Mrs. Ray Hill is reported to be doing nicely in the Wichita Falls Clinic Hospital, where she underwent an operation Tuesday morning.

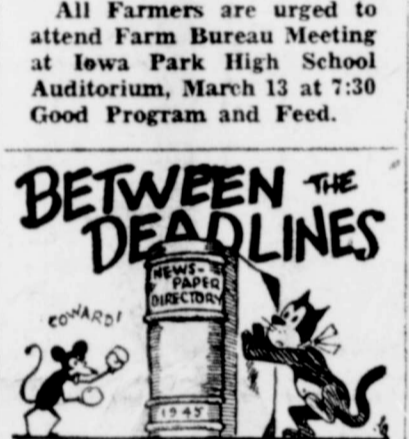
"THE WRONG PROFESSOR" TO BE PRESENTED FRIDAY NIGHT

ABOUT ENOUGH

Weather such as we have had this winter has really run the gauntlet. Nature can be most contrary. We think she has shown us her whole bag of tricks and then next week we can't be too sure. February seems to be saved for sound and fury. Boasting upon her mild treatment in January and December, we were led to expect that such might be ours this month. The now beat against the house, the rain and sleet spanked the windows and we hoped they were but signs of the beginning of the end. We look to March when winds lash with less force perhaps, when plant and animal life take heart. February is probably jealous of Nature's spring plans and consequently is most irritable at this time of the calendar.

AN IMPORTANT POINT

Some time ago leading Soviet journalists traveled this country to write their impressions of Americans at work and play. They were shown every courtesy, were wined and dined. They wrote what they desired for the Russian papers. One of them, Mr. Ehrenburg, was especially caustic and said some pretty nasty things about the U. S. He has repeated this in a visit to France, treating that country in the same manner. What he seems to forget but Burkburnett people have not, is that he was permitted to wander freely over these lands, live as he chose, speak freely as he saw fit. Contrast this with the conditions of American and French writers in Russia. We would say the Soviet journalist has overlooked one very important factor in his observation, that is—"liberty."

GOING FURTHER

We have felt teen-age centers were a way to combat juvenile delinquency, giving them healthy surroundings. We still do. But, we read of a poll of the teen-agers themselves and in answer to the problem they state that they had to have some place to go. The first thing that pops into the mind, is what has happened to the home and family life. Has it so deteriorated that children must escape from it, that they can't find pleasure and entertainment within it but must seek society away from home—Home would be-

come just a place to eat and sleep, from whence comes payment of doctor bills, new clothes, baths and spending money. It may be true in many instances but we trust that in our city our teen-age group have more respect and appreciation of that foundation of American life—the home.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

GET READY NOW FOR POULTRY YEAR

Now's the time to be laying ground for the poultry raising season ahead. To have a flock of good pullets next fall, high quality chicks are needed this spring. It takes five to seven months to mature a heavy breed, which

means that pullets will start to lay from July to September if started during February, March or April. For those who start only one brood of chicks each year these are generally the most successful months to begin operations.

After deciding to start your chicks early, select a breed that fits the objectives you hope to achieve. Always some poultrymen wish to make changes simply to try something different, but the poultryman who year after year have the best results are those who stick by the breeds and hatchery with which they have enjoyed the most success in the past.

Another question usually roving through a poultry raiser's mind in February is, Shall I buy sexed or straight run chicks? This brings one once more to the question, What are my objectives and what are my facilities? If your aim is toward laying profits select pullets from a heavy laying strain, but be sure the brooder and laying houses are large enough to accommodate the number purchased. Pullet chicks

should have more space in the brooder house if they are to do their best, than straight run chicks. If one is dressing fryers or broilers, cockerels are fine, but first determine the maximum market possibilities and make selections accordingly.

Housing Requirements

Be sure the brooder house and equipment are adequate for the number of baby chicks which

will comprise the brood at least one square foot of space for every 2 1/2 chicks regardless of floor space in a single unit. Make the house is tight, free of drafts and well insulated.

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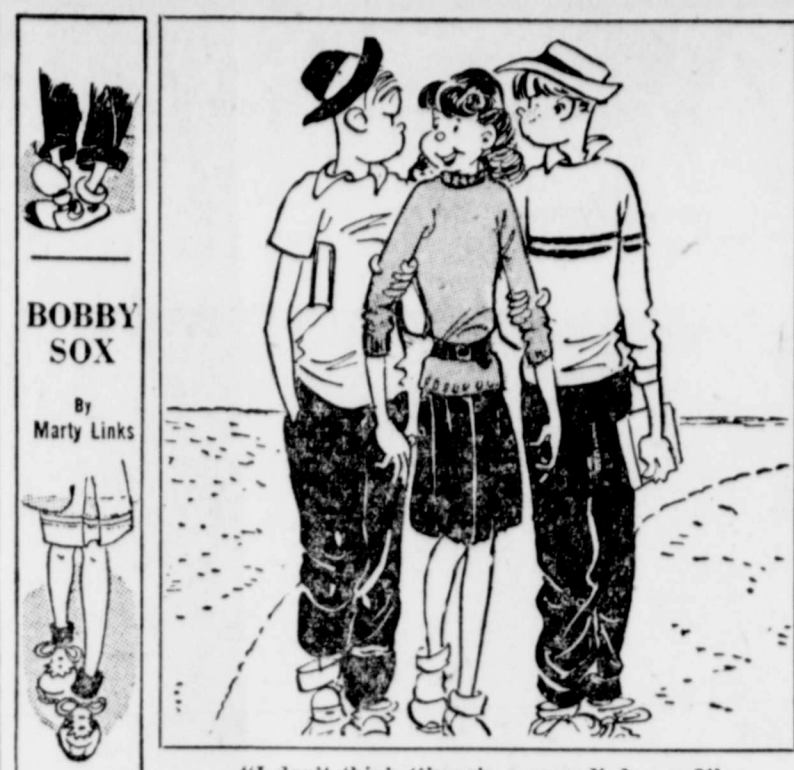

Turn Back

Three easy steps will degrade a self-governing people to the level of dictatorship: (1) to planned economy (2) to government management (3) to government control. America has already taken the first step. War pushed central planning upon us, and people who like it are trying to make it permanent. If it can be made to stick, the nation will be ready for the second step—government management.

Disregarding all fancy and impractical theories, history proves that private enterprise made America the world's most powerful nation and gave us all the most comfortable lives that common people ever lived. Our only wise course is to turn back to free enterprise but first we must get ahead of planned economy. It is going to demand a series of strenuous treatments, for it is well advanced.

It Is No Dream

Disaster for the only remaining prosperous people on earth can not be avoided by any magic method like suddenly waking out of a bad dream. Things we have learned about what took personal liberty from the Germans, the Russians and the French, and more recently from the British, may seem like nightmares but they are very real and painful. Here in America we have a chance.

It is a back illustration but very useful: When you want to get rid of darkness, you turn on light. When you want to get rid of ignorance, you admit truth. Incompetents scatter when they hear intelligent competition approaching. The first move against politics in business is to take the handcuffs off business itself. Set private enterprise free and it will protect itself.

Let Money Work

Laws made to take the profit out of war are now taking the pay out of work. Laws have rolled profits in some businesses so thin that there is nothing left to make but a loss. Ill-advised taxes on some commodities are so large that a fair price will not cover them. Industrial relations are so needed with politics that declining volume already is endangering jobs and wages.

People who are saving money are obliged often to let it lie idle in banks because there is no reasonably secure place to put it to work. Some invest in government bonds but the earnings of bonds come from taxes and serve not at all to put men to work and increase the national wealth. When private investors are afraid to trust enterprise, government management is at the door.

The Need of Today

Getting the United States out of its present entanglements with state socialism is one thing, keeping it out is another. For the long-range good of this nation, and of the world that looks to us for leadership, a ceaseless campaign of education is needed. The present need is to cut restraints on production and set American business on its feet again; by three measures:

(1) Change the tax structure to permit profits to operators and dividends to investors. (2) Balance the federal budget now, in prosperous times when, if ever, high taxes can be paid. (3) Improve industrial relations. In the long run, workers get paid in proportion to what they produce, and high wages, fairly earned, comprise the foundation of American prosperity.

Dogs Played an Important In Lincoln's Life, History Shows

To the long list of historical figures who were lovers of dogs, the name of Abraham Lincoln, party President, should be added, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

Not only was Lincoln very fond and understanding of dogs and owned several during his life, but they in turn seemed to have loved and understood him, it states.

At Fort Wayne, Ind., in front of the Lincoln National Life Insurance Company building, is a huge bronze statue named "Abraham Lincoln—the Hoosier Youth," executed by Paul Manning, world-famed sculptor. This statue shows young Lincoln wearing a homespun shirt, buckskin trousers, and boots, his left hand caressing the head of a hound dog seated at his side. This striking memorial has been praised as the truest as well as the most beautiful, concept of Lincoln as a young man ever given this country. The inclusion of the dog in the statue was intended to symbolize Lincoln's great love for animals and the many occasions upon which he showed kindness toward them.

Lincoln's constant companion as a child was a large hound owned by his father, Thomas Lincoln. The dog went with the boy on fishing and hunting expeditions and on jaunts over the Kentucky hills and streams.

Once when playing in the woods young Abe and his boyhood chum, Austin Gollaher, found a dog with a broken leg. Abe made a splint for the injured leg, carried the dog to a nearby cave for shelter and brought food and water to it for several weeks. When the broken leg had healed Lincoln took the dog home and named it Honey. Abe's devotion to the dog was rewarded, for Honey once brought aid to his owner when the boy had been trapped in a cave by falling boulders.

When Lincoln was 21 his family moved from Indiana to Macon County, Ill. During the long, tedious journey in March of 1830, the family was accompanied by a small dog. The dog trotted along under the big covered wagon

pulled by eight oxen. On occasion the dog fell in a caravan and didn't get after the wagon for a large stream. The stream and thick with brush the dog stood on the bank and howling as he was disappearing. Lincoln endured the dog's distress was impractical to feed again with the wagon, through the icy water, a dog and carried him on.

On leaving his home field, Ill., for the White House Lincoln presented his old friend, John I. in the White House soon became a member President's family. When exhausted and Lincoln would seek the getting down and pat the family dog. FOR WANT OF A NAIL . . .

Nearly two hundred years ago
Benjamin Franklin wrote the
famous lines about how a kingdom
was lost . . . because a battle was
lost . . . because a rider was lost
. . . because his horse was lost . . .
because a shoe was lost . . . and all
for want of a nail.

We keep thinking of those lines
whenever we're asked what's hold-
ing up production of the new Chev-
rolet cars. You see, it requires more
than 8,000 parts to build an auto-
mobile, and if a shortage of mate-
rial prevents production of just one
of these parts, then production of
the entire car is halted.

For want of a nail? Yes, it's
almost literally that. Of the 8,000
parts in a Chevrolet, about 2,500
of these are nuts and bolts alone!
The production men at Chevrolet
tell us that nuts and bolts are hard
to obtain just now, and are shipped
by special planes to assembly plants
all over the country whenever a
source for these vital parts is found.

At ten o'clock one morning it was
learned that Fisher Body plants at
Kansas City and St. Louis would
be forced to shut down the follow-
ing morning if a supply of window
channels was not available by
seven a.m. These parts were at a
plant in Amesbury, Massachusetts,
and none of the passenger airliners
had doors big enough to admit the
long channels.

Arrangements were finally made
for a C-47 cargo plane to fly from
Chicago to Boston to pick up the
channels trucked there from Ames-
bury. The 9,000 pounds of channels
were then flown to Kansas City and
St. Louis, and Chevrolet bodies
continued to move out of the plants.

Hoods have been flown from
Elint to Kansas City; fenders from
St. Louis to California. These daily
air-cargo shipments are a part of
the vast Chevrolet plan to move
parts, the minute they are avail-
able, into plants where shortages
exist—to move them there fast, so
that those plants can keep oper-
ating.

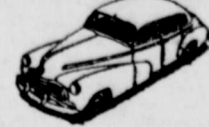
Another ingenious step taken to
help beat the materials shortages
was at a Chevrolet foundry in
Saginaw. Pig iron was low, a sched-
uled shipment had not arrived, and
a shut-down seemed certain. Then
someone suggested exploring the
river bottom with an electromagnet
near the docks where pig iron had
been unloaded for many years.

Divided in 1935 over the issue of vertical (mass) organization of workers, the "House of Labor" was another tortuous step closer to unity with CIO acceptance of an AFL invitation to merge the two great American labor movements with a total membership of over 12 million.

FAMINE: Aid Romania

The American Red Cross drew upon Uncle Sam's bounty to relieve Romania's worst famine in 50 years. No less than 500,000 men, women and children were suffering starvation in the Moldavian region and lacking clothing and other supplies.

Declaring that American exports chiefly will be limited by the amount of foreign exchange held by other countries, John L. McCaffrey, president of International Harvester company, urged that the U. S. should finance shipments with imports of goods and services which we do not produce ourselves or can buy more cheaply abroad.

If left to themselves they are lost forever as was Judas. Peter was helpless to turn back to his Lord. But Jesus looked at Peter. He wanted to save him. That look caused him to see his sin and repent. By that look Peter was drawn to faith in the Savior and became a true disciple again. The Lord, who suffered and died for all, through His Word draws those who have fallen. In it He shows them their sin that they truly repent. Thru His Word He works faith in their hearts that they believe in His suffering and death again. All who hold fast to the Word of Christ's suffering and death shall be saved. Christians, too, must hold fast to that Word, lest they fall into sin and are lost. "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."
