Russia's actions have struck fear in many hearts. Already they figure on another Pearl Harbor, only believing it will be Alaska this time, the aggressor being the Communists instead of the Japanese.

duction. Colds can practically ruin a whole laying season. Production may fall off 50 per cent and more within a few days after a flock sustains an outbreak of colds; and the condition may persist for several weeks.

Usually, colds result indirectly from errors in management or faulty construction in the laying house itself. When the poultry raiser permits his flock to become chilled, or when he fails to remove damp spots in the litter, or makes no attempt to plug up cracks in the walls or to replace broken window panes — if he is guilty of all these, then he is inviting an outbreak of coryza. A cold, damp, and drafty laying house is the ideal environment for a cold epidemic. So eliminate those conditions with proper ventilation and insulation.

Once the disease has appeared the sick birds should be isolated. Infected chickens at first have a nasal discharge of watery consistency; later it becomes sticky. There may be some swelling of the face, wattles, and skin of the neck. Difficult breathing and coughing may be noted. While mortality is not usually high, the birds go out of production and often become culls.

Good results are being obtained in controlling infectious coryza (colds) by using sulfathiazole products, which most poultry medicine dealers can supply. The use of inhalants or nasal washes will frequently give affected birds temporary relief by loosening congestion in the upper respiratory passages. Recovered birds are apparently immune to the disease. However, since they still may carry the infection it is advisable to keep them separated from younger stock.

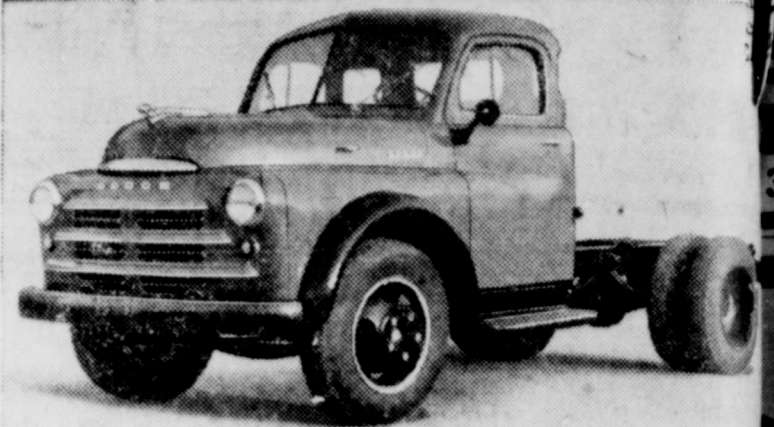

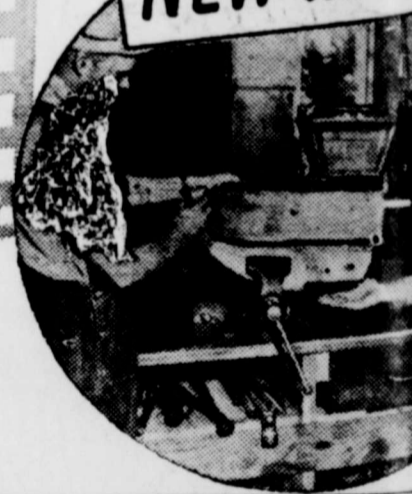

With the production today of its 1,000,000 vehicle in 1947, Chevrolet became the first single company in the automobile industry to manufacture a million cars and trucks a year since before the war.

Announcement of the production milestone was made by Nicholas Dreystadt, general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division, who said all of the vehicles were made in the plants of Chevrolet in the United States, and that the total does not include Canadian output.

The 1,000,000 total, Dreystadt said, includes passenger cars, trucks and commercial vehicles. The last time Chevrolet manufactured 1,000,000 vehicles a year before 1947 was in 1941, when domestic production reached 1,173,799 units.

30. 1948 will see a continuation of "feather" workless jobs, and which result in slow labor saving machine installed. The public is realizing that inflation beaten only by inflation.

31. Sometime during the year a reduction in many lines caught up with which will prevent further increases in such lines.

32. There will be more price investigation in 1948. Both the Democrats and Republicans will try to blame for high prices the other party.

Stock Market

33. We believe that 1948 will be a year of switching reasons. One of these attempts to get out of companies which have their assets in big volume of war cities into whose assets are well and safe from attack.

34. The administration to keep the Dow-Jones Averages between an average of around 185 and around 165. Commodities will be curbed.

35. The wisest will pick any special winner but will diversify those who have too much will gradually build a reserve, in cash or gold for the big break which is coming.

36. Careful buyers will insist on making a margin and avoid borrowing 1948.

BONDS

We are definitely for low-coupon rate, long-term bonds. Many of these will be lower prices in 1948 than in 1947. Money rates will gradually rise.

38. If Congress gives a reduction in Federal tax rates in high brackets will see a further fall in the prices of most municipal bonds. Other tax-exempt bonds expected such a desired reduction.

39. In view of the late 1947, this rate of decline will begin to level off during 1948. Investors will give more attention to dividend-paying stocks in 1948 and not become overly interested in railroad ties, telephone issues and public utilities, many of which are now selling too high for their value.

Real Estate

41. City real estate will continue to hold firm through 1948. There is less available space by pulling down structures, taxes, to provide parking etc. There also is a desire to build city property in the present high interest building costs.

42. Suburban real estate will continue in greater demand, still higher prices during 1948. Big commercial buildings may sell for less than their cost but subsistence farms close to established communities will hold up in price.

44. General building will increase during 1948. They are gradually getting tired of living with their in-laws.

45. Both office and property owners are receiving higher rentals, such as are granted will be as much building as they follow.

46. Mortgage rates during 1948 will continue about the same as in 1947. These rates are favorable for those who have the courage to build. However, 1948, it will be harder to get mortgage loans.

Politics

47. Both President Truman and the Republican leaders playing politics up to 1948. It is now too early to forecast the outcome of the presidential election. The price controversy that man has a fair chance of winning.
