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

## Mrs. Harry Felgar Critically Injured Sunday Night

At press time today, the condition of Mrs. Harry Felgar still remained critical.

Mrs. Felgar, employee at the United Gas Office, suffered a ruptured bladder and a broken left leg, when she was run over by a truck in the driveway at her home about 8:30 p. m. Sunday night.

Details of the accident are somewhat vague, but according to Mr. Felgar, he had started to the grocery store. When he felt the truck pass over a bump he stopped and found his wife crushed under the truck. It is presumed she ran out to stop her husband, got entangled in the long house-coat she was wearing and fell behind the truck.

Mrs. Felgar was rushed to the Wichita General Hospital in an Owens & Brumley ambulance where she received several blood transfusions. Her injuries were of such a nature that immediate surgery was necessary. Reports Tuesday were that the operation was a success and with no complications she would recover. However, late Tuesday night she developed pneumonia and is under an oxygen tent. Although still in serious condition she is resting as well as can be expected.

## Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

### What To Do For Loafing Layers

What corrective measure will you adopt when the daily egg record indicates your layers are heading for a slump? On many poultry farms, the flockowner's first impulse is to cull out the laggards — and, indeed this is frequently a wise and necessary move. Usually, however, it's best to check up first on your feeding practices and other management methods to find out whether it is something you have done or omitted doing which might be responsible for the decreased production.

#### Provide Balanced Ration

If, after a fairly thorough examination of your flock, it appears that the physical condition of the birds is good and if you can satisfy yourself that lice, mites, or worms are not responsible, then the chances are probably good that the birds aren't getting a properly balanced ration. That is a common trouble during the winter months.

You may find that you can alleviate the trouble by simply increasing the amount of laying mash, and cutting back slightly

on the daily ration of grain. If it appears that the hens' appetites are not up to par, try moistening the mash and feeding it to the birds in a crumbly form.

**A Tonic May Help**  
Commercial tonic appetizers, mixed in the mash, frequently

help restore birds' appetites, too, thereby lifting the laggards out of their laying slump. In any event your feed dealer or other authority should be consulted if you feel it is necessary to change feeding methods.  
The use of artificial lighting in

the evening or morning will boost feed consumption and help the production in almost every instance. If your laying house is not equipped with lights, why not install them soon and give your layers the benefit of longer feeding day?

Insufficient feeding and ing space is often cause for laying. If there is over-crowding at the feeders, it means that of the birds are not getting enough to eat. The same to water fountains.

## 140 Million Capitalists

"Soak the Rich" used to be quite  
a popular slogan in some quarters.  
Whether the same words are used  
today, the same idea still appeals to  
a large number of people. The plan  
put forward by these folks boils  
down to one main issue: limit the in-  
comes of citizens in the high brackets  
and divide it among the other  
people. By putting more money in  
the hands of more people they hope  
to attain a greater prosperity.

However, this economic Utopia  
theory runs afoul of economic fact  
and economic law. Its basic plat-  
form is hinged on the idea that most  
of the nation's money is held by a  
comparative few. A greater mis-  
conception is hardly possible. In the  
light of sound reasoning and cold  
statistics, the absurdity of this no-  
tion is obvious. No other civilization  
has seen a more equitable distribu-  
tion of wealth among its people.

## The People's Money

For example, a tabulation of in-  
come tax returns for 1942 shows the  
full impact of the results of our  
American system. In that year the  
group of individuals receiving in-  
come of less than \$5,000 annually,  
representing 96 per cent of the coun-  
try's population, paid 47 per cent of  
all federal personal income taxes.  
This, too, is the group which since  
1931 has averaged at least 88 per  
cent of the nation's annual income.  
In comparison, some 1,321,000  
people reported incomes in excess  
of \$5,000 during the same year. This  
group—approximately 4 per cent of  
the population—paid 53 per cent of  
all federal personal income taxes.  
In the above-\$5,000 group, only 22.3  
per cent of their income came from  
interest, dividends, rents, royalties,  
and fiduciaries. This is a far cry  
from the well worn "coupon clip-  
pers" line of attack of radical  
planners.

### HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Slip-cover baby's bottle. A wool bag will keep the milk from cooling. A drawing at the top will fit the cover snugly to the bottle.

If your fabric has any holes or flaws in it, mark them plainly with pins, so you can cut around them. Be especially careful if the fabric has a definite pattern. Plan before cutting in such an instance.

To keep a recipe card in view and out of the way while cooking, insert the card between the tines of a fork placed handle down in a glass.

If you plan to have pop-corn strings for the Christmas tree this year, pop the corn a day or two before it's to be used. This gives pop-corn a chance to become tough, and the kernels won't break when the needle is pushed through them.

To cut cardboard, use a sharp pocket knife. Rubber is more easily cut if the knife blade is moistened with water. To cut thick leather, first immerse it in warm water for two or three hours.




