in Bryan, Texas. In December 1944 he was assigned to the Fleet Marine Force for overseas duty, where he served with the Second Marine Division attached to support troops of the eighth Regiment during the operation at Okinawa. Then assigned to the Second Medical Battalion, Second Division, he proceeded to Japan for occupational duty. Here he remained in the Nagasaki and Sesabo areas of Kyushu, Japan for nine months following the Japanese surrender.

In May of 1946, Dr. Roberts returned to the United States and since that time has been assigned to the Main Dispensary at the Naval Station, Port Huene, California. He will be separated from the United States Naval service March 1, and will join the Clinic staff around the 15th of April.

Dr. Roberts was married to Miss Dorothy Sue Freeman of Galveston, Feb. 1941. They have one daughter, Lynn Ann, age 3. He is a member of the American Medical Association.

### UNIFORM DIVORCE LAWS

Legislation is afoot to pass a uniform marriage and divorce bill, while there rises the cry of states rights. Such a bill will win support from those who would like to see marriage and divorce mills killed, do away with hasty and child marriages. It would grant divorce only for adultery, cruel and inhuman treatment, abandonment or non-support for one year, habitual drunkenness, incurable insanity or conviction for an "infamous" crime. These would be the only grounds and divorced persons would have to wait one year before the decree became final. Are we to permit divorce records to reach their peak this year and do nothing about the matter, next year?

### WORDS FROM WASHINGTON

This country's relationship with European countries has been and will probably always be, a series of friendly and unfriendly incidents. Some differences have been slight with amicable decisions, others have caused war. We are naturally drawn towards those nations whose general

mode of living and ideals correspond most favorably with our own. Emotionally we have become attached to certain countries in the process of waging a battle upon our enemies. The United Nations Organizations strive to draw all people together in a global bond of unity but this has not been possible so far. As we are ambitious for a successful fulfillment of the UNO hopes, we might quote words of wisdom from a statesman whose birthday we celebrate February 22. George Washington, who might have prescribed in 1798, policies that would not be good for us today as time changes occasions, still did give us a prescription for European alliances that can hold good in 1947. From his Farewell Address: "Nothing is more essential than that permanent, inveterate antipathies against particular nations and passionate attachments for others, should be excluded. The nation which indulges towards another and habitual hatred for an habitual fondness is in some degree a slave. It is a slavetoitsanimosity or to its affection, either of which is sufficient to lead it astray from its duty and from its interest."

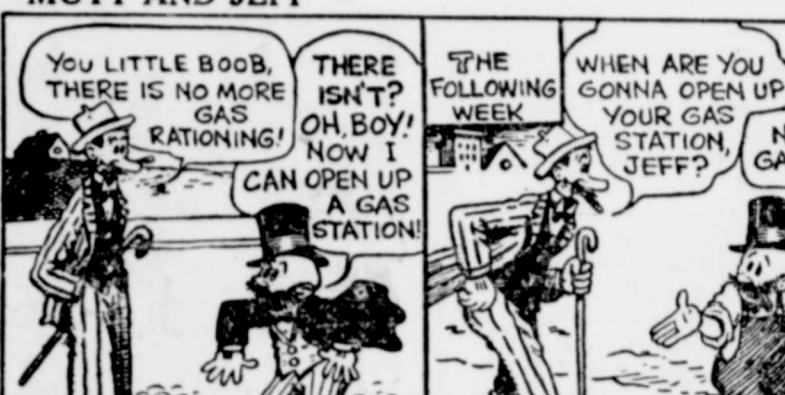

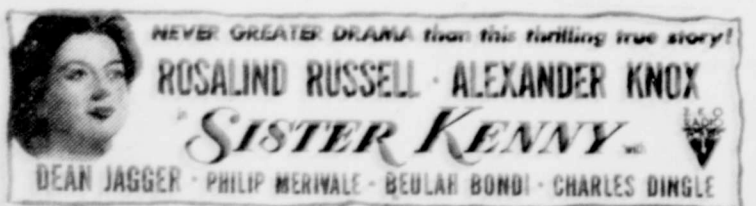

## Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

### CHICKS THAT ARE WELL BRED

While a poultryman may save money at the beginning by purchasing chicks at the lowest possible price, he generally finds that it is more costly

in the long run. One of the most important rules of poultry management is to start with good stock. When this rule is violated, the producer loses the many advantages offered by chicks with a good breeding background.

Chicks should be selected with care from a source known to be reliable. Well-bred chicks, while not as cheap as the bargain rate birds, will reward the producer later in the season either through superior egg production or better meat quality or both. Other things being equal, the more expensive chicks will be more economical pullets or cockerels.

Order those chicks early. The best breeders and hatcheries usually have a certain amount of top grade chicks, and those who place their orders first for these chicks of superior quality are placed highest on the delivery preference list. It also assures one of getting the breed desired and getting them off to an early start so they reach the favorable early broiler market quickly. Hatcherymen must make their plans far in advance, and many of them offer special discounts to early purchasers so their plans can be completed. Early booking pays off so don't neglect to contact the hatcheryman at once.

After the chicks are ordered start planning the year's management program. Even birds with the best breeding won't do well without help from the poultry raiser. See that the brooder house and equipment are in good condition before the chicks arrive. Then determine to give the birds the best care all through the growing season. Good management may mean the difference between high and low mor-

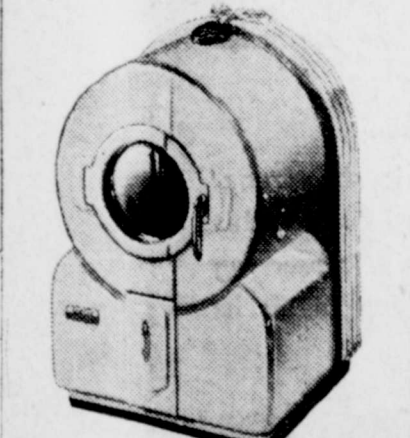

Watch out for the man with the case!  
An odd thing about northern game wardens is the weapon they

prefer. On enforcement patrol they use guns, but they get more use out of a plain, one-inch walking cane with a crooked handle. That cane is used for fishing in water for illegal nets, for feeling along dikes for forest pits at night, for defense if attacked, and one warden is known to have started a violator he was chasing through the brush by breaking the cross through the suspenders of the man's overalls.

Gordon MacQuarrie, noted Wisconsin outdoor writer, went along for the ride on several patrols with wardens in the Iron River section of Wisconsin, and his observations present a warning to all would-be poachers.

The easiest arrests to make are the city slickers who go back into the sticks to spend time or stay deer. With the expert poacher, whose theory is that winter sports are sweeter, it's a game of wits which sooner or later the warden will win.

One warden can work a dozen lakes in a day with his extra eyes — those night-power field glasses that see just about every thing going on out there in the fishing boats. He has an eye for ice trends, and chances are knows the kind of shoe soles on

all suspected violators in town. There are a lot of tracks to the woods and it's the warden's job to know them.

Ralph C. Conway, Wisconsin state superintendent of refuges and public hunting grounds, also a warden, tells me on a visit.

I was stationed in an eastern camp instructing eyes on the firing of the Garand semi-automatic rifle. I stood back of one young man who was dropping me into the black from the prone position. He was simply deadly and after his score was posted he winked at me and said: I oughta know how to shoot. Been firing a rifle all my life.

I asked him where. He said: Up in Forest County Wisconsin, Hell, that score today was nothing. Last July I knocked over a buck at 300 yards—without a scope.

Somehow Conway adds, I thought of Sergeant York and I don't guess I'd ever want to patch that kid.

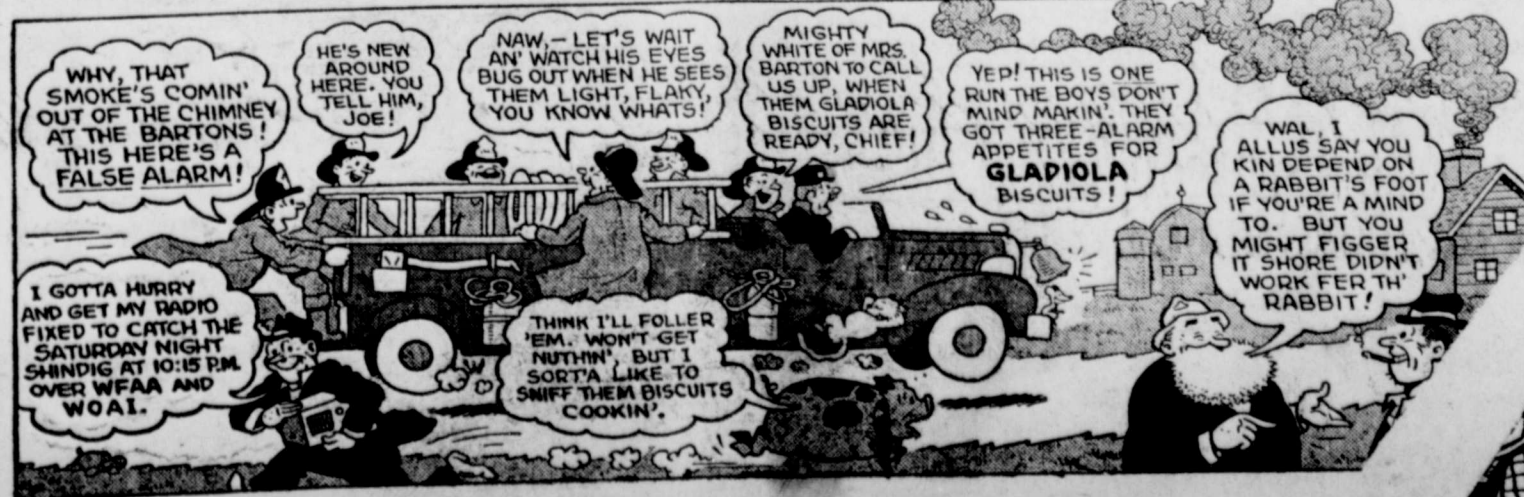

### Accidents Kill 100,000 in 1946; State Department Maps Program; Seek Presidential Term Curb

#### U.N.: How to Disarm?

Sick or war, the U. S. and Russia remained solid on world disarmament, but as the two great powers in conflicting camps, they locked horns on procedure.

The atomic bomb remained the nub of the problem. The U. S. insisted that no adequate system of collective security could be devised until establishment of effective control over A-bombs, long-range rockets and other mass destruction weapons. The Russians, on the other hand, wanted the U. S. to surrender the A-bomb and disarm at the same time.

#### Mishaps Take Big Toll

Home, sweet home continued to be the most dangerous place in 1946. National Safety Council reported in its roundup of accidents for the year. No less than 34,000 persons were killed in their homes and over 5,000,000 incurred disabling injuries. In all, 100,000 persons were killed and 10,400,000 injured in accidents for 1946, with an average of 1 out of 13 people in the U. S. suffering a disabling mishap. Based on wage

#### STATE DEPARTMENT: Legislative Aims

While Secretary of State Marshall called for early congressional action on his request for full aid to the hungry in war-stricken areas overseas, the senate foreign relations committee indicated it would hold off consideration until receiving President Hoover's report on food requirements for Germany.

#### PRESIDENCY: Rush Curb

Mustering its full strength, the Republican majority in congress pushed for passage of a bill by Representative Michener (Rep., Mich.) for limiting a president to two terms. Denying Democratic charges that the measure was "anti-Roosevelt," the GOP contended it was designed to curb the growth of autocratic power and put a historic U. S. tradition into law.

#### WORLD TRADE: Hit British Pact

Britain renounced any intentions of negotiating restrictive trade clauses with other countries following Secretary of the Treasury Snyder's protest to London over terms of an agreement with Argentina.

#### Appliances Find Place in U. S. Homes

Luxuries of years ago are commonplace in the American home today, the National Family Opinion organization reported after a nationwide survey for marketing interests.

it would prevent the free flow of trade promised in the deal. Should Britain extend the same provisions to India, Egypt and other countries, it would tend to choke free trade. In answering Snyder, the British government declared it had no intention to apply the terms to future trade pacts.

#### Marriage Aid

Alarmed by the rising divorce rate, the British Labor government proposed a new welfare service devoted toward stabilizing marriage. Banned by the London press, the proposal attracted the keen interest of parliament.

#### Use Rockets to Brake Speed of Trains, Planes

The jet power of rockets, which has so far been employed almost wholly as a propulsive force, is expected to be used soon in the opposite way—to brake the speed of planes and trains in cases of emergency, says Collier's.

### THE GOOD SHEPHERD

LESSON TEXT—John 10:7-18. MEMORY SELECTION—I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep—John 10:11.

An open door! How inviting! Jesus had just been talking to the man once blind (John 9) who had seen the temple door closed against him. It shut him out from all the sacred traditions of his people, but it turned him to Jesus, who presents himself in our lesson as "the door of the sheep."

#### I. The Door of the Sheep (vv. 7-10).

The preceding verses of chapter 10 are important, for they identify Jesus as the true Shepherd. He speaks of his people as his sheep.

Flocks were sometimes kept in the field at night, as was the case on the night when Jesus was born in Bethlehem. But ordinarily they were brought into a sheepfold, where many flocks gathered for protection. A shepherd was on guard at the door. Thieves would climb the wall to steal sheep, but the true shepherds, when they came in the morning to lead forth their flocks, entered by the door. They called out their own flock by name.

It is said that only sick sheep will follow a stranger, which may explain why so many false isms of our day appeal to the sick and lead them away from the Good Shepherd.

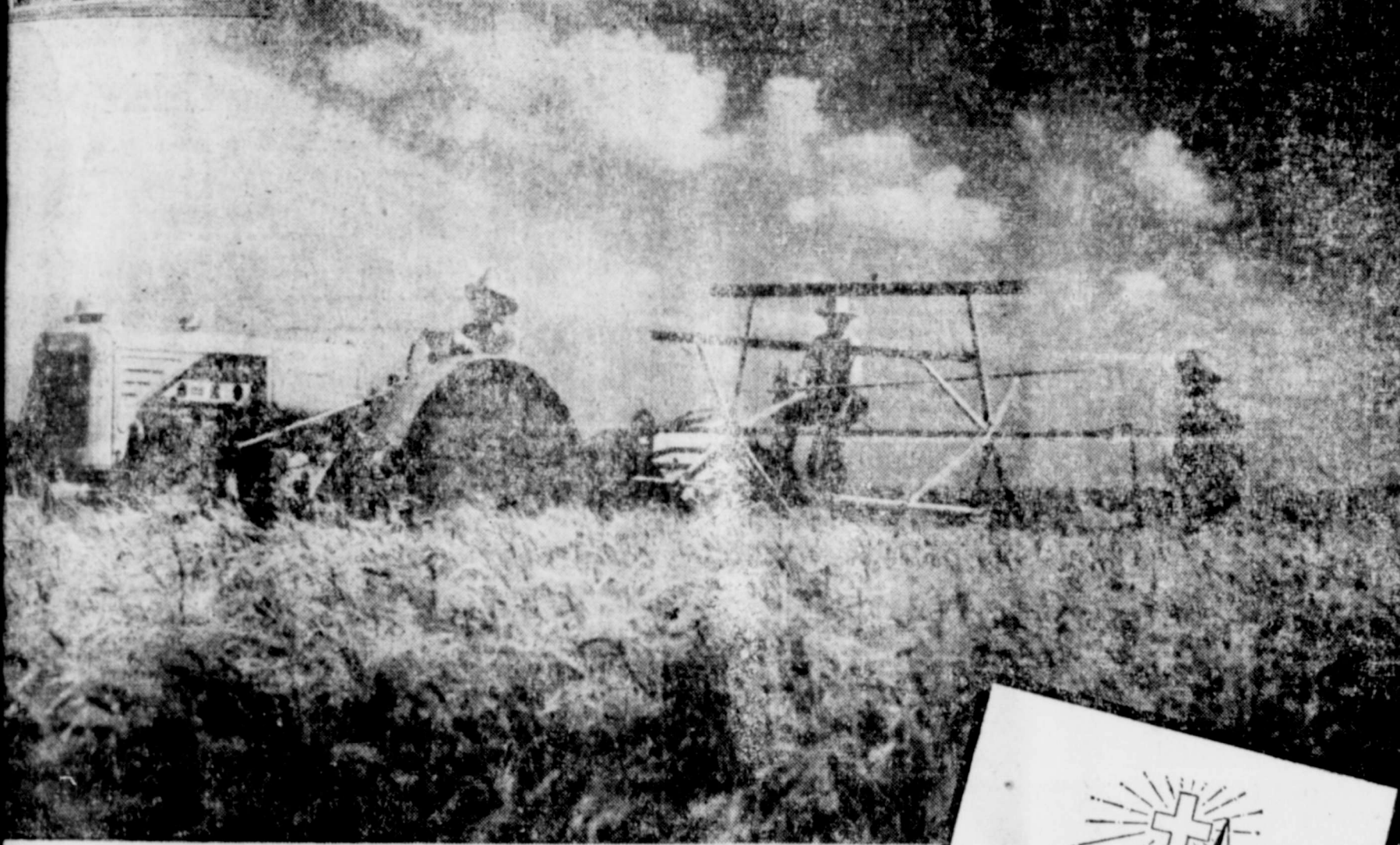

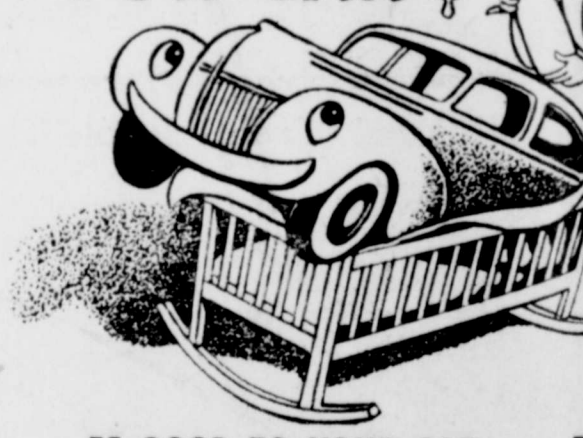
