WHAT WE DO KNOW

When two people converse, starting with any kind of topic, they generally wind up discussing the difference between the American democratic and Russian communistic systems. It becomes a subject of human rights. There is much we don't know about what Russia is doing in economics, in military preparedness, in adding to physical comforts and the contentment of her people.

We have learned, in the matter of maintaining an army, of encouraging military research, in training, that Russia is not standing still. Also, she is adding 20 million acres of crops above last year, has a 15 per cent rise in industrial production. The production of pig iron, petroleum, coal and steel has greatly increased. They are producing enough food and fuel to export. As for housing, Russia has her problem the same as we.

ing life insurance companies, says that with soybeans at \$3, wheat at \$2.60, corn at \$1.85, 24 cents for hogs and the same for beef, selling wouldn't be profitable for the farmer. Some small farms near cities are being sold more for homes because of the housing shortage, than for farm sites. Large farms are going only at very high prices.

Eighty farm loan solicitors and land appraisers say that unfortunately many farmers look upon this present boom period as easy money. If this is the attitude of many, what happens if and when conditions change, when high incomes won't be so high when land isn't worth nearly so much... If, as many people believe, prices won't go much higher but will take a decided drop in favor of the consumer, the farmer will feel the pinch. According to what most of us have learned of economics, without benefit of college degrees and so forth, it seems to work out that "what goes up must come down."

SOME WAYS TO CUT FEED COSTS

A thrifty poultryman manages his flock on the principle that a penny saved is a penny earned. Applied specifically to feeding methods, this old saying takes on an especially significant meaning for it is here that the greatest saving can be realized.

Without depriving your birds of the nutritional balance they need in their diets, you can cut down on your feed costs by following a planned feeding program that aims at reducing waste.

Here are some of the essential parts of such a feeding plan:
Store feed carefully — Feed stored in building with leaky roof or with damp floors often becomes moldy and unfit for use. Keep it in a weather proof, dry place.

Protection against Rodents — Three rats eat and destroy enough food for two laying hens. Continued efforts to control rats and mice will help save feed.

Don't overlook feeding — Hoppers should never be completely full. It is best to keep the feeders about three-quarters full as this prevents the fowl from billing the feed out onto the floor or ground.

Avoid wasteful handling of feed — Spilling the feed on the floor when filling the hoppers, spilling feed when carrying it from the feed house to the hoppers and rough handling of feed sacks all are wasteful feeding practices that should be avoided.

Feeding balanced rations — It is a waste of feed to give an unbalanced ration to your birds. Not only does such a diet predispose growing birds to disease, but it takes more feed to produce a pound of weight gain.

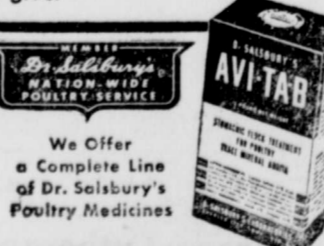
Dispose of runty birds — Cull your flock frequently. Runt birds are not economical feed users, and many of them may be disease

Impaired Digestive Functions—Not often considered as a waste is the feed given to birds not in good physical condition. Unwell birds do not digest their feed properly, and as a result the food given to them is partially wasted by not being thoroughly digested and assimilated. It is a good practice to feed these birds separately, perhaps giving a reliable conditioner medicine in their wash until they are back in normal health.

America's dog population is right around 20,000,000, a survey by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, indicates.

The South leads in the number of dog-owning families and the average dogs per family is also highest there, the survey also revealed.

Dog ownership varies in inverse proportion to the size of communities, with farmers having the highest percentage of dog ownership.

Approximately half of all families with children boast dogs, while 40 per cent of families without children keep canine pets.

Raise A Puppy, Then Baby, Couples Told

Raising a puppy is the finest sort of preparation for the rearing of a baby, workers of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, believe.

They point to the finding of Lawrence K. Frank, a recognized authority on child care who himself has raised six children and many puppies, and who states that an understanding of the fact that babies are "human puppies" can be of enormous help to parents in dealing with the problems and vicissitudes of raising a family.

Both puppies and babies, when new-born, are dependent, helpless and demanding, he points out. They require frequent feedings and much sleep, and crave petting and affection. When hungry, hurt or uncomfortable they whimper or cry. Like the puppy, the baby will acquire politeness, emotional balance and self-discipline or will become a petulant and discordant individual depending on the manner in which he has been treated while small, he states.

A Statement To Our Customers About Resale

PRICES of PRODUCTS

Built by International Harvester Company

Here at Harvester we are concerned over the fact that a growing number of our products are appearing on the resale market at greatly inflated prices.

As manufacturers, we try to produce at the lowest possible cost. We cannot set the prices at which our products—tractors, motor trucks, farm implements, refrigeration, and industrial power equipment—are sold. We can and do suggest list prices which the great majority of our dealers adopt as their retail prices.

\$20,000,000 Price Reduction
Our basic price policy was publicly stated in March, 1947, when we announced price reductions at the rate of approximately \$20,000,000 per year on our products. At that time, Fowler McCormick, Chairman of the Board, said: "ANY PRICE IS TOO HIGH IF IT CAN BE REDUCED."

Practically all of our dealers cooperated with this policy and passed on the savings to their customers.

The objective of the price reductions was to make it possible for customers to buy our products, which they need so badly, at lower prices. Naturally, this purpose is defeated when our products are sold by anybody at inflated prices.

IH Production at All-Time Peak
Inflated prices are caused by

the difference between supply and demand. To increase supply, we now have the greatest number of employees in history on our payrolls—almost 90,000 in the United States, as against about 60,000 prewar. Large new plants are getting into production in Louisville, Evansville, and Melrose Park. A fourth will soon be in operation in Memphis. The men and women now employed are turning out the greatest quantities of IH products of all kinds that we have ever made. These are also the finest products we have ever made, and recognition of that fact is an important contributing factor to the demand for them.

Distribution to Dealers

But even record-breaking production is not sufficient to give your dealer—and other IH dealers—enough products to meet today's demand. We have tried to make the fairest possible geographical allocation of our products so that every dealer would get a fair share, and we know that dealers, in most cases, have tried earnestly to make the fairest possible distribution to their customers.

We know that the overwhelming majority of IH dealers are as much opposed to inflated prices as we are. In the public interest, we have already asked their cooperation—and are now asking the cooperation of customers—in correcting this situation.

Behind the Curtain

Too much misinformation has been circulated about Russia. A lot of this has been put into circulation by Russia. Some of it has come from fellow-travelers and other admirers of the Soviet experiment. There have been honest mistakes of American writers who have been unable to penetrate the mysteries behind the iron curtain. Prominent Americans who have "toured" Russia have too often become dupes of propaganda shows cleverly contrived for visiting eyes.

Gradually, however, facts are coming to light. Documented and unbiased studies are greatly needed, for they will dispose of many fallacies about the Soviets. Straight facts will set folks right who have accepted such boners as this one: There's no unemployment in Russia. It's quite true, but slave laborers have been estimated at 14,000,000. You see, unemployment insurance is not even necessary.

Facts Talk Loud
Such a factual study is the 141-page book, **Communism in Action**, prepared under direction of Congressman Dirksen of Illinois. Printed as a house document by the Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress, the book may be obtained from the U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for 25 cents. Copies are also distributed free by the American Wage Earners Foundation, Suite 605, 30 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Ill.

Written in a simple, factual style, without the customary slanted or biased approach, the book should interest all Americans who have been confronted with the idea that "the State does the job better." The facts set forth therein do not call for elaboration or editorial bias. They talk loud enough to make a mighty good advertisement for the American way of life.

Special Privileges
Russian Communism theoretically envisions a classless society. On the basis of pay, the difference between the status of the wage earner and the manager is much greater there than in America. The many "special privileges and bonuses" that are distributed to the Soviet managers make this inequality more striking. The average wage of workers was reported in a pre-war year as approximately \$10 to \$12.50 a month.

What about labor? Yes, in Russia labor is active and organized. Joining unions there is a political and economic necessity. Labor leaders are appointed by the ruling group, and their duties are to speed up production, to keep labor disciplined. Wages are not a subject for discussion or negotiation. There is no collective bargaining. Most Russian labor laws, rulings, and practices would be called "anti-labor" by American unions.

There are no minorities; there is no deviation from the "party line." The final decision of the people, in elections, must conform to the "party" decision. In the party, religion is equivalent to "superstitions and unscientific processes." Profits are a capitalistic phenomenon, and therefore go to the state alone. The vast profits of the Soviet do not go to the workers whose property they are said to be, but to further the expansion of "the Soviet of the future." Little wonder this study terms Communism a "theoretical failure."

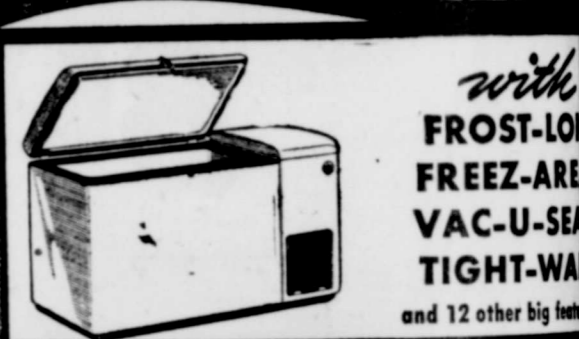
