Q. What causes blood to appear Lee Wyatt have returned from in milk?

A. Presence of blood in milk is due to the rupture of one of the many small blood vessels within the udder This rupture may be due to some turned to her home from the mechanical injury or small tumor, or it may indicate tissue damage due to infection (mastitis). In the latter case the milk will be otherwise abnormal in appearance. When blood appears in the milk, it is best to call in your local veterinarian immediately for diagnosis and treat-ment of this condition. A small tumor in the teat canal may be quite successfully removed by surgery, while mastitis may respond to direct internal medication of the udder

> Q. When should gilts be removed from the market herd and placed in the brood sow herd?

A. The Research Farm of the Raiston Purina Company recommends that gilts remain with hogs being fattened for market until it is possible to select the "good-doing" gilts of the type desired. Usually this is at six months of age when their mates go to market.

Q. At what age do turkey hens come into production?

A. With the proper feed and management practices, a young turkey hen will come into production at about 7 to 8 months of age, regardless of the season of the year when she reaches this age.

Q. When should pullets be vac-cinated against chicken pox? A. Vaccinations against chicken pox should be done when pullets are

between six and ten weeks of age.

parts of such a feeding plan: Store feed carefully - Feed stored in building with leaky roof or with damp floors often becomes moldy and unfit for use. Keep it in a weather proof, dry

Protection against Rodents -Three rats eat and destroy enough food for two laving hens. Continued efforts to control rats and mice will help save feed.

Dont overlook feeding - Hoppers should never be completely full. It is best to keep the feeders about three-quarters full a this prevents the fowl from billing the feed out onto the floor or

Avoid wasteful handling of floor when filling the hoppers, spilling feed when carrying it from the feed house to the hoppers and rough handling of feed sacks all are wasteful feeding practices that should be avoided.

Feeding balanced rations - It a waste of feed to give an unbalanced ration to your birds. Not only does such a diet predispose growing birds to disease, but it takes more feed to produce pound of weight gain.

Dispose of runty birds - Cull your flock frequently. Runts are not economical feed users, and many of them may be disease

As manufacturers, we try to produce at the lowest possible cost. We cannot set the prices at which our products-tractors, motor trucks, farm implements, refrigeration, and industrial power equipment-are sold. We can and do suggest list prices which the great majority of our dealers adopt as their retail prices.

\$20,000,000 Price Reduction

Our basic price policy was publicly stated in March, 1947, when we announced price reductions at the rate of approximately \$20,000,000 per year on our products. At that time, Fowler McCormick, Chairman of the Board, said: "ANY PRICE IS TOO HIGH IF IT CAN BE RE-LDUCED."

Practically all of our dealers cooperated with this policy and passed on the savings to their customers.

The objective of the price reductions was to make it possible for customers to buy our products, which they need so badly, at lower prices. Naturally, this purpose is defeated when our products are sold by anybody at inflated prices.

IH Production at All-Time Peak Inflated prices are caused by and demand. To increase supply, we now have the greatest number of employes in history on our payrolls-almost 90,000 in the United States, as against about 60,000 prewar. Large new plants are getting into production in Louisville, Evansville, and Melrose Park. A fourth will soon be in operation in Memphis. The men and women now employed are turning out the greatest quantities of IH products of all kinds that we have ever made. These are also the finest products we have ever made, and recognition of that fact is an important contributing factor to the demand for them.

Distribution to Dealers

But even record-breaking production is not sufficient to give your dealer-and other IH dealers-enough products to meet today's demand. We have tried to make the fairest possible geographical allocation of our products so that every dealer would get a fair share, and we know that dealers, in most cases, have tried earnestly to make the fairest possible distribution to their customers.

But we also know that many of our products-far too many -are being resold at inflated prices. The public criticism and resentment of these resales are of real concern to us, as we know they must be to our dealers, because such reactions en-



J.N. Denies Greece Debate gar.

The United Nations security council, which has yet to meet a tough problem head-on and overcome it, rejected an American appeal for an emergency debate on the Balkan situation, despite reports of increasing strife in Greece.

When Herschel V. Johnson, deputy U. S. delegate, warned that the

crisis developing in Greece "may burst into explosion any day," Andrei Gromyko, Soviet delegate, protested that an emergency debate on the issue w a s unnecessary and France added that the United Nations "must not act too hastily."

As additional troops were sent up to reinforce both the invading leftist guerrillas and the Greek government forces, the swiftly developing battle in the rugged heights of northern Greece began to take on a cast reminiscent of the Spanish civil war.

The war ministry disclosed that six strong guerrilla units had been concentrated along the Albanian and Yugoslav frontiers of Greece and that all were poised to join the original invasion force of 2,000 which government troops had so far been able to repel

We will want to make much of this lesson, for it is the only one during the entire year which deals directly with the home.

The book of Proverbs, to which we were introduced last Sunday. I. Youth Looking to Parents (1:8, 9; 6:20-23; 23:22-26).

Young people want to be well-dressed and properly groomed. They are interested in that which adorns and improves their appearance. It is right that they should have such concern. Let us remind them, however, that a young man or woman should not only be physically well-groomed, but spiritually attractive as well. If we should give as much thought to that side of our beings as we do to our bodies. there would be wonderful improvement in the life of the individual and in the home.

The child who is properly instructed, and who is responsive to that instruction, is prepared for life no matter where it may lead him (6:22) Wherever and whenever he needs guidance, night or day, it is with him. Even when he sleeps, he is in the hand of God for blessing.

Let no young man or woman be betrayed into that awful folly of our day which neglects the teaching of parents and of the church. Disaster is ahead on that road -sure disaster, and swift!

But now look at the other side of the matter, where we see

The fruits of that kind of child training are now being harvested in the present crop of juvenile delinquents. We have the sad and awful proof before us that children cannot be reared that way.

We are not pleading for a return to the unduly restrictive measures of some of our forefathers; children are not helped by harshness or cruelty. But there is a proper place for definite instruction, for discipline, yes, even for chastening when that becomes necessary.

The larger part, and the most effective part, of this matter is the training of the child (22:6) and when properly done it brings forth the finest of results in later life. The boy who has been taught and directed right may get on a sidetrack for a time, but there is always the promise of a return to the right way.

This business of rearing children calls for the best any of us can put into it, and over and above that, all the grace and wisdom that God can and will give us. We have reserved one verse for

gether (17:6).

OLD men need encouragement. and they receive it in no richer or more satisfying measure than in the delight they take in their children's children. Young people should remember that, and not fail to give to their grandparents, as well as their parents, the full measure of their interest and devotion.

But now note that "the glory of children are their fathers," yes, and grandfathers. How sad it is when a boy has to be ashamed of his father or one of his grandparents.



Behind the Curtain .

Too much misinformation has been circulated about Russia. A lot of this has been put into circulation by Russia. Some of it has come from fellow-travelers and other admirers of the Soviet experiment. There have been honest mistakes of American writers who have been unable to penetrate the mysteries behind the iron curtain. Prominent Americans who have "toured" Russia have too often become dupes of propaganda shows cleverly contrived for visiting eyes.

Gradually, however, facts are coming to light. Documented and unbiased studies are greatly needed, for they will dispose of many fallacies about the Soviets. Straight facts will set folks right who have accepted such boners as this one: There's no unemployment in Russia. It's quite true, but slave laborers have been estimated at 14,000,-000. You see, unemployment insurance is not even necessary. Facts Talk Loud

Such a factual study is the 141page book, Communism in Action, prepared under direction of Congressman Dirksen of Illinois. Printed as a house document by the Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress, the book may be obtained from the U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for 25 cents. Copies are also distributed free by the American Wage Earners Foundation, Suite 605, 30 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Ill.

Written in a simple, factual style, without the customary slanted or biased approach, the book should interest all Americans who have been confronted with the idea that "the State does the job better." The facts set forth therein do not call for elaboration or editorial bias. They talk loud enough to make a mighty good advertisement for the American way of life.

Special Privileges Russian Communism theoretically envisions a classless society. On the basis of pay, the difference between the status of the wage earner and the manager is much greater there than in America. The many "special privileges and bonuses" that are distributed to the Soviet managers make this inequality more striking. The average wage of workers was reported in a pre-war year as approximately \$10 to \$12.50 a month.

What about labor? Yes, in Russia labor is active and organized. Joining unions there is a political and economic necessity. Labor leaders are appointed by the ruling group, and their duties are to speed up production, to keep labor disciplined. Wages are not a subject for discussion or negotiation. There is no collective bargaining. Most Russian labor laws, rulings, and practices would be called "anti-labor" by American unions.

There are no minorities; there is o deviation from the The final decision of the people, in elections, must conform to the "party" decision. In the party, religion is equivalent to "superstitions and unscientific processes." Profits are a capitalistic phenomenon, and therefore go to the state alone. The vast profits of the Soviet do not go to the workers whose property they are said to be, but to further the expansion of "the Soviet of the future." Little wonder this study terms Communism a "theoretical




