Wage-Hour Fixing

Thurman Sensing, who directs research for the Southern States Industrial Council, Nashville, Tenn., is a man who speaks with wisdom. Sometime ago Mr. Sensing released comments on our wage and hour law, in which he predicted there would be continued agitation to fix minimum wages at high figures. I think it is true, as Mr. Sensing suggests, that few people understand the implications of wage and hour fixing by the government.

Says Mr. Sensing: "The whole system of democracy is directly opposed to any sort of planned economy. . . . Deny it though we may, the fixing of wages by legislative action can be regarded as nothing else than part and parcel of planned economy. If the government is allowed to assume the power to fix minimum wages and maximum hours, there is nothing to keep the government from reversing this process and fixing maximum wages and minimum hours." With that, democracy flies completely out the window, Mr. Sensing declares.

Real Guarantee
Everybody, he says, should have a living wage — or more — if he earns it. "But no one who believes in democracy will argue that a person should have a certain wage whether he earns it or not. Productivity comes first, not wages. The only real guarantee behind a wage in a democracy is the productivity of the person who receives the wage."

These words are so logical and the reasoning so plain that I would like to continue with Mr. Sensing's comments. Suppose an employer couldn't pay the minimum wages set up, and had to close down. There are two choices for the government; "either the business must be taken over . . . and workers paid without any reference to the earnings of the business; or the workers go on relief and are issued a dole at the expense of the general public."

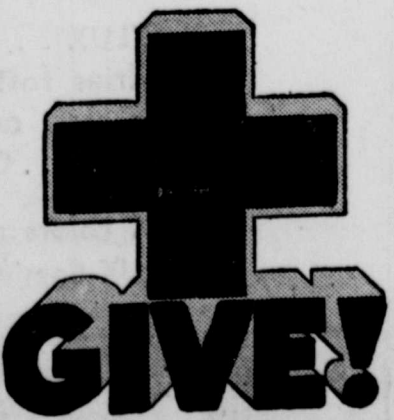
False Promises
The first would be state socialism, which the people of America would never endorse willingly or knowingly. "Socialism never has and never will bring the people a strong government and a high standard of living." Mr. Sensing cites state socialism in England: "Promising them greater production, it has brought decreased production; promising them a higher standard of living, it has brought them a lower standard of living; promising them happiness, it has brought them misery."

Whence Prosperity?
The other alternative, says Mr. Sensing, would bring a great body of unemployed. "They are unemployed simply because the laws of the land have made it unprofitable for them to be employed. . . . They are living off the enterprise and productivity of the rest of the people. Their incentive is dulled, their energy is stifled, their initiative is warped. They are drones in a free society." When the drones are too numerous to be supported by the workers, Mr. Sensing continues, the government takes over and the society is no longer free.

"If minimum wages fixed by the law are to make us prosperous, we might as well set the figure at one dollar per hour or two dollars per hour or five dollars per hour. . . . In a democracy the requirement must always be that the individual shall earn his wage, whether it be ten cents per hour or ten dollars per hour; moreover, that it shall be fixed by free enterprise in a competitive economy. Our whole history has shown this to be the road to prosperity."

Texas Gas Used To Refill Empty Michigan Fields

An interesting development affecting Texas' diminishing supply of natural gas is found in the growing practice of pumping natural gas transported from Texas by pipe lines into exhausted oil fields in states that have used up their supply of natural gas.

One of these large projects is that of the Michigan Gas Storage Company which early in 1947 secured ownership of declining or abandoned gas fields in three

Michigan counties for the purpose of refilling these empty natural reservoirs with gas transported from Texas by the Panhandle Eastern Gas Company. The gas will be pumped into these fields by the use of compressors of tremendous size. The gas for this purpose is obtained from the pipe line company in the summer, when the need of gas for heating is low. It is pumped back into the old gas reservoirs to be stored until winter when the pipe lines capacity is overtaxed. The consumers company says when the field is completely repressured, a matter requiring several years there will be sufficient gas to supply its customers for 25 yrs., after allowing for doubling the

demand during that time. It can easily be foreseen that Michigan housewives will be burning Texas gas after Texas reserves have been diminished to a point that Texas' needs can no longer be met.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

As long as the cold weather remains with us the danger of a coryza outbreak in your poultry flock is ever present. Watch for signs of this respiratory disease and if it appears, don't waste time in taking steps to control it. Unless it is checked, you will lose heavily in egg production.

Clean, Warm House

The first rule of preventing infectious coryza (commonly called colds) is to give the flock a clean and comfortable place in which to live. The house should be warm and dry, free of drafts well ventilated, clean and sanitary.

If your flock sustains an outbreak of infectious coryza despite your precautions, you will find that the disease can be controlled by using sodium sulfathiazole. This drug, which is available in commercial forms as a drinking water medicine, is effective against Hemophilus gallinarum, the organism which causes infectious coryza. It should be administered as soon as the first coryza symptoms are noted.

In the early stages of coryza, the infected chickens have a watery nasal discharge; later, this mucus becomes thick and sticky. The diseased bird's face, the wattles, and the skin of its neck are swollen. A post-mortem examination reveals that the swellings are filled with fluid. Often coryza is confined to the nasal passage and sinuses, but sometimes the windpipe and lungs are also involved. Difficult breathing and coughing may be symptoms.

While mortality resulting from this disease is usually negligible most poultry raisers fear it because it causes heavy losses in production. Among younger stock it often creates culls.

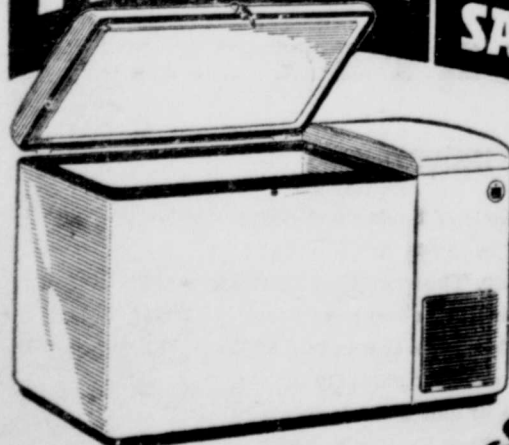

Barnyard manure is the most complete fertilizer on a farm. A person can expect 13 tons annually from each grown cow. This is equivalent to 6 1-2 one hundred pound sacks of 20 per cent sulphate of Ammonia (nitrogen), two 100 pound sacks of 20 per cent superphosphate or five 100 pound sacks of 20 per cent potash. Save and use all the barnyard manure.

Fertilizer increases microscopic plants and animals in water which fish feed on. With the use of fertilizer, a pond .25 to 2.0 surface acres will normally produce all the fish that an average family can use. Fertilized ponds produce about twice as much fish as unfertilized ones. Most ponds are overstocked or have too many fish and too little food supply.

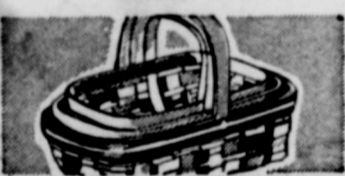

CRACK DOWN: Holy Land

It was time to get tough in the Holy Land, the British occupying army decided. Far from showing any inclination toward peace, Palestine Jews and Arabs were carrying their civil war over the partition plan to even bloodier lengths than ever before.

Better Health

By Dr. Geo. W. Cox

Pellagra, although not a communicable disease, is one of great concern to public health officials in Texas and other southern states. The disease is caused by the lack of certain essential foods, and as it comes on slowly, it may not be recognized until the victim begins to have the more serious symptoms such as sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin.

"When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "The longer an individual has pellagra the harder it is to cure. It is advisable, therefore, to watch for the early symptoms such as nervousness, indigestion, and burning of the hands and feet, and if these symptoms appear, treatment should be instituted at once. In its advanced stages pellagra may become so severe as to not only cause physical suffering but seriously affect the mind."

Pellagra is not contagious and it can be prevented entirely by including the right kinds of foods in the daily diet. These essential foods are milk, fresh meat, whole wheat products, brewer's yeast, and salmon, as well as tomatoes and other fresh fruits and vegetables. Including these foods in the daily diet will prevent pellagra, and as in the case of any disease, it is much better to prevent it than to cure it.

He was raised in the vicinity of Duck Run, a tiny farm community in the rolling hills of southern Ohio. Roy's father worked in a shoe factory, and one of the firm's customers used to permit the boy to go out to his large stock farm. It was there that Roy rode a horse for the first time and he soon became an expert equestrian. He also acquired a guitar, mastered a number of cowboy songs and on Saturday nights doubled as square dance caller and master of ceremonies. He played the guitar as readily as he had ridden those thoroughbred horses.

While still in his teens, Roy moved to California. Times were hard then and he worked at a variety of jobs such as harvesting crops, driving a truck and helping to build a highway. Then at last his dream came true. He went to work on a Montana

ranch where he became a cowboy in reality.

Through all this time, Roy had never forgotten his guitar. Eventually he joined a cowboy band called "The Rocky Mountaineers." When that group disbanded, he organized another one which he dubbed the "International Cowboys." They had a lot of fun but made no money.

Just when things looked darkest, Roy met two other musicians named Bob Nolan and Tim Spencer. Together they formed the group now famous as the "Sons of the Pioneers," which still appears in Roy's Republic pictures. "The Last Roundup," their first recording, became a national hit and they were definitely in the big time.

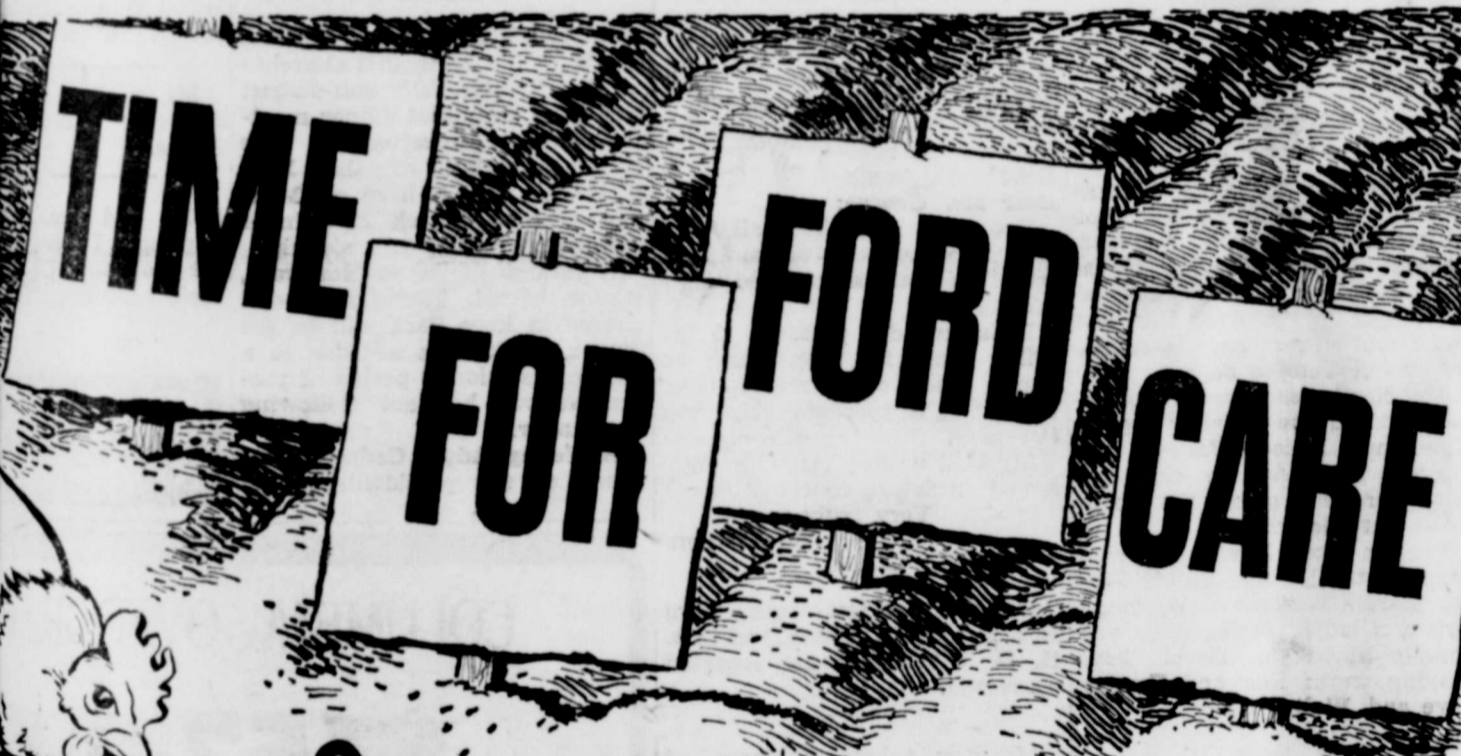
