### THE NICKEL IS BACK

We all remark about the high price of food. In some cities the women's clubs use the telephone to contact all housewives and ask them to buy less of meat, butter, eggs, to effect a buyer's strike. Seems that everyone is disturbed and most of us talking about it. So, when we pick up the paper and read the announcement of the U. S. mint, that the nickel had returned, we felt something was wrong. They don't mean that the nickel is back to being worth five cents, but that the nickel is home again. During the war the need of nickel, less copper and some manganese. Before the war the nickel was 25 per cent nickel and 75 per cent copper and 9 per cent manganese. The disadvantage was in the yellowlike color the coin assumed because of the oxidation of the silver. and sanitary and that they are constructed so that the birds are unable to contact the accumulated droppings underneath the boards. It's a good idea to remove the droppings at frequent intervals.

Waterers should be clean, and there should be enough of them so that there is no crowding among birds trying to drink. Disinfect the waterers and feeders at regularly scheduled times. Plan to use a reliable drinking water antiseptic in the water to keep down bacterial growth.

Make a special effort to keep every part of the laying house sanitary. You yourself may be guilty of spreading disease when you enter the house with dirty boots or bring in contaminated feed sacks, crates, or other material.

Make sure there are no cold drafts in the building for they may weaken the birds, lessening their resistance to respiratory or other ailments. At the same time the ventilation should be good enough to insure that there is plenty of fresh air at all times.

International Scout Jamboree Helped World Brotherhood

Home Folks Letter No. 5 August 21, 1947 To Parents of Boys Attending The World Jamboree:

Our personal "foreign correspondents" at the World Jamboree have sent some informative letters to the Home Office the past few days. I know you will be interested in reading what they have to say.

**Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell—**  
"The Jamboree, so far as we are concerned, is going over. Our boys are well—Dysentery here and there but no real sickness and we are halfway thru. The French are doing their best to make the "Jam" a success. The food in the main is plentiful."

**Mrs. Jean Ball—**  
(Mrs. Ball is Public Relations Director for the American Delegation at the Jamboree).  
"I've zigged and zagged 'round the world of Scouting—so thrilled than on I wandered, regardless of fatigue or time—what an experience!"  
"Would that you could have stood with me Sunday along the Grand Concourse and joined some 20,000 Scouts in "The Lord's Prayer" and later "America." Then we watched as they streamed out of the huge bowl—four abreast for miles, each national group flying its flag; Scouts singing or whistling; and Scouts (at attention as foreign flags passed. I, for one, saw it through blurred eyes and my heart prayed that I was seeing future peacemakers for surely they were strong and fine enough to meet such a challenge. And as the last group stepped smartly by—I heard those Irish (and kilted) lads whistling, "Onward, Christian Soldiers"—somehow, my prayer seemed answered!"

"There is a tremendous underlying purpose that I sense—a determination to prove that living together happily is a present possibility. There's an earnestness as well as gaiety, a real effort to know the other fellow as well as possible. There is more than a 'swapping' of equipment and gadgets. There is an exchange of thoughts and experiences. One American group is giving all of its equipment away the last day to those signing up

for it but there are less tangible mementos changing hands too. "The bits of conversation I have overheard as I take a picture or hesitate to absorb the scene, are priceless. The New England Scout who gasped (after I thanked his gang for a snapshot) 'Gee, she speaks English.' The little 'limey' who poked his head out of the tent flap and chirped 'hello lady.' The Algerian Scout who confided in me of his homesickness. And the constant obligato of 'Jamborendo'—the camp language of English, French, and arms and legs. What memories.

"You will hear the details of varying standards of perfection in camping. Let me assure you that while there are lots of new ideas our boys can learn about making things do with a minimum—still they are the cleanest ones there. Their uniforms are not colorful or picturesque by comparison but they do stand out for being neat and clean even though they are not 100% official, what with berets, fezes, plaid neckerchiefs, etc., having been added.

"I have been having a gay time becoming better acquainted with Paris. And I quickly became the Paris agent for Boy Scout Headquarters—doing odd jobs from buying nail files to booking flight passages and getting visas. So I feel I have a little part in this glorious reunion of boys with a purpose.

I would also like to quote to you a release about the official closing of the Sixth World Boy Scout Jamboree as given by Robert Ahier, United Staff Correspondent:

Moisson, France, August 18, 1947  
"The Sixth World Boy Scout Jamboree was officially closed tonight as 30,000 boys representing 42 nations took part in a huge parade which followed the lines of the 'Carrick Knot,' emblem of the Jamboree. Closing ceremonies were held in the big arena on the edge of Moisson Forest Camp where the boys have been camped for more than a week. Scouts, wearing the official garb of their nation's organization, marched in two lines across the 4,000 square meter arena, up and down ramps to follow the lines of the two pieces of rope used in tying the old sailor's knot. With banners waving overhead and led by bands of all descriptions—the contingent from Scotland had its famous kilted bagpipe band—the ceremony presented a colorful finale to the 'Jamboree of Peace.' In another spectacle of the

closing ceremony, approximately 2,000 Scouts of all nations participated in 'Demonstration of World Solidarity.' In this demonstration, Scouts passed a huge air-filled ball which represented the world overhead from hand to hand. As the huge ball passed each delegation, Scouts attached their national flag to the ropes around the sphere. At the conclusion of the ceremony, the 'World' was placed in front of the tribunal where it was guarded by an honor guard of one Scout from each nation. To end the spectacle, 'devils' in black clothes and top hats tried to rush and besmear the 'World' but were frustrated by the guard which rolled the ball over the attackers.

"The closing address was made by Col. John S. Wilson, Director of the International Scout Bureau, who thanked the Host Nation, France, for the reception the Scouts received at the Jamboree. Wilson also said that the most important part of the Jamboree has been the contact which you boys have made among yourselves. 'Scouts, you gave a good account of yourselves at this Jamboree,' he said, 'now continue to do well in day-by-day Scouting.' General Joseph Lafont, Chief French Scout, presented the leader of each delegation with a plaque as a keep-

sake of the International gathering. In a short address, he complimented them on their behavior."

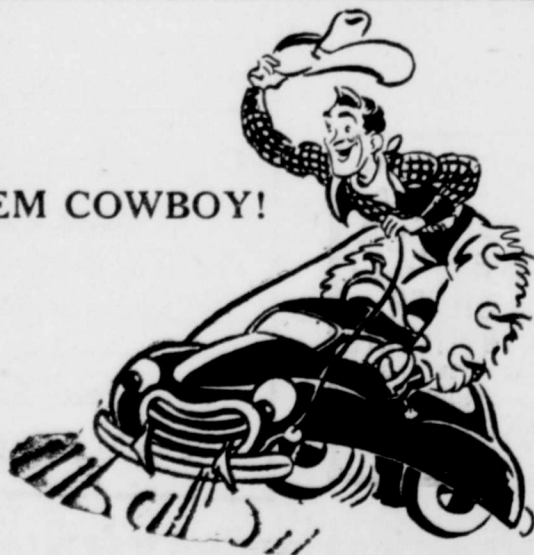

**Disease Is  
Prevention, Too**

Heart disease is now the leading cause of death among Americans, with 14,000 deaths each day, and is second only to cancer in its importance. The importance of its prevention is well established. No one is immune from it. We do know, how-

ever, some of the danger signals and with the physician's accurate diagnosis some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented. Exposure of frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in

the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows, or wrists. The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever. According to Dr. Cox the best safeguard against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present a doctor should be consulted at once, and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.

**District News Items Soil Conservation**

Several cooperators of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District are preparing land for sowing Alfalfa. Graded Borders were run this week on Ben Richards farm. He plans to construct borders and level between each border before planting alfalfa. Borders have run on approximately 150 acres of Rufus King farm North of Kamay.

Approximately five and one-half miles of terraces were completed on R. W. Ramming farm of Clara Community the past week. Norb Zimmerman has completed two and one-fourth mile of terraces on Van Lesley farm. Others in process of construction of terraces are Clyde Bryant, Elvie Wellborn, Henry Vaughn and Frieda Nieman.

Terracing alone will not improve fertility of soil but is one of first steps to take in installing a conservative program on any farm. The following of a crop rotation that includes a Legume such as Vetch, Austrian Winter Peas and Clover is an important step forward in soil improvement.

The following Cooperation harvested Vetch seed last spring, John Storey, E. O. Mullins, M. T. Riley and Van Lesley of West Burk Conservation Group. The yields run from 200 to 300 pounds. At present the seed is selling for \$20.00 per hundred pounds. J. A. Looney on S. B. Marchant farm of Barwise Conservation group harvested 6,000 pounds. The above Vetch seed growers are planning to plant more Vetch seed this fall. Vetch is well adapted to sandy soils, very cold resistant, offers good grazing and an excellent soil improver.
