1,910 pounds of seed cotton ginned 565 pounds of lint and 850 pounds of seed. This first bale was picked on the Troy Mills farm, from about four acres of land formerly occupied by the Burk Airport, just East of the

city limits.

Mont Bowles, buying cotton for G. D. Crockett, purchased the cotton for 32 cents per pound. The gin made no charge for the ginning, and a \$25.00 check was given Mr. Mills by the Chamber of Commerce for the first bale.

Most cotton in this area is in full bloom now, but beginning to suffer because of the lack of rain. A good rain now would assure a fair crop, otherwise the yield may be small this year.

Stories appear in print about criminals who, when facing death, profess a deep faith, cry against a misunderstanding world. Death bed repentance may be the salvation of a soul. A man may not be lost who acknowledges his wrongs. However, hysteria, an appeal for public favor, is the basis for some emotional outbursts. This is especially true when it is an appeal for sympathy to get out of paying a debt to society. We must find the answer in our hearts

Take the case of those who stress past goodness to excuse a crime of the present. For instance, a certain Congressman who was judged guilty of grafting \$50 thousand on war orders, pleaded for a light sentence because of leading an upstanding life, of not smoking and drinking, of teaching Sunday School. We had the case of a woman who enslaved a Negro maid for 40 years and because this woman was a "good devout Christian in all other ways," her sentence was suspended. What we mean by being a Christian causes the best minds to fumble for the right answer. One man's conception may not be his neighbor's, and both may be right. Do we excuse a man because he doesn't smoke or find his crime less because he taught Sunday School. Can a woman be a good, devout Christian and impose slavery on another? The opinions on this topic are varied and heated.

Select Laying Birds Carefully

There is no place in the laying nouse for an unprofitable egg producer. Such birds will only consume valuable feed and take up room needed by their more prolific sister - without paying for their keep.

When the time comes to select the pullets which will comprise your laying flocks, remember that every poor layer you choose will lower the efficiency of the flock as a whole

The type of bird to select is one which will come into production early, will maintain a good laying record throughout the winter and will continue to lay well into the summer. There is no assurance that every pullet you select will equal this standard. However, there are certain markings and



The birds you will want to keep are those with well developed heads, long broad backs, long keel bones, and fleshy breasts.

After the pullets have been housed and the flock has reached about 25 per cent production, begin culling the poor layers. Here are some of the tell-tale markings to look for.

Pigmentation - Non-layers of yellow skinned breeds have yellow pigment in the beak, shanks, vent, eye ring and sometimes the ear lobes. These parts are bleached or faded if the bird is a good producer.





> Possessions are a trust from God, and we shall have to render an account of our stewardship.

Just because we have given a certain percentage of our income to Christian causes is no reason to think we shall meet with divine well and good, but what about the other nine-tenths? Is God pleased

I. The Vanity of Wealth (Eccles. 5:10, 11).

IN ANY study of wealth, it seems necessary to begin with an understanding of its limitations. We live in a world in which men frequently lay great importance on possessions, and indeed, there are many things which wealth can purchase. On the other hand, there are some things that money cannot buy. And further, we should recognize that our possessions are not eternal, that they may suddenly

The passage here reminds us of the fact that wealth for wealth's sake is bound to be a disappointment. The man who loves silver shall not be satisfied with silver. any more than the man who loves pleasure shall be satisfied with pleasure. Augustine was right when he said that man could be satisfied with no less than God himself.

Notice how accurately the picture is drawn. If we have increased wealth, we have increased responsibility (v. 11). That fact is as unalterable as the most rigid law we know. The only advantage is, as the Preacher expresses it, the beholding of goods with the eye-not a very great advantage after all. II. The Proper Accumulation of

Wealth (Prov. 16:8). IT IS just as true as when Solomon wrote it, that "Better is a little, with righteousness, than

great revenues with injustice." This statement needs no argument, needs no proof. If we would have the honor of men, self-respect, and the blessing of God, there is no alternative.

III. The Improper Accumulation of Wealth (James 5:1-6).

THE apostle James speaks of a condition that will obtain in the last days (v. 3). There are many evidences that the condition he describes has had altogether too

many fulfillments in recent history. James excoriates the rich who have defrauded their employees in order that they might fare sumptuously and live riotously. These unscrupulous rich have taken advantage because they were not resisted (v. 6). Such wealth is corrupted.

Notice once again that the result of their sin will rise to break them. It is a serious thing to trifle with sin, to eat the bread of iniquity. God has no patience with injustice in social relationships. Sooner or later judgment will






