Now it's Canada which is fuming under the weight of an unfavorable balance of trade with the United States and consequent shortage of the lovable American dollars.

In an effort to bridge part of the gap between two billion dollars worth of imports from the U.S. annually and sales to this country of only one billion, Canada has adopted an austerity program that bears a mild resemblance to the one now governing England.

Under the plan, Canada has restricted or prohibited imports ranging from fruit to motor cars. has curtailed pleasure travel and imposed heavy taxes on a wide range of durable consumer goods made from U. S. materials.

Among the items prohibited are: jewelry, candy, novelties, typewriters, radios, refrigerators, washing machines and furniture. Import of motor vehicles has been prohibited 'temporarily."

Import quotas have been placed on oranges, grapefruit, lemons, fruit juices, potatoes and onions
