BIG BOYS GETTING MOST NEWSPRINT

Yes, there has been a real shortage of newsprint paper for a long time. As usual, there was discrimination. The government used more paper than was necessary. The big dailies and magazines were the best customers and the easiest to supply. The small newspapers took the raps, and they still are getting the shorndent of the deal. Evidently less than 15 per cent of the total output of newsprint is sufficient to take care of all Family Dailies and Weeklies printed outside the metropolitan areas. United States Senator Capehart is an energetic champion of "ye small papers," and he holds an advantageous post on the Senate Small Business Committee, which has close connections with the U. S. Department of Commerce. Editors and publishers who feel an urge to push for their rights, could help to do a useful job by telling their own Representatives and Senators that "now is the time to come to the aid of their party."

Washington Newsletter

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 22—The House this week passed several minor bills, including one to transfer sugar control from O. P. A. to the Department of Agriculture. Under this bill sugar controls are extended to October 31, with control over industrial inventories for an additional five months.

A number of big and controversial issues on which committees have been hard at work will soon hit the floor of Congress. These will include labor control, taxation, and foreign policy.

The tax bill sponsored by Congressman Harold Knutson of Minnesota, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the House, is scheduled for a vote in the House on Thursday. Tax bills are presented under the so-called closed rule. This means one must vote for the whole bill or against the whole bill; no amendments are in order. I am opposed to a 20 per cent cut across the board as urged by Mr. Knutson, and oppose any drastic reduction in taxes at this time. Our national income is twice as high as at any time before the war. Certainly we should balance the budget and pay something on debts while income is high. If tax relief is to be given, most people agree it should be given first to exceedingly low income persons. Among facts pointed out by tax experts however, is that 95 per cent of all the corporation stock of America is owned by persons whose incomes are less than \$5,000 per year.

The President's proposal of a \$400 million loan to Turkey and

Greece is going to run into some tough opposition. Already the liberal left wing group of the country is fighting it; joined with them are some notable conservatives and right wingers. Some contend that any aid extended these distressed countries should be handled through and by the United Nations. Others point out that we permitted UNRRA to be handled by a United Nations group and that much of it was diverted to the aid of communists, and that Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia used it to equip a communist army. Others will strongly contest that this aid should be only in material equipment and supplies necessary to bolster Grecian-Turkish economy and none of it in money. However, if we start shipping them much needed locomotives and boxcars and so on, the cry will go up that these things are badly needed at home. Whatever attitude one takes, he must admit that America is now a world power and cannot escape responsibilities of world leadership. On one hand we do not wish to permit people to starve and democracy crumble, while on the other hand we do not want to set up a world-wide W. P. A.

An article in the current issue of the United States News points out that we have already committed in cash and in world relief and the staggering sum of 6,000,000,000. This includes contributions of \$ 1.4 billion cost of our occupying \$1,201,000,000, funds made by the World Bank and International Monetary Fund, loans made by the War Relocation Authority, and additional billions.

Within a few days the Labor Committee is expected to report out a comprehensive amending and changing bill to labor. Such a bill to labor, such as a case, Congressmen know that 25 per cent of CIO unions are controlled by Communist agents. AROUND THE HOUSE

Keep an old tooth brush in your sewing box. The next time you have to rip out seams with a razor blade, use the tooth brush to brush off little threads along seams.

Good knives are a housewife's helpers, so you'll want to take good care of yours. Keep them away from the stove, because heat destroys the temper of steel. If this happens the blade cannot be kept sharp.

Slip a convenient-sized oiled silk bag into your purse just before you go out to buy fish. Have the fish dealer slip the fish into this before wrapping it. On the way home no fish odors will escape the package, and there'll be less chance of liquid leaking on your clothes.

Coat the inside of lids on mustard or horseradish jars with a thin layer of paraffin and they'll not turn green.

To send coins through mail, cut a square from the corner of an old envelope. Slip coin in square and turn back the opening to hold it in.

Pull your card tables, folding chairs and games out of cupboards or sliding racks built into waste space under the stairs.

Glue pieces of felt on the bottom of your vases and they will not mar the surfaces of the tables on which they are placed.

If you will place citrus fruits to be used in salad in hot water for a few minutes before peeling, the under skin will come off easily.

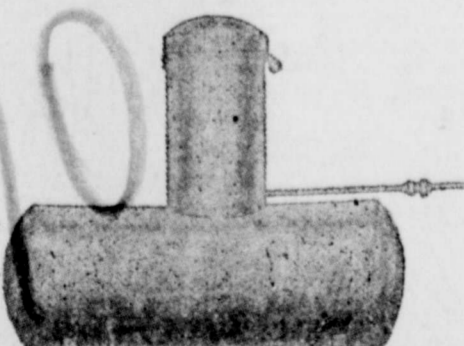

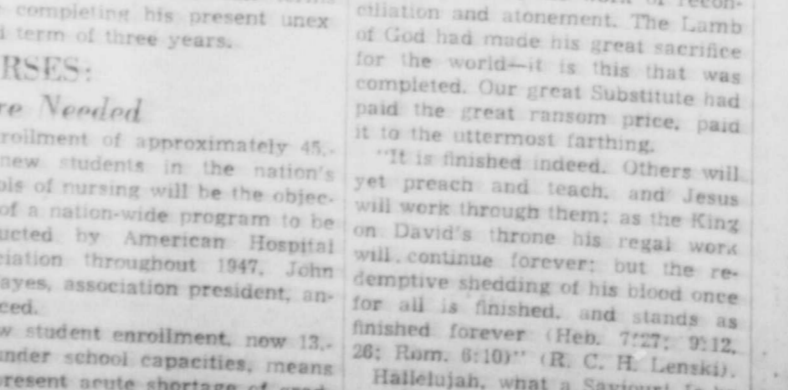

Garden 'Greens' Can Be Continuous

Leafy vegetables, raw and cooked, are necessary in the diet of children and grownups in order to promote vigor and well-being. Home garden they can be continuous for many months if various are grown.

Lettuce is one of the first green things to appear. The young can be picked for the table only a couple of inches in while the smaller inner are left to grow. Of the numerous root tops used as greens, beet, mustard, and turnip are increasingly popular. Like all vegetables they are best when young. Mustard and turnip particularly should be used for greens only in the early stages. The tops of mustard and turnip combined are appetizing—a favorite of grandmother's day.

By sowing seed of kale in spring or summer in the North and August to October in the South, fresh greens can be picked from the garden even after the coming of frost and light snow. In fact, some frost improves the texture and flavor of kale, making it a real treat for late autumn and winter meals. Dwarf Curled Kale is one of the best varieties for home gardens.

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Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

HELP CHICKS GET A GOOD START

After receiving his new chicks and getting them comfortably settled in the brooder house, how should the poultryman proceed from there to bring the little birds safely through their first few weeks of life? Baby chicks are tender creatures which are highly susceptible to disease, and consequently the care they are given in the brooder house means a lot of determining how many or how few of them will die before reaching maturity.

First, provide plenty of room for the chicks — at least one square foot of floor space for every two or three birds. A 10'x12' house is about right size for a brood of 250 chicks.

Have the floor of the house covered with one to three inches of clean, absorbent litter. Stir the litter frequently to keep it loose so moisture will evaporate. Add a thin layer each week, and remove all wet litter as soon as it is noticed.

Brood the chicks away from older birds. Adult chickens, although they may appear healthy and normal, frequently carry infections which can be transmitted to the chicks.

Erect a hover guard around the hover to prevent the chicks from straying away from the warmth of the brooder stove and to eliminate floor drafts. This guard should be about ten inches high — roofing paper, galvanized tin or boards will do as material for the guard. During the first day it should form a circle one foot outside the edge of the hover. Gradually it should be moved back until on the fifth or sixth day it can be removed entirely.

Give the chicks feed and water, as soon as they are received it may be helpful at first to place their feed on egg flats to teach them how to eat. Use regular chick-size feeders after the first few days, about six 2-foot feeders for every 250 birds. Six quart size waterers are needed for a brood of 250.

Brooder stove temperature at the start should be 90 to 95 at the edge of the hover, two inches above the floor. Reduce the temperature about five degrees each week until a temperature of between 60 and 75 degrees is reached. Above all, keep the house clean and sanitary by frequent cleaning and disinfecting especially when diseases threaten to break out in the brood.

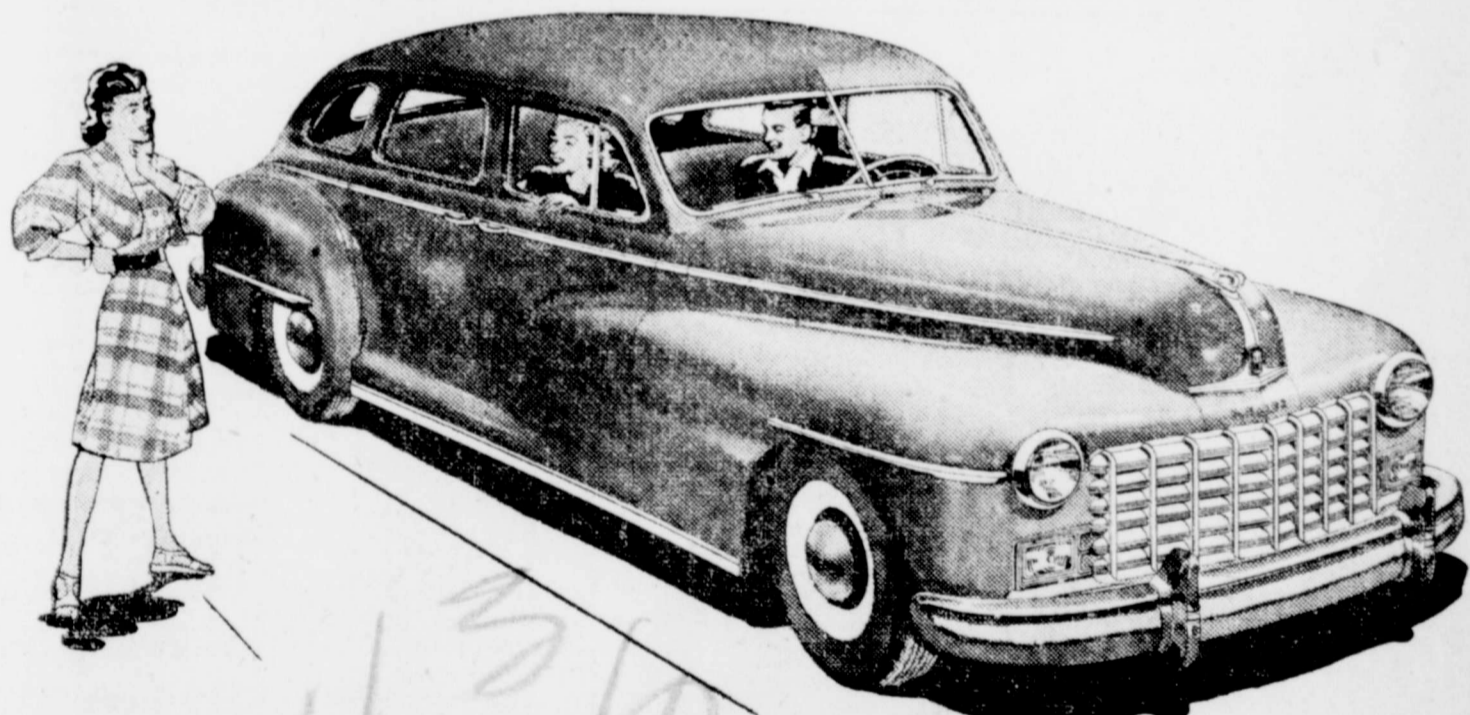

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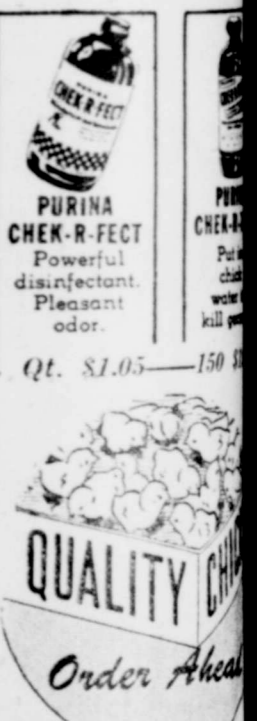

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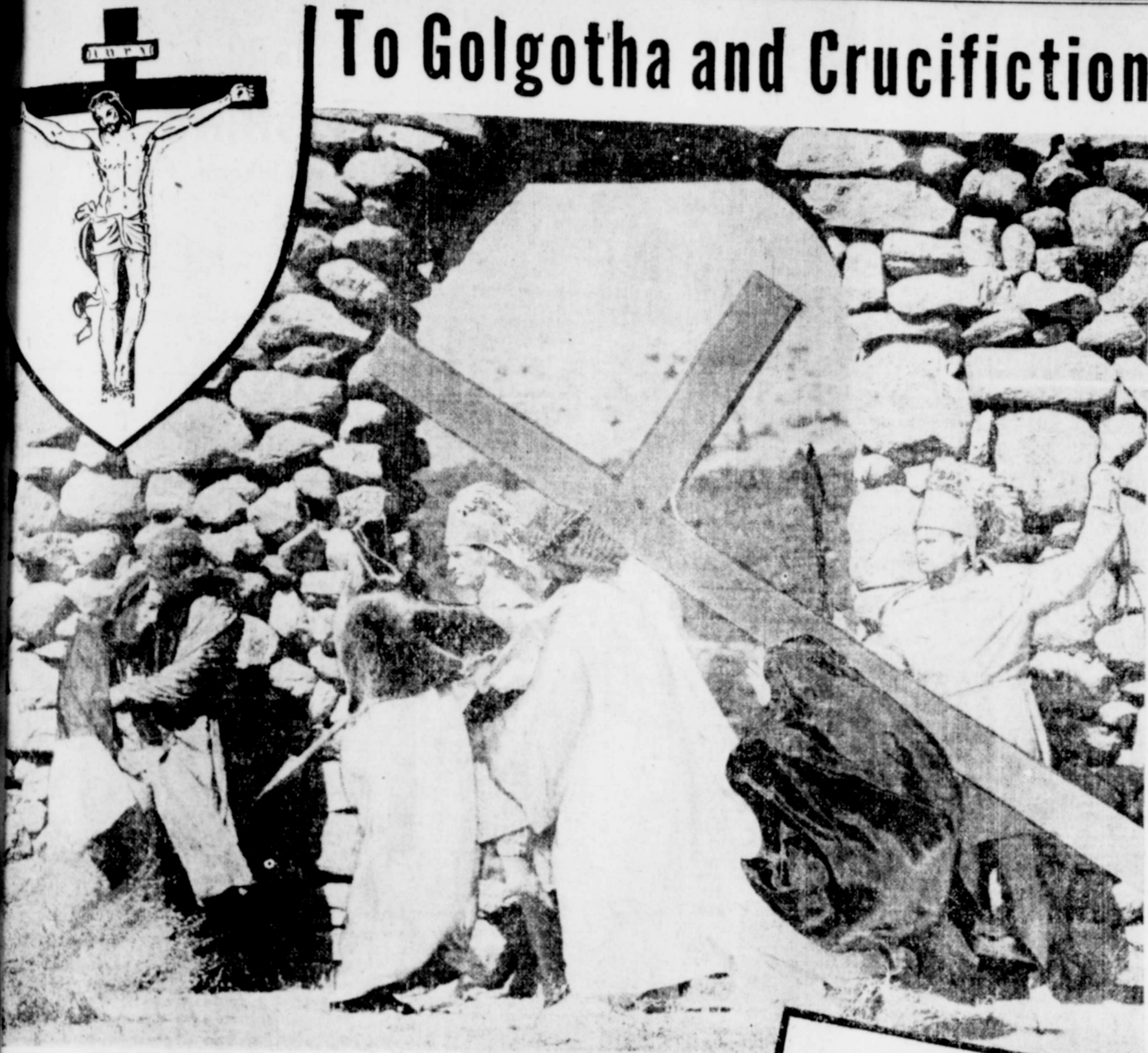

Then we with our children should go to the church of our choice on Sunday. "You in the Church and the Church in you" form a combination for good.

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Up a "green hill far away" the feet of pilgrims have been journeying for seven hundred years; all bearers of crosses have found themselves in the company of the Divine Burden-Bearer. He could not save himself, he could not bear the cross alone; nor have the good and the great ever been able to save themselves, for "he who saves his life loses it". It is a strange paradox, but everlastingly men are strong not to bear their own burdens, but to carry a Cross for others; they will find God at their side to sustain them when they fall beneath their own burdens. Men were never meant to carry their burdens alone; that is what God is for. Likewise God was never meant to bear the world's load alone; that is what Jesus is for. So it is a wonderful partnership, this company of God and his human children. **JESUS TRANSFIGURED THE CROSS FOREVER, TURNING A SYMBOL OF SUFFERING INTO A SYMBOL OF TRIUMPHANT LIFE.** Every man who carries a Cross on his heart will find good company; he will walk with the Son of God, who forever walks with God. How terrible is any Cross that a weary man carries alone, the more terrible because he does not need to carry it alone! The Christian Gospel tells of a Man who died for us and of a God who was reared in the love of Calvary as nowhere else in the world. Our God lives with us for us, and in us, if we allow Him.

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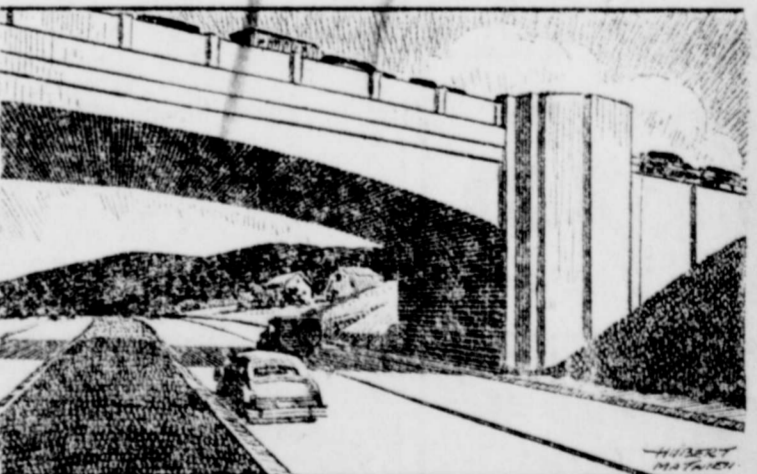
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
