Final tribute was paid Monday to one of Burkburnett's most prominent merchants at the First Methodist Church here at 4 p. m. W. S. "Billy" Boyd, 59, and resident of this city for 24 years, died suddenly at 1 A. M. Sunday, apparently the victim of a heart attack.

Boyd, a native of Taylor, Texas was born August 5, 1888, and was married to Miss Agnes Ncedham in 1922. They have one son, Billy. He moved to Burkburnett in 1923, and had been associated with three brothers in the Boyd Bros. general merchandise store, as manager of the grocery department. He was a member of the First Methodist Church, Men's Bible Class, and the Odd Fellow lodge.

Rev. T. Herbert Minga, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was officiant for the service. Rev. Minga took his scripture reading from the 1st Psalms, Mr. Boyd's favorite Bible passage.

Interment in the Burkburnett cemetery, was under the direction of the Owens & Brumley Funeral Home. Graveside services were conducted by the Odd Fellows.

He is survived by his widow, one son, W. E. Boyd, a student at John Tarleton College, Stephenville; three brothers, Tom, Jimmie and Charlie Boyd, all of Burkburnett, and one sister, Mrs. Ethel Hartman, of Austin, Texas.

Pallbearers were Vernon Thornton, W. W. Chambers, Avan Fields, Joe Nichols, Jobie Dunn, and Lonnie Edwards. Honorary pallbearers included members of the Men's Bible class of the First Methodist church.

### Merry-Go-Round At City Park Will Be Kids' Paradise When Completed

A visit to the City Park on S. Avenue D will bring surprises to those who have not been down that way the past week or so.

Assisted by a \$1,000.00 donation from the Chamber of Commerce, the City has been able to make lasting improvements to the recreation center, which had been neglected for many years.

Everything that has been done shows careful planning. Accommodations have been arranged to give park visitors modern facilities conveniently arranged.

A partial list of the improvements made thus far includes 9 swings (seat) and 2 (hand); 1 hand-walker, and 2 slides for the kiddies. A drinking fountain (with step for kiddies) is conveniently located. Five hydrants make water available from any point in the park. Three small barbecue pits with water and tables close by. One large barbecue pit, covered, will accommodate a large party of picnickers. For cooking beans, an outdoor cooker with washpot and everything is waiting.

Modern, sanitary rest rooms are situated on the Northwest corner of the park.

A concrete band stand will be good for small programs.

One thing that will impress the visitor is the permanency of all improvements. Tables and benches are made of reinforced concrete.

Fifteen floodlights furnish plenty of illumination for night visitors.

So far as children are concerned, the greatest attraction is still under construction—A Merry-Go-Round. A real Merry-Go-Round turned by an electric motor. P. A. Wiggins, City Manager, has given much thought to the planning of this thriller for the kiddies. It had to be something absolutely fool-proof, and something that would make it practically impossible for a child to get hurt. The Merry-Go-Round is fifteen feet in diameter. It will accommodate 40 to 50 children at one time. It will turn so slow that even the little kids may get on and off while its going and run no risk of hurting themselves. Present plans are to run the Merry-Go-Round constantly when several children are in the park and want to ride.

When there is a shortage of corn, when corn prices are high, when the farmer feeds his cattle high priced corn, the price of meat rises. There have been varied reports of conditions in Europe, some showing a worse condition than others. Some countries haven't made the best use of their food we do know. That there are millions who are hungry and will face starvation this winter, we don't deny. That these countries can't afford to buy our higher priced foods, is understandable. Something must be done. Those who favor compulsory food rationing, realize it can't be affected without an act of Congress. That takes a long time. There are those who prefer the voluntary rationing of food, which could be effective at once, without the process of red tape and Congressional entanglements. During World War I, we observed meatless and wheatless days each week. Cities have now inaugurated a meatless day or two each week. It is proof that when Americans feel something is worthy and necessary they don't need a law.

## Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)  
**FOWL CHOLERA TIME IS HERE**

Fowl cholera, one of the most deadly of poultry diseases, occurs in all domestic fowls and many free-flying birds. It is most prevalent during the fall and winter among flocks of laying age. It rarely is seen in brooder chicks. You may suspect cholera when

birds suddenly die in their nests or on the roosts without previously displaying symptoms of any kind. Sometimes the disease kills so quickly that the first indication that cholera has broken out comes when the poultry raiser finds up to two per cent of his flock dead when he enters the laying house in the morning.

Birds which linger for a few days after becoming infected by cholera organisms will display these symptoms: sudden listlessness, ruffled feathers, loss of appetite, green or yellow diarrhea, and a dark purple or blue color

in the comb, wattles, face, and throat.

Cholera also appears as a chronic infection which may localize to form abscesses in various body parts, inflammation and swelling of the joints, infection of the middle ear, edema of the wattles, or infection of the nasal cavities. In the chronic form affected birds lose flesh gradually and become thin and poor before dying.

These symptoms all are suggestive of fowl cholera, but to get a positive diagnosis, the poultry raiser should consult a poultry specialist who is qualified to identify the disease by microscopic examination.

Since cholera is highly infec-

tious, good sanitation is important both as a preventative and as a control measure. Keep the laying house interior and equipment clean. Disinfect frequently. The yard and runs should be kept as clean as possible also, and should the soil become contaminated with droppings containing cholera organisms, it may be necessary to remove the birds until the soil has been purified by the sun, wind, and rain.
