

The Burk Star Is Getting Rich??

Not that we would object if the above were true, but the general public should have some facts to clear up a slight misunderstanding. The rumor was started in connection with the advertising catalogue put out by the Chamber of Commerce. Last year, and this year, many of the advertisers believed that all the money went to the Burk Star, and many of them tried to make their checks payable to said newspaper.

A representative of the Chamber of Commerce sold all the advertising. It was sold for the sole purpose of raising money to help defray expenses of the Boom Town Celebration. All checks for ads must be made out to the Chamber of Commerce. To keep from asking for an outright donation from merchants and individuals, C. of C. directors decided on the catalogue and program book as an advertising medium to further the cause of the celebration.

This year when the Star was approached on the matter of printing the catalogue, we suggested that out-of-town bids be secured. We didn't have, nor did we know where we could get the paper for such a hugh order, and we didn't feel that we had the time to get it out. Four out-of-town bids were secured. They seemed high to non-printers who know nothing of the amount of paper involved and the amount of work required to get out 6,000 books.

At a meeting of the C. of C., the bids were read. A motion was made, seconded, and carried, asking that the Star take the job for \$200.00 less than the lowest bid. (So we could get rich). We reluctantly accepted the gigantic task of producing the books. Reluctantly, for we remembered that last year we worked three days and nights without sleep in order that the books be ready for the first show.

A trip to paper wholesalers in Dallas and Fort Worth netted exactly 20 reams of paper, which was only 100 reams short. A neighboring publisher had enough paper for the job if we could talk him out of it. He generously loaned us the paper, but goodness knows when it can be repaid.

Every week the Burkburnett Star leaves cut two or three pages of advertising because paper is not available to make extra pages. Had we used the precious paper that went into the catalogue to make extra pages in the Star, IT WOULD HAVE MADE US MORE THAN \$8,000.00, which is several thousand and a few hundred dollars more than the amount we will receive for the program-catalogue.

Last year we printed the reserved seat tickets for the exhorbitant price of \$18.75. This year the tickets were ordered from St. Louis and will cost only \$76.60. ARE WE GETTING RICH? You're not kidding!

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

BIRDS MUST HAVE GRIT FOR CHEWING

The expression "scarcer than a hen's tooth" is well founded because, as any poultryman knows, the chicken actually has no teeth whatever. Instead of teeth, ,the fowl uses grit or gravel to grind up the feed it consumes.

Since chickens are toothless, yet consume large quantities of hard grains and dry grasses, Nature has given them a different kind celebrated their 47th year in of equipment with which to grind food-the gizzard.

This is the tough, muscular organ in which the grit or gravel is retained to crush and grind the feed. When it is loaded with feed the gizzard begins to expand and pebbles or grit. When the feed is reduced to finer form by the grinding, it passes on into the intestine.

Of course, if there is no grit in the gizzard, no grinding can be done. Impacted crop or gizzard frequently results when the bird does not have access to grit or other grinding material.

Eventually the grit grinds itself into powder, then passes on thru the intestine. Grit should always


With baby chicks and poults, it youngsters are receiving all-mash rations, there is no real need for grit, and so it is recommended that it be withheld for a few weeks. The danger in giving grit particularly the latter, lies in the There is a very sensational reason for absenteeism in fact that the little birds may gorge themselves on the substance, filling up their gizzards so completely that the regular movement of feed through the digestive tract s blocked. Of course, after the birds are old enough to eat whole grain, grit should be available at all times.

Grit should be rather insoluole. Soft material such as marble or ordinary limestone powders quickly, and the birds must eat large amounts of the material for replacement.

Spruille Braden, longtime advocate of and principal force behind this country's hard-handed attitude toward Fascist-inclined Argentina, has resigned as assistant secretary of state in charge of Latin-Ameri-

To succeed him in that post,

to nominate Norman Armour of New Jersey, topflight career diplomat. 'Armour previously served as American envoy in the Argentine and is well known and liked there. Latin-American reaction to his appointment was expected to be highly favorable.

Acceptance of Braden's resignation by President Truman was generally regarded as a strong implication that the United States is ready to swing back to a

policy of appeasement in Latin America. It was anticipated that the changed attitude would take the form of "just a little appeasement" of Latin-American Fascist dictators, particularly Juan D. Peron, president of

Departure of Braden from the state department followed closely on the heels of his being overruled by the administration on two basic issues in inter-American relations: Supplying of arms to Latin-American nations and formation of a military alliance with other republics in the western hemisphere. Braden had opposed both of those policies.

NEW DANGER:

Fear Corn Borer

Already impaired by constant rains and cool weather which have harried the corn belt this spring. the corn crop faces a new danger of infestation of corn borers because of the late season. This year the damp weather did

not permit much corn to go in during the normal May 20 to 25 planting period, so most of the corn was planted later. Wet, cold weather also beld back the emergence of the first brood of borers; and as a result, the late planted corn which ould ordinarily be safe from attack now will be subject to damage from the pests.

Last year the corn borer caused 37 million dollars crop damage throughout the nation. The borer threat now is so serious that special radio broadcasts have been set up to keep farmers aware of the pests' progress.

STEP DOWN:

Hague Leaves

Frank Hague, hammer-swinging political boss of New Jersey for more than three decades, has resigned as mayor of Jersey City.

One of the last representatives of the era of great American political bosses. Hague made it clear that he will keep his power as city, county and state Democratic chieftain and that he will remain as vice-chairman of the Democratic national committee.

Hague said that his nephew, Frank Hague Eggers, would succeed him in the mayoral spot until the next commission election in

Rail Crisis Looms

Fears of a minor crisis in railway shipping in mid-July have been expressed by federal transportation experts in view of an apparent slowdown in frieght car construc-

Contributing factors are mounting industrial production coupled with increasingly heavy wheat export movements, and officials predict that the "minor crisis" could swiftly develop into a major transportation block unless steps are taken to ease the traffic slowdown or prevent it from occurring.

With fate of the now financially embarrassed Office of Defense Transportation still undecided, the Interstate Commerce commission has been requested to assume full responsibility for continuing orders requiring full loading of boxcars in the event that congress does not extend the life of ODT beyond its June

80 expiration date. Meantime, ODT has sent investigators to freight car building companies to probe reports that allocated steel tonnages have not gone entirely into the 10,000-a-month car construction program.

High-ranking naval officers assailed the bill as "merger legislation," which the navy has consistently opposed. However, the unification bill specifies that there shall be no merger of the military services.

It would establish a "national security organization" under a secretary of national security with cabinet rank. The secretary, a civilian, would fix general policies and exercise general direction of the army, navy and air force. Those three departments would be lieaded by secretaries without cabinet

The measure also provides for a war council made up of the four secretaries and the chiefs of staff of the services, a research and development board and a munitions board.

Labor and 1948

The hotly contested labor bill to impose restraints on strikes and unions, emphatically stamped with top-heavy congressional approval. poses for President Harry S. Truman possibly the most difficult decision he has faced since he took his seat in the White House.

To veto or not to veto-that is the question. And the answer undoubtedly will be reflected in the 1948 presidential election.

Backers of the bill, however, are certain that the measure will become law, regardless of the final presidential decision, because both houses of congress are able to muster enough votes to override a veto. Some major provisions of the bill on which the fate of the next elec-

tion may be riding would: 1. Authorize the government to seek injunctions to halt national emergency strikes for 80 days while mediation is carried

2. Ban the closed shop and forbid various kinds of lesser

Mayrhofer will be the third of the late fuehrer's relatives to be prosecuted. Hitler, when he was still Adolf Schickelgruber, was a ward of Mayrhofer's father, a farmer.

TO THE SWIFT:

Atomic Race

Directing attention of the United Nations to the fact that the world is galloping down the uranium track to the finish line in an atomic race, the United States has repeated its plea for international ownership and operation of "dangerous atomic activities."

Frederick Osborn, American representative, said that 10, 12 or 15 nations had set up atomic agencies since the U. N. atomic energy commission began its efforts for world controls a year ago.

He said large sums have been appropriated for development of nuclear fuels in such countries as England, Canada and Russia. Osborn further sharply attacked Russian proposals for an international inspection agency of atomic activities, coupled merely with orders from the United Nations to national authorities.

That plan, he said, would bring U. N. "in constant conflict with the national agency of every country." st would "breed antagonisms, distrust and suspicion from the start," Osborn asserted.

BUSINESS:

Why Failures?

Most important cause of business failures during 1946 was the scarcity of merchandise and materials, says the U. S. department of commerce, which has been investigating business growth and failures since the end of the war.

Nearly 47 per cent of the firms nation. contacted in the department's survey listed shortages as either the major or a contributing factor in their failure. That percentage ran higher for retailers of durable goods and for contract construction

FEED PRICES: *

To Stay Up

Prospects for the 1947 feed crops will be an important influence on feed prices, according to a department of agriculture report.

The very strong foreign demand for grain is expected to continue to support prices through 1947 and into 1948; although if production of feed is as large as in recent years, feed prices probably will decline, at least seasonally, in the last half of

Corn prices this summer, the report predicted, will average higher than the June, 1946, ceilings, but lower than in the summer of 1946 after price controls lapsed.

The department's survey went on to reveal that reports in early May indicated that approximately 832 million bushels of 1946 corn would be marketed this season. That figure would be 50 per cent greater than the 1938-42 average and 14 per cent above the previous record sales from the 1944 crop. Farm sales of other feed grains from 1946 crops also ran generally larger.




