City Utilities Bills Are Higher For October First

Many customers of City Utiliare in many cases higher than Those who heard Mr. Sartin they were on August first or they owe for approximately fifteen days that do not appear onthe current bill.

A little reasoning will convince anyone that it would be an impossibility to read all the meters and mail the bills in one or two days. Meters are read on about the fifteenth of each month. From the fifteenth to the last of the month the readings have to be posted on the ledger, cards addressed and ledger readings transferred to the cards. Then they are ready for mailing.

Going back to the period of June 15 to July 15 and coming up to August 15 to September 15, the overall picture explains high bills on October first. According to D. C. McNeill, Water Supt., more water was pumped August 15-September 15 than any time during the past hot summer. June July period only 11,871,000 gallons came into town. For July-August the amount climbed to 13187,000. Seems that should have been the peak for the summer, but it wasn't. From August 15 to September 15, which covers the October first statements, an alltime record high of 14,462,000 gallons of water was consumed in Burkburnett. That is 2,591,000 gallons more than was used in a like period in what we usually consider summertime.

The same pattern held true in the use of City electricity. July 15 to August 15, 277,288 KW Hrs. kept lights and electrical appliances humming. From August 15 to September 15, it took 279,782 KW's to do the same job.

THE NICKEL IS BACK

We all remark about the high price of food. In some cities the women's clubs use the telephone to contact all housewives and ask them to buy less of meat, butter, eggs, to effect a buyer's strike. Seems that everyone is disturbed and most of us talking about it. So, when we pick up the paper and read the announcement of the U.S. mint, that the nickel had returned, we felt something was wrong. They don't mean that the nickel is back to being worth five cents, but that the nickel nickel is home again. During the war the need of nickel, less copper and some maganese. We may be color blind so far as the vellowness of the coin is concerned, but we can see that the return to more nickel in the nickel isn't as bright as if they had found a way to bring back the prewar buying power of that piece of change.

PREVENT THOSE WINTER DISEASES

As fall housing time approachs, it would be well for poultry raisers to plan ahead with a view of setting a workable and efficient disease prevention program for the coming period of confinement. During fall and winter the average laying house may become a breeding ground for disease and parasites. Through the cold weather months, the birds will be living under crowded conditions, cooped up in an enclosure that often is either ventilated poorly or is drafty and cold

A Health Problem

The very fact that confined chickens always live in congestion (by human standards, at any rate) create a health problem in

What are some of the things which may be done to encourage better health in your laying flock. First, see that your flock is not too crowded. Allow for at least

four square feet of floor space per bird for heavy breeds and three square feet for light breeds. Keep the litter dry and clean, removing when damp and adding clean litter periodically. Stir it

See that the roosts are clean

lated droppings underneath the move the droppings at frequent intervals. Waterers should be clean, and

there should be enough of them so that there is no crowding among birds trying to drink. Disinfect the waterers and feeders at regularly scheduled times Plan to use a reliable drinking water antiseptic in the water to seep down bacterial growth.

Make a special effort to keep every part of the laying house boots or bring in contaminated feed sacks, crates, or other ma-
