Five Millionth Maytag Washer

Newton, Iowa—The 5 millionth washer made by the Maytag Company since its first was manufactured in 1907 came off the assembly line here recently.

To celebrate the occasion, 100 guests from various parts of the country were invited to participate with Gov. Robert D. Blue, of Iowa, heading the list. President Fred L. Maytag, II, grandson of the late founder of the company and, like his grandfather, a member of the Iowa Senate, hosted a luncheon following completion of the 5 millionth washer.

The company's 1 millionth washer was produced in 1927, 20 years after the first; the 2 millionth in 1932, the third in 1936 and the fourth in 1941, shortly before the concern suspended all washer manufacturing for the duration of the war.

Burk Loses First Football Game of The 1947 Season

Courage alone is not enough to win a foot ball game. The little Bulldogs had plenty of it when they came up against the big boys from Olney. On paper the Dogs won, but a look at them after the game and a look at the score board told another story. They played their hearts out, but they met more than their equal. Olney knew they had been to a ball game too, but 200 pounders can dish out more than 150 pounders can take.

The Olney Cubs staged an 80-yard downfield drive late in the fourth period last Friday night on the local field to pull their 12-A district game out of the fire and defeat a fighting pack of Burkburnett Bulldogs, 19-13.

The Cubs ran up two quick touchdowns in the opening period but saw the Bulldogs come back in the second and fourth to go ahead, 13-12, on the basis of an after-touchdown point.

Olney took the kickoff after the last Burkburnett score and marched right on to victory. One gain after another put the ball on the 1-yard line where Dishman, quarterback, ramed over center and Burris, halfback, kicked goal for the winning scores.

Olney's first two scores came before the game was very old. From their own 35 the Cubs worked down to Burkburnett's 28 where Burris skirted left end to tally. A 25-yard pass, Bearrow to Perkins that put the ball on the 10 set us the second Cub touchdown. Burris ramed over from the six.

In the second stanza, the Bulldogs when from their own 20 to the Cub 1 on a march and Fewin went over to score but missed the extra point try. Early in the fourth Burkburnett recovered an Olney fumble on the 33 and drove to the 10 where Brown split the center of the Olney line to go over and then hit center again for the extra point.

That put Burkburnett ahead, but Olney took the kickoff and marched to victory.

The Bulldogs had 13 first downs to 12 for Olney and gained 222 yards rushing to 172 for the Cubs.

The Bulldogs go to Holiday Friday night for their last scheduled game of the season.

Burkburnett has lost one game and tied one. Olney has lost none and tied none, but have two more conference games to play.

This colorful group has performed many times since its organization. Last summer they were at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, to participate in a rodeo celebration.

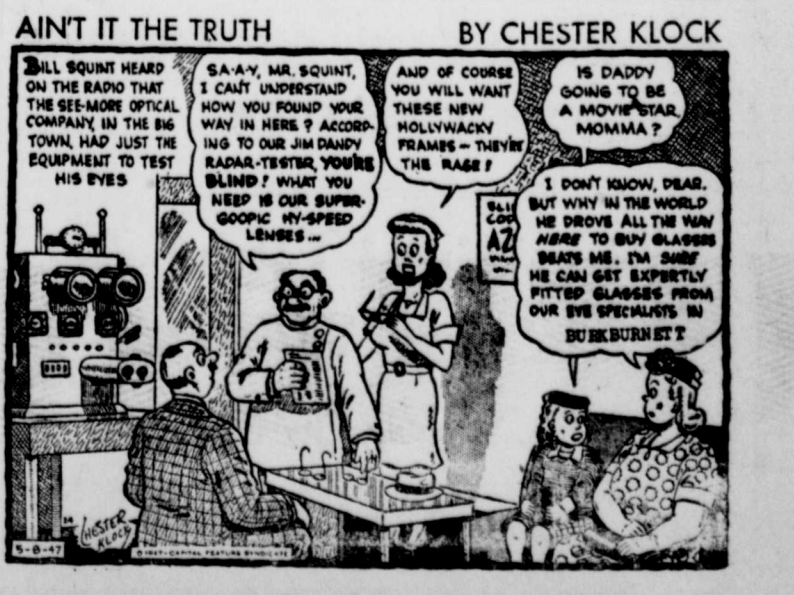
Mrs. John McGarvy Honored On Her Birthday Thursday

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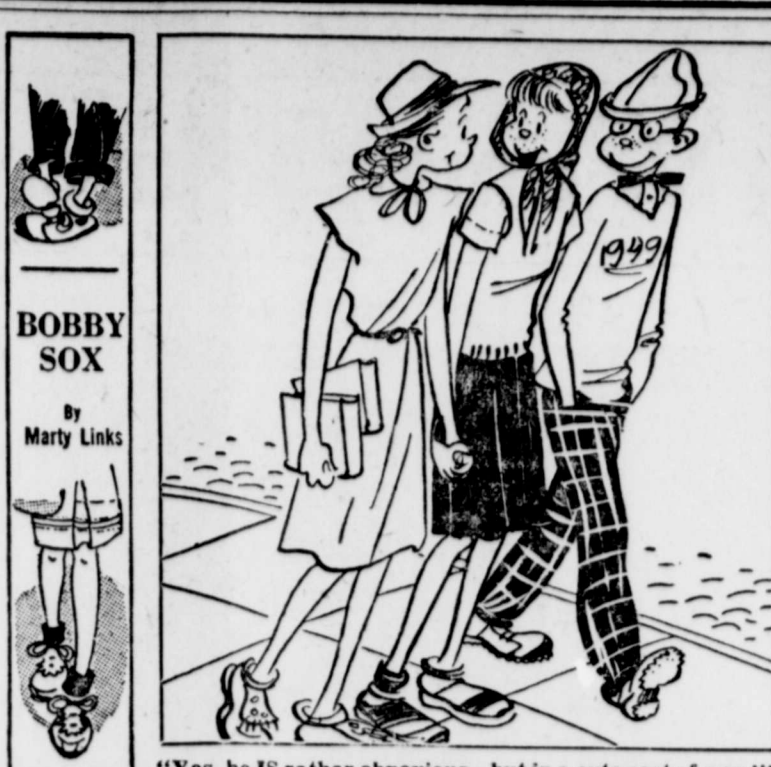

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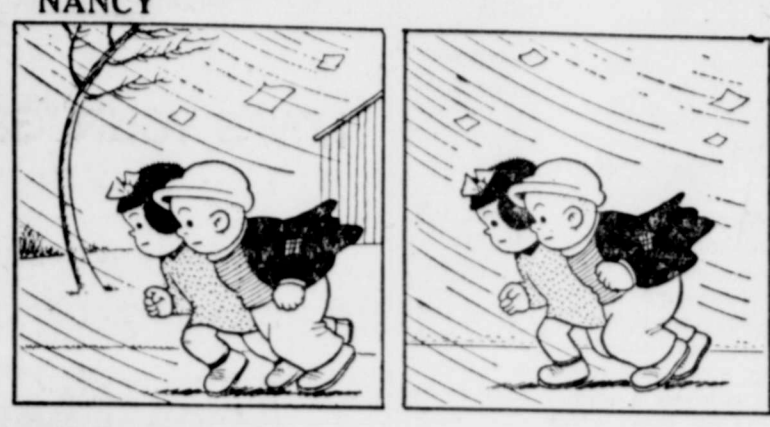
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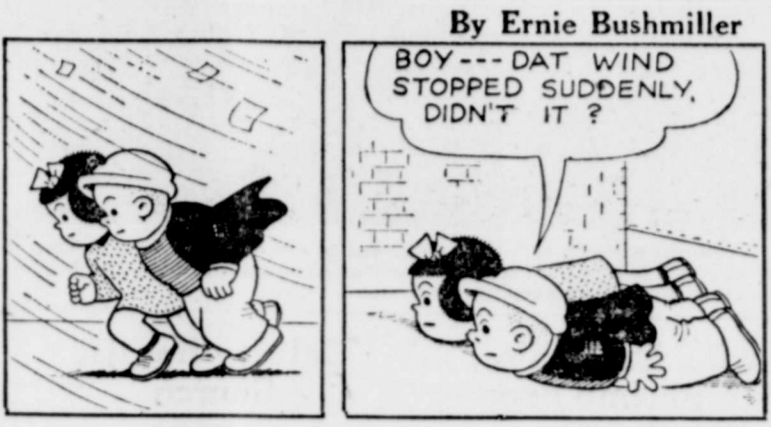

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Big Four Meet Awaited With Gloom; Grain Men Ask 'Speculation' Probe; Congress Hears Aid Fund Request

BIG FOUR: Pessimism

With the imminence of the most vital international occurrence of recent months—the Big Four foreign ministers meeting in London on November 25—the mood surrounding the coming conference was predominantly one of pessimism.

That there was much justification for such pessimism, no one doubted. When the chief representatives of the U. S., Great Britain, France and Russia come together they will tackle the tough, deadlocked problems of writing peace treaties for Germany and Austria.

Nevertheless, sentiment has been rising in the U. S. favoring such an action if the Soviets refuse to cooperate in straightening out the problems of Germany.

INVITATION: Grain Battle Three of the nation's major grain exchanges, smarting under President Truman's accusation that their "speculation" is responsible for prevailing high prices of cereals, have carried the attack into the enemy camp by requesting a special congressional investigation by the joint committee on the economic report.

RED CZECHS: Go Communist Add Czechoslovakia to the list of Communist-dominated nations in Eastern Europe.

HUGHES AND CRIES: Inquiry Renewed Howard Hughes had just barely smuggled his monster plywood flying boat back into its berth after making a tentative, mile-long flight in it over Long Beach harbor when the reopened congressional inquiry into the now celebrated wartime airplane contracts threw a fresh shower of sparks around the millionaire sportsman and industrialist.

BIG REQUEST: Relief Funds Even before congressmen from all over the country had logged their suitcases back to Washington to open the special session on November 17, word went around that President Truman was fixing to ask them to appropriate about \$1,155,000,000 in temporary European relief funds to tide the stricken continent through the winter.

Just across the fence, just across the hedge, just across the desk, just across the hall, just across the way, narrow or wide it may be, is a human being who yearns for love.

What can you do to help them in their loneliness? That is where the water begins to hit the wheel in applying this lesson to everyday life.

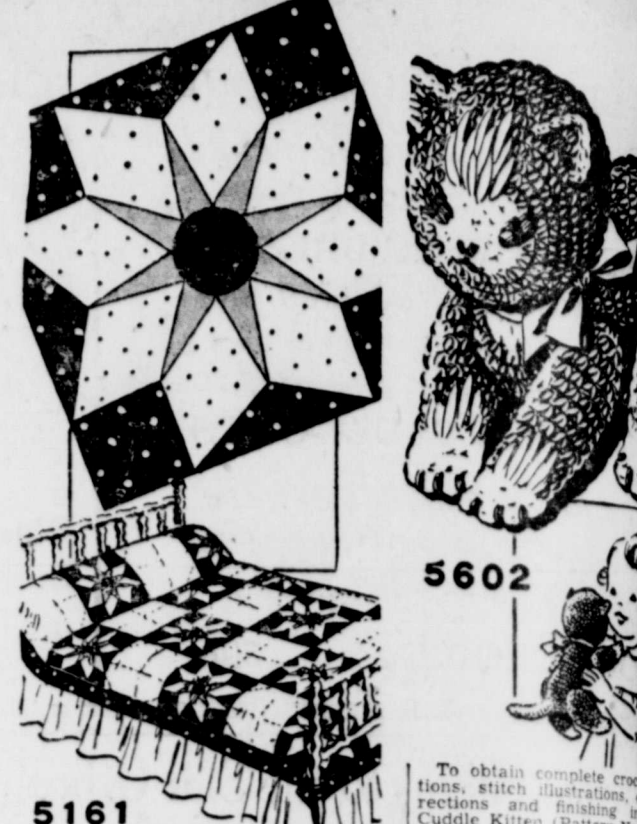
THE WAY OF LOVE THE way of love is the way of Christ. "A new commandment I give unto you," said Jesus, "That ye love one another as I have loved you."

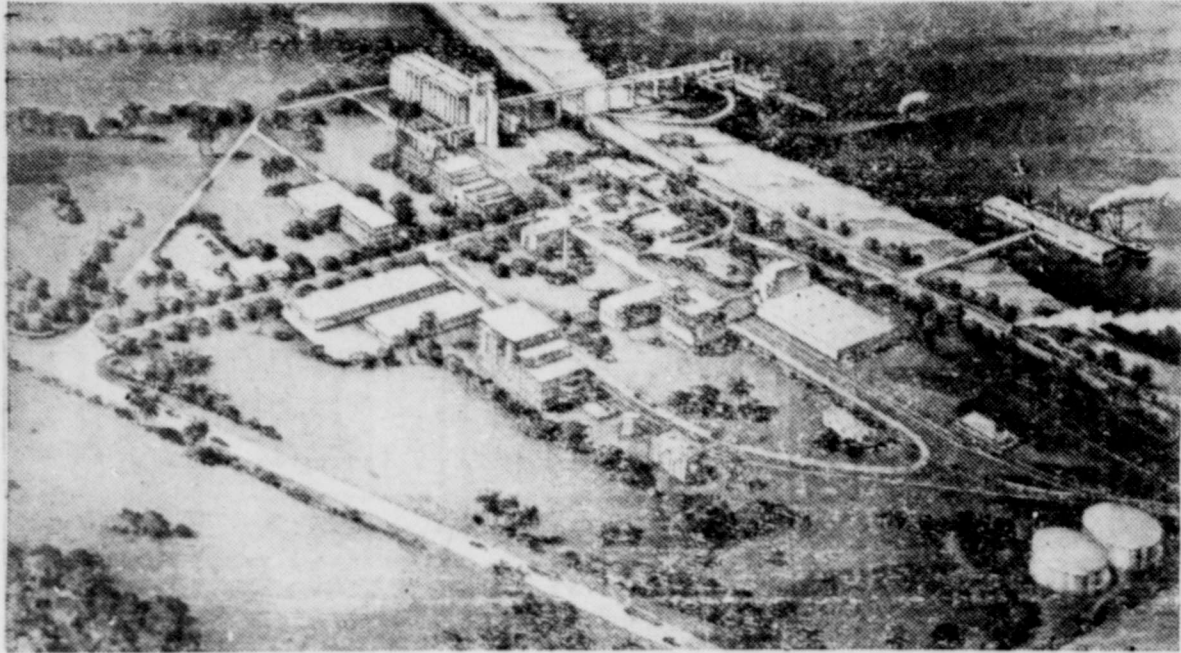

Corn Products Refining Company Builds in Southwest



In order to utilize the Southwest's large crops of milo maize—the recently developed dwarf-type grain sorghum valuable because of its resistance to drought and disease and because it can be harvested mechanically—the Corn Products Refining Company is building a new processing plant at Corpus Christi, Texas.

The new Corn Products Refining Company plant will produce dextrose, starches, and high protein livestock feeds. It will have a grind capacity of 30,000 bushels of milo maize per day and is expected to be completed in time to process the 1948 harvest.

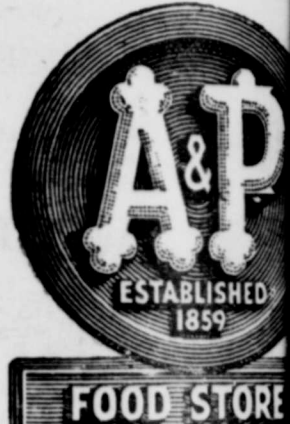

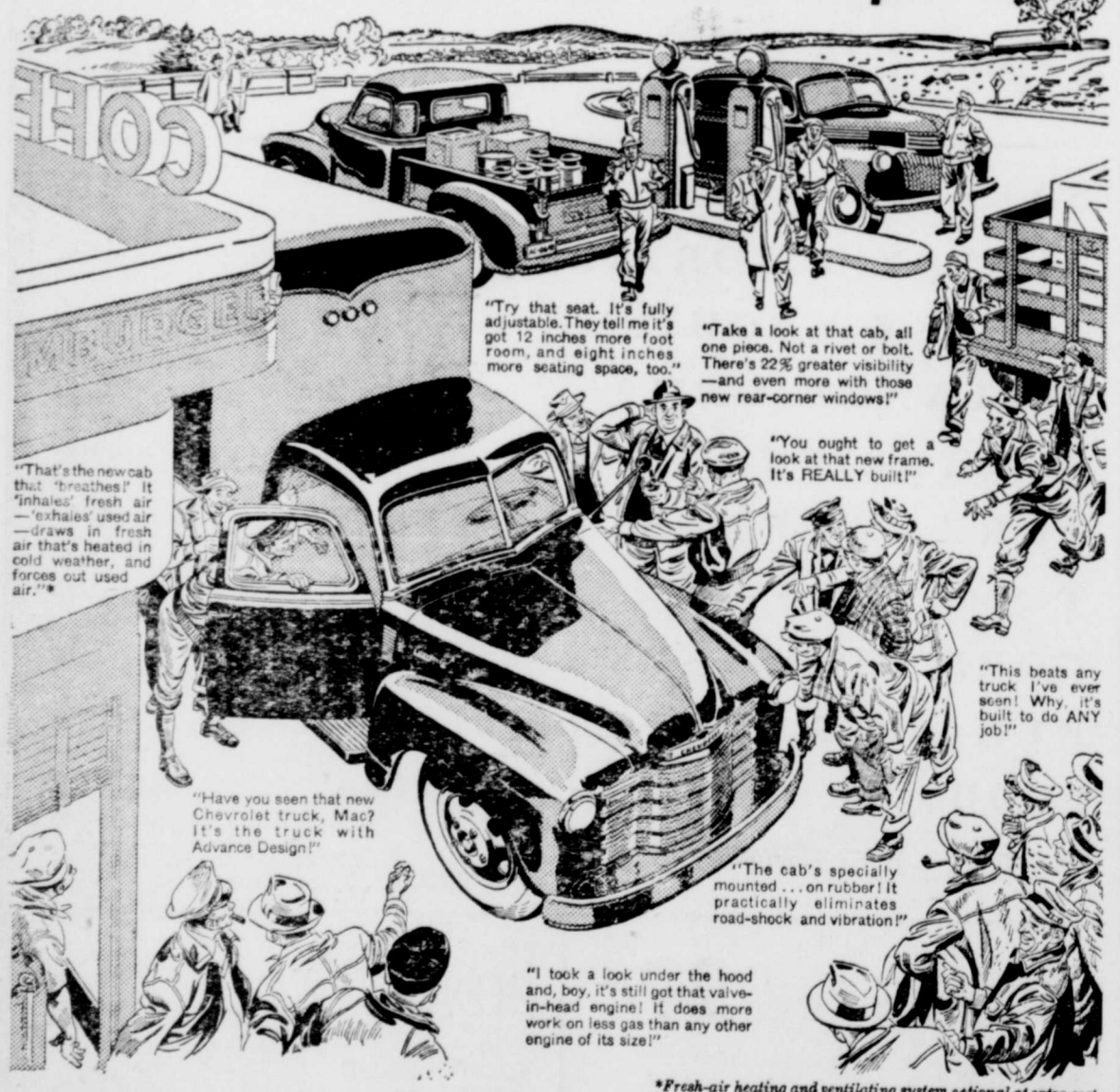

WAR AGAINST RATS
 Rats are you supposed to be on your farm? There are only a few, take steps to get rid of them. They are far more dangerous than most insects. Some years ago, a single rat would spoil \$2 worth of grain in a year. Now, because of so much higher prices, a single rat is probably two or three times as great. And if your farm has, say, 200 or more of the pests, their presence becomes extremely costly.

In addition to eating or spoiling feed, rats have been known to kill baby chicks and damage farm buildings with their teeth. One of the first things you should do to get rid of rats is to eliminate all rat harbors. Such precautionary measures as plugging holes in buildings or using metal strips on walls at places where rats might gnaw an entrance will be helpful. Get rid of junk piles or other heaps of refuse in which rats would be likely to make a home. Take particular pains to rat-proof your feed storage rooms or buildings.

The use of rat poison often gets fast results where other methods fail. One of the most successful poisons is ANTU, a chemical which was discovered only a few years ago by a Johns Hopkins University scientist. His experiments with the poison included a block-to-block rat clean-up in the city of Baltimore where ANTU killed off practically every rat in the city.

ANTU has the unique advantage of being extremely toxic to rats while having low toxicity for poultry and other animals. Thus, if bait is properly distributed, there is little danger that chickens or other fowl will consume enough of the poison to die. From now until next spring, rats will be even more destructive than they have been during the warm weather months. Rats start moving indoors in the fall when grains are harvested and stored away, and prefer to live in places where food is available. This is the season to crack down hard on our rat enemies.

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


