Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

Manager Range Bird Carefully

Birds go on range when they are 6 weeks of age or as soon thereafter as the weather permits.

The range period is an important stage in the chicken's growth. It is during these months that birds are expected to build up body strength and develop into sturdy, ready-to-lay pullets. They should come off the range as well-feathered birds in the pink of health, capable of holding up under the strain of high production in the laying house.

Range Programs
The range is by no means free of obstacles, however. The poultryman must anticipate certain problems, such as lice, worms, unfavorable weather, diseases, and others. And he must be ready to cope with these difficulties as they arise.

Avoiding such problems, of course, should be his first consideration, so we shall list here some of the things the poultry raiser can do to keep his range flock in good health.

Grass is food and a good range will provide up to 10 percent or 15 percent of the birds' food requirements. The ideal range is

well-sodded with young immature grass. Long grass gets matted down, the sun cannot penetrate its roots, and it does not have the food value of younger vegetation. Some of the better range crops are clover, alfalfa, perennial rye grass, timothy, and ladine clover. Mow the range frequently to keep grass short at all times.

Give Them Shade
Provide plenty of shade. If there are no trees, shade can be created by planting a few rows of corn or sunflowers. Shelters are another good source of shade.

Keep the areas around the shelter clean. Near and in the shelters droppings will accumulate rather rapidly, and should be cleaned up frequently.

Examine a few birds periodically for lice, and, when needed, get a good delouser from your local dealer. In case of mite or tick infestations, there are commercial preparations on the market today which may be painted on roosts and other surfaces to control these parasites.

Don't put more than 125 pullets into a single range unit. Figure a maximum of 400 pullets to an acre of range.

Move the hoppers every day to avoid contamination of the soil. Do the same with waterers. Both feeders and waterers must be cleaned and disinfected regularly.

Should worms become a prob-

lem, consult a poultry specialist on the best type of treatment to use.



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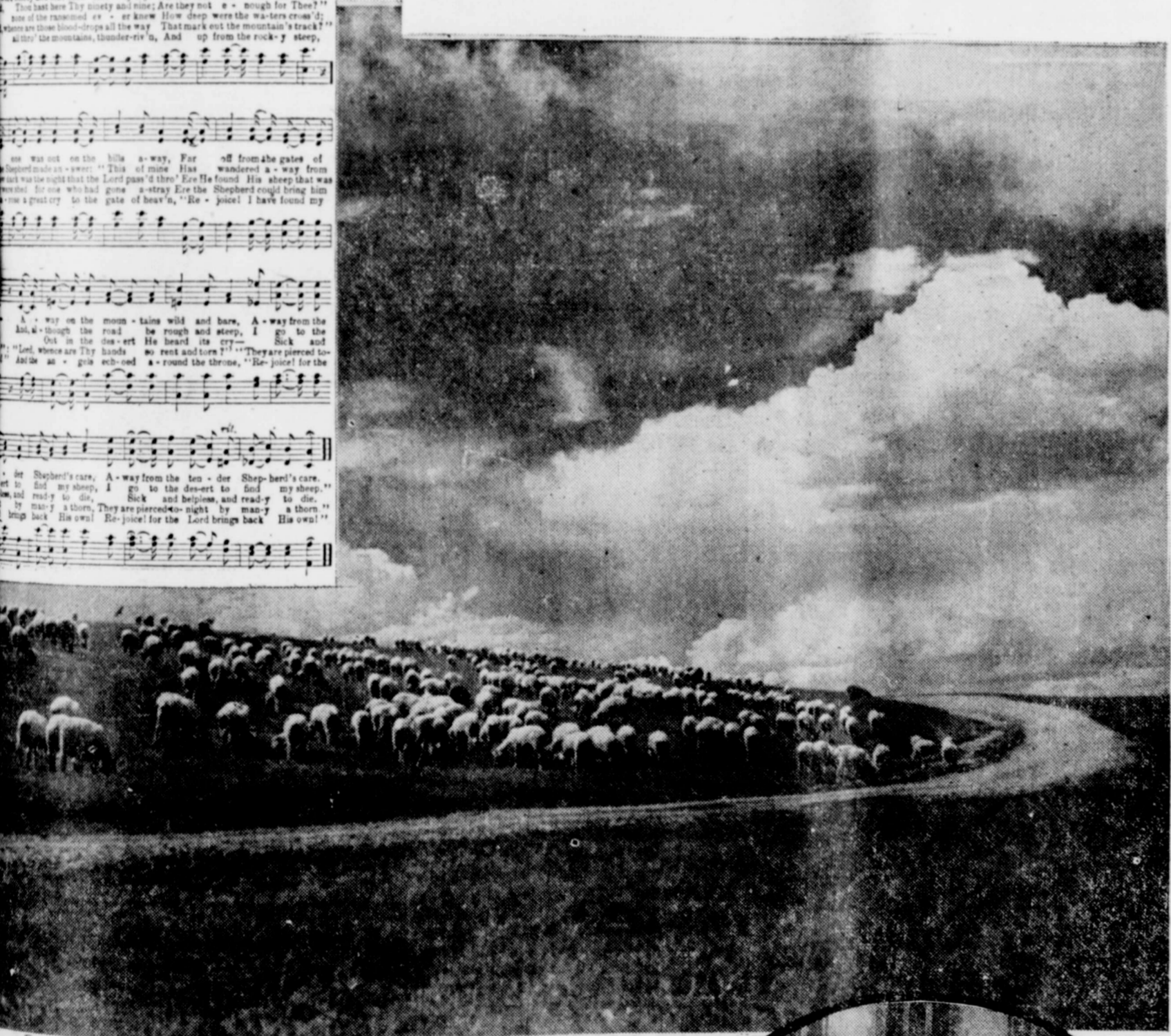
