

The European recovery program stresses the point that we give the necessary aid, to help others help themselves. Huge sums of money for reconstruction seems necessary to promote peace and understanding, but this is water down the drain if such money doesn't encourage those who receive it to try and improve their economic difficulties by exerting themselves to get back on their feet. This nation has been accused of being Imperialistic, of wanting to rule the world, of trying to buy our way. Such assertions are absurd and unfounded.

At a meeting with representatives of the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, Secretary of State Marshall emphasized this point of helping others help themselves. The the cold weather months. S., to those young farmers abroad who make important contributions to foreign agriculture. Spokesmen for the Junior Chamber also suggested that the outstanding young farmers of foreign countires, be invited to an annual exposition in this country, in order to exchange ideas about soil conservation, livestock breeding, farming procedures and so forth. Such group thinking, by such an active body of young Americans, is encouraging to those who have felt that too much of what goes abroad is to have no return on the investment.

And you'll want to use a different exposure than for flash shots at night; otherwise the background of your picture will "go black"; it will look like a night shot A good general rule to follow for

exposures of this sort is to set the camera just as you would if you were making the shot by sunlight, using no flash. This gives good exposure for highlights, background ime, of course, is to areas, or the sky-parts of your picture upon which the flash has little or no effect.

Then, rather than use the naked flash bulb at full strength, drape a white handkerchief over your flash reflector. This will cut the light by half. As a result, you'll have sufficient flash illumination to brighten the shadows without making your picture appear unnaturally bright. What you are actually doing, of course, is striking a balance between the sunlight and the artificial light

The black market offers twice as many francs for a dollar as the government allows officially. "The great problems of France are bad government, encouragement of the people to believe they can live without working, and the consequent failure of the people generally to produce."

Follow Up the Money! Mr. Weir thinks the German people must have full liberty in the reconstruction of their country. He branded the Morgenthau plan, as applied in Germany, "one of the great crimes of history." America should stop lending or giving money without proper planning and full investigation of the use of the money. At the same time, he believes Germany a safe place to put funds for reconstruction, with proper

plans. The individualism of the people in England, France, and the United States makes communism an unreal danger. He believes the people in these countries will never, for long, permit "the iron heel on their necks." It is his belief that a program financing foreign nations so they will not go communistic is without justification, "People who will stand for Communism will go in that direction irrespective of what we may do to the contrary.".

Need for Leadership Europe is loafing on the job of genuine recovery, he believes. "The day they roll up their sleeves and go to work, recovery will begin.". Visitors find the English and French, supposedly starving working only 40 hours a week. Mr. Weir asks: "Why don't they adopt a six, day week, which would greatly increase the production of all materials?" There are enough resources and manpower. "Given the right kind of leadership and adequate incentives . . . the peoples of Europe would work harder and more productively."

Mr. Weir's phrases "right kind of leadership" and "adequate incentives" suggest the key to this entire puzzle of European difficulties. Take away the profit motive and people lack incentive to work. Then add tax oppression and all the decay of leadership that Europe has had to put up with. The result is unrest and economic chaos. Grabbing the nearest "ism" will not bring prosperity, nor freedom of any kind, for anyone. That is the way to shackles that bind men: hands,

SOIL CONTROL: State or Federal?

One of the springtime battles now shaping up in congress will concern the issue of whether the national farm erosion program should be federally or state controlled.

Fireworks are scheduled to begin in March when the house agriculture committee opens hearings on a bill sponsored by Rep. Harry D. Cooley (Dem., N. C.) which would turn over the soil conservation program, operated by the agriculture department since 1935, to state land grant

Along with the transfer of authorwould go about 10.500 depart ment agents who administer the program in about 2,000 districts. That will provide a point of strong controversy, as will the measure's provision for federal grants to help states foot their soil-saving bills.

Pushing the switch from federal to state control most strongly is the national farm bureau, one of the most powerful lobbies in Washington, on the grounds that the soil conservation program would accomplish more under state author-

The federal program has not been the farm bureau contends. But opponents of the transfer counter with the argument that the states lack experience to handle the project satisfactorily.

Currently operating under an annual budget of 39 million dollars. federal soil conservation service has 10,500 persons working with farmers, helping prepare conservation plans which the farmers may accept or reject.



You Pay for It

Other day that classic journal of ours, the Arkansas Gazette, commented: "The government has it all figured out what people do with every penny of their money, Now, if only the people could figure out what the government does with it." That is a real poser! To be sure, government has to spend a lot of money. We are a big nation. Moreover, we find it necessary to take obligations in many foreign

whether the government (specifically the federal government, where they throw around big sums) spends no more than is needful is important to everyone. Government is not a luxury; it is a necessity. Yet, to read the budget figures you would think all operations were on a luxury basis.

Government Spends That government is expensive was proved again by John T. Flynn, who showed in Reader's Digest that TVA, a government project, forgot to include certain items in its bookkeeping. Instead of the indicated profit, there was a real deficit of \$130,000,000 to June 30, 1944. Flynn shows there was an actual loss in sales of power to that date of \$15,-000,000. This demonstrates that efficiency is a quality unknown to government operations.

Here's a prophecy. Wait until the budget is presented to this Congress, then watch the departments and bureaus fight any reductions. Increase the appropriation and swell the payroll - but shrink the swollen department? Never.

Way to Depression. This kind of selfishness means meager tax savings. It permits little tax reduction for folks who so much need relief. The more we tax and the more we spend for government, the nearer we get to depres-

Taxes of all kinds are too heavy these days. Corporation taxes are burdensome. Income taxes on all levels are too high. The individual income taxes cut down the rewards of the wage earner, keeping him from saving and investing. Instead, his tax payment is earmarked: "government expense." Some people oppose tax reductions for corporations and individuals, without realizing that continued heavy taxes will undermine our economic system and their own standard of living.

Decisions Lie Ahead

Obviously, one of the quickest ways to halt wasteful and unprofitable bureaucracy is to stop feeding fuel to its fires. Government, without a plentiful supply of tax money, could hardly be wasteful govern-ment. Congress has the power to say what the government shall spend and what amount it shall collect in taxes. It is up to us to see that our Congress keeps a proper rein on collections and expenditures.

Unwise spending and taxing could take this nation into the bankruptcy of communism. It could do it more quickly than anything else, Indeed, the power to tax is the power to destroy. We must see to it that America keeps an efficient and well-managed government, not a wasteful bureaucracy. That will be a powerful factor in deciding, in the coming months, whether America will remain prosperous and economically stable.

Right Or Left Don't Be Wrong

You have to keep left to be right, according to George Clarke managing director of the Texas Safety Association.

But let me tell you what I mean, before you think I sound mixed up, he said. "A left turn in heavy traffic is one of the most difficult maneuvers in an automobile, and it causes traffic tieups and accidents when bung-

Clarke said that the Texas Safety Association is cooperating in a nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February, and he cited National Safety Council statistics to show the need for such a program.

At least 31/2 % of all fatal pedestrian and non-pedestrian accidents involve a turning vehicle, and improper turnings was reported in from 4 to 5 per cent of all accidents.

Pointing out that about twice as many accidents involve left turns as right turns, Clarke listed five rules to remember in

making a left turn. Keep next to the center line of the roadway, so that no car will approach from behind on your left as you turn.

Turn around two points, one where the center of the street or road you are on meets the crosswalk or property line, and the other where the center of the street or road you are turning into leaves the crosswalk or prop-

Start to get in the proper lane for turning far enough back, at ast a block before the turn.

Use hand signals before makng the turn and be sure to make full turn. Don't cut corners. Always respect the right of way of other drivers who are at the intersection or approaching o close as to be a hazard.

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

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
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
