Management Is Important

It's an easy matter to fall into bad poultry management habits. Sometimes even the most elementary principles of good laying flock care are overlooked or simply forgotten in the rush of other activities. Some of our best poultry raisers, men with years of experience in the business are occasionally guilty of committing one violation or another.

So it will pay to take stock of yourself and your management practices now and then. Listed below are a few of the elementary rules of good laying house management. Study them over

and then judge yourself accordingly.

There should be at least three square feet of floor space, including roost area, for each bird of light breed and four square feet of floor space for heavy breeds. Don't overcrowd layers. You invite trouble by so doing.

Provide one 5 gallon waterer more if necessary, in hot weather, for each 100 layers. Fill fountains daily with clean, fresh (but not cold) water. Clean and disinfect the fountains at least once a week.

Have a minimum of three 6-foot feeders, open on both sides, for each 100 hens. Do not fill hoppers to overflowing. If they are about two-thirds full, spillage will be avoided.

Have enough nests so that there is one for every five laying hens. The nests should measure at least one cubic foot for light breeds and slightly larger for heavies.

A deep, or built-up, litter is usually the most satisfactory. Starting the litter in the fall at a depth of about three inches, the poultry raiser should add a small amount every two weeks. Deep litter provides excellent insulation against the cold.

Allow 8 to 10 inches of roost space for each bird, and place perches 14 inches apart.

Clean and disinfect the house and equipment at regular intervals.

Household Hints

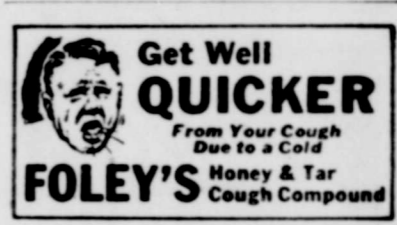
For a flash of color with your skirt and blouse or wool dress try the new vogue—a thin wool scarf with fringed ends used as a sash.
