Exemptions For 21 Year Olds At C of C Office

Many twenty-one year olds may be overlooking an exemption which will entitle them to vote in the many elections for this year.

Regardless of residence, all persons who have attained the age of 21 since January 1, 1947 or who will become 21 prior to an election this year must secure an exemption certificate in order to cast a legal vote—of course, they are not allowed to vote until they are 21.

Those who are entitled to exemptions may secure same at the Chamber of Commerce office.

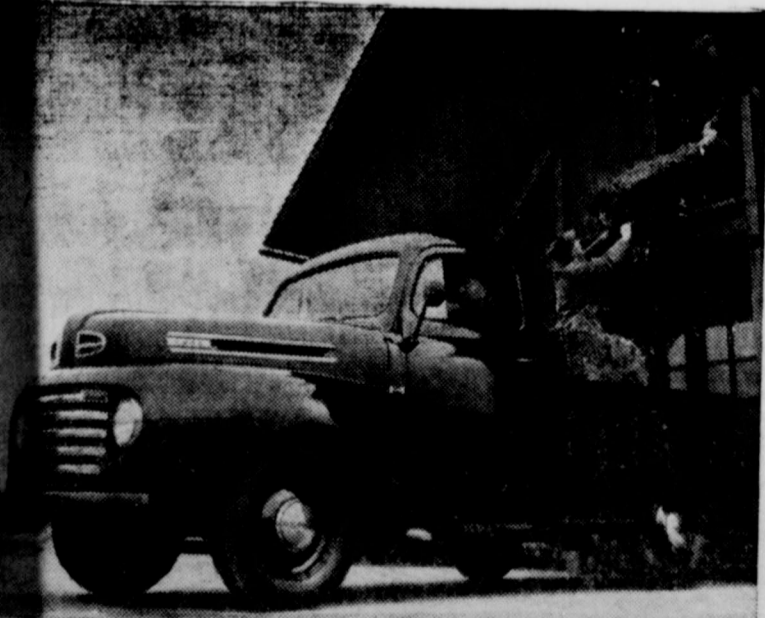
Members of the Current Literature Club met last week in the home of Mrs. C. M. Archer. Roll Call was answered by "Latin phrase in common usage."

When Good Fellows Get Together

There's still a lot of good in the world. We're speaking of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and the Boy Scouts of America. When these two great public spirited organizations, neither of which has any commercial, political or religious angles, get together for the benefit of American youth splendid things are going to happen. Here is what has taken place:

Lafayette A. Lewis, national head of the Elks, and Dr. Elbert K. Fretwell, chief Scout executive, have made a compact whereby the 1475 Elk lodges throughout the country, with 900,000 members, will be urged to undertake financially and actively the sponsorship and organization of from one to three new Scout troops each, to add to the 600 troops already under the Elks' patronage. This

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is a nationwide effort to discourage juvenile delinquency and to build real American citizenship.

There are now 68,000 Boy Scout troops. It isn't enough. Each year approximately 1,000,000 boys reach the age of 12. About 700,000 of them express the desire to become Boy Scouts. At present only 400,000 can be admitted. So the BPOE has come forward in an attempt to provide units for the 300,000 leftovers, with World War II Elk veterans as troop leaders.

Just another example, and an important one, of the Elks' unselfish work for their fellowmen.

INEVITABLE: Our Fault

It had to come. Even while Americans were trying to get the bad taste of the London conference out of their mouths, Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov was savoring the same flavor by publicly blaming the failure of the talks on the United States.

In a statement broadcast by the Moscow radio Molotov asserted that the American delegation "undertook to disrupt the entire work of the London conference" because "for some reason" the United States wanted to delay settlement of Germany's future.

However, said he expansively, the Big Four talks were not altogether fruitless, mainly because of "the efforts of the Soviet delegation." The exact nature of those efforts he did not pause to explain.

Repeating charges which he had made in London, Molotov said that the western powers, led by the U. S., were pursuing a policy "aimed at Germany's disintegration rather than unity, a policy... which has already resulted in the actual splitting of Germany."

FIRE LOSS: Greatest

With the great toll of the Texas City explosion heading the list, fires and related disasters cost the United States almost 700 million dollars in 1947, the national board of fire underwriters said in its year-end report.

It was the highest damage loss in history of the nation, and the greatest annual peacetime loss for any country in the world.

By way of vivid comparison, the board pointed out that two years of the German air war against Great Britain cost only an estimated 400 million dollars in property damage.

Thirty-three major conflagrations, including the Texas City disaster and the Maine forest fires, involved damages of more than 100 million dollars. This also was the largest number of major fires in any one year, each representing losses of a million dollars or more.

There were 28 such major fires in 1946, 26 in 1945 and 25 in 1944.

Most costly by far of the year's holocausts was the ammonium nitrate explosion at Texas City on April 16. More than 500 persons were killed, 3,000 injured and property damage ran above 32 million dollars.

Next in importance from the standpoint of material destruction were the Maine forest fires, where property loss at Bar Harbor alone was estimated at 6 million dollars.

Third biggest disaster was the explosion of an oil tanker in Los Angeles harbor last June.

The number of lesser fires in 1947 exceeded 840,000.

SCRIPTURE: John 4:5-26; Romans 8:12-17, 21-39. DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalm 103.

Our Relationship to God

Lesson for January 18, 1948

THE Scripture lesson for Sunday is John 4:5-26 and Romans 8:12-17 and 31-39, with the 103rd Psalm as the devotional reading.

The passage in John presents the dramatic story of Jesus meeting with the woman from Sychar at Jacob's well, and of her discovery of the Water of Life.

There is no more convincing evidence anywhere in the Bible of Jesus as the one and only approach to God. He is the Door through which one must pass into the Kingdom, whether bond or free, rich or poor, ignorant or learned, high or low.

Jesus Teaches About God

IN THIS great story we see Jesus, weary from the day's arduous tasks, sitting on the curb of Jacob's well, resting. The disciples had gone across the valley to the village to buy food. The woman comes to draw water from the historic well. She did not notice Jesus until he spoke to her. He is never too busy, never too weary, to seek to bring all men to a knowledge of God's love.

He asked for a drink of water. That was his way of making contact with her. She drew back, wondering why a Jew would speak to a woman in public. But Jesus got past the immediate wall which she threw up between herself and him, and soon was teaching her the way of everlasting life, to which she responded with gratitude.

How We Worship God

READ John 4:5-26 and see how Jesus led the woman of Sychar to understand true worship. Strange enough, she knew a good deal about Jewish rites and ceremonies, but she had never known the basic truth that "God is a Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth."

Included in the record of how Jesus taught the woman to worship was the necessity of confessing her sin, having five husbands, and living at the moment with still another man. We cannot worship God if there is unconfessed sin in our hearts.

We often miss the joy of true worship because we fail to confess our sins. God looketh upon the heart. If there is sin in our hearts it must be forgiven.

Our Need of God

"I shall die," Romans 8:13. Here is a solemn truth that many seem to forget — apart from God we are dead. The young person who undertakes to live with eating food will soon discover that his body is wasting away and his mind is broken and dissipated. Just so with the spirit of man. We are spiritual creatures, made in the image of God. If we live by the flesh, we die spiritually.

In the preceding chapters in Romans, Paul has shown how sin worketh death. He sets forth the penalties that result from carnal thinking and behavior. But in the 16th verse he comes on to say:

"It is the Spirit himself bearing witness with our spirit that we are the sons of God, or children of God," Romans 8:16.

Strong in the Lord

OUR age has made much of might — might that expresses itself in speed. We think in terms of atomic power. This lesson would help us to understand that we may be strong in the Lord. All power is with him. "All power hath been given me in heaven and on earth," said Jesus.

And this leads us to the climax of Sunday's lesson, when Paul declares: "For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord," Romans 8:38, 39.

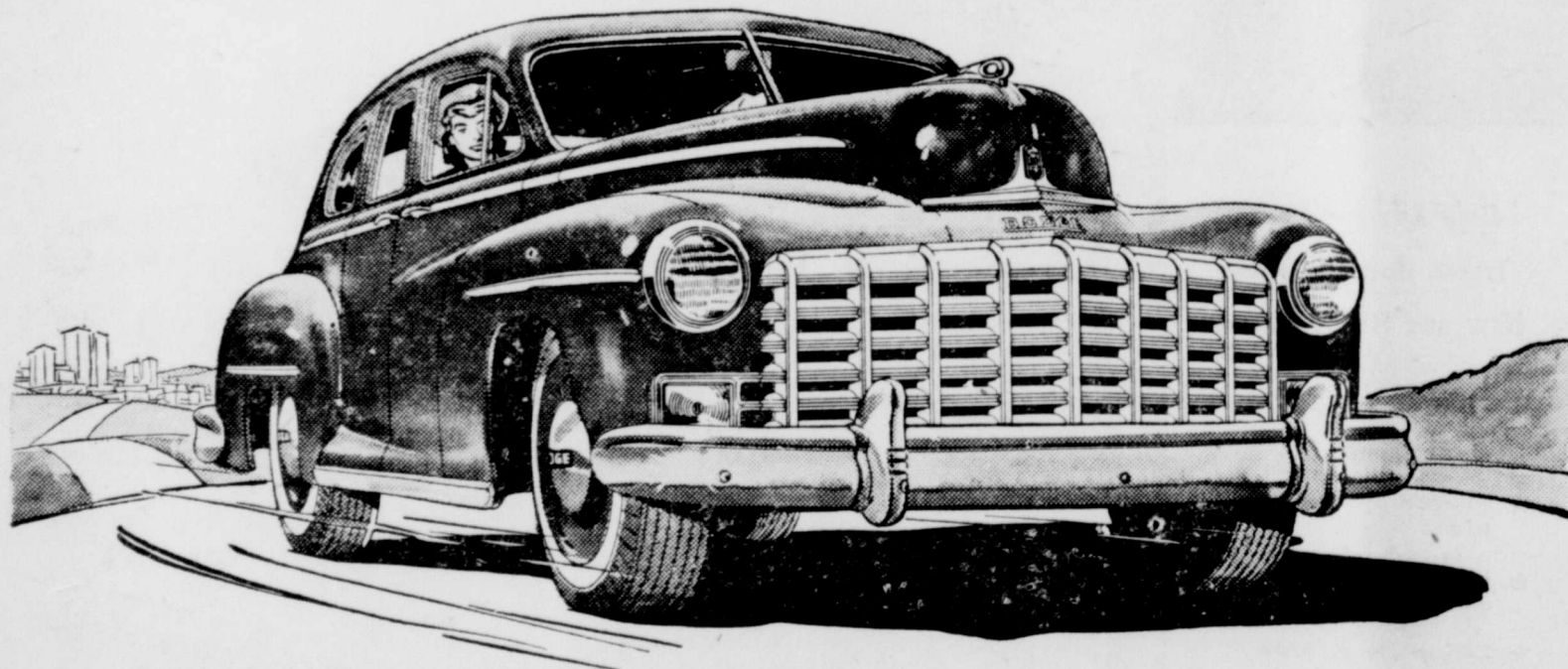

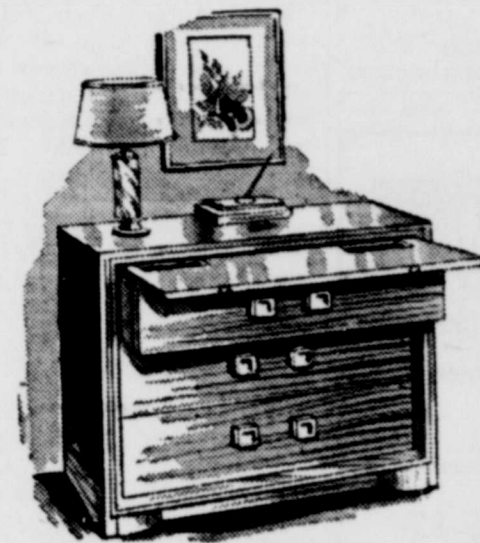

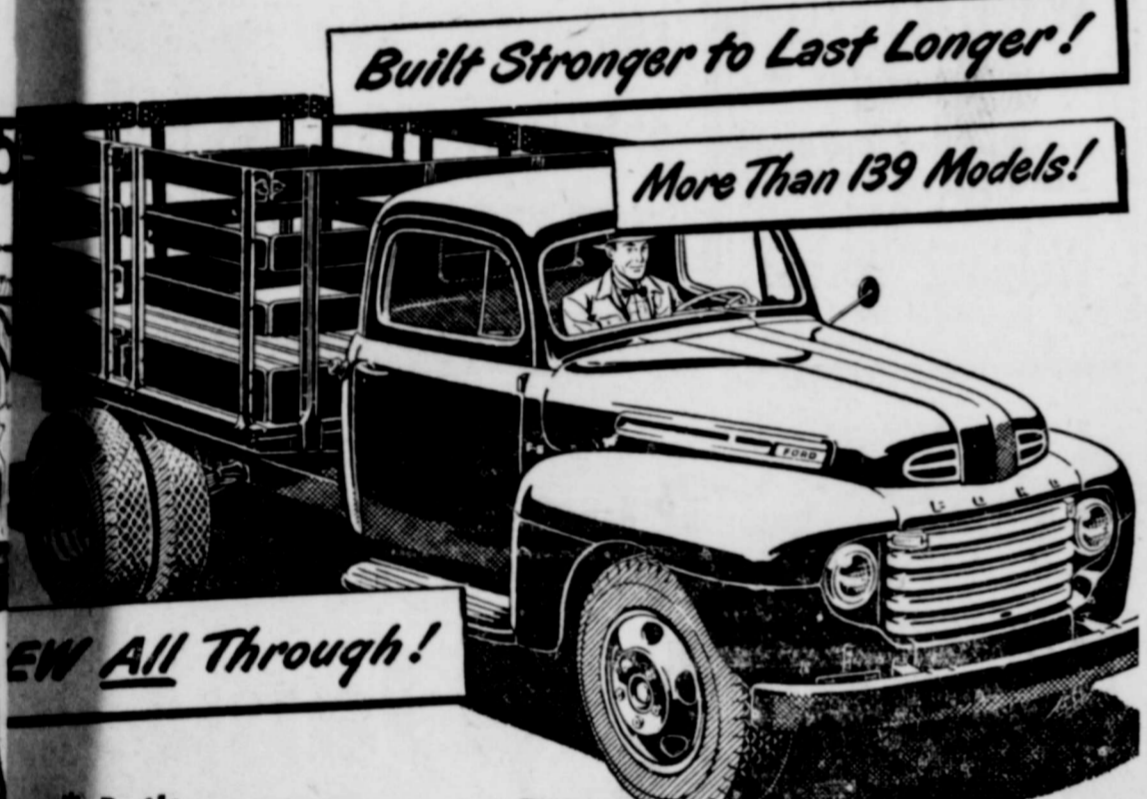
