WHAT IS SCOUTING?

want to take time here to give a picture of what
is, in order that Church leaders may see clearly
it fits into what the Church is doing for its boys.
Scouting covers the three programs — Cub
for boys nine to eleven; Boy Scouting for boys
fifteen; and Senior Scouting for young men who
and older.

Scouting idea originated in 1907 with Baden-
Powell when he was serving as an Officer of the British
Army. Service — in boy language, "doing things
for people" — was a new note in working with boys,
and remained one of the distinctive features of
Scouting. This idea of service to others brought into play
the spirit of the creed and practices of the Knights of
St. George.

The spirit of Scouting is latent in the heart of every
boy. Scouting helps to give direction to the desire of
boys to do worthwhile things and to make some-
thing of themselves. Through Scouting the boy is helped
to the great heritage which the past has brought to
the life and ideals of America. It points the way to
citizenship through service; not only getting but also
not receiving but giving back something that will,
as Baden-Powell said, "make the world better because of our
part in it." Add to that the religious emphasis and
ideals which recognize the need for the fulfill-
ment of one's duty to God — and you have the ingredients
of Scouting reaches its goal of helping to develop
character in boys and trains them for citizenship
and democracy.

Artificial Light Boosts Laying

By mid October the day light hours have decreased to the point at which egg production suffers unless the poultryman uses artificial lighting in his laying house. To offset the effect of short fall and winter days many poultry raisers equip their poultry houses with electric lights and turn them on either early in the morning or at dusk, or both. Enough morn-

ing or evening lighting to account for a 13 or 14 hour day is considered about right by most raisers of poultry, and experience has borne out that this probably strikes about the right balance between feeding time and roosting time.

Help Birds Thrive

Lighting is an important factor because it helps maintain proper body weight, tends to hasten maturity for late hatched pullets, and has the effect of bringing breeders back into production—all these in addition to lengthening the daily laying period. In the case of early pullets which begin to lay in June or July, artificial lighting is sometimes used when the birds' body weight cannot be maintained by

known feeding methods. Usually molting will appear earlier in a flock housed without lights than in one provided with lighting equipment. Flocks of high production birds have been kept at 50 per cent production or better for 12 or 15 months by the use of lights.

Alarm Clock System

Most poultrymen find that the most satisfactory lighting method is to turn the lights on at

about 3 a. m. Usually this is done by the alarm clock system or some similar method.

Under the evening lighting plan birds get up at dawn and lights are turned on until 7 p. m. or as long as is necessary to make a 13 or 14 hour day.

Morning or evening lighting should be discontinued when the days become longer in the spring.

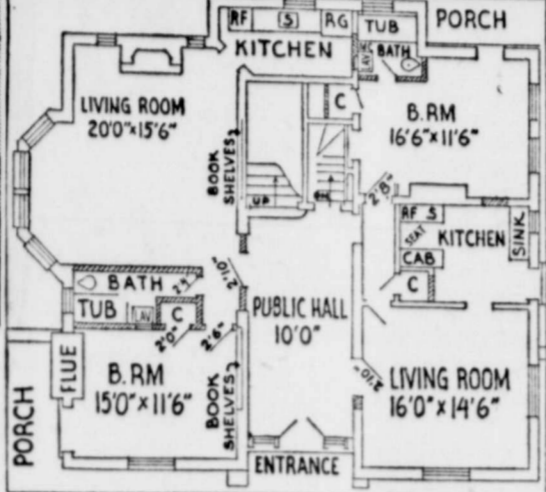

Conversion of Old Homes Offers Easy Way to Provide Rental Housing

Projects being carried out in Montclair, N. J., are demonstrating the fastest and most economical way to provide rental housing for veterans is by converting existing single family homes into apartments.

Mr. Snyder and Mr.

"In continuing our program for veterans housing, we are financing the remodeling with FHA insured loans under the provisions of Title I. Our experience shows that veterans prefer to rent an apartment in one of our homes rather than live in a conventional apartment house. They have ample space for outdoor recreation for themselves and their children, and they can indulge in their hobbies as in a home of their own."

Low Rent for Apartments

Apartment rents have been maintained at a low level, averaging slightly more than \$60 a month. A 4 1/2 room apartment, consisting of a spacious living room with a fireplace, two bedrooms, a modern kitchen and bath rents for \$52 a month, including gas, electricity and water. The apartment is one of six in a former 14-room single family home which retains its "look" of a private residence. The house has an acre of landscaped ground

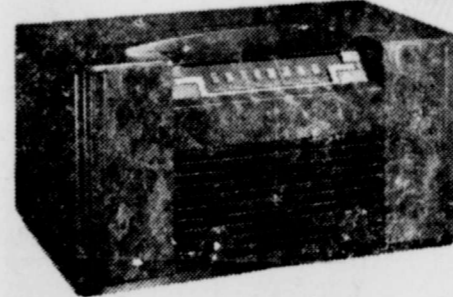
