## Tax Reduction Measures

The fight over tax reduction is sure to be resumed and the Republicans under the leadership of Representative Knutson of Minnesota will force a bill through Congress to cut Federal taxes \$5,600,000. Both branches of Congress passed similar tax reduction measures at the last session. President Truman vetoed both measures, and he was over-riden by the House. In the Senate he won his point by a scratch of less than a half dozen votes, even though the Senate did register almost two-thirds majority over the veto.

One authority says that Europe probably will not get all of the aid it expects — which is a strange prediction, because Europe is already assured plenty of foreign aid.

## Sports Afield

By Ted Kesting

Too often when the fisherman resurrects his tackle in the spring he finds that winter storage has caused considerable damage to his equipment. A few suggestions from Jason Lucas, outdoor writer and angling expert, may help you avert this calamity.

The bamboo rod probably requires more care than any other article, since it is easily affected by heat or dampness. A damp basement may cause strips of bamboo to peel from the rod and render it unsatisfactory for further use. Dry heat will cause the bamboo to shrink to such that the ferrules come loose, which necessitates extensive repairs.

Before storing a bamboo or steel rod it is a good idea to give it a coating of floor or auto wax, which will protect it from any bad atmospheric effects.

It is well to clean reels before storing, for dirt eventually may cause discoloration. A reel must be completely taken apart for cleaning, but this is such a simple process that it should dismay no one. Carbon tetrachloride, being non inflammable is fine for cleaning a reel. An old toothbrush is ideal for cleaning the gears. Be sure that the steel parts are well oiled or, in a damp climate, covered with petroleum jelly before putting the reel away.

Silk casting line should be thoroughly dried, or it will soon decay and stored in a dry place. Melted grease can be quickly ap-

plied to hooks with a small, round paint brush. To preserve their finish, plugs may be coated with wax before being put away. Store your tackle carefully and you will be rewarded in the spring, when you are impatient for the thrill of that first strike, and any delay is exasperating.

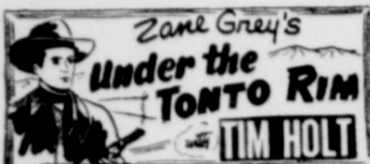

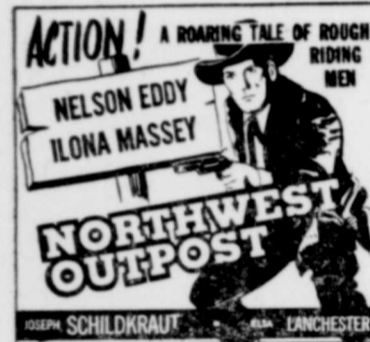

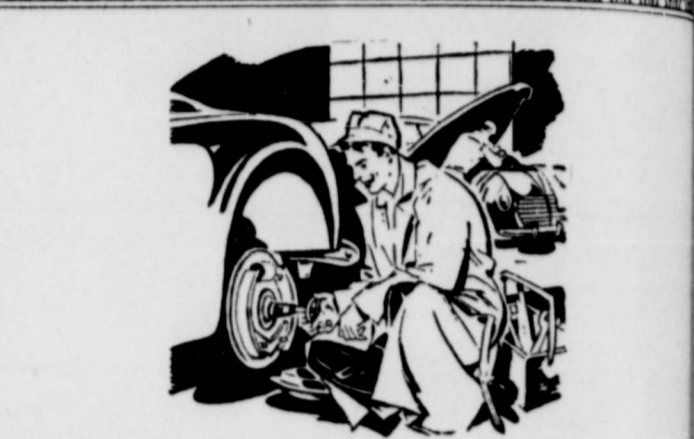

## FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. Does marketing hogs at lighter weights lower the feed requirement per pound of gain?

A. Definitely. The heavier the hog, the higher the feed requirement per pound of gain. Results from the Ohio Experiment Station on one of their feeding tests illustrate this point:

Weight of Hogs	Lbs. Feed per 100 lbs. Gain
200 to 300 lbs.	415
300 to 400 lbs.	470
400 to 500 lbs.	510

Q. How can shrinkage in weight be prevented when freezing poultry?

A. According to work done at the University of Missouri and at Pennsylvania State College, there is no shrinkage in weight when carcasses are wrapped in moisture vapor-proof wrappings before being frozen, and the original freshness is retained as well. There is a two-fifth per cent shrinkage in weight when the carcass is unwrapped in freezing. Missouri University recommends that whole or cut-up chicken be frozen in a film of ice inside a water-proof wrapper.

Q. How much floor space, feeder space and water space is required for growing ducks?

A. Recommendations of the Ralston Purina Company per duckling are:

Floor Feeder Water Space Space
1 Day to 2 Wks. 1/2 sq.ft. 1/2 in. 1/2 in.
2 Wks. to 4 Wks. 1 sq.ft. 1 in. 1 in.
4 Wks. to 7 Wks. 2 sq.ft. 2 in. 2 in.
7 Wks. to Mkt. 3 sq.ft. 2 in. 2 in.

Q. How many cows should a bull be able to service in a year?

A. A bull from one to two years old should not be used on more than 25 cows. A mature bull can handle up to 60 if the breedings are spaced through the year. Artificial insemination is becoming more widely used each year and permits much more extended use of good sires.

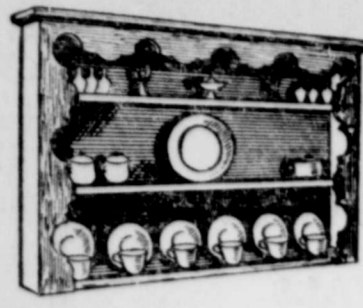

Truman Asks Tax Cut in Message, Arouses Strong GOP Opposition; Brazil Moves to Oust Communists

MESSAGE: Tax Issue

Whether President Harry Truman's state of the union message to congress was "socialistic," as Republican partisans dubbed it, or "forthright and courageous," as in the eyes of loyal Democrats, remained a matter of opinion, but it was fairly obvious that in making it the President had cast a loving glance toward next November's election day.

He proposed a combination tax-cutting-and-raising device that manifestly has no chance of passage in the Republican dominated congress but one that sounds good to a lot of voters.

His plan, embodying tax-relief to the "little man," would give each individual taxpayer an immediate \$40 tax cut for himself and for each dependent. To offset that reduction in federal income he proposed that corporation taxes be raised by 3.2 billion dollars.

Mr. Truman presented the scheme as a "cost of living" credit designed primarily to relieve the small taxpayer.

In a phrase certain to be quoted with relish by Democratic orators during the coming campaign, the President said he wants to keep revenue collections where they are and still help those who need relief to "buy the necessities of life."

Supplementing the tax proposals he called for a 75-cent-per-hour minimum wage, representing a 35-cent increase over the present 40-cent minimum. Although in the past he has favored raising the national minimum wage, the 75-cent figure was the highest flat demand he has made.

General tone of the President's message to the joint session led most observers to believe that he was swinging his administration back to "a little left of center," a point which generally is identified with New Deal philosophies.

Some saw in the speech a perceptible bid for the left-wing and liberal vote that Henry Wallace's third party is threatening to take away from the Democrats.

Republican reaction to Mr. Truman's speech was bitter and intense and the G.O.P. went ahead more determinedly with its own tax-reduction bill.

AND FURTHERMORE... Taxes were not the only controversial issue touched upon by Mr. Truman in his message to congress. He also asked for: 1. The once-rejected 10-point anti-inflation program with power to impose wage and price controls and rationing.

2. Universal military training. 3. Authorization of the four-year Marshall plan. 4. Stronger and extended rent controls.

5. Public housing for low-income families and government action to cut building costs. 6. Modernization of farm price supports and broader crop insurance.

7. Extension of unemployment compensation, old age and survivors' benefits, a national health plan and federal financial aid for education. 8. Admission of European refugees into the U. S. 9. Statchord for Alaska and Hawaii.

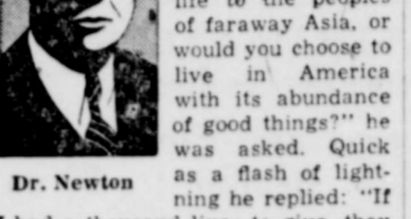
THE BIBLE SPEAKS

When We Work With God

Lesson for January 25, 1948



Dr. E. STANLEY JONES was in Atlanta on one of his several visits, and some of us were asking him about his notable and unique experience as a missionary in the Orient.

"If you had it all to go over, Dr. Jones, would you devote your life to the peoples of faraway Asia, or would you choose to live in America with its abundance of good things?" he was asked. Quick as a flash of lightning he replied: "If I had a thousand lives to give, they would all gladly go to the wistful souls of Asia."

Paul would have been enheartened in the day that he wrote II Corinthians 5:20 to 6:10, and Romans 12:9-21, to have heard someone talk as Dr. Jones talked that afternoon, for in our lesson for Sunday, Paul is summoning every Christian to the highest possible commitment to the will of God as we go forth in the task to beseech all men to be reconciled unto God through Jesus Christ, who hath taken upon himself the iniquity of us all.

Thus we come to see the significance and the meaning of the memory verse for Sunday's lesson, "We are fellow workmen for God," I Corinthians 3:9.

PEOPLE WHO WORK WITH GOD READ Hebrews' 11th chapter for a picture of some of the noble souls who really worked with God, by faith, as the writer delights to put it.

Abraham, for example, "went out, not knowing whither he went," but when he came to the end of life's day, he was accounted the friend of God. Moses, "choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt, endured as seeing him who is invisible."

HOW WE WORK WITH GOD READ again that eleventh chapter of Romans to discover how the men and women named there worked with God. Two words will quickly come to light - faith and obedience. They believed God, and they obeyed God.

GOOD WORKMEN ESSENTIAL WE COME now to the deeper implications of the lesson, revealed in II Corinthians 5:20 to 6:10. "We then, as workers together with him, beseech you also that ye receive not the grace of God in vain; but in all things approving ourselves in much patience, in afflictions, in distresses, in watchings, by kindness, by love unfeigned, by the power of God..."

Here is the acid test of doing the work of an ambassador of Christ - we must first be fully committed to him before we can persuade others to accept him as Saviour and Lord. We shall not have better homes and better churches until we first have better business men.

And the only way by which we become good workmen is through the redeeming, transforming grace of the Lord Jesus Christ.

JOY OF WORKING WITH GOD WHY did Dr. E. Stanley Jones answer so quickly about giving a thousand lives to the benighted, wistful souls of Asia? Because he had discovered the unspeakable joy of working with God in reconciling men unto him. The largest, surest wages in this world is the experience of working for and with God. "What I kept, I lost; what I gave, I have."

Do you believe it? It is difficult to believe until you try it. Indeed, I would say that it is beyond all imagination to grasp the meaning of working with God. You have to take Christ at exactly what he meant when he said, "Come and see."

"When we walk with the Lord, in the light of his word, what a glory he sheds on our way!"

# Telephone preview for 1948

As we enter 1948, the 50,000 telephone people in the Southwest are continuing to work hard to make telephone service better than ever and to get service to people waiting. Here is what we think 1948 will bring:

#### INSTALLATIONS

Shortages of switchboards, cable, and wire continue, but we were able to install 460,000 new telephones last year for a net gain of 295,000. This year we expect to equal or better that total.

#### CONSTRUCTION

Dollars spent on construction last year came to 115 million, close to three times as much as in any prewar year. In 1948, the job will take even more money—150 million dollars! That will buy new buildings, switchboards, cable, wire, and other things needed to supply more and better telephone service.

#### DEMAND

Demand for telephones continues at 50,000 a month. New orders keep the waiting list long, but it is smaller now than a year ago. About 200,000 persons in the 700 exchanges we serve are now waiting for service, but 3 out of 4 of them applied in 1947.

#### LONG DISTANCE

Improvements in long distance service are coming in 1948 as we add more miles of wire needed to handle calls. Some 50,000 miles of circuits were added in 1947. We expect to double that total in 1948.

#### SERVICE

Telephone service will grow better as more switchboard equipment brings relief from the extra-heavy loads now being carried. More than 18 million calls a day were made in the Southwest during 1947. This is well over a million more than the previous year, and a new record. The trend is upward for 1948.

#### RURAL SERVICE

We connected 50,000 more rural telephones last year. Our large-scale program to bring telephone service to more farms will continue in 1948. We hope to be serving 260,000 telephones in rural areas by the end of this year, nearly twice as many as at the start of 1946.

We worked hard to do what we did in 1947. We've still got an uphill job. We'll be doing the best we can to put in more telephones and further improve telephone service during 1948.

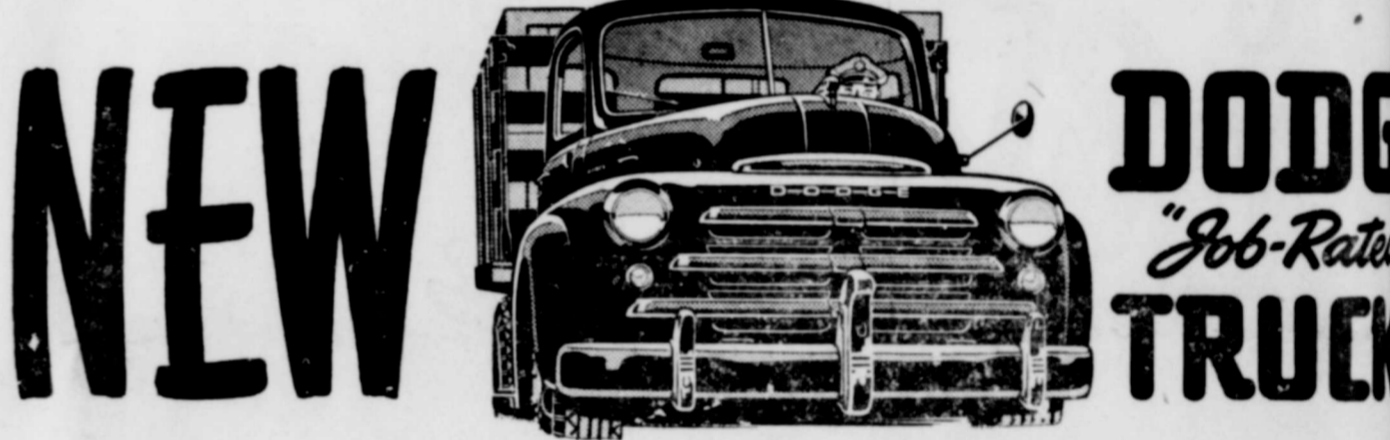
