### Texas-Oklahoma Fair Sept. 29 -- Oct. 4

The dates of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Iowa Park are September 29 to and including October 4th. The fair is a satisfaction to those who attend it and those who produce and manufacture with the opportunity to exhibit the examples of their co-operation. The boy and girlhood homes of many of the nation's greatest have been in communities that hold fairs each year. It is an established American custom that draws friends and relatives together for fun and education. There are exhibits of handicraft, floral displays, midway attractions, band concerts, special attractions for children. Premiums are offered for prize cattle, sheep, horses, eggs and roosters. Pastry, canning, quilt displays attract the women. The displays this year promise folk something to talk about for a long time after the fair is over.

### Farming Is Our Firm Foundation

In this year 1947 there has been tremendous progress on the farms. The area of the average American farm has grown nearly one-tenth in the past five years, from 174 acres in 1940 to more than 200 acres up, to date. More than 800,000 farms are receiving electric service. Every part of the country where there is good soil has been enriched—large areas by conservation methods carried on by the National Government. Our farmers have automobiles and farm machinery, and good highways exist everywhere. Electric refrigeration, milking machines, washing machines, radios, new furniture, and all kinds of modern improvements exist in all parts of the country.

It is impossible to tell just what is going to happen, but the best authorities in Washington say that agricultural exports will be up as much as \$4 billion this year.

### Why Europe Should Scratch Dirt

When the first settlers settled in Virginia and Massachusetts they "lived off the land." They started at scratch. They caught fish and shot wild game, and while they ate food brought with them from England in their ships, they managed somehow to get maize from the Indians. In less time than has elapsed since the close of World War II, they were raising their own crops on their own ground. Some of the Europeans might get along if they would try out those old plans instead of depending upon this full-grown United States to feed them. Last winter they were hollering for coal but miners refused to dig in the mines. Now they want food which they have failed to produce.

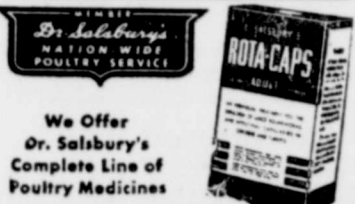

an important task, one which requires plenty of preparation. If the job is done well, it means the poultry raiser has taken the first step toward achieving high winter egg production and toward giving his flock the protection it needs against disease.

### Make Necessary Repairs

The first step in preparing for housing is to make whatever repairs are necessary in the laying house. Plugging up cracks and crevices, replacing broken windows, and nailing down loose boards will help eliminate drafts. Examine the roof for any necessary repairs. Give the entire building a thorough going-over and make a list of the things that will have to be done and the materials you will need to complete the repair work.

When the house is in good repair, take all movable equipment outside and give it a thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Then allow it to dry in the sun.

Remove all loose litter and droppings with shovel and a broom. Now take a hoe and give the floor and roosting pits a thorough scraping. Sweep the ceilings, walls, nests and floors, eliminating all cob webs, dust, and other filth.

### Clean and Disinfect

Next, scrub the floor and the roost areas with hot water and strong soap. And while the interior of the house is still damp, spray the walls, floor, and fixtures with a reliable disinfectant. Then allow the house to air and dry.

INSOLENCE: Slap Hands The United States, visibly irked by recent actions of the new Communist-Hungarian government, vented its diplomatic rage in a stinging note which accused Hungary of "inadmissibly insolent" conduct toward American diplomats in that country.

Second cause for U. S. anger was the arrest and beating in Budapest of an American citizen and the subsequent unsatisfactory explanation of the incident offered by Hungarian officials.

One of the most harshly worded protests to come from the state department since American planes were shot down over Yugoslavia a year ago, the note marked the first official unpleasantness to be delivered by the United States to the puppet Hungarian regime.

The incident grew out of the arrest of Stephen T. Thuransky, an American citizen, for his alleged "revolting and scandalizing vilifications in public" of Hungary's president and other government members. Thuransky, his wife and two daughters later were taken into custody by U. S. legation officials and removed to Vienna.

In the protest note, the state department pointed out that the arrest of an American citizen on purely political charges is "absolutely inadmissible" under the armistice agreement which prevails in Hungary. Also, officials of the Hungarian ministry of the interior were accused of being "uncooperative in the extreme and in some cases inadmissibly insolent."

VIVA: Toreador Orson Welles, the man who didn't come from Mars, has found himself, to put it politely, on the horns of a dilemma.

The self-designated genius was quoted recently as saying he had killed 20 bulls, and immediately he was challenged by another actor, Fortunio Bonanova, to enter the bull-fighting ring at Tijuana, Mexico, and perform for the benefit of charity.

Said the Spanish-born Bonanova in an open letter to Welles, "Killing 20 bulls is a lot of killing," neglecting to add that it is also a lot of bulls.

"So let us do a corrida (series of fights) this season in Tijuana for the motion picture relief fund. I am sure the impresario would give us a Sunday afternoon. What do you say to two bulls apiece?" Admission: Shady side, \$2; sunny side, \$1.

ALEUTIANS: Bases Retained

The Aleutian Islands, that long, cold chain of fog-bound rocks which started many an American G.I. talking to himself during the war, is being integrated into the pattern of the North American defense system.

General of the Army Dwight Eisenhower has revealed that the framework of strategic bases in the Aleutians is being kept intact for rapid expansion if necessary.

After having paid a visit to the continent's northernmost line of defense, General Eisenhower said that the islands were not being abandoned, but were undergoing a "contraction and concentration of military potential in accordance with available manpower."

Conducting a tour of Alaskan bases, the chief of staff admitted that he was "far from satisfied" with housing facilities there but was proud of the job done by men assigned to the areas.

Social Security Freeze

A bill to stabilize the social security tax at 1 per cent each for employers and employees until January 1, 1950, has been signed into law by the President.

Under the new law, the tax will be increased to 1 1/2 per cent on January 1, 1950, and to 2 per cent on January 1, 1952. The old law had provided for increases to 2 1/2 per cent next January 1, and to 3 per cent on January 1, 1949.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Plain Facts About Honesty LESSON TEXT FOR AUGUST 24 - Proverbs 3:3; 11:1, 3; 12:17-22; 14:5; 23:10, 11.

MEMORY SELECTION - Prove all things, hold fast that which is good. Abstain from all appearance of evil. - 1 Thessalonians 5:21, 22.

THE Bible's presentation of the subject of uprightness of living, or plain, downright honesty in everyday contacts, is recognized by all who have given any attention to what it has to say.

The high ethical standard demanded by the Word of God is another evidence of its divine origin. Were men to evolve a moral standard of their own, it is quite evident that that standard would not be very much higher than their own attainments; in fact, the probability is that the standard would be lower than the attainment of some. However, the Bible allows for no deviation from the standard.

We men by nature are the children of wrath who have undoubtedly failed when we measure our lives against God's pattern. How needful is God's work of providing and effecting salvation! Those who have been born of God are then confronted with living a life that meets the divine standard.

I. A Plea for Honesty (Prov. 3:3). HOW good it is when the Christian has a reputation for integrity in all his dealings. However, that outward manifestation is possible only if there is inward reality. Therefore, we move in order of emphasis to the greater truth at the conclusion of the verse. Truth is to be written upon the tablet of the heart.

Here is the plea for heart honesty. It is not enough by plausible argument or by feigned conduct to appear honest before men. It is necessary rather to have motives so sincere, to have a heart so honest, that all we do and say will reflect a character that is honorable.

It is out of the fullness of the heart that man speaketh. As the heart is, so is the man. Let us give attention therefore to this word from God.

II. A Factual Presentation of Honesty (Prov. 11:1, 3; 12:17-22; 14:5).

THESE passages of Scripture bring to our attention the consequences of dishonesty as well as the rewards of honesty.

For example, we know that dishonesty is an abomination to God (Prov. 11:1; 12:22); that perversity of heart has its own reward, in that the perpetrator of evil is sooner or later ensnared in his own sin (Prov. 11:3); that a lying tongue may be victorious, but that victory is short lived (Prov. 12:19).

On the other hand, the rewards of honesty are also made apparent, for we are told that probity of character is God's delight (Prov. 11:1; 12:22); that the very integrity of the upright shall be a guide to them (Prov. 11:3); that blessings to others flow from the tongue of the wise (Prov. 12:18); and that the lip of truth shall be established forever (Prov. 12:19).

III. God and the Life of Honesty (Prov. 23:10, 11).

THE reference here to the ancient landmark has to do with the removal of such evidences as would prove the claim of individuals to certain probity.

We are to respect the rights of others. Honesty involves more than correctness of speech; it implies rightness of life. No subtlety of reasoning can lead us to the conclusion that we may have God's approval if by unfair means we take that which belongs to another.

Particular attention is given to the fact that we are to have regard for the fatherless. The Word of God constantly gives special attention to the fatherless and the widows. It would seem that God will particularly mark as amiss any unfair advantage taken over these individuals. In fact, this text stresses that God as their Redeemer will plead their cause against anyone taking advantage of them. Of course, there can be only one result when God opposes, and that is disaster to the individual who occasions his wrath.

Perhaps it is that very sense of helplessness that makes the fatherless depend upon him. It is certain that until we feel our need of God, we shall go on in our self-sufficiency without him. When our own lack of strength becomes apparent, then it is we turn to him, and then it is that he is willing to be our Redeemer.

Let us dare to face the implications of these texts. Unless we commend our God to men by our upright lives, we shall have to suffer the consequences of our dishonesty in divine displeasure. Released by Western Newspaper Union.



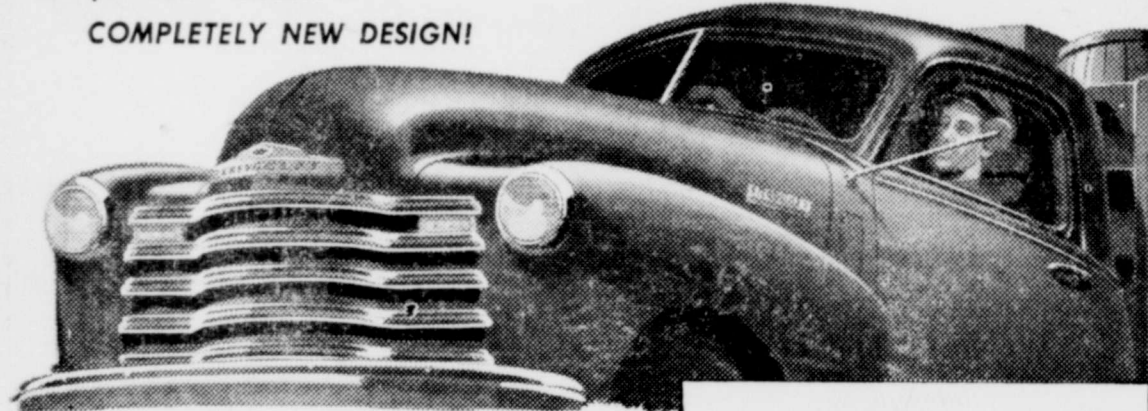

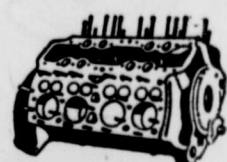
