The convention of the National Fire Protection Association had some figures to face and some suggestions to make to reduce the loss by fire in the U. S. Almost one-fourth of the time lost by strikes and industrial disputes, is lost in man-days of work due to fires — in one year. In one year, 25,000,000 man-days of work in one year. The loss in lives, 10,000 and in property, \$560,000,000. When viewed in the light of money lost in property, it would buy enough lumber and timber to build two million five-room houses. The suggestion is to make Burkburnett realize fires in terms that would hit the pocketbook as well as the heart.

Getting Ready To House Birds

This is the time when many poultry raisers should be thinking about housing their birds for the fall and winter. Housing is an important task, one which requires plenty of preparation. If the job is done well, it means the poultry raiser has taken the first step toward achieving high winter egg production and toward giving his flock the protection it needs against disease.

Make Necessary Repairs
The first step in preparing for housing is to make whatever repairs are necessary in the laying house. Plugging up cracks and crevices, replacing broken windows, and nailing down loose boards will help eliminate drafts. Examine the roof for any necessary repairs. Give the entire building a thorough going over and make a list of the things that will have to be done and

the materials you will need to complete the repair work.

When the house is in good repair, take all moveable equipment outside and give it a thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Then allow it to dry in the sun.

Remove all loose litter and droppings with shovel and broom. Now take a hoe and give the floor and roosting pits a thorough scraping. Sweep the ceilings, walls, nests and floors, eliminating all cob webs, dust, and other filth.

Clean and Disinfect

Next, scrub the floor and roost areas with hot water and strong soap. And while the interior of the house is still damp, spray the walls, floor, and fixtures with a reliable disinfectant. Then allow the house to air and dry.

Now you're ready to place litter on the floor. Many poultrymen cover the floor with a thin layer of sand before adding the litter. This practice, they say, prevents litter from sticking. Select a dry, absorbent litter, and scatter it about the floor. Litter should be about 2 or 3 inches deep. Continue to add litter, as required during the season.

After litter has been placed in the house, put all equipment in position and get ready to bring the birds off the range.

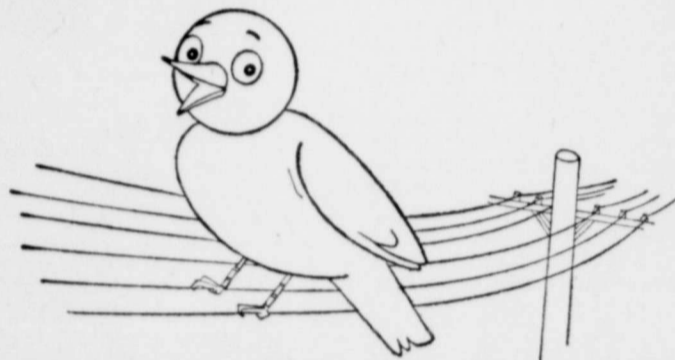

Social Security Payments May Be Raised

Hundreds of retired workers in this area stand a chance of getting their social security retirement payments raised, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security office, reported today.

Social Security Act amendments, passed some months ago, make certain changes in the way the amount for a retired worker is figured. Since the amendments do not provide for a general or automatic increase, Tate explained, amounts already being paid will be refigured only on request. In some instances, no increase

will be due; in others, the increase will be small. Some applicants, though, if they ask us to recheck their claims, will realize a gain of several dollars per month, he continued.

Workers who filed their original claims as soon as they became 65 and who did not go back to work are not affected. All others now drawing retirement checks which were figured before 1947 should have their claims rechecked if they have not already done so.

Tate extended a special invitation to come in and talk it over to the following groups:

Those who waited some months or years after they were 65 before filing their claim. Claimants in this group who continued working up until the time their claim was filed may or may not get an increase. Those who did not work during this time or who worked on non-covered jobs likely will be eligible for larger amounts.

Those who returned to work after filing their claims. People in this group should get in touch with the social security office as soon as they retire.

Full information and, of course free assistance is available at the nearest office of the Social Security Administration. The office in Wichita Falls is located at 412 Federal Building.
