Boy Scouts Mark 38th Anniversary

Scouting is having a rebirth in many of the countries ravaged by the war. The Boy Scouts International Bureau in London reports a world membership of 4,409,780 boys and leaders in 42 nations.

World peace and mutual understanding is an objective of Scouting. Through World Scout Jamborees and the resultant expanding interest in friendships, understanding and personal relationships through correspondence these aims are increasingly being met. The Sixth World Jamboree last summer brought 30,000 Boy Scouts and leaders together in France from 38 nations.

The Boy Scouts of America is the largest group in the World Scout Brotherhood. Its 2,120,000 Scouts and Leaders are members of 68,500 units. They in turn come under the jurisdiction of 545 Local Boy Scout Councils which provide camping experience, leadership training, Scoutcraft activities and Courts of Honor to mark individual growth through the grades of the various programs.

The Barter Theatre cast of professional artists who will appear in Wichita Falls includes Carroll McComus who has been seen on Broadway in the title role of the Pulitzer prize play, "Miss Lulu Bett"; and opposite Walter Hampton in "Cyranos De Bergerac"; she replaced Catherine Cornell in the Shaw play "Candida" when it was first presented.

Marion Wilson is appearing with the Barter Theatre this year after being named by Miss Helen Hayes to a year's scholarship with the outstanding footlights group. AN EDITORIAL

Only five cents more of each tax dollar was required to educate the more than 1,500,000 grade, high school and college students in Texas during the last fiscal year than was required to pay the pensions of fewer than a quarter-million aged, blind persons and needy children.

Figures from the office of George H. Sheppard, state comptroller, also reveal that the cost of public school education, as compared with the overall cost of state government, decreased 5 per cent during the last fifteen years while pensions skyrocketed from 3 per cent to the total cost of 28 per cent.

The 33 cents of each tax dollar expended by the state for higher and public education is also only 5 per cent more than went into the maintenance and construction of highways last year, Sheppard's figures disclose.

At the same time it was shown that the total cost of state government has more than tripled in fifteen years, while cost of education to the state has not kept pace.

During the 1932-33 fiscal year the total expenditure for all governmental functions was \$107,922,451. Of this amount, \$40,529,256, or 38 per cent went for grade, high schools and college education. Only \$3,242,564, or 3 per cent went for public welfare. A total of \$49,589,036 was expended upon the highway system, that being 46 per cent.

In contrast, during the 1946-47 fiscal year total governmental expenditures amounted to \$319,988,100. The schools colleges and universities got \$106,013,331, or 33 per cent. Pensions for 217,458 aged, blind and children had skyrocketed to \$9,213,091, or 28 per cent of each tax dollar. High-

ways, while dropping to 28 per cent, had a total expenditure of \$91,146,484.

The comptroller's records reveal that pensions have marched upward each year during the last fifteen, but the cost of education has fluctuated.

Welfare checks have skyrocketed each year since 1932-33. They reached a total of \$22,013,982 within five years. During the next ten years aid for the aged, blind and children gained until their total was more than \$90,000,000 last year.

While the pension cost was steadily increasing, the schools' aid ebbed and flowed each fiscal year. It reached a low of 25 per cent in 1938-39, when \$45,640,985 was expended upon them.

"The spotlight of late has been on the increased appropriations for our schools, but official figures disclose that the cost of education has not kept pace with the total cost of government in Texas," Charles H. Tennyson, director of public relations for the Texas State Teachers Association, pointed out.

"Educators in Texas have fought long and hard to bring the state into the front ranks in education. We are making progress, but we are not doing so at the cost of other governmental functions."

Tennyson pointed out that not only does the 33 cents of the tax dollar help educate 1,500,000 grade and high school children and an estimated 50,000 students in state universities and colleges, but that it helps pay 46,500 public school teachers, a large number of persons on the college teaching staffs and an estimated 18,000 other persons employed by the various school systems.

"The last Legislature increased appropriations for the little red school house, its modern counterpart and the colleges, but the percentage of the tax dollar going into education is not expected to be much greater than the high for the last fifteen years," Tennyson said.

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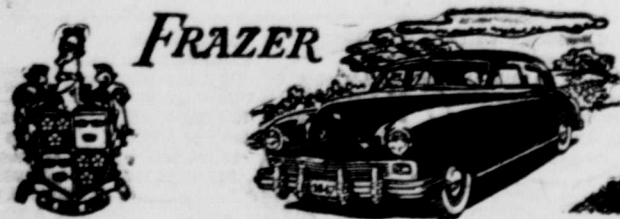

"If you want to live in the kind of a town, like the kind of a town you like," you'll have to be a builder with vision. Your town will progress as you grow in outlook and endeavor.

The municipal light plant is a community project worthy of your loyalty. If you want a prosperous place in which to live, remember — "It isn't the town, it's you."

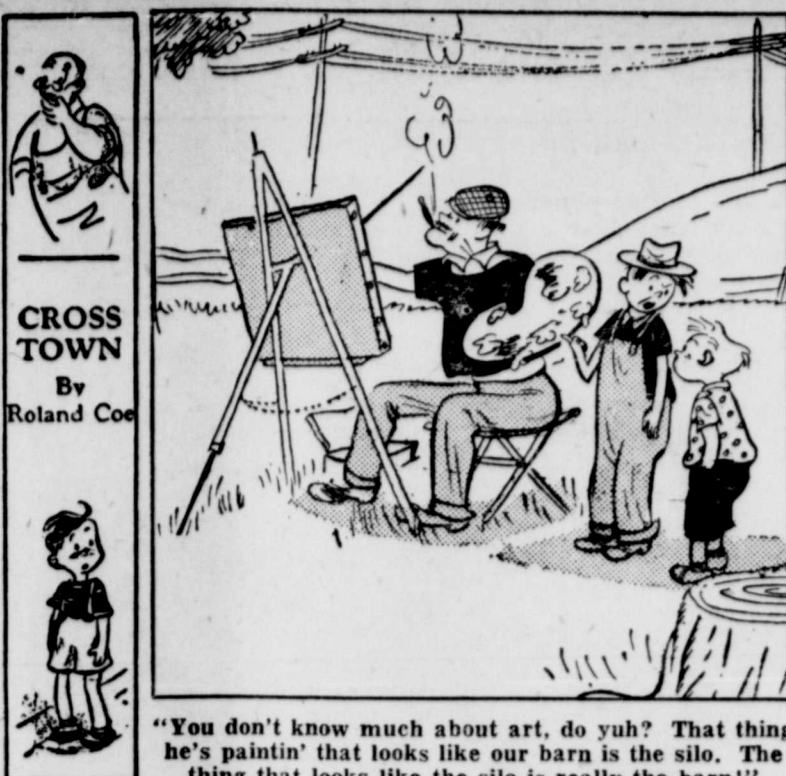

Safe Driving

What is your T. L. Q.? Your traffic law quotient, that is. Do you know the laws that help protect you from an automobile accident?

To familiarize the public with traffic laws and the necessity for obeying them, The Texas Department of Public Safety is cooperating in a nationwide "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February.

"In almost every accident, one or more drivers were violating some traffic law," said Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director. "Better voluntary observance of traffic laws would save a lot of lives."

One of the most common causes of accident is driving in the wrong lane, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol Division. He pointed out that National Safety Council statistics show driving on the wrong side of the road to be the second most frequent violation reported in traffic mishaps.

Keep right and you'll be left—to drive another day, he said.

Drive to the right of the centerline. On three lane roads, never drive in the far left lane, and on four lane roads, never drive to the left of the center.

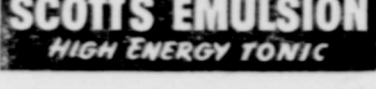

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

U. S. Publishes German Documents As Anti-Russian Propaganda Blow; Hoover Proposes Foreign Aid Cut

Released by WNU Features.

COLD WAR New Propaganda

The celebrated "cold war" has been enriched by another U. S. propaganda strike, probably the heaviest yet, against Russia. It took the form of official state department publication of captured German foreign office records revealing the extent and nature of Nazi-Soviet relations from 1939 to 1941, the period covered by the non-aggression pact between the two nations which ended when Hitler attacked Russia on June 22, 1941.

In the light of the U. S.-Russian wartime alliance, the Nazi documents, published in book form, tell a sordid story of secret agreements, global gambling with nations for stakes and the feverish fetish of political expediency which gripped the minds of German and Russian leaders before and during the war.

High point of the hitherto secret dossier was the revelation that in 1940 Adolf Hitler and V. M. Molotov of Russia agreed that Britain and the U. S. must be excluded from Europe, Asia and Africa.

The book told also how, in 1940, Stalin had offered to join the German-Italian-Japanese axis if Hitler would give Russia a free hand in Finland, a military base near the Dardanelles and a dominant voice in the oil-rich Middle East. Then the documents show how Hitler, disdaining even to answer Stalin's proposition, ordered his armies to prepare "to crush Soviet Russia in a quick campaign."

Value of the publication of these documents at this time is questionable, despite the flagrantly apparent anti-Russian propaganda they can and will inspire. State department's action obviously was aimed at rallying public support behind the Marshall plan, soon to come up for congressional action, but it also would serve to aggravate and inflame the already dangerously touchy "cold war."

DOLLARS: Lordly

Just about the only record that Britons are interested in having broken when the revived Olympic games take place this summer is the one for the number of American dollars spent in England.

Harold Wilson president of the British board of trade, minced no words when he said with quiet desperation: "Quite frankly, we are going to discriminate between tourists who are bringing in dollars and those who are not."

There will be special concessions made for the people with dollars in their pockets. Certain hotels, Wilson implied, will be favored with special food supplies, fuel and labor for the purpose of catering to American tourists.

Opposition to this plan is being expressed, with some fury, as a combination of the inherent British love of fair play plus a general criticism of the Labor government's policies.

Editorialized the London Daily Mail: "As a bald exposition of the art of exploitation, this (Wilson's) statement would be hard to beat. Here is the profit motive in all its balmy, expounded by a minister whose party exists to repudiate it."

Balancing Act



Perplexed in the extreme was Rene Mayer, French minister of finance, who was caught in this pose as he explained to French newsmen the new fiscal measures adopted by the government and the method he will use in an attempt to balance France's 1948 budget.

FOREIGN AID: Hoover Plan

Herbert Hoover, former U. S. president, has urged congress not to commit this nation—even "morally"—to a four-year European recovery program, and advised a reduction of the 6.8-billion-dollar outlay proposed to carry the Marshall plan through its first 15 months.

In the 4,000-word statement which he filed with the senate foreign relations committee Hoover expressed his opposition views to the administration's foreign aid plans.

Of greater significance, however, was the fact that Hoover's own opinions amounted to a documentary of the entire right-wing conservative element of thinking which rejects an "internationalist" foreign policy on the grounds that U. S. resources should be concentrated at home.

Decriing even a "moral commitment" for the four-year period contemplated in the state department's proposals, he asserted the U. S. should keep itself entirely free "to end our efforts without recrimination."

He expressed, too, the fear that a lavish outpouring of aid would weaken the American economy to the extent that all world recovery would be defeated.

The volume of exports and funds proposed in the Marshall plan, he opined, might aggravate the already serious inflation, draining our national resources and continuing high tax rates, "all of which might bring depression and thus destroy the strength of the one remaining source of aid to a world of chaos."

REFUSAL: Prediction

About all the average U. S. citizen knows about Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is that he either will or will not get into the campaign for the Republican presidential nomination this year.

But Roy A. Roberts, president of the Kansas City Star and leading promoter of pro-Eisenhower sentiment, now says he definitely will not.

Roberts' prediction was that the general soon would remove himself from all consideration along those lines. Said Roberts: "I'll venture a guess that before June the general may take himself completely out of the political picture. I am sure the message will come when he lays aside his military uniform February 15."

He emphasized, though, that he was not speaking for Eisenhower. With Alf Landon, 1936 Republican presidential nominee, Roberts had been doing most of the political drum-beating for Eisenhower.

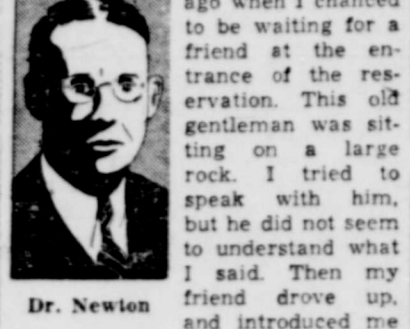
Rubber Bill

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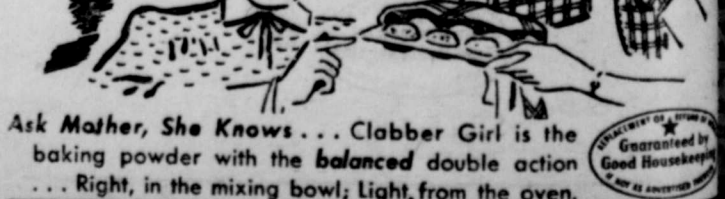

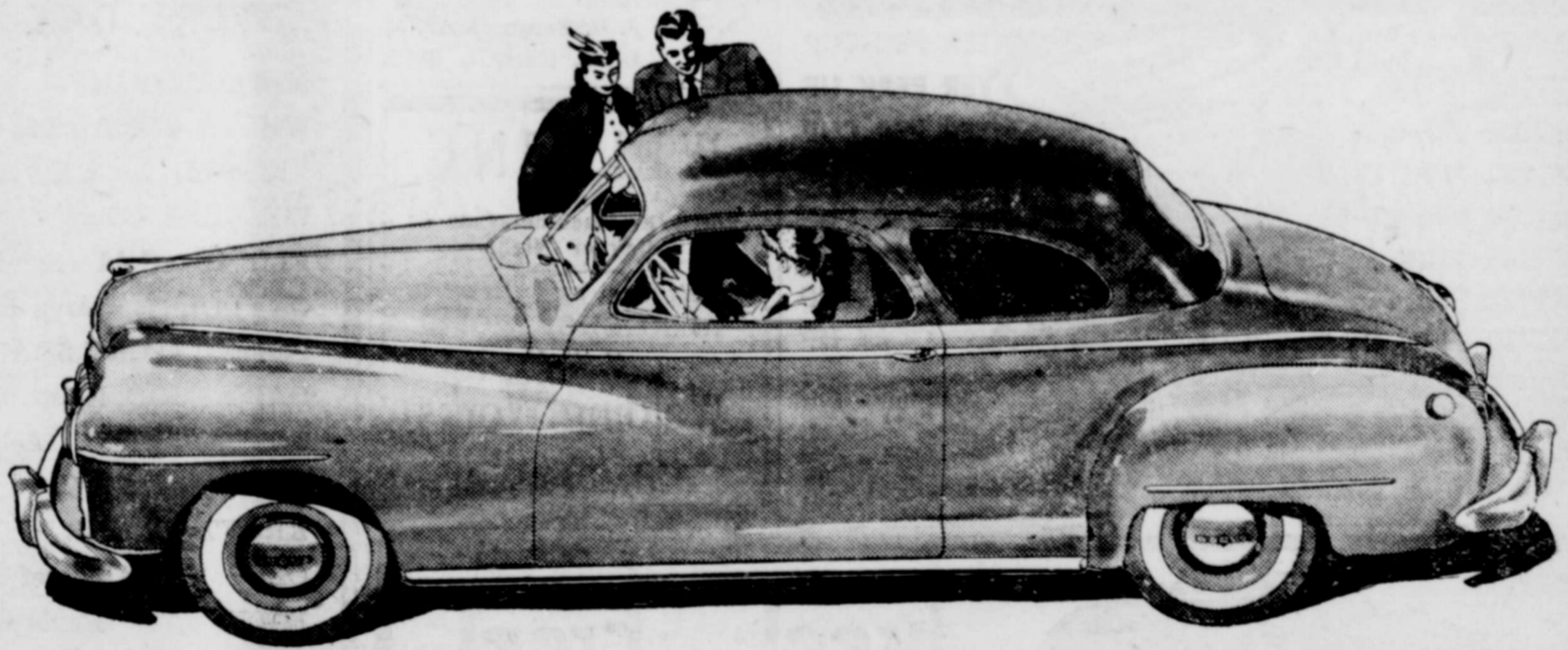

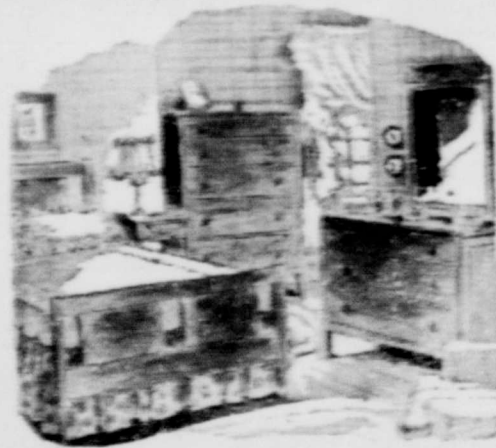
