CHRISTMAS SEALS

The annual sale of Christmas seals means dollars as an investment in public health. T. B. is an ominous set of initials. It is an arch enemy of mankind, when recognized in its deadly, slow work, taking a toll in lives that might have been saved had the symptoms been discovered and the patient treated.

There are many clinics established in the name of tuberculosis. Numerous cities have been giving the public free X-ray examinations. Other services are offered for revealing the disease and defeating it. Such measures cost money. Scientists must be equipped to fight it, patients need prolonged bed rest for cures, special kinds of nourishing foods must be provided. Christmas seals help defray expenses.

We never know when one of us, one of those we love, might be stricken. Tuberculars are apt to spread the disease since it is communicable. Coughing from lungs that are infected is one way, sputum of a tubercular is also infectious. These cases, many of them unaware of their condition, must be given immediate treatment and individual care in order to protect society. Buying a sheet of Christmas Seals, between now and the first of January, means a dollar towards curing one afflicted. Let's help to comfort through combat.

DO IT EARLY

Don't be afraid the Christmas package will arrive at its destination too early. Simply put a "Don't Open Until Dec. 25" seal on it and get it to the postoffice before that last minute rush. Santa Claus has arrived late in many a home, because of someone's neglect in getting cards and parcels to the mail in time. It is wiser to be ahead of schedule. Folks who work in the post office are human beings and deserve our consideration. Some of us wait until late to even buy our stamps. We could help out by getting them right now. Address cards and packages neatly and plainly using zone numbers when possible. Pack securely, wrapping boxes in heavy paper, use stout cord. Insure safe and prompt delivery at the other end.

Chick Chats

Many Factors Affect Laying

A laying flock which produces at peak efficiency day after day is a well managed flock. The manager of such a flock permits nothing to occur which will disturb his birds laying ability.

There are a good many seemingly harmless factors which can hurt your flock's production record. Failure to maintain a regular management routine is one disturbing influence. Since birds respond favorably to regular habits, it is well for the poultry raiser to plan and maintain a fixed schedule for feeding and egg gathering. Entering the poultry house frequently and at odd hours during the day has the effect of upsetting the layers, causing a temporary slump in production. A planned chore routine is important for the additional reasons that it enables the poultry raiser to save time and labor.

To some poultrymen the presence of lice and mites are a natural counterpart of poultry raising. Yet these parasites are capable of causing lower egg production and should not be tolerated.

There are several different types of commercial mite and lice killers which will help solve your lice or mite problem.

Of course, good housing and equipment are extremely impor-

tant factors as most poultry raisers realize. A cold, drafty laying house predisposes the birds to winter diseases in addition to hurting egg production. Poor equipment, or the lack of it, makes it difficult for birds to consume as much feed and water as they need to lay efficiently.

Another management practice which helps boost production is the feeding of moist mash or pellets during the middle of the day. Taking the chill off the drinking water is always helpful.

Take every precaution to prevent a disease outbreak; disease not only hurts egg production but also may prove fatal to a number of birds. Frequent cleaning and disinfecting will help keep the house sanitary. Good sanitation is the most important part of your disease prevention program.

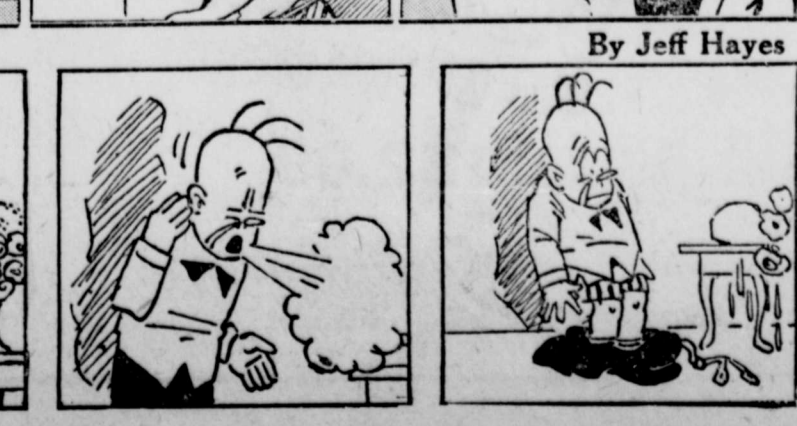

From Germany

A letter received by Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Hughes from their son Lester, in Germany telling of the conditions there, was brought to the Star office this week. The lack of space prevented us from printing the entire letter, but it said in part:

"This winter is going to be a very hard one on the people of Europe, and especially so for the Germans. First we will look at it from the food angle. The monthly food ration per person stacks up to 1,653 Grams. 450 grams equals one pound, which means each person gets something less than 4 lbs. of food per month. They receive less than one pound of Erzata (coffee substitute) and only the men get a tobacco ration, 40 cigarettes a month. The cigarettes are so awful no American would think of smoking them. We have men working for us that keep our offices spotless for the cigarettes in the ashtrays on our desk."

"Add to this situation the fact the people have had no new clothes since the war, and they get 100 lbs. of coal plus 300 lbs. of wood to heat their homes for a year, it does not add up to a very high standard of living. It has dulled their sense of hearing and comprehension."

He closes his letter with this statement. "We are not trying to shove democracy down these

Texas Press Association Sees Dawn of A New Era

December 1 will mark the dawn of a new era for the Texas Press Association in the opinion of Paul Fulks, president of the Texas association and publisher of the Wolfe City Sun.

On that date the daily and weekly newspapers of Texas join hands to open their own central office with a full-time staff of experienced press association workers in charge.

Texas Press Association directors have contracted with Vernon T. Sanford, for 13 years secretary-manager of the Oklahoma Press Association, to manage the Texas association. Officials of the Texas organization are now endeavoring to locate office headquarters in Dallas.

Said Fulks, "Our central office will issue information bulletins to the newspapers, serve as an employment bureau for newspaper workers, look after the legislative interests of the publications, represent our newspapers in the sale of political and state advertising, and arrange our convention programs."

The TPA president also stated that "our plans call for activities not alone in the interest of the press of Texas, but for the state in general. Details of a promotion program for Texas will be announced as soon as the central office can complete arrangements with other interested groups and individuals who want to see the great state of Texas grow greater and greater."

Sanford has been with the Okla-

homa organization since August 1, 1934. Prior to then he was manager of the Nebraska Press Association.

He is a native Oklahoman. His newspaper training was received in the Sooner State over a period of 15 years, on the Chickasha Daily Express, Norman Transcript, Anadarko Daily News, and the semi-weekly Cleveland County Democrat - News. He has been a carrier boy, printer's devil, assistant pressman, reporter, classified advertising manager, display advertising manager, and part-

Sanford is a past-president of the Advertising Club of Oklahoma City; the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Southwestern Association of Industrial Editors; and of Newspaper Association Managers. He served for two years as chairman of National Newspaper Week and editor of the NAM Bulletin. He is a member of the board of directors of the Better Business Bureau of Oklahoma City and an honorary member of the board of directors of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce. HE'S OFF:
Stassen

Harold Stassen, the lone wolf in the Republican presidential nomination race, formally opened his campaign in Milwaukee with a blast against the "powerful presidential pickers in the Republican party."

The former governor of Minnesota, who made public his political principles in a recently published book, denounced "behind the scenes" operations in GOP circles, singling out for special criticism Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York who has not yet gone on record as being a candidate for the Republican nomination.

"I know that the powerful presidential pickers consider that it is wrong to be so frank and forthright with the people of America," he told his audience. "It is their view that the correct thing to do is to go through very elaborate operations of looking the other way . . . but that great care should be taken never to meet a difficult real problem face to face."

TURMOIL:
French Style

Leon Blum, who tried on the premiership of France like a man buying a new hat, found it didn't fit. And, as in the case of his predecessor, Paul Ramadier, the only reason it didn't fit was because his head wasn't the right shape. It was too medium, with not enough bulge to the right.

Blum, who outspokenly rejected both the Communists and De Gaulle, failed for that reason to get a vote of confidence in the national assembly.

Next man up was Robert Schuman, for minister of finance, who was not above wooing the powers of Gen. Charles De Gaulle. As a result, he received a strong vote of confidence, getting the support of all French political parties except the Communists.

How long he would be able to remain in office, with the French economy tottering and the ranks of strikers swelling to above the million mark, was an open question. Probably, he would stay as long as DeGaulle wanted him.

The over-all situation, however, was intolerable. There was no assurance that Schuman would remain in power long enough to take any effective action, even if he did attempt to reconcile the warring political factions by forming a coalition government.

TAXES AGAIN:
Two Ideas

The makings of another rousing tax battle were introduced into the house of representatives with two separate proposals for removal of six million low-income persons from tax lists, and for tax exemption of the first \$25,000 of net income of all corporations.

Rep. Walter C. Ploeser (Rep., Mo.) offered the corporate exemption suggestion to the house ways and means committee to settle "the nationwide controversy over the tax exempt privilege of co-ops."

The other tax-cutting provision would embody an increase in personal exemptions—probably from the present \$500 to \$900.

But Rep. Harold Knutson (Rep., Minn.) said his new four-billion-dollar tax slashing measure, to be introduced in mid-December, probably would include no provision for increased individual exemptions. He was sticking by his idea for percentage cuts for all the 48,500,000 taxpayers.

Choo-Choo Chapeau

Bigger and Better

If there's a new car in your future it's likely to be a bigger, better and more expensive one than previous models, according to present plans of the auto industry.

Models for 1948 and 1949 will follow the general uptrend in size and cost, since automobile manufacturers believe they can sell all the cars they can make for the next year or so if prosperity continues at its present boisterous level.

Courageous Loyalty
Lesson for December 14, 1947

OPEN your Bible to Revelation, and read the first seven chapters. Then you will be ready for Acts 16:16-40, and 1 Peter 4:12-19, and 5:6, 7. These Scriptures form the basis of a study for Sunday on Loyalty Under Persecution.

How a Song Helped
"HUMBLE yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time; casting all your care upon him, for he careth for you." 1 Peter 5:6, 7. That is a splendid watchword for every boy and girl.

Now, turn to Acts 16:16-30, and see how Paul and Silas, locked in the inner dungeon at midnight, could pray and sing. That is what happens to the Christian who sincerely trusts in God—who acts on the promise that God really cares for his trusting children.

A memory verse suggested for Sunday is found in Proverbs 17:22, and it goes like this: "A cheerful heart is a good medicine."
Have you watched some Christian in affliction—how he or she could bless every passerby? It was because that person possessed the "cheerful heart." And each of us may have that precious possession, if we remember Mark 11:22, "Have faith in God."

Happy Behind Prison Bars

PAUL and Silas are pictured as happy in that dark dungeon. There is a statement to challenge every cynic, every doubting Thomas. Only the grace of God can make men happy under persecution. Paul declares in Romans 1:16, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel." Aye, he was not ashamed to preach the Gospel to the little damsel on the streets of Jerusalem, nor was he ashamed to go to the prison for the sake of the Gospel.

Best of all, Paul and Silas were sustained in their sorrowful plight by the consciousness that God was with them—that he always keeps his word.

I venture the prediction that the fortitude of Paul and Silas in that night of persecution did more to impress the Christian religion upon Jerusalem than any sermon ever uttered. We, too, can witness for Christ as we face difficult situations.

Courageous Loyalty

LOOK now at Revelation 2:8-11, and 3:14-22, for the example of the church at Smyrna, burdened by tribulation and poverty, but "rich" in the promise that a crown of life awaited them.

It was far more difficult to be a Christian in the first century than it is in the twentieth century. By which I mean that the early Christians were few in number and without any backing of public opinion. They were despised as the lowly followers of the crucified carpenter of Nazareth. Today, Christians are acknowledged as the best citizens in every community.

Even so, there are tests for us—tests that will be too much for human courage and loyalty. If we are true to the teachings of Jesus as they relate to everyday life, we shall need that same endowment which the Christians at Smyrna possessed, else our discipleship will shame the name of our Lord.

The Blood of the Lamb

THE lesson concludes with the dramatic passage in Revelation 7:9-17, in which we behold the great white-robed throng about the throne of God, singing, "Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be unto our God forever and ever. Amen."

Who were they? "These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."
Loyalty under persecution is dependent absolutely upon the life-giving power of the blood of the Lamb.

"Fear not, I am with thee. O be not dismayed. For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid."

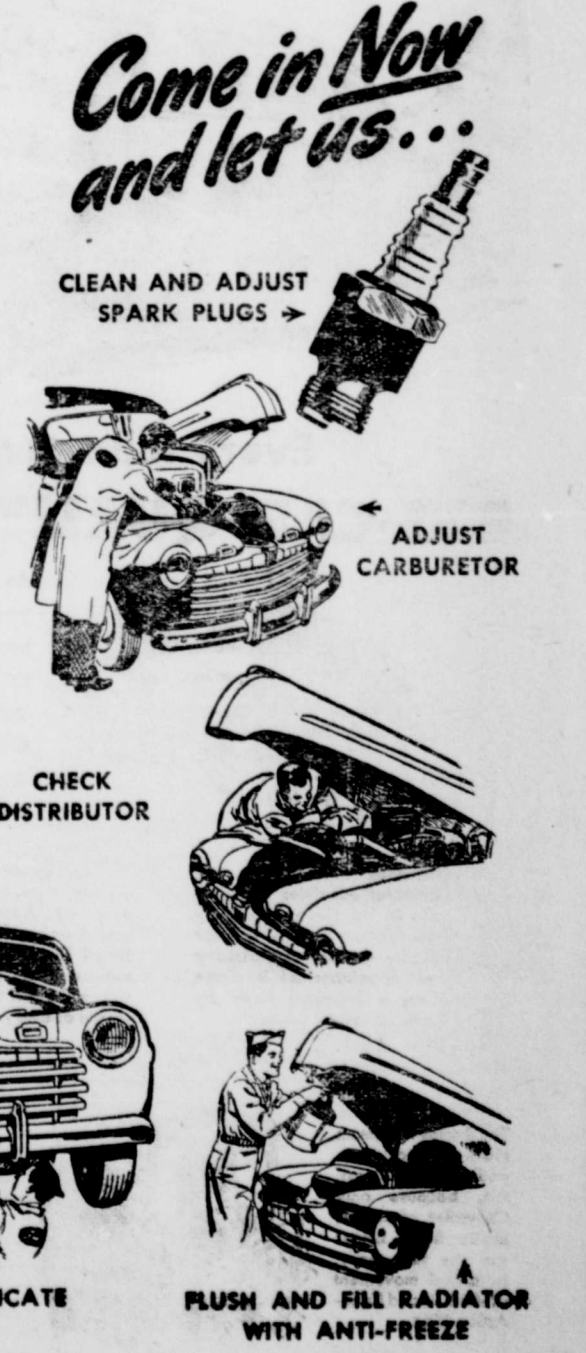

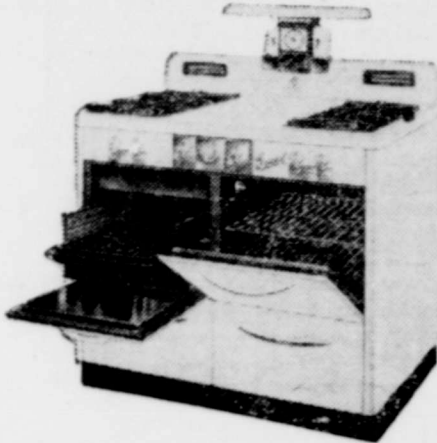

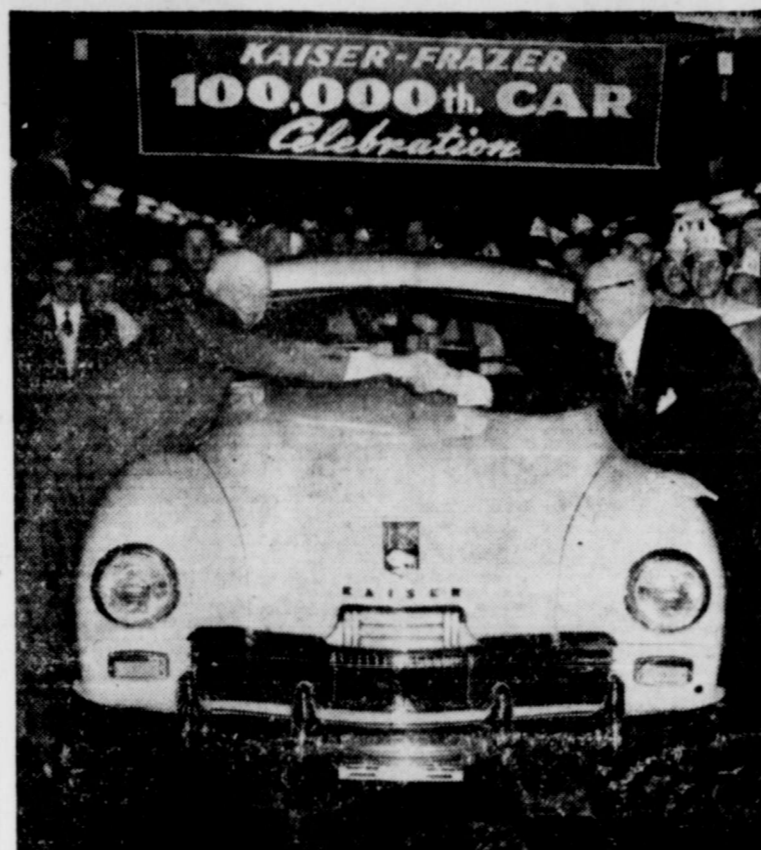
