

## MAJORS SELLS VARIETY STORE. NEW OWNER TO TAKE OVER MONDAY, 7th

### ENDS TWENTY-THREE YEARS OF BUSINESS IN THIS TOWN



Joe D. Majors, veteran business man of Burkburnett, has sold the Majors Variety Store and will retire from business in this city effective Monday, April 7th. New owner of the store is Mr. Francis Kauer, of Houston, Texas.

Mr. Majors left Georgia with his parents and came to Morgan, Texas, in 1905. They stayed there only two years and came on to Burkburnett in 1907. Mr. Majors was sixteen years old just out of school, and well he was, for there were no schools in Burkburnett at that time.

According to Mr. Majors, there was little in Burkburnett then compared to the city today. The bank was here, two or three stores and a very few residences.

In 1920 Mr. Majors went into the grocery business where the City Hall is now located. In 1922 he moved his store where the A&P Grocery is now, and in 1923 converted his stock to a variety store. He stayed at that location until 1929 when he moved the store to the location it now occupies. In 1943 Mr. Majors bought the brick building that housed his merchandise, and in 1945 extended the building on back to the alley.

Since Mr. Majors went into business here he has taken a very active part in all church, civic and business activities. He is a steward in the Methodist church, and has been for the past twenty five years. He was a charter member of the Lions club and has been a member of that organization continuously since 1922, with the exception of two years.

Mr. Majors has served his town in just about every capacity that men in cities the size of Burkburnett can serve. He served on the school board four years, has been a director of the Chamber of Commerce at various times, and served two terms on the City Council for a total of eight years. He is also a member of the Masonic Lodge. He is a veteran of World War One.

In 1922 Mr. Majors was married to Miss Bertha Prinzling. Mrs. Majors has helped at the store some through the years in addition to her work in and around their lovely home located at 511 East 5th street. They have two children, Truett Majors, who is employed at the First National Bank here, and Mrs. Jonita Johnston, employed in the Fidelity State Bank at Austin. There is one grandbaby Sandra Lee Majors, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Truett Majors.

Other than the home, Mr. Majors has acquired downtown business property. He owns the building where the store is located, which he retained when he sold his stock of merchandise, and the building housing Home Furniture Co.

Funeral services for S. E. McCullough, 66, Grandfield, Oklahoma pioneer farmer, who died in a Wichita Falls hospital Thursday, were held at 10 a. m. Saturday in Grandfield, under direction of Hampton, Vaughn & Merkle Funeral Home. Rev. Lee Slaten, pastor of the First Baptist Church and C. Y. Pettigrew, minister of the Church of Christ, officiated.

Survivors include his widow; four daughters; four sons, among whom is Ellis McCullough, Jr., of Burkburnett; three brothers; 11 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

## Clean-up Week Set For April 7 to 12th

Clean-up does and should come at least once each year for outside premises or residences and business houses. This year the dates are April 7th to April 12th. Business houses can do much to improve the sanitary conditions and general appearance in the alleys by gathering up rubbish, cans, paper boxes, boards, etc., and stacking it in a pile to be picked up by the garbage truck.

In the residence section the usual collection of various refuse has accumulated. Dead trees, limbs, hedge and shrubbery trimmings, cans, paper, boxes, magazines, dog bones, etc., must be raked up and disposed of. The City garbage truck will haul off all trash that is raked up and piled in the alley where the truck can get to it. The city offers this service free for one week. Just call 180 when your trash is ready to be taken away.

There are several reasons for having a general clean-up. If for no other reasons property owners should have that much pride in their premises.

## Burk Youth Held In Burglaries

Six Burkburnett burglaries were solved last Thursday after charges were filed against a 21-year-old youth, arrested at his home Thursday afternoon by Burkburnett Chief of Police Willis Bartley.

The youth, Lonnie Paul Freeman, 21, of Burkburnett, was remanded to Wichita County jail after failing to perfect \$1,000 bond set by Justice of Peace Coit Mock. Burglary charges were filed by Assistant District Attorney Clyde C. Fillmore.

Two of the burglaries were committed Wednesday night, when the rear doors of the Farmers' Cooperative Gin and the Burkburnett Sweet Shop were jimmied open. The thieves failed to find any money in the cash drawer of the gin, but took a quantity of pies and cakes from the bakery.

Bartley said he believed Freeman's arrest had cleared four other robberies in Burkburnett. More than \$300 in cash was taken last Dec. 7 from the Thaxton Brothers Hardware Store. It was following that robbery that Freeman was reported to have gone to Peoria, Ill., for several days. He had been an employe of the company at the time of the robbery. The same store was burglarized again on Feb. 15 of a radio and phonograph, valued at \$150, and of \$100 worth of tools. All were recovered the next day behind the city jail.

Included in the list were the Friday night burglaries of the City Grocery and Market and the Acme Chevrolet Company. A 50 pound sack of sugar, about 35 cartons of cigarettes and about 35 worth of groceries and miscellaneous articles were stolen from the market.

Two tool kits, valued at \$500, and a 1939 Ford pickup were stolen in the burglary of the automobile agency. Bartley said the pickup was used to haul the loot from the grocery store to a hiding place near the Red River where the stolen goods were recovered Saturday by Burkburnett police.

Aiding Bartley in the investigation were Jim Lawson, of the Burkburnett police and Jim Turner, former deputy sheriff.

Hicks and Mrs. Carl Morrison are the candidates. Voters are cautioned that sample ballots must not be brought to the polls.

**EASTER 1947**

Man awakens to glory with the coming of the spring. The splendor of sun and shadow, the grass of the orchard, the buds of trees and flowers, feed man's eyes. Those who have seen the trees of the orchard blasted by guns, watched flames lick and consume the gardens, seen birds hovering over stiff, dead bodies, have faced another side of Nature. The philosophy of life points to murder, rot and pain with a stick of dynamite in the one hand, while the other sustains the dove and notes the soft clouds, rippling streams and feathery blooms for the soul's praise.

"Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden."

The garden, the symbol of birth, where the narcissus nods and the colors and perfumes delight, is a God-given spot. That he was crucified there is but the meaning of all life: the maturity, the flowering, the death. But, each spring, as weed, wood and grove burst into bud, man realizes the elemental purpose of living. Singing and nesting multiply the joys and sorrows that make up the cosmic pattern. That this mystery includes destruction and an ending of flowering, we in Burkburnett well know, as the shape and purpose of the design. Yet, as the garden awakens in the spring, dies in the winter, as the earth turns, so

does new life return to prove the immortality and the resurrection.

In our use of microscope and test tube, our intelligence in pursuit of development, we have one comforting and sustaining hope and thought, that life comes only from life. As man plumbs the depths and reaches to the heights he copes with bacteria and butterflies, with atoms and anomones, lives through passion and imperfection as well as godliness and grandeur. This is the miracle of nature, that the crucifixion in the garden is but the contrast between the cradle and the tomb, the lullaby and the dirge. To live forever, to ascend and descend, we creatures are guided by this symbol and without its hope we deny the forces of Nature and are thereby lost.

**IT MAY BE WELL**

According to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, we are to suffer a business recession late in 1947, with a general drop in farm purchasing power and farm prices. Reasoning on the basis that "industrial activity may reach a record level in the first half of the year and then decline from 5 to 10 per cent in the last half," it strikes a gloomy note. But Burkburnett people might consider what they might mean by the word recession. That there will be a leveling of the present peak, which is a record, there is little doubt. But perhaps, this should be viewed in the light that it is a step toward the lessening of inflation as we have it at present. This may result in a healthy condition for our economy, after all.

Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE RISEN LORD AND HIS DISCIPLES

LESSON TEXT—John 20:19-23, 26-29; 21:15-17. MEMORY SELECTION—But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first fruits of them that slept.—1 Corinthians 15:20.

Ever new and blessed in its touch upon our souls is the message of Easter. To be assured once more that the grave could not hold our blessed Lord and Saviour, and that he arose in victory over sin and death, is our delightful portion in today's lesson.

It is a very appropriate conclusion to our three month study of the Gospel of John and comes in the new quarter because of Easter Sunday.

Three helpful incidents make up our lesson.

I. A Risen Lord and Glad Disciples (20:19-23).

The appearance of our Lord to his disciples after he arose from the grave emphasizes the close relationship between the resurrection and the life and ministry of his followers.

Those who live for and serve the risen Christ have a triumphant faith, an inward peace, and an outward authority and power. Their convictions are based on the Lord's own words which came to assure the disciples as they secretly assembled for fear of the Jews.

He stood in their midst and spoke the words of peace (vv. 19-21) and authority (vv. 22, 23).

Peace of soul is absolutely essential to useful and satisfied living. Only as we are "steadfast, immovable," can we be "abounding in the work of the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58).

Steady at the center, active at the circumference.

Commissioned and sent by the Son of God, clothed with Holy Spirit power, the Church of God has its authority. While some have read too much into verse 23, others have read out of it the real authority that God has given.

Little wonder that we read (v. 20), "Then were the disciples glad when they saw the Lord." They had reason for joy!

II. A Convinced Doubter and Glad Testimony (20:26-29).

Thomas made the serious error of being absent from the gathering of the disciples when the Lord Jesus stood in their midst. Let those who commonly absent themselves from the place and hour of worship take heed lest they miss a blessing, and coming later add nothing to the spiritual life of the church, but rather become troublers and doubters.

But God graciously turns the doubt of Thomas into a means of blessing to all of us who since then have read of his experience. Thomas was an honest doubter. God is always ready to meet such with satisfactory proof.

The trouble is that there are so many in the world who use professed doubts to cover a life of sin.

Doubt may come to any man. In itself it is no sin. But to cherish it and hold to it in unbelief—that is a different matter. One wise spiritual leader rightly counseled his people, "Believe your beliefs and doubt your doubts. Never make the mistake of doubting your beliefs or believing your doubts."

III. A Restored Disciple and Glad Service (21:15-17).

After meeting Jesus on the first Easter morning, Peter had been assured of forgiveness for his denial of the Lord and had been taken back into fellowship and service with him.

But then something seemed to have gone astray, for we find that Peter and the others had returned to their old life as fishermen. They seem to have lost their vision, or had become discouraged.

But the Lord had not forgotten them. He appeared and told them where to catch fish, and then we have the lovely scene around the fire as they breakfasted together.

There it was that the Lord met Peter, and as he had denied Christ thrice he is asked to thrice declare his devotion to him.

The man who thus declared his readiness to serve Christ to the end had many an opportunity to prove the sincerity of that profession. He met persecution and imprisonment, but to every effort of man to close his mouth or to change his witness he had the simple reply of absolute obedience to the Lord.

Tradition tells us that this faithful man finally led Peter to a martyr's death. So we see a life made over, made powerful, made glorious for God through the matchless grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. He can do it for you, too. Will you let him?

There could be no better time to meet the risen Lord face to face than on this day when we remember his resurrection. Let him come into your heart, dissolve your doubts, forgive your sins—and make you glad!

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Georgia Gets New Governor; Swollen British Rivers Bring Misery, Destruction

Political satire turned up unexpectedly in a Swiss Lenten parade. The drum major, called "the big guy from the East," bears an unmistakable resemblance to Stalin. The drummers are supposed to depict the Soviet commissars and generals marching roughshod over small states. Switzerland is probably the only southern European country free enough for a public lampooning of Russian leaders. The parade attracted much attention as it wound through the ancient streets of Basle.

GEORGIA: Talmadge Ousted

Melvin E. Thompson, elected lieutenant governor, is rightful governor of Georgia, the state supreme court has ruled, 5 to 2. Herman Talmadge, son of Gene, who has been acting as governor since his appointment by the legislature, was declared a usurper. Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook has invalidated all bills signed by Talmadge during his brief and troubled term. The most important of this legislation is the white primary bill, but 150 other measures also were declared void by Cook.

The 33-year-old son of the famous "Old Gene" accepted the verdict of the state's highest tribunal and immediately made preparations to leave the executive mansion.

"We'll be back," he told well-wishers. "The court of last resort is the people of Georgia. This case will be taken to the court of last resort." This was interpreted as indicating that Talmadge intends to run again in 1948, when a special election will be held. Under the law a lieutenant governor can serve only two years as governor.

The supreme court's majority decision took the view that the legislature erred when it appointed Herman Talmadge governor on January 14. The legislature, after a canvass of votes cast, acted on the theory that since Eugene Talmadge had died before inauguration, that there was no one elected to the office. Herman Talmadge was chosen on the basis of a few write-in votes. Thompson, duly elected lieutenant governor, was ignored.

FARM MACHINERY: Prices Trimmed

Although demand is expected to exceed supply "for months to come," International Harvester company has reduced prices on 163 items of farm equipment. More than half the company's customers will benefit, a spokesman said. Reductions range from 1 to 23.8 per cent, or in dollars from \$2.50 to \$309. Lower prices have been announced for 123 farm machines, 16 models of industrial tractors, 12 models of motor trucks and 12 other miscellaneous articles. The program will cost the company about 20 million dollars this year, it was stated. New prices became effective March 10.

ELECTRIFICATION: Loans Reach Billion

With the granting of \$45,000 to Illinois. Rural Electrification administration loans have reached the billion dollar mark. Every state excepting Connecticut and Massachusetts now have cooperatives financed by REA funds. On January 1, REA loans totaled \$968,009,000. More than 1,900 borrowers have repaid \$126,038,000 in principal and interest.

Railroads Rent Autos

Railroads will resume their auto-renting service by June 1 in 300 cities, announces H. W. Siddall, chairman of the Railroad Passenger Interterritorial committee. In this arrangement a railroad passenger can obtain the use of a car through the railroad's agents. The acute shortage of new cars has delayed resumption of this service, Siddall said. Autos can be obtained in 1,000 cities by the end of next year.

## RAISED IN CHICK RAISING

It is the time for chick course, and this year will be a big one for raising the nation. Are you the millions of Americans going to engage in money-making, satisfying your chicks right? If you are, plan to first place, give your

chicks the right kind of home. A modern, sound brooder house is the best. Obtain one that is large enough for the number of chicks you plan on; follow the rule of two chicks per square foot of floor space, or 50 square feet per 100 chicks. It is better to give chicks the room they need, and raise a healthy, profitable flock, than to overcrowd them and lose money.

In raising chicks, as in every other stage of poultry management, strict sanitation is highly important. It is essential to disease prevention. If you are using an old brooder house or other chick quarters, make it absolutely sanitary several days before you get your chicks.

### A Cleaning Program

Follow these recommendations in cleaning and disinfecting before the arrival of the chicks.

Get all dirt, dust, litter, etc. out of brooder house by vigorous scraping and sweeping. Scrub floor and walls with hot water and laundry soap. Set up the brooder—clean, of course—and start it; check burner, flue, thermostat, etc. at this time. When temperature is about 70, spray floor and walls thoroughly with a good disinfectant. Don't neglect disinfecting all equipment.

When this job is finished, leave brooder running, to make house warm and dry. After a few days put down clean litter, two or three inches deep. Over litter place three layers of clean newspaper so that chicks cannot pick up bits of litter before they learn to feed.

Next, arrange plenty of small feeders & waterers round brooder and hover. Remember — it is preferable to invest in a little extra equipment for feeding and watering rather than lose chicks because of insufficient hoppers and founts. Let "Be Prepared" be your motto in raising chicks.

## Washington Newsletter

By Congressman ED GOSSETT

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—The House this week passed two major bills that were bitterly debated. First, an appropriation bill for the Labor Department and the Federal Security Agency was passed which cut \$79,000,000 from the budget request of \$1,068,000,000. Funds for the National Labor Relations Board were cut in half.

On Friday the House passed H. R. 1, the Knutson tax reduction bill, by a vote of 274 to 137. The bill provides a 30 per cent reduction in taxable income up to \$1,000; 20 per cent in incomes up to \$302,000, and a graduated reduction ranging to 10.5 per cent on still higher incomes. Representative Knutson says it will reduce government income by \$1.3 billion, while Senator Taft contends it will reduce Federal

income by 5½ billion. It seems to me the bill's worst feature is one making reductions retroactive. If the bill becomes law, the Treasury Department will have to issue millions of checks refunding billions of dollars. One Democrat declares the Republicans plan to have these checks in the mail about election time in 1948.

Our sub-committee on immigration has been flooded with hundreds of private bills which seek to stay the deportation of various aliens. We sat for several hours this morning and disapproved all such bills presented. Among bills rejected this morning were the following: A bill by Mr. Peterson of Florida to legalize the entry of four mid-gets known as the Singer Mid-gets, who came here from Czechoslovakia many years ago and who have been acting in circuses ever since (they have been here under visitors permits); a bill by Mr. Hefferman of New York to legalize the entry of a Russian couple who came here in 1940, and who same in—as have many others—by paying \$130 to a boatman to slip them across the Niagara River just above Niagara Falls in the dead of night; a bill by Mr. Walter of Pennsylvania to legalize the entry of two Chinamen who came here from a torpedoed freighter just off the Virginia coast in 1942; a bill by Mr. Shafer of Michigan to legalize the entry of an Italian who came here at the age of eleven and who was convicted of selling narcotics when he was

eighteen, who has been twice deported but has twice returned, is married to an American, and has his own business in the City of Detroit.

We have had to turn down numerous bills to legalize the entry of seamen who jumped their ships and remained in this country. Other bills rejected would permit stowaways to remain in the country. We must not reward or encourage illegal entries into the country under existing laws merchant seamen who have served on American vessels or vessels flying the American flag, for as long as five years are permitted to enter this country over and above quotas. A committee of the Maritime Union (one of our most radical and troublesome organizations) has been bringing in thousands of these alien seamen because they are not chargeable to immigration quotas. I will introduce a bill on Monday which seeks to plug up this hole in the immigration dike.

Many religious and charitable organizations are now joining in a high pressure campaign to bring into this country hundreds of thousands of additional refugees. Their misguided patriotism could be very harmful to America. We do not want our country infiltrated with those who will become a drain upon our resources or who might seek to destroy her institutions.

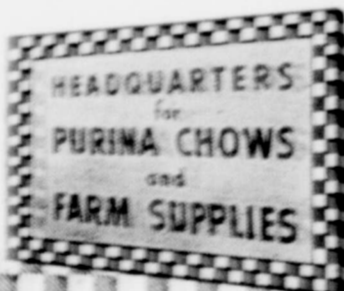

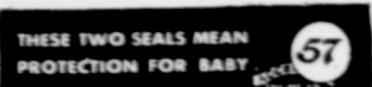
