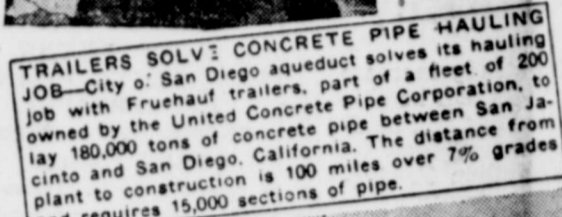

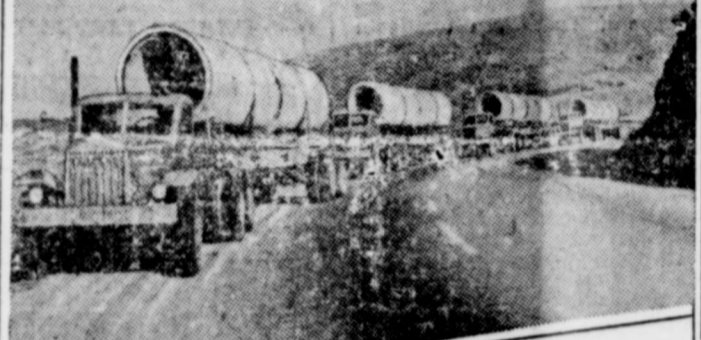

Recommending that farmers in this area consult their county agent, vocational agriculture instructor, or state entomologist for controls most effective locally, the National Cotton Council says that failure to fight the weevil properly will reduce the value of the cotton crop more than \$100,000,000.

DREAD OF SUMMER

During the summer we worry more about the fearful, cruel cripple called infantile paralysis. It is then that there is more danger of being stricken with polio. It is true that many persons have polio in its mildest form and never know it. Bear in mind that the most active and healthy persons are the ones usually the victims. It is highest in countries where sanitation is good. During the hot months we might use certain precautions whether we fear the disease or not. Don't over exert but take rest periods, avoid operations except emergencies, during the summer months, be sure of purity of drinking water and of water when swimming, wash fresh fruits and vegetables carefully and keep summer insects away from your food.

BELIEVE IN SIGNS?

They laugh at the methods of great grandfather had to predict weather, time for planting, fertility of crops and so forth, but there are still many farmers around Burk who swear to certain signs and portents that have proved faithful prognostications through the years. Certain farmers, a long time ago, believed that if a stalk of corn could be bent over one's instep and touch the ground, there would be a good yield. Today many use this same test and are finding more than enough to spare to touch the ground. Someone reminds us that with so many commercial fertilizers in use and less humus, the predictions of today would differ from those years back. But in spite of this, many corn growers are still bending the stalk of corn over the instep.

Timely Tips to Farmers:

Repair of Farm Buildings Aided by Materials Supply

With the advent of Spring weather and a steady increase in the supply of most building materials, farmers will be able to put into action long delayed plans for repairing and modernizing their homes and production buildings.

Further encouragement comes from the Civilian Production Administration which has raised the limit on the amount of money that can be spent for such work. On farms of five acres or more, \$5000 may be spent repairing and remodeling production buildings. On farms of less than five acres, the limit remains at \$1000. For modernizing farm dwellings, the existing limit of \$400 has been retained.

These expenditures may be made without obtaining a CPA permit. If necessity can be established, more extensive construction may be undertaken by applying for a CPA permit through the County Agent.

Materials Situation Improves

Recent official reports of the U. S. Department of Commerce indicate that the situation as regards lumber and other building materials is steadily improving and that the over-all supply will be greater this Spring. This is especially true of asphalt roofing products, perhaps the most essential building material used on farms. Last year the asphalt roofing industry set a new production record in providing 86 percent of all the roofing material produced in the United States.

In reconditioning farm production buildings agriculture engineers emphasize these important considerations: (1) proper selection and application of materials; (2) a careful check on daily chores to eliminate time-wasting steps and to permit more efficient use of the buildings, farm tools and equipment. A recent time-and-motion study in a 16-cow dairy barn resulted in an 18 percent increase in efficiency which enabled the farmer to add three more cows to his herd with no increase in labor costs. This was accomplished by adjustments in the daily chores and minor alterations in the physical layout of the barn. Many state

agriculture colleges are making basic time-and-motion studies, frequently involving building rearrangement. These are available for anyone desiring to check his farm efficiency.

Proper Application Essential

In selection and application of building materials, these points are emphasized: 1—The first essential of satisfactory protection of buildings and their contents is a soundly constructed, weathertight roof with a fire-resistant covering such as asphalt shingles which will resist sparks and windblown embers.

2—Materials should be selected to best meet the functional requirements of the buildings. Only the highest quality of materials available should be used on permanent structures, such as barns, to assure long service at low maintenance cost.

3—Proper application, preferably by experienced workmen, is vital. Faulty application of asphalt shingles usually is the cause of premature failure of the material to do the job it is designed to do. Field studies indicate that up to 40 percent more service may be obtained from asphalt roofing by careful selection of the material for the purpose to be served and proper application.

U. S. LIVESTOCK DECLINES

Livestock on U. S. farms declined in numbers last year for the third successive year since the all-time peak of 1944. In terms of animal units (excluding poultry) livestock was 3.7 percent lower than a year ago.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

FRONT vs. BACK

A **BULKY** envelope reached me the other day from a young girl in her teens. She enclosed a number of prints "I always take my pictures," she wrote in her letter, "with the sun over my shoulder. Do you think these are good?"

After I had answered her note I got to thinking further about it. Specifically, I got to thinking about the business of the sun and her shoulder. It gave me an idea for today's column and I dug out the snapshot shown here.

This picture was made with the sun over the photographer's shoulder. It's properly focused, properly exposed, and pretty well composed. Yet it is not a fine snapshot.

And the reason it's not is that the sun was behind the shoulder of the photographer. The model faced the sun—a brilliant, noon, summer sun. If you look closely you will notice that this has left deep shadows on her face. Most of her forehead is shaded by her hair and her nose

casts a shadow over her mouth and much of her chin. As a result, the light on her face is uneven, her features less easily recognized.

Here, then, is a case where my young correspondent might well forget the rule of having the sun behind her when she shoots. For with pictures of people out of doors, backlighting or sidelighting generally yields more pleasing results than full, frontal lighting. And in this connection, too, the slanting sunlight of mid-morning or afternoon is to be preferred to the direct, overhead sun of noon.

Two last points, however, which it's well to remember. When your subject is backlit you must be sure that no direct sunlight falls on your camera lens. And you may find, too, that you need a somewhat longer exposure. Where this shot was made at 1/50 and f/11, a backlit shot might be made at 1/50 and f/8.

Who Owns Business?

"Who owns American corporations?" That was the lead sentence of an Associated Press story released the other day. Point of this story was that the people own business. Stockholders of five big companies in representative fields added together number 1,634,868, or enough people to make the fourth largest city of the United States. That is correct, the people do own our corporations. It is right for people to own our business.

I have often contended that in America you have the people owning the wealth and resources of a nation in much more direct and complete manner than you could ever have under any of the socialistic dream Utopias. This is the straight answer to the Communistic dodge that the people are the state to which must be added the fact that in totalitarian countries the state owns the people. In America the people, in a very real way, own the wealth and resources of the nation.

"Vested" Interests

If you were to combine the population of Nevada, Wyoming and Delaware, according to the Associated Press story, you would still not have as many people as own the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. A city composed of the 700,000 A.T.&T. stockholders would be the tenth largest in the country. Moreover, it is significant that this corporation's stockholders far outnumber in number its 500,000 workers.

This is generally true of American corporations, and when you add the stockholders to the employees, you strengthen your picture of America as a place where the masses have "vested" interests in the wealth of the nation. The stockholders of the richest railroad in the land, the Pennsylvania, outnumber the employees almost four to three. They live in every state of the union, and on the average own 60 shares representing an individual investment of \$1,200.

We're All Dependent

We think of General Motors, biggest automobile manufacturer, as having a lot of employees. Yet, except for a brief period at the peak of armament work during the war, General Motors stockholders have outnumbered employees for 17 years. More than a third of General Motors individual stockholders have holdings of 10 shares or fewer. No single person owns more than 1.5 per cent of all General Motors stock.

While it is remembered that sometimes large blocks of stock will be owned by other companies, it must be kept in mind that these companies in turn have many stockholders. Notable also is the fact that many educational, charitable, and religious institutions, as well as non-profit associations and foundations, are on the rolls of "big" business. No one knows just how many persons may be dependent upon the successful operations of our corporations. In the truest sense, all of us are, either directly or indirectly.

Most of the nation's wealth has its source in the enterprise of a carefully conducted business. Natural resources must first feel the hands of men at machines. I cannot imagine why any free American would wish to trade what we have in this country for any part of the vague economic systems that have produced only failure. Not only have these other systems failed to produce real blessings for their people in the form of higher living standards, but they have brought slavery instead of economic freedom.

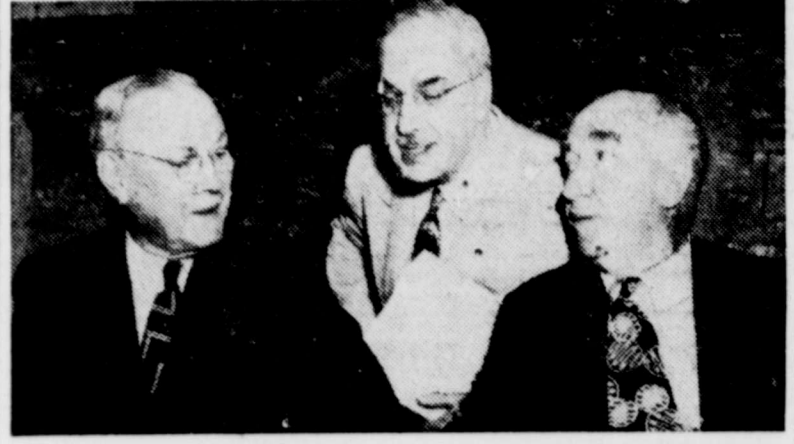

Noting that the contract afforded a "prime case history of the evils of industry-wide bargaining," he said that there was evidence of "collusion between the mine operators and the UMW with the intention of violating the law."

EXCELSIOR: Altitude 2,000

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Wisdom, Understanding For Our Daily Living

LESSON TEXT FOR JULY 27—Proverbs 1:1-5; 3:13-18; 9:9, 10; James 1:5. MEMORY SELECTION—Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom; and with all thy getting get understanding.—Proverbs 4:7.

EDUCATION is so widespread in our day, and so eagerly sought after, that one might assume that the world would soon solve its problems through the cultural attainments of its people.

Why this is not true appears clearly in our lesson; for it is wisdom that the world needs, and wisdom is quite different from the understanding or memorizing of a mass of facts.

Wisdom teaches us how to use knowledge effectively for the glory of God. We see in our lesson:

I. The Meaning of Wisdom (Prov. 1:1-5).

PROVERBS are pithy, useful sayings, which gather up the wisdom of a people in easily remembered form. They are highly thought of in all nations, but reached their highest development among the Hebrews, because they rightly insisted that they must be related to God and worship of him.

We learn in this passage that they are given to us that we may "know" that we have both wisdom and instruction. The growth of knowledge is always a prerequisite to growth in grace—learn more about God and his precious Word, and you will have more of his grace upon you.

Knowledge must be coupled with discernment (v. 2), which speaks of going beyond and below the surface meaning. This will not be an abstract love of the scholarly, but a practical application of truth to life (v. 3). Wisdom results in right living and proper dealing with our neighbors.

The one who has come to this place is ready to give (v. 4) help to others, especially to the young or those of "simple" thinking, who have not yet reached the place where they can get hold of such things for themselves.

Notice that the wise man does not stop at that point, but because he is wise he goes on to more and more understandings, to further receiving and giving out of "sound counsels" (v. 5).

Observe next, II. The Value of Wisdom (Prov. 3:13-18).

THE character of a man shows up in the things he holds to be valuable. Some cannot see beyond gold and silver. Others seek comfort and convenience, and do not wish to be disturbed in their easy ways.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

YOUR BIRDS PLENTY OF WATER

is the greatest single contributor to the health of the hen. It is a raw material which the water supply must have. When the water supply is inadequate, production suffers. It plays other important parts. It is the substance which helps birds maintain their body temperature, and it also is a part in the body's function of assimilating food. If the water supply affects not only egg production, but also the health of your laying birds, it is a plentiful supply of cool water before laying is one of the most important requirements in the poultry stock management plan. There should be of ample water for the size of your flock. Five gallons of water would suffice in wintertime, but in the heat of summer consumption increases. This means that a constant supply should be available during the warm weather.

A good plan to place the water in the shade when used. If placed in the sun, the water remains cool for a short period.

In the same sense, waterers might be a necessary evil for flocks as they are spread through the fountains. Since an evaporation is using the same water, disease, if present,

is almost certain to be spread to healthy birds unless precautions are taken to prevent contamination. Construct waterers in way that will prevent contamination. Commercial drinking water antiseptics also may be used to help prevent the transmission of disease through the water in fountains.

Green beans are a nourishing food you can have in plentiful supply for your family by canning them in your own kitchen. Select fresh beans and be sure to wash them thoroughly before the pods are broken or cut. The short fuzz or nap on the pods holds dust and possibly bacteria, yeasts or moulds which may cause spoilage. After

washing the beans, string, and break or cut them into two-inch pieces. Boil five minutes and pack into hot Ball jars. Add one teaspoon salt to each quart. Cover with water in which the beans were cooked. Process beans with small, young pods 35 minutes and those with large pods 55 minutes at ten pounds pressure.

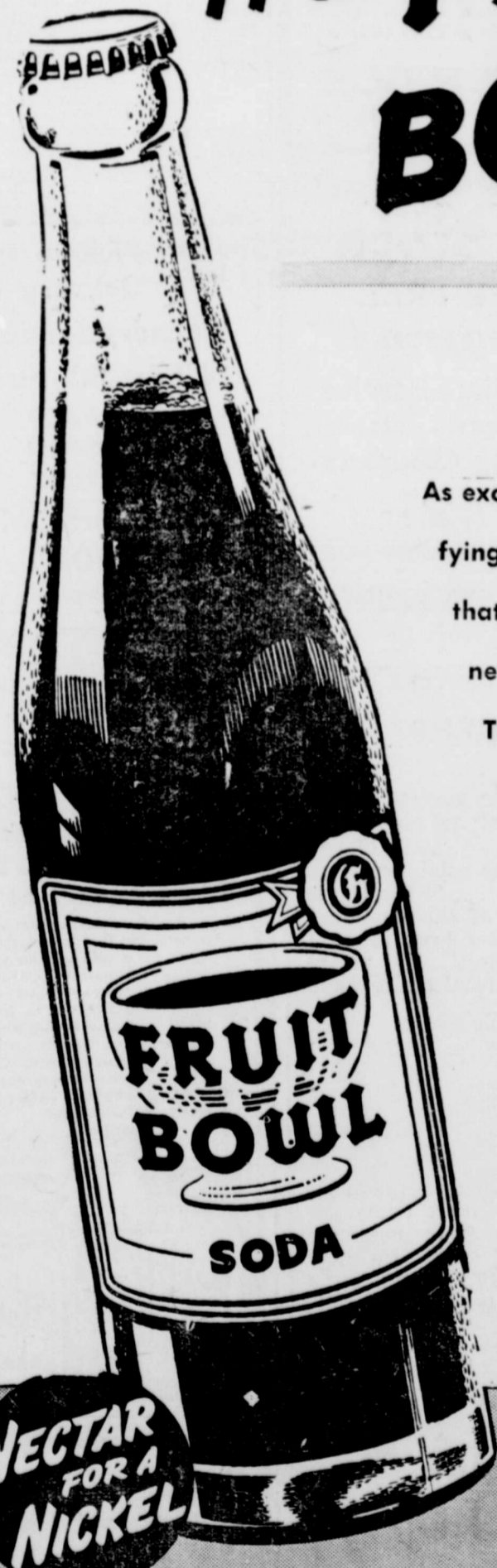

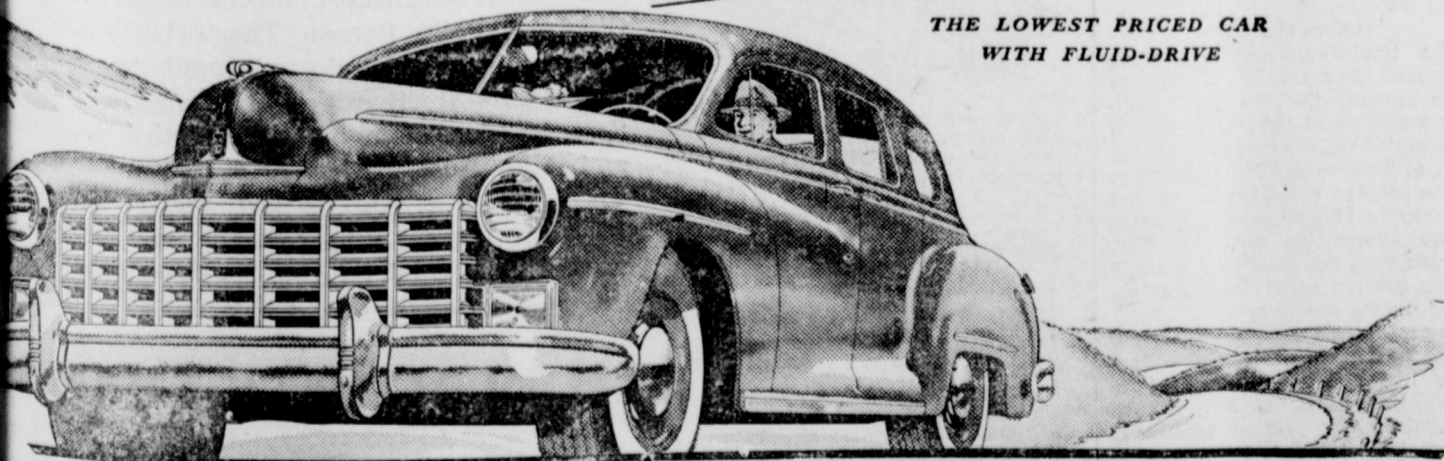

Check Your Roof Before 'Sneak Leaks' Develop

How long has it been since the roof over your head was checked? Will the roof continue to ward off the elements for another year, or has the weather beaten the "life" out of it? Roofs too often are taken for granted. Simply because a roof has given good service for many years, home owners forget that it is the most exposed part of a house, subject to unremitting attack. Hot summer suns bake the roof, and rains cool it. Winter's snows and ice freeze it, and winds blowing from every direction seek to rip and tear it.

Most parts of a house "scream" for attention before it is too late. Paint flakes and chips. The furnace "acts up." The refrigerator gets noisy. But a roof silently does its job until weather finally takes its toll. Then, water seeps in. If ignored, roofers warn that moisture may rot the roof deck, or the wood in the deck may swell and buckle and tear the roof covering. Often, water may make its way inside the walls and emerge far from the source of the leak, cracking the plaster and staining the wallpaper.

Patching Roof Seldom Pays
Unless a roof is replaced before it ends its useful life, the interior of the house may require repairs. And the cost is likely to exceed the price of a new roof. Patching an old roof seldom pays. H. R. Snook of the U. S. Bureau of Standards states that "a single apparent leak in a badly weathered roof is usually the forerunner of other larger leaks that will appear in a relatively short time. . . . There comes a time in the life of a roof on every permanent structure when it is no longer practical or economical to effect repairs. When that time comes, re-roofing is the only solution."

There is more to consider in selecting a roof than just its initial cost. A roof not only should provide trouble-free service for many years, but also it should beautify the home by its rich texture and blended colors, and protect the home from the danger of sparks or flying embers. The National Fire Protection Association reports that flammable roofs are a major cause of fire and the principal cause of conflagrations.

Roofing, such as fire-resistant asphalt shingles, generally may be applied over the old roof, eliminating the expense and mess of removing the existing covering.

Why Ham and Eggs TASTE GOOD
If you want a scientific reason why ham and eggs make such a satisfying food combination, here it is. Scientists of the Bureau of Animal Husbandry have found that proteins of these foods supplement each other so well that the two supply more nourishment when eaten together than when eaten separately. Previous experiments had shown that the protein in pork enhanced the nutritive value of bread eaten with it. Now it seems that the protein of eggs enhances the nutritive value of the protein in pork.

Motors Big As A House To Power Coulee Dam

Four giant electric motors, each rated at 65,000 horsepower and exceeding by more than 50 percent the capacity of the most powerful alternating current units ever built, will be constructed for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation. They will power pumps to store water from Grand Coulee dam to transform more than a million acres of semi-waste land in Washington into a farming oasis. Each of the motors will be as large as a six-room house, will weigh 325 tons and require the force equal to the pulling power of 30 automobiles for starting purposes. Each motor will move enough water to supply the needs of a city as large as New York City. Together, the four units could meet the water requirements of 28,000,000 persons.

75 Million Acres of Trees Needed for Timberland

An estimated 75 million acres of denuded and poorly stocked forest land, about one-sixth of the commercial timberland in the United States, must be planted to trees if it is to grow timber within the lifetime of present-day children, reports the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Forest acreage planted in this country since 1926 totals almost 6,500,000 acres.

What to Do About It

There is one way, and only one way, to avoid a serious depression, and that way is open to the American people. Responsibility rests firmly upon each of us, no matter what may be our economic status or individual social background, to choose out this proper course. There is no way to go, if we should face into a depression, except toward hard work and the high productivity of industrial peace.

That's the formula that will enable us to weather a business recession, provided we begin to use it now. We must all tighten our belts, get our feet on the ground, and go to work just as hard as we can work. A greatly increased measure of productivity per man-hour is the best answer to the present situation that can be thought up.

Down With Prices

With increased productivity, with an honest hour's labor given for every hour's pay, we could see a considerable lowering of prices. Indeed, with genuine whole-hearted cooperation from labor and industry, it would be quite possible to increase output as much as 40% generally. This should be enough to bring about a general 25% reduction in prices. This could be done with our present labor force and without increased working hours.

This would in fact bring prices down until it would be equivalent to an increase in wages. This is the one sound answer to the present threat of a depression. Such answer would also give us hope of regaining our foreign markets, which have had little attention paid to them since the war.

Wisdom of a Sage

The importance of this thing prompted Bernard M. Baruch to state recently that the whole post-war world would "get going only if men work" and to come out for a 5 1/2 day, 44 hour week. The seriousness of the problem we face is such that we may be able to save civilization if we accept the challenge. Mr. Baruch said, adding that this would mean greater effort than that exerted during the war.

In proposing a 44 hour work week, "with no strikes or layoffs to January 1, 1949," as a means of increasing production, Mr. Baruch recognized our present tendencies to put limitations on our work. He emphasized that a way must be found for production to flow smoothly. This achieved, then a "sense of security would return to worker and employer, and the reaction upon the economy of the world would be deep and lasting."

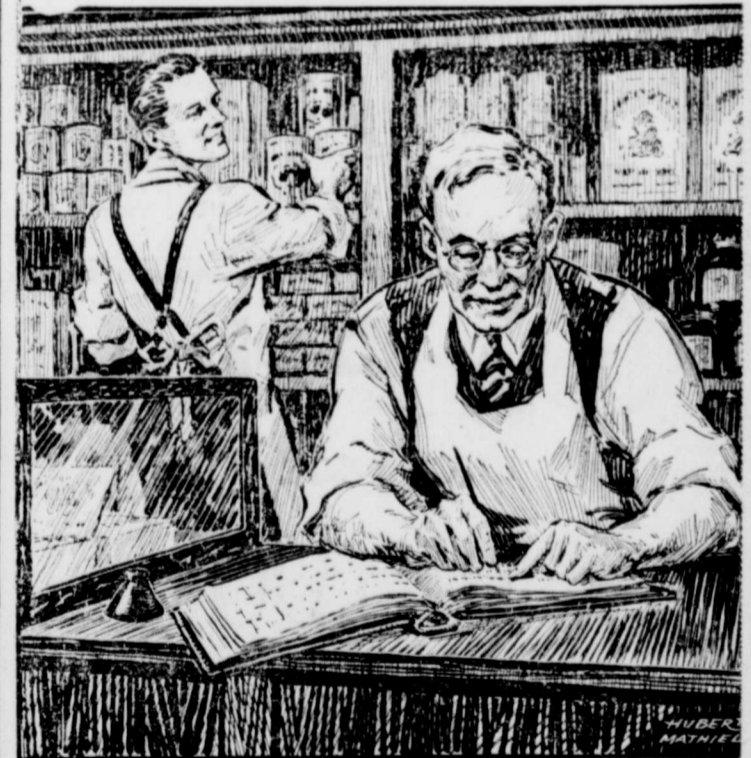

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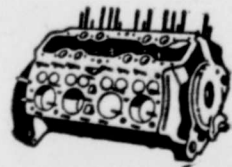

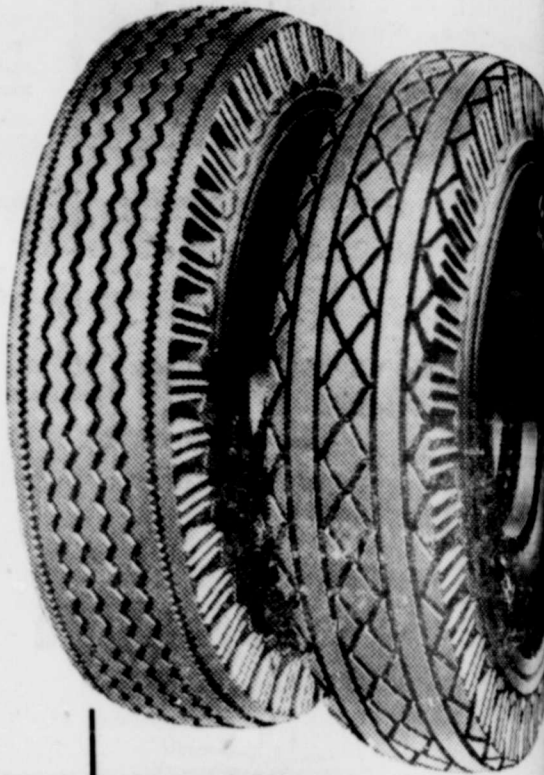
