5-Mile Procession Biggest In City's History

Thousands of people lined the streets Wednesday at 5 o'clock to view the largest parade ever assembled in Burkburnett. The gigantic parade ushered in four days of celebration as the town observes its 40th anniversary and 2nd annual Boom Town Celebration and Rodeo.

Riding at the head of the procession were color bearers, T. Guy Willis, H. G. Benson, Wid Phillips and H. C. Preston. Next in line was Fay McClarty, queen of the celebration, dressed in the regalia that won her first prize as best dressed cowgirl at the recent Electra rodeo. She was riding a beautiful Palomino horse owned by H. C. Preston.

Behind the queen came representatives of nearby towns, all riding prancing horses. Most every kind of conveyance was in the long procession. Covered wagons, buggies, surries, two wheel dude carts, modern cars, trucks, bicycles, motorcycles and tricycles. Bands from Burkburnett, Wichita Falls and Oklahoma were spaced along to provide marching music.

T. Guy Willis, parade chairman, promised 500 horses in the parade. His promise was kept and then some. Between 700 and 1,000 horses, some of the best in the country, were here. Jerry Barnes, Electra; Bobbie Burnett, Fort Worth; E. H. Maxey, Grandfield, Okla.; Miss Leona Jackson, Burk; and R. O. Smith of Wichita Falls judged the parade entries and made awards. Bill Burnett of Iowa Park and Mrs. R. B. Swinford of Burk were chosen best dressed cowboy and cowgirl.

1907 -:- 1947 40th Anniversary

The history of Burkburnett, especially during the oil boom days of 1918-1920, varies, according to the fancy and imagination of the story teller. However, below is presented a short history of the city, based on information from the old files of the Burkburnett Star and other reliable sources, as accurately as possible.

Although the City of Burkburnett is officially only 40 years old, the first white settler, Mabel Gilbert, came here in 1861 from Alabama, making this the oldest settlement in Wichita County. The official date is based on an auction sale of more than 1,000 townsite lots June 6, 1907.

Gilbert settled near the present site of the Burkburnett Cemetery, and named the first trading post Gilbert City. Later the name was changed to Nestorville. In 1867, D. P. McCracken and a band of heavily armed men (protection against hostile Indians) settled at Nestorville to pursue their round-up of wild and tame cattle, which roamed the tall grasslands in this area. In 1877 the families of Ensign Rexford and Monroe Dodson settled near Nestorville. A short time later Burke Burnett established a ranch headquarters just Northwest of the present city limits.

In the summer of 1879, J. G. Hardin and his brother-in-law, S. P. Hawkins, came through the county on an inspection tour. After the first tour, the two men returned to Johnson County, Texas, and prepared a settlement here permanently. In November of the same year, George Derby established the first formal store at Nestorville. It was later designated as a U. S. Postoffice and when J. G. Hardin purchased it, he became the first postmaster of the community.

At the turn of the century, Frank Kell of Wichita Falls built a railroad into Oklahoma. When it came time to decide on a site for a depot here a spot beside the track near the present depot was chosen. The first train stopped at the wooden shack depot on September 6, 1906. The following year on June 6 a public auction sale of townsite lots was held. The first two were bought by Burke Burnett. For a time the town was called Burke Burnett. To appease postal authorities who objected to the double name, the "e" in Burke was dropped and the city became known as Burkburnett.

Burkburnett grew steadily for the next few years and in spite

SUMMER DRIVING

More Burk motorists will be driving on urban and rural roads during the summertime. We sound the warning of the increase in motor accidents, and this in spite of safety drives and printed statistics to show the dreadful toll. Every driver is responsible for upon his shoulders rests the life of others.

Chick Chats

GOOD RANGE FOR BETTER PULLETS

It cannot be denied that good grassy range is one of the most important elements in the process of growing vigorous, fast-laying pullets. Moreover, the green feed available on the range is a money saver as it permits the poultry raiser to cut down on the amount of hopper feed he gives to the flock.

The benefits coming from the use of good range, therefore, are of double value.

The danger of disease is not so

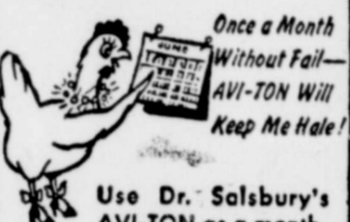
great on the range because birds get plenty of fresh air, have more room in which to move about, and need not be in constant close contact with one another. It's easier to keep range birds healthy.

A range which is well covered with sufficient grass may provide up to 15 per cent of the flock's food needs — quite a saving in feed. The grass should be kept short by frequent mowing. It's the new growth, the fresh edible shoots that the birds like best and will eat readily. Furthermore, long grass becomes matted down and prevents the sun's rays from reaching the soil, thereby protecting disease organisms.

Birds have a tendency to congregate around the shelters, and so the range around these structures will probably be worn down after a time. To avoid this, the shelters should be moved regularly so that the flock always has a supply of fresh green forage at hand. Frequent moving of shelters also prevents contamination of soil and helps preserve the condition of the range. Of course, feeders and waterers should be moved even more often, preferably once a day.

If possible, do not use the same piece of land for range on successive years. Allowing chickens to occupy the same tract year after year may expose them to contamination left by the range flocks of the previous summer. If land is used only on alternate years, such danger is greatly reduced.

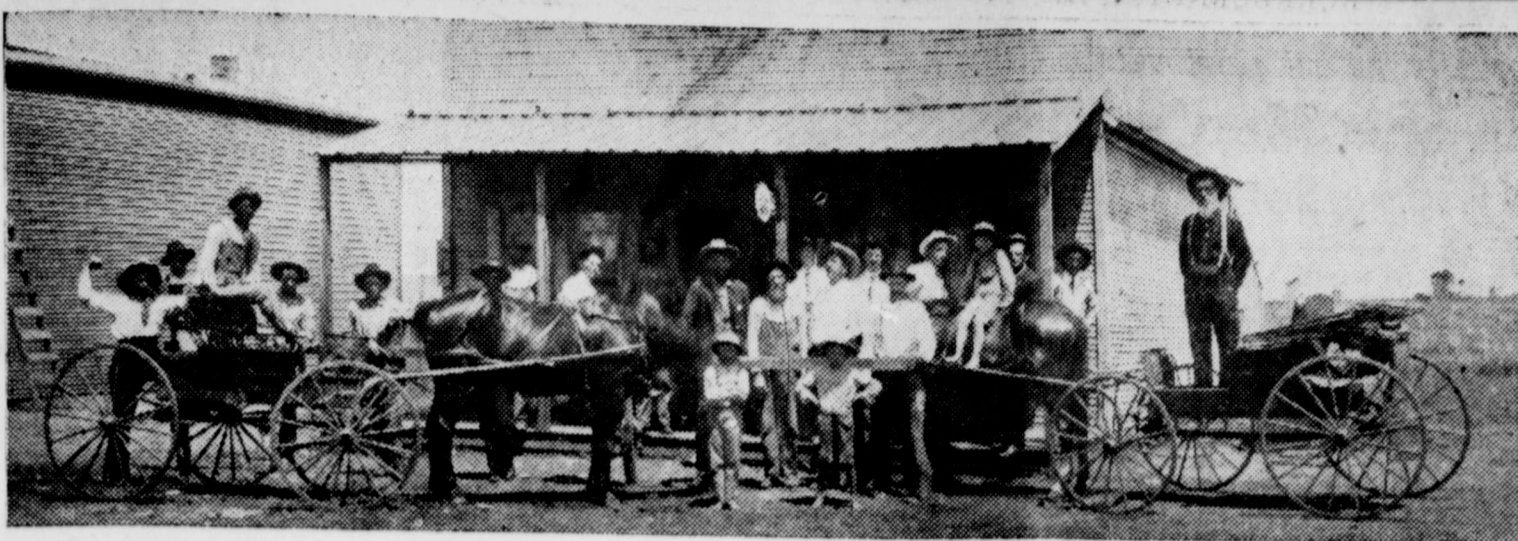

of a severe drouth and panic in 1911, the site for the first oil well was staked December 25th by J. R. Sullivan, about three miles Southwest of town. The well blew in July 1, 1912, with only Mr. Sullivan present. The well, which came in with 45 barrels per day production, still produces a little oil. Mr. Sullivan and wife now live one and one-half miles North of the original well, the Schmoker No. 1.

When World War 1 started, oil production became extremely important. The Fowler wildcat well here blew off the oil lid for Burkburnett. Oil derricks were going up every day and most of them drilled good wells. By 1919 the drilling excitement was dying down. The 30,000 estimated population dropped almost over night to around 5,000. Burkburnett now receives considerable income from oil, and several wells still pump within the city limits, but the chief sources of revenue are from more stable products—farming and ranching.

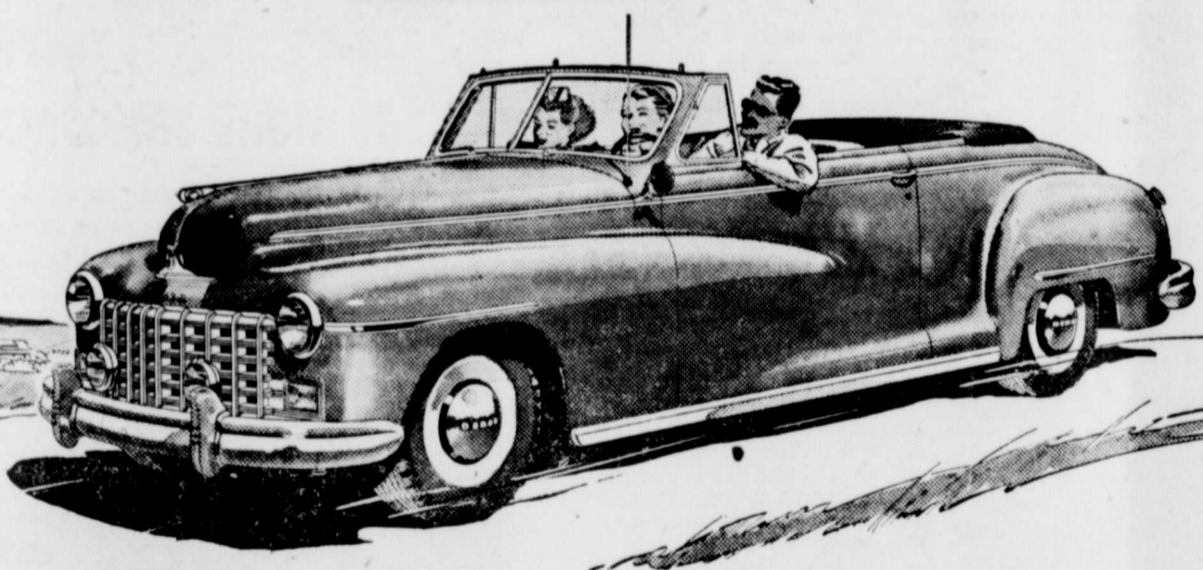

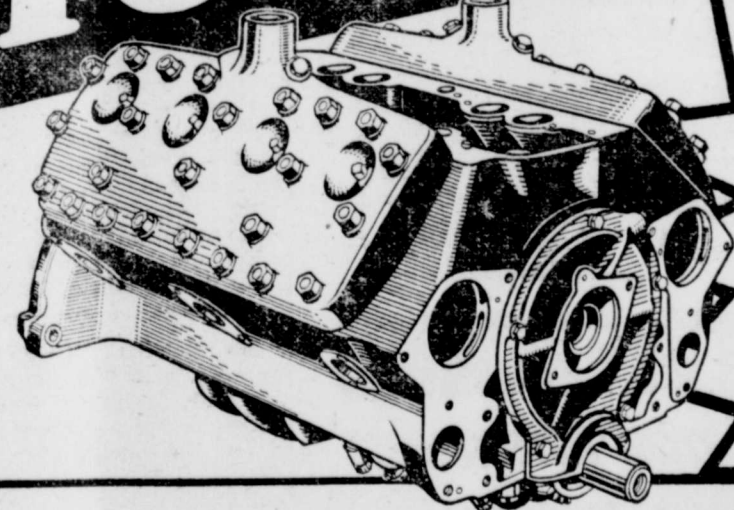

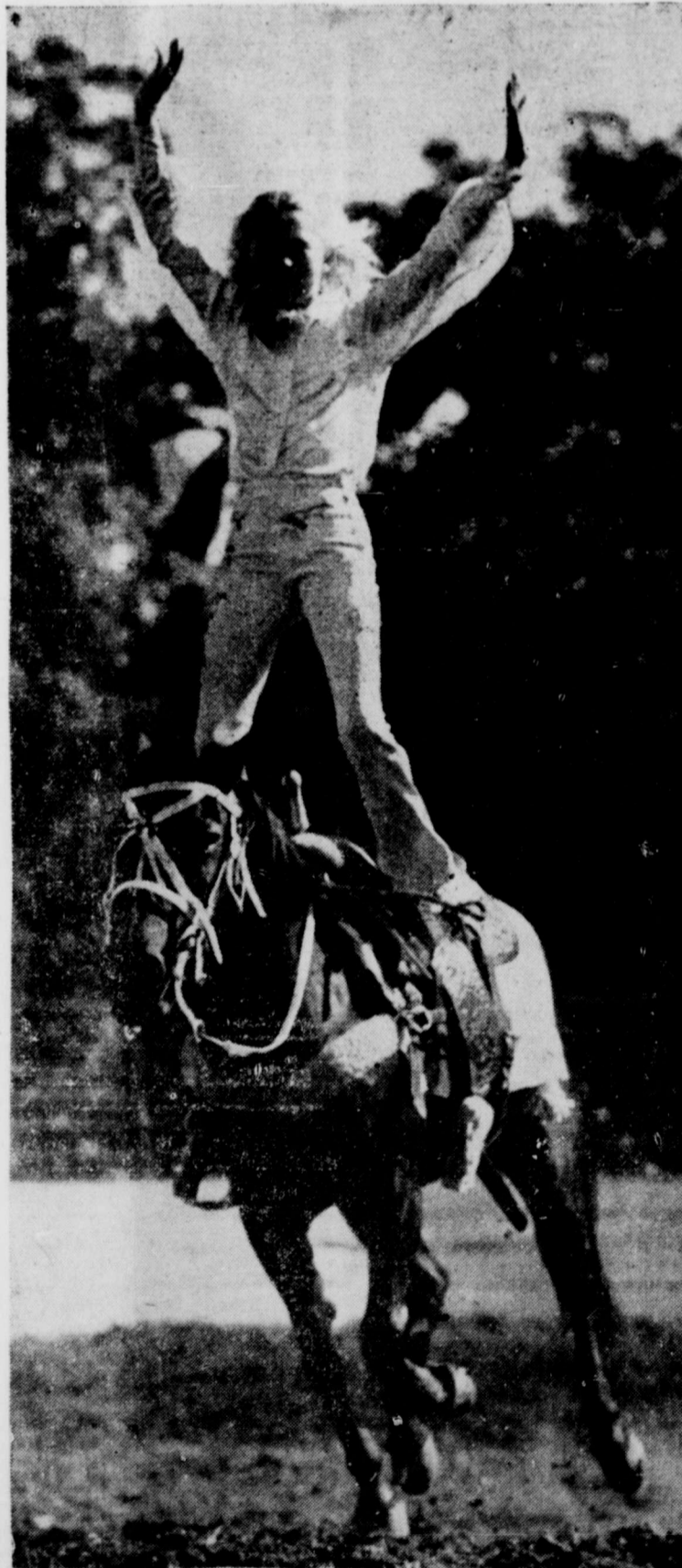
