## THANKSGIVING

Tradition and custom brings each November, a day set aside over 300 years ago, to acknowledging our debt to a Di-vine providence for blessings wrought. As time passed since a long ago Ply-mouth Colony met to celebrate a plente-ous harvest, the manner of observing Thanksgiving Day has somewhat chang-ed. #### Savings on Insurance to Annexed Property Will Pay City Taxes

Because property outside the city limits carries a much higher rate than property inside the limits, the savings on insurance premiums will more than offset city taxes if the same property were inside. Below is a typical example, on a house in Rose Lawn, the insurance carried by M. C. Tucker: \$5000.00 Fire Insurance on a one-story, shingle roof frame dwelling occupied by owner; term of insur-ance, one year: Outside City Limits, annual premium ..... \$37.50 Inside City Limits, annual premium ..... \$15.38 Difference in annual premium ..... \$22.12 All tax money in the City of Burkburnett at present is paid on bonded indebtedness, which is \$300,000.00. The utilities owned by the City, which is debt free, amounts to more than twice the amount of the bonded indebtedness. With the added revenue from property in the proposed extension, the bonded indebtedness could be retired about 5 years sooner. \$9,000.00 in bonds were retired this year.

Local business concerns are warned to be on their guard when slick-tongued, fast-talking adver-tising men (and women) approach them with con-tracts for out-of-town advertising over a radio sta-tion to the West. In the past few weeks Burkburnett has been worked thoroughly. Here is the way past approaches have been made: A long distance phone call informs a prospective victim that a series of radio adver-tising has been prepared for him. Without giving the prospect a chance to say a word, the caller im-mediate starts reading the proposed advertising. When he has finished he says the prospect will be called upon, perhaps the next day. Bright and early next morning a woman appears at the place of business with an advertising contract. She in-troduces herself and says she has the co-operation and best wishes of your local newspaper publishers. We have never believed in high-pressure sales-manship. When a product or service has to be sold by high-pressure methods, ten to one you will not be satisfied if you buy. We have never ok'd any out-of-town radio ad-vertising. A moment's thought would convince any one that we would not do that. When such advertising salespeople call on you and tell you we have given them our blessings, ask them to show you their credentials. Or better still, call the Burkburnett Star for verification. We do not object to out-of-town advertising salesmen working in Burkburnett, but WE DO OBJECT to their misrepresenting the facts.

## WE'RE ON THE SPOT, TOO!

The cold, cruel facts are that consumers prices have advanced within the past year 23 per cent. Food prices have jumped 40 per cent; clothing 18 per cent. Businesses large and small have struggled under increasing costs of wages and materials. The latter having shot up wholesale quotations 40 per cent in less than a year and a half. There is no denying the fact, as much as we hate to admit it, that there is a lot of inflation in a lot of places.

There is plenty of employment in the country as shown by the fact that 60,000,000 persons are employed. A half a dozen years ago that was the goal that the New Deal was always striving to reach—but never reached.

Nevertheless, high wages and plenty of industrial activity has boosted the Nation to higher levels. Maybe this is a poor illustration, but wise statisticians tell us that meat consumption formerly leveled off at 125 pounds per capita a year, but now it is 155 pounds, at double the price that it was in the "good old days."

But you can't measure National inflation or prosperity by the old yardstick. But we do know that an increasing

number of well-to-do people are wondering how they are going to continue to keep up the old habits.

Uncle Sam's legs are pretty shaky. And believe it or not, inflation still is the danger.

## PARENTS TAKE NOTE

Parents of Burkburnett have a responsibility that extends beyond the portals of home. To unite and strengthen bonds between teachers, pupils and parents, there is an accent today on "open-house" in the grade and high schools. To get acquainted with aims and achievements of faculties of public schools, is to cement the foundation of our educational system. There is no need for formal display of the work done, but rather a continuation of the every day procedure of the classroom, which will give parents the opportunity to study the system and find needs not in effect but, through co-operation, may be supplied. There are not many instructors who will not welcome the interest of parents, will be glad to answer questions, point out reasons for programs, take time for individual counsel with a parent and try to solve the problems of child and parent.

A report card is not the only test of a student's ability or lack of it. Other factors must be taken into consideration from the standpoint of home background and classroom attendance. In order to further educational facilities, we should be familiar with school equipment, its courses in music, science, art, workshops, student government, health programs, creative lines. Parents owe it to their children, the teachers, the country and themselves.

## Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

### Better Eggs—Better Price

Every poultry raiser wants to get top prices for his eggs. The best poultrymen have learned that the easiest way to do this is by improving their egg quality and egg marketing procedure.

Simply because eggs are in a shell, too many people are inclined to forget that they are just as perishable as fresh vegetables, milk, or fruit. Cooling the eggs quickly and keeping them cool is essential if egg quality is to be retained. The safest egg holding temperatures range between 40 and 60 degrees. Eggs should not be put in egg cases until they are well cooled. Wire baskets are recommended for gathering as this allows eggs to dry more quickly.

Clean nests, clean floor litter and frequent egg gathering are simple factors which assure cleaner eggs. A good uniform egg laying ration is essential as yolks, color and food values are determined in part by your feeding program.

If your flock produces eggs for hatching, all birds on your place should be tested for pullorum disease. Pullorum is a disease that takes a heavy toll of baby chicks. Among other ways, it is carried by the mother hen through the egg laying organs. One of the most important ways to keep pullorum from spreading from generation to generation is to test the breeding birds and market all the reactors. Only birds reaching negatively to the test should be kept as breeders.

When We Walk With God

**Design Aid and Its Effects**  
 Understanding of human nature will tell us that when we stop aid to European nations, the countries there will be angry at us. The more aid we give an individual and the longer we give it, the more disgruntled he becomes when you stop. This seems to be true of nations. Naturally, now we have hinted at a little less aid toward Europe, some called "selfish" and "unsympathetic" at us.

The more we give and the longer we give it, the greater will grow this scorn toward the giver. When finally we have to stop the flow of our money toward Europe, anger will be the reaction. That was true after World War I. America had been very liberal, but when aid was halted, up went the tariff barriers. England campaigned: "Buy Within the Empire." Depression followed.

**What Results?**  
 Following World War II, America again has been extremely liberal. We have spent some 10 billion dollars during each of the past two years. Help we gave to England during the war and since will total nearly 40 billion dollars. We have not been stingy with our food, our goods, nor our dollars, although this drain on our resources has helped to make things tougher for the average American breadwinner.

All the Lend-Lease, all the UN-NRA relief, all the goods, all the dollars—what are the results? England is not even on her feet, much less Europe. The crises seem to mount, with England right now facing her greatest crisis since the war. All of these facts must lead us to re-study our aid to Europe and the possible effect of continuing handouts to so many outstretched palms.

**Europe's Problem**  
 Obviously, we cannot keep on giving at the rate of 10 billion dollars a year to Europe for the next ten, twenty, or thirty years. Then what can we do? It is plain common sense that the best thing we can do is to help Europe figure out how she can help herself. We must help Europe to get up on her own feet and off the necks of American taxpayers. That is the only kind of aid that will ever be worth much to Europe.

The sooner we get Europe to thinking in terms of helping herself, the better it will be for all of us. We might send her food and money till doomsday, but it would only make America poor and would not make Europe rich. Europe must understand that the problem of rehabilitation is her own problem, first of all, and not entirely ours. We must try to re-educate Europe in the principles of American enterprise and initiative. Hard work and self-dependence are among those first principles.

Europe needs production. We can supply machinery on the basis that it may be paid for with goods produced. We can keep down our trade barriers and buy from Europe. Only in that way can those nations get on their feet and buy from us. There are definite ways to help war-torn Europe without imposing the serious injury of continued, outright aid. The sooner our help gets on this basis, the better for everybody.

**THENCE** South 0° 06' West parallel with and 300 feet East of the East right-of-way line of the proposed U. S. Highway No 277 cutoff to the Burk Bridge across the Red River, at 1724.95 feet, at 1844.95 feet a steel rod driven in the ground 60 feet South of center line of the above pavement, at 8608.8 feet the North fence of the Burkburnett-Wichita Falls pavement U. S. Highway No 277, at 9137 feet the North fence of a 60 foot wide paved East-West road which jogs South about 360 feet West at 9564.65 feet the Southeast corner of the proposed extension of the City Limits of the City of Burkburnett;

**THENCE** South 0° 16' West with the East line of a North-South paved road, at 300 feet the South line of a paved road East, at 928.1 feet a reentrant corner of the proposed extension of the City Limits of the City of Burkburnett;

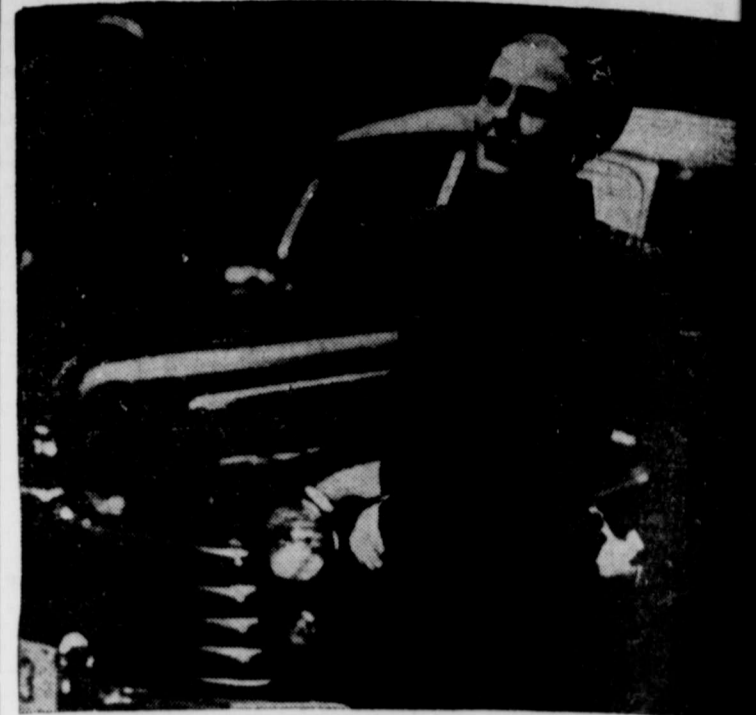

**Scarlet Fever Cases Increasing**  
 The incident of scarlet fever is at the present time nearly one-third higher than the seven-year median in Texas. One of the most disabling and dangerous of the diseases usually associated with childhood, actually it is confined to no age limit according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Fifty-five cases were reported in the state during the week ending November 15, bring-

ing the year's total to 1,242. The doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive scarlet rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated. Complications can result in prolonged distability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved causing life-long invalidism or crippling. "A child with any kind of sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment the doctor prescribes will do much to alleviate discomfort, and reduce the possibility of dangerous complications."

**Xmas Seals Sales Nov. 24 to Dec. 25**

In a proclamation officially designating the period from Nov. 24 to December 25 as Christmas Seal Month, Governor Beauford Jester pointed out yesterday that tuberculosis takes an average of 3,000 lives in Texas each year and kills more people between the ages of 15 and 45 than any other disease. The Governor called attention to the fact that the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations are waging an effective and continuous campaign to control this communicable disease, stating that the funds to carry on their work are derived from the annual sale of Christmas Seals. He urged Texans to be generous in their support of the campaign against tuberculosis by buying and using Christmas Seals.

**A Speech Was Made**

A letter came to my desk a few weeks ago containing one paragraph that astonished me. It read: "At the church conference held in this southern district a speech was made against the profit motive." That any American group, particularly a religious group, should raise its voice against the profit motive struck me as amazing. To get rid of the profit motive, you would have to find some substitute for economics in modern civilization. You would have to eliminate all trading and marketing, buying and selling. You would have to get rid of money and other mediums of exchange. You would have to cease bartering and swapping. In fact, you would have to reduce your modern civilization to self-sufficiency of the individual.

**Only Two Ways**  
 A modern and complicated civilization like our own could not do without trade, exchange, manufacturing, raw materials and production. You just have to ask more than it cost you. That is what profit means. And without the profit motive, trade and commerce would die.

There are only two ways that an economy may operate. In America individuals own farms, stores, factories, and run them for the chief purpose of making enough profit to live on. The other way is for government to own everything, operating all production merely for the purpose of feeding the people and supplying what it thinks are their needs.

**Compare the Two!**  
 The profit motive is the very foundation of our American way of life. It is the constitutional way in our country. It has produced more enthusiasm, finer cooperation, and a greater abundance of clothing, food, housing, and transportation than the masses of the people have ever known in any other country.

The other kind of economy, owned and operated by the government, attempts to do away with the profit motive. Actually, it does away with incentives, individual initiative, and efficiency. This kind of economy soon settles down to a "what's-the-use" status, offering only the barest necessities to its people. Russia is a good example of this. Russia has attempted to substitute other enthusiasms for those of owning property and making profit, but she has found that whenever she wanted increased industrial output she had to imitate some of the incentives that are so common in America.

**Advance Agents?**  
 The very concepts of freedom of the individual spring from the Bible. Therein you will find the foundation for the freedoms and liberties that America has built upon. I am unable to explain why church leaders are willing to attack the profit motive. To do so indicates tremendous misunderstanding of the American way of life, of our constitutional government, and the freedoms of the individual.

Let us not confuse greed and sin with the profit motive. There is nothing un-Christian, nor anti-social, in fair and honest buying and selling and trading. One who is against the profit motive is in reality opposed to ownership of property, for when the profit motive is taken away, the right to own things must go with it. It is high time for some of our religious people to start thinking through these things. Doing this, perhaps they would refuse to be used as advance agents of socialism and communism.

**Bishop Funeral Rites Held In Burkburnett**

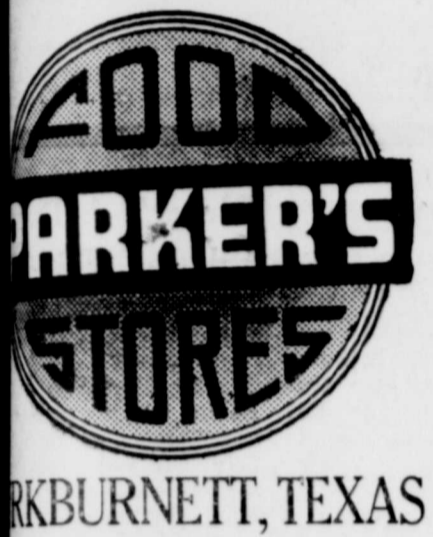
