Chillicothe Loses To Burk, 26 to 0

With Fewin's smashing center plunges leading the way, the Burkburnett Bulldogs roared to a 26 to 0 victory over the visiting Chillicothe Eagles here last Friday night in a 12-A district conference tilt. Fewin's center plunges netted 19 of the Bulldogs 26 points.

Midway through the first quarter, the Bulldogs took a punt on the Chillicothe 32 and drove to the 6-yard line in two plays. From the 6, Fewin crashed through center for the initial tally.

In the third period, Fewin hit center again, crashing through from the visitors' 28 and striding over for the second touchdown, then plunged center for the extra point.

Later in the same period, Fewin snatched an Eagle pass on the Chillicothe 40 and raced to the 9 yard line, from where Gragg hit center for the tally. Gragg crashed center again for the extra point.

In the fourth period, Edwards intercepted a pass on the visitors' 45 and returned it to the 20. Three plays later, the plunging Fewin smashed center to go over from the 11 yard stripe.

Kaiser-Frazer Corp. Produces 16,535 Cars For Monthly High

Steadily climbing toward its goal of 1500 to 2,000 cars a day, Kaiser-Frazer Corp. produced 16,535 automobiles in September and highlighted the month by shipping its 100,000th automobile.

The 16,535 September record, according to Edgar F. Kaiser, vice president and general manager, is a 28 per cent increase over August's total of 12,874. The October schedule is set at 18,000 units.

K-F's production for the year now totals 91,825. This places the Willow Run firm ahead of all other independents and several divisions of the "Big Three" in passenger car production for the first three quarters of 1947.

to crime. Not that everyone who is ugly wants to become a bad man, but from a physiological standpoint, such handicaps tend to make an individual an absurdity, a point for crude jokes, called insulting nick names, making them feel different from society and an object of ridicule. When this happens to children, it often leads to delinquency, and child delinquents often become adult criminals. After a series of 376 operations upon penitentiary cases, he had only 0.9 per cent of such cases coming back as repeaters in crime. This is unusual. We have known that deformity or physical defect as ugliness, causes inferiority complexes, so it is logical that such might be blamed for crime causes.

These facts give us something to think about, inasmuch as it is possible, with the advice of science, to correct, improve and eliminate physical handicaps as deformities and ugliness. If this could be possible when occurring in childhood, it may be a relief to society and a veritable godsend to the affected individual.

 When the first bridge over Niagara Falls was planned in 1848, the problem of getting a cable from the American to the Canadian side was solved by offering \$5 to the first person who could make a kite carry a string across the 800-foot chasm.
 After this had been accomplished by a boy, the string was used to pull over a small steel cable which, for several years, enabled persons to go back and forth, two at a time, in a little wire basket. The original steel suspension bridge thrown across the river just below the American falls had a span of 820 feet, and was long considered to be a feat of engineering.

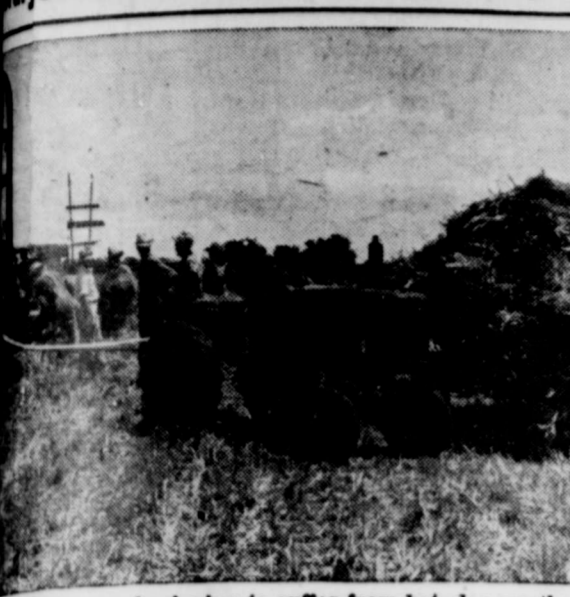

In other demonstrations in the Southwest, such crops as corn that is beginning to fire, sorghums including Sudan grass, and Johnson grass are going into the temporary silos. One farmer even used surplus potatoes obtained through the Commodity Credit Corporation to make silage for his dairy herd.

County agricultural extension agents can advise on correct methods of making temporary silos and filling them. Dairy specialists are urging that quick action on storing forage be taken to help relieve probable feed shortages this winter.

Greyhound Racing A Growing Sport

Numerous Kennels Throughout Country Provide Stock for Track Use

Greyhound racing, which in England and Ireland lures more patrons than horse racing or any other sporting activity, is fast coming to the front in this country as a major sports attraction, according to the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

At the present time there are 18 dog tracks in operation in the United States, and over 500 racing kennels whose dogs appear at these tracks. Owned by approximately 2,500 fanciers, around 6,000 Greyhounds are in training at all times, with an equal number of breeding animals and youngsters at home in the kennels.

Breeding fine racing Greyhounds oftentimes has proven a profitable occupation. Well-bred pups bring high prices—\$500 to \$1,500, and exceptionally promising young stock has brought as much as \$3,500. Most of today's racing Greyhounds are raised in the West by farmers who breed a litter or two a year as a hobby or sideline to their regular farming activities. Recent years have seen the establishment of numerous elaborate kennels built for the express purpose of raising racing Greyhounds. While breeding activities are centered in the Middle West and West, Massachusetts has in the past years come to the fore as a breeding state and now produces around 1,000 racing dogs every year.

same forebears, as they are almost all of the same general bloodlines. The names of famous Greyhounds of the past appear in the pedigrees over and over again, making racing Greyhounds practically all one large loosely-knit family. One of the best-known racing dogs of the past century, whose name appears in many Greyhound family trees, was Master McGrath, an Irish dog. His picture was stamped on Irish coins, and a memorial statue of him was erected in Ireland. A name which shows in the pedigrees of nearly 65 per cent of modern coursing dogs is that of Mutton Cutler, another Irish dog, and a prolific sire of racing champions. The outstanding American sire of today is Never Roll, who stands at the top of the current list of sires of track winners.

Greyhound track racing started in this country about 1906. The invention of the electric rabbit by Owen Patrick Smith gave the sport its first genuine impetus. Smith promoted racing meets throughout the West, and at Emeryville, California, in 1919 the first really successful meeting was held. By 1926 dog racing had achieved national prominence and its sponsors were reaping handsome financial rewards. After Smith's death in 1927, Greyhound racing fell into the controlling hands of an unsavory group who all but ruined the sport. Although the dishonest element has long since been banished, dog racing still suffers the effects of this unfortunate period. Conducted under state sanction and supervised by state appointed regulatory bodies Greyhound racing is actually one of the cleanest and fairest of all American sports, the Center states
