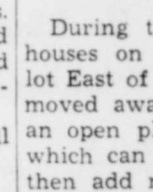

Election to Extend Burk City Limits Carries 218 to 71

An election on a proposal to extend the City Limits of Burk Burnett carried by a three-to-one majority at the City Hall Monday.
Of 289 ballots cast, 218 favored the extension; 71 opposed.
The area as extended covers, roughly, 300 feet beyond the Oklahoma Cut-off on the East. The South boundary goes in front of the C. O. Smith Nursery, thence West to take in the Gulf and La Salle properties, then along the road in front of Preston Dairy to the lane running by Knauth farm to the Burk-Vernon road, then Northeast to the old N-W City Limits corner.
The population of Burk Burnett, based on the 1940 census, was listed at 2814. Including the extended area, the population will be over 5,000, based on best estimates at present.
A move is now under way to take a census place the new population figures where highways enter the town.

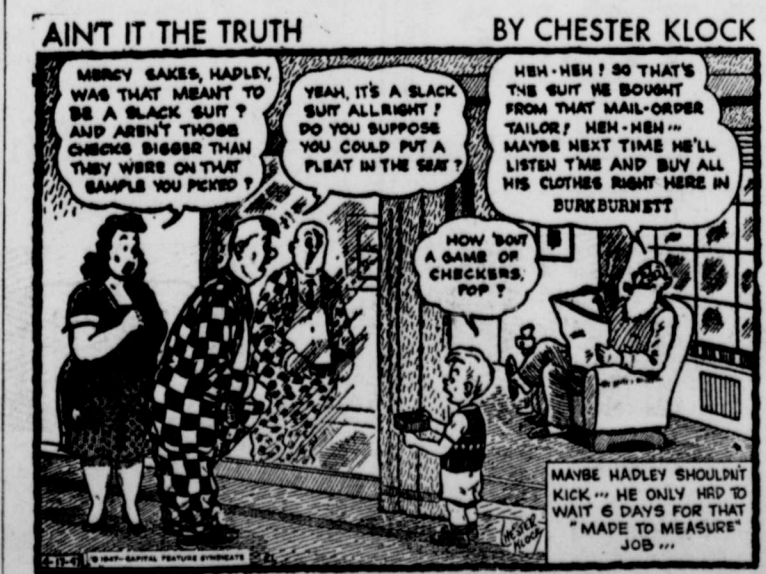

FARM INCOME

There is a lot of talk about the farmers. In this talk there are stories of their prosperity and of their difficulties.

The United States Department of Agriculture officially reports that at the end of this November the farmers will have received about \$27.4 billion dollars from this year's marketings, which amounts to 24 per cent above the first eleven months of last year.

Government payments are less than half this year as compared with 1946. The purchases, mostly by the government, for livestock and grains are up about 27 per cent above last year.

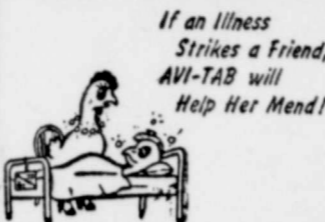

that the easiest way to do this is by improving their egg quality and egg marketing procedure.

Simply because eggs are in a shell, too many people are inclined to forget that they are just as perishable as fresh vegetables, milk, or fruit. Cooling the eggs quickly and keeping them cool is essential if egg quality is to be retained. The safest egg holding temperatures range between 40 and 60 degrees. Eggs should not be put in egg cases until they are well cooled. Wire baskets are this allows eggs to dry more quickly.

Clean nests, clean floor litter and frequent egg gathering are simple factors which assure cleaner eggs. A good uniform egg laying ration is essential as yolks color and food value are determined in part by your feeding program.

If your flock produces eggs for hatching, all birds on your place should be tested for pullorum disease that takes a heavy toll of baby chicks. Among other ways it is carried by the mother hen through the egg laying organs. One of the most important ways to keep pullorum from spreading from generation to generation is to test the breeding birds and market all the reactors. Only birds reacting negatively to the test should be kept as breeders.

Through blood-testing your flock, the layers before hatching time and all birds at housing time, you not only realize greater long range profit but you are cooperating in a nation-wide program to eliminate one of the industry's most costly diseases.

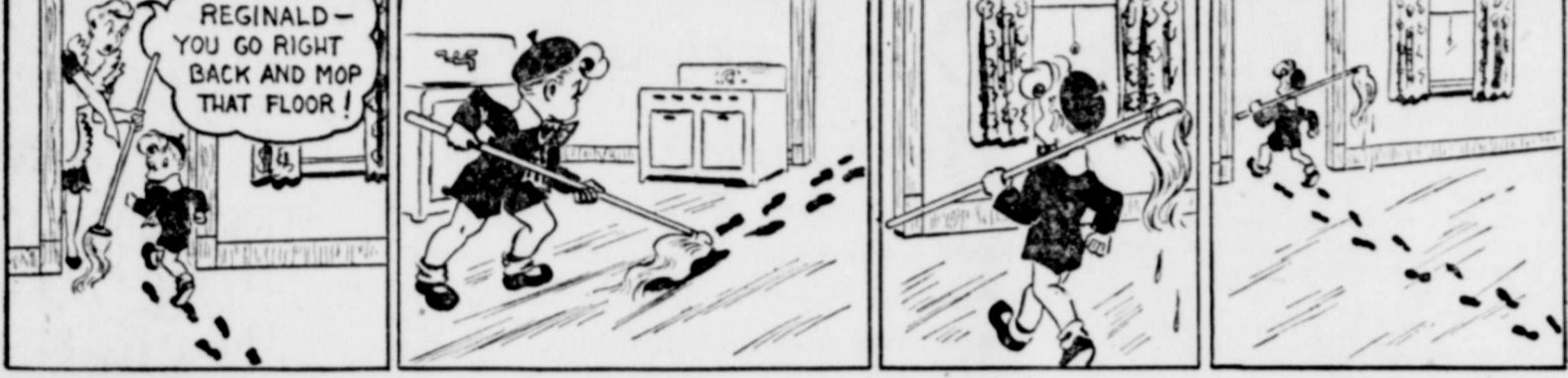

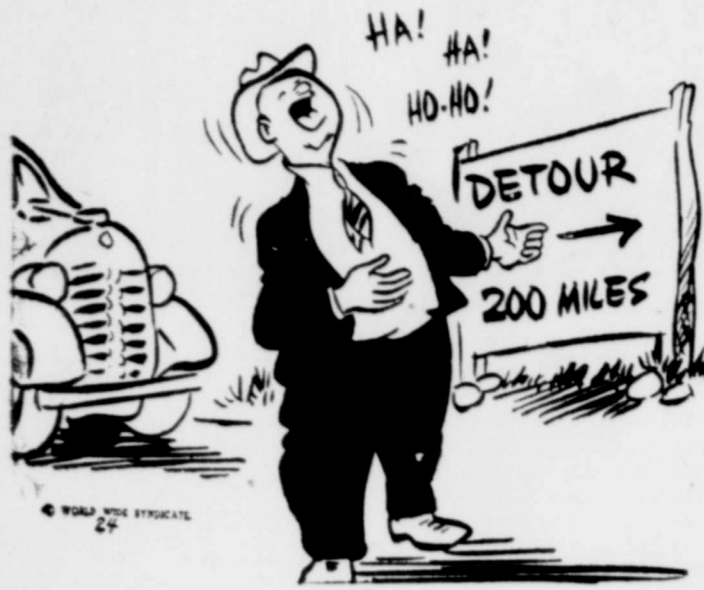

PRICE DEBATE: Ration Meat?

Congress was preparing, with some misgivings, to tackle President Truman's proposed 10-point anti-inflation program including requests for rationing and price control power.

While Sen. Robert Taft (Rep., Ohio) chairman of the senate-house economic committee, announced that his group will sidetrack those two controversial points to consider first the other portions of Mr. Truman's plan, other congressmen objected to that method of procedure. Sen. Ralph Flanders (Rep., Vt.) and Sen. John Sparkman (Dem., Ala.) said they believed the rationing and price control proposals should be debated during the current special session, even though they may be predestined for certain defeat. It was an argument that promised to grow louder.

At the same time there was a surprising indication of growing support, even among Republicans, for direct consumer rationing of meat as a compromise answer to demands for curbs against rising prices.

JOBLESS PAY: Vets Collect

More than half of the 14,450,000 veterans of World War II have applied for unemployment compensations under the G. I. bill of rights and have collected more than 2.2 billion dollars, Veterans' administration has reported.

Through September, a total of 7,400,000 World War II veterans had applied for unemployment compensation and 600,000 for self-employment allowances. About 500,000 veterans have exhausted their claims for unemployment or self-employment benefits, it was reported. There are 6,500,000 potential claimants who never have participated in the program.

National Heroine



Now 15 years old, Marguerite Van Steenberghe became a national heroine of France when she was 11 and has just been decorated with the croix de guerre at Nice. A member of the French resistance movement, she saved two underground army chiefs from the Gestapo during the occupation.

IMBALANCE: Canada Trade

Now it's Canada which is fuming under the weight of an unfavorable balance of trade with the United States and consequent shortage of the lovable American dollars.

In an effort to bridge part of the gap between two billion dollars worth of imports from the U. S. annually and sales to this country of only one billion, Canada has adopted an austerity program that bears a mild resemblance to the one now governing England.

Under the plan, Canada has restricted or prohibited imports ranging from fruit to motor cars, has curtailed pleasure travel and imposed heavy taxes on a wide range of durable consumer goods made from U. S. materials.

Among the items prohibited are: jewelry, candy, novelties, typewriters, radios, refrigerators, washing machines and furniture. Import of motor vehicles has been prohibited "temporarily."

Import quotas have been placed on oranges, grapefruit, lemons, fruit juices, potatoes and onions.

SO WHAT?

Here's another story about how the world is coming to an end, but not for another million years.

Dr. Harlow Shapley, Harvard astronomer, sees the possibility of the end of the universe coming as a result of a gradual scattering of all matter through cold, limitless space. His view is that creation may be dying slowly of "negative gravitation," a cosmic force which has caused other galaxies to disintegrate.

Christian Fellowship Lesson for December 7, 1947

SUNDAY'S lesson is based on the short third Epistle of John. You can read it in two minutes, but you will not exhaust its meaning in a lifetime. Link with III John the devotional reading found in First Corinthians 1:10-17, and you have a great and glorious picture of Christian fellowship. Note these words:

"Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same things, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." I Corinthians 1:10.

And these words from III John, second verse: "Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth."

Here we have the basis for Christian fellowship.

Let Us Love One Another

WHAT is the first test of Christian fellowship? Read I John 4:7.

Love one for another is the first and last test of Christian fellowship. Of course, love one for another is dependent upon love toward God. We do not really love one another until we first love God. And we do not love God until we realize that he first loves us.

Why do we keep certain letters? Because they are from those who love us, and whom we love. Boys and girls can help to make this a better world if they will express their love one for another in letters.

Gracious Words

IN ECCLESIASTES 10:12, we read: "The words of a wise man's mouth are gracious." Christmas is soon here. There will be many Christmas cards and Christmas letters. Let us think carefully of some lonely boy or girl in our community who may not receive such a message unless you send it.

More than that, think of the lonely boy or girl in the hospital, in the orphan home, in the underprivileged tenement. Think what a letter from you to such a lonely neighbor would mean!

Doing Good

CHRISTIAN fellowship, in the last analysis, is doing good. "He that doeth good is of God," says John, and we know that it is true. Intermediate boys and girls can prove their Christian attitude as we come toward the Christmas season. Discuss with your teacher next Sunday the idea of providing Christmas gifts for underprivileged boys and girls of your age. If no in your community, somewhere.

While in Europe last summer, I was impressed with the fact that there will be very little Christmas for the young people in many of those lands this year. War has left its frightening desolation. The people are without money and without homes and without clothing and without food.

May I suggest that you discuss plans by which you may send packages through CARE to some lonely, needy neighbor in Europe this Christmas, thus proving your sense of Christian fellowship.

Furthering the Gospel

AS WE grasp more fully the meaning of this lesson next Sunday, our hearts will gladly respond to the opportunities for furthering the Gospel of Jesus Christ even as Gaius and Demetrius impressed John.

In every community are crying needs for Christian ministry. Your newspapers will be telling of special opportunities for Christmas help. Your Community Fund chairman can give you names of worthy neighbors who need help.

"I thank God for your fellowship in furtherance of the Gospel from the first day until now," wrote Paul to the Philippian Christians.

How did they show this fellowship? In many, many practical ways, some of which Paul names. They sent food, books, clothing. More than that, they gave themselves in personal visitation to lonely friends. They cheered the faint.

How happy we shall be if after the study of this lesson we go out to do with all our might what our hearts find to do.

Why We Light Our Christmas Trees



New Santa Claus—New Christmas tree lights

The brilliantly lighted Christmas tree as we know it today originated late in the 16th Century. According to legend, Martin Luther became entranced one night with a starry Christmas sky and returned home to set up for his children a tree illuminated with numerous candles to represent the star-brightened sky.

The first written reference to a Christmas tree is found in the works of an unknown writer of the early 17th Century who said: "At Christmas they set up fir-trees in the parlours of Strasbourg and hang thereon roses cut out of many-colored paper, apples, wafers, gold-foil, sweets, etc. . . ."

But the relationship of light with the observance of Christmas goes all the way back to the birth of Christ when the brilliant Star of the East became the most universal symbol of the Nativity.

Even as the early converts gathered in the catacombs to observe Christmas during the dark days of the Church there were tiny oil burning lamps to brighten their dim surroundings. The interiors of the medieval cathedrals and churches always were banked with rows of flickering candles during the Christmas season, while later in English-speaking countries the dancing light of the Yule log burning in an open fireplace added cheer to the occasion.

This flickering motion of light, so long identified with the grave observance of early Christmas,

was lost completely around the turn of the 20th Century when the electric light replaced the unsafe, outmoded wax candle. But now the electric light itself has reverted to that dancing light effect through its newest development—the Bubble-Lite.

For the first time it is now possible to obtain all the brilliancy and eye-arresting motion that was lost when use of the candle was discontinued in Christmas tree decorating. The Bubble-Lite consists of an "action" candle-shaped three-inch glass tube set in a two-toned translucent plastic base, which in turn houses a low-wattage bulb. This small bulb serves to light up the ornamental plastic base, as well as to generate sufficient heat to whirl the gayly-colored fluid in the glass tube upward in a continually bubbling spiral, while sending rays of light colorfully dancing through the upper glass "candle." Manufactured by Noma Electric Corporation, Bubble-Lites were available only in limited quantities last year, but more than 25,000,000 Noma Bubble-Lites are being produced for use this Christmas.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How can the dairyman conserve on grain?

A. The dairyman can do a lot toward grain conservation if he will:
 1. Feed cows according to production by weighing the milk and feeding accordingly.
 2. Cull dairy herds carefully and intelligently. Sale of low-producing and defective cows will increase the meat supply as well as conserve grain.

Q. Will feeding a supplement to hogs save corn?

A. A good supplement can save about 6 to 6½ bushels of corn for every 100 lbs. of pork. For instance, 50 lbs. of Purina Pig & Hog Chow and 5½ bushels of corn on the Purina Plan can do the job of about 12 bushels of corn fed straight.

Q. How often should poultry flocks be culled?

A. Culling is particularly important now when grain must be conserved. More and more poultrymen are culling on a monthly basis. They go into the houses at night when the birds are on the roost and use a strong flash light, removing all birds which show "caw heads," pale, shriveled combs, yellow beaks and other indications of being out of production. This system has the advantage of not disturbing the birds and does not require the handling of the entire flock.

Q. How can you tell by its appearance when a turkey is ready for market?

A. A turkey is ready for market when:
 1. The skin on the breast is light in color and no dark meat shows through the fat.
 2. It is fairly free from pin feathers.
 3. Fat is deposited over the bird in broad layers.
 4. The breast and thighs are well fleshed.

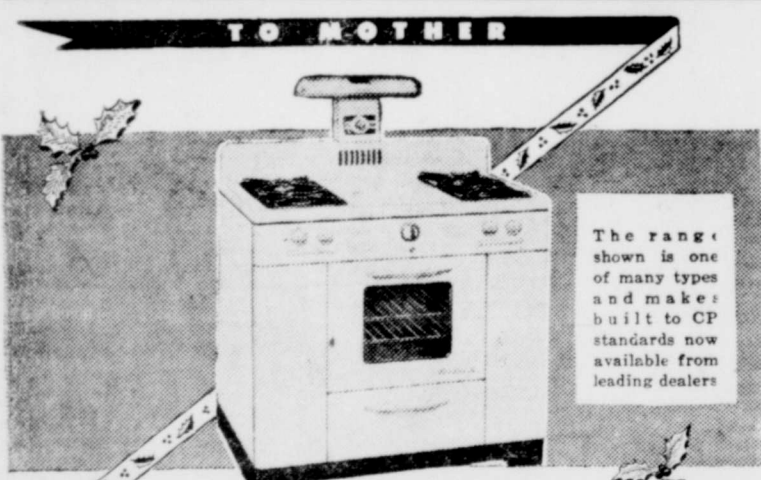
