Homer Whisnand Gives Platform In Sheriff's Race

Homer Whisnand, resident of Wichita County 22 years and a veteran of World War Two, Saturday issued his formal announcement as a candidate for sheriff, subject to the action of the Democratic primary, as follows:

"I feel that the sheriff is an employee of the citizens of the county and that they are entitled to, and should expect, the very best service possible from the man they elect to this public office.

"Due to my experience as a peace officer, I believe I have the qualifications to make you a good sheriff.

"I am a candidate on my own merits and pledge the citizens of Wichita County that if I am elected sheriff I will use common sense in operation of the office. In the selection of my deputies I will endeavor to find men who are qualified and courteous.

"I also will do my best to work harmoniously with the other officials of Wichita County, the police departments of the various cities in the county, and the state highway patrol.

Came To Kamay
"Born in Fannin County 40 years ago, I came to Kamay in 1926, where I resided for seven years, during which period I made Iowa Park the business center where I transacted much of my business.

"At Kamay I was an irrigation farmer, later working in the oil fields, as a roustabout and a tool dresser on drilling rigs and in pipe line work.

"Moving to Electra in 1933, I continued as an oil field worker until appointed constable of precinct 4 (Electra) Jan. 1, 1935.

"I served as constable of that busy precinct six years, quitting to enter war plant protection work in South Texas in 1941.

Volunteered In Navy
"In 1943 I volunteered in the United States Navy and saw service in the Southwest Pacific.

"When I left Electra in 1941 my wife and family moved to Wichita Falls and have resided there ever since, with the exception of eight months we spent in Electra in 1946.

"I was a deputy sheriff of this county for the first three months of last year, resigning from the post. I then served several months as special investigator for the county and district attorney's offices of this county.

"I am a member of the Church of Christ, a Mason and a member of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and AMVETS.

"My family includes my wife and one daughter, Sybil Ruth, a sophomore in Wichita Falls High school. My wife owns and operates the Elite Beauty Shop in the Staley building.

"I shall endeavor to see each citizen of this county personally during the campaign. Your vote and influence will be sincerely appreciated."

No evil can quench the glow cast by the Easter sunrise nor can man rise to such power he can dim its triumphant light.

Death is known by many names in many tongues, prophets for its interpretation, doctrines for its spiritual significance.

Men of all faiths, observing Easter, suffer the shame of Golgotha and the death, but men of true faith create new life within themselves as they commemorate the Resurrection. Far flung from this religious festival today seem the shepherds and prophets of Biblical Palestine. Palestine is, at present, a place of political turmoil, contention, hatred and death. The intellect of a modern world, studies the sufferings of humanity and trusts in a resurrection in Palestine. Religion speaks its message over the hills of Palestine today, as then. It appeals to our conscience now as when Thomas, the disciple, doubted. It points to faith as when the two Marys were at the door of the sepulchre.

Since religion was first known, man has lived in the belief of a triumph over death. As far back as the earliest Greek mythology, he has put his hope in a resurrection of those dearly beloved who have gone before. Good lives after one, as the saints, the philosophers, the heroes who died for humanity, have endured.

As long as man is not devoid of hope and determination, of idealism and aspirations for good, the significance of the present physical violence in Palestine, is but a symbol. The sky grows darker before it becomes light.

In this Easter celebration, the people of Burkburnett ask for peace rather than passion, for gentleness in the stead of violence, the bloom of the lily rather than the symbol of swastika or sickle and hammer, the freshness of spring and new life than the blight of hate and selfishness. Christianity is a living process and there is no death in that living when good defeats evil.

While this work is in progress it will be necessary to cut the water off on those blocks where repair work is in progress. Mr. McNeill states that they will work with all haste when the water is off, and that at no time will they keep the water off more than one hour at a time if they can possibly get it on that soon.

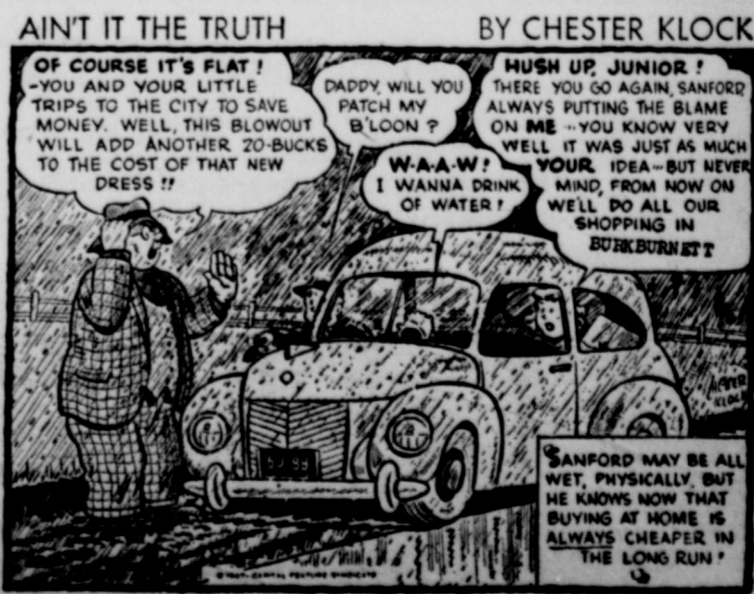

It is better to be safe than sorry and no one intentionally would risk the lives of their family.

NOT FAIR PRACTICE

Oleomargarine has long been a step-child. It has suffered much in reputation and through taxation by dairy states and through bills passed in Congress. It is declared by doctors to be as healthful as butter and because of its lower price, is the householder's friend, when cost really counts. A Burkburnett man says putting a tax on oleo is about the same as apple growers getting a bill passed to tax oranges. Colored oleo means heavier taxes than the uncolored. Stores selling it must pay more money to handle the colored variety. There are many women who have long felt the pressure of the increased cost of butter and would welcome a reduction in the price of margarine. Repealing the tax will bring this about.

YOU NEVER KNOW

You never know when you will have to stop your automobile suddenly. A truck or bus swings suddenly into your line of traffic, a driver quickly halts without a signal. You need brakes, you need action. Charts are given to show drivers the distance required to stop a car going so many miles per hour. They give the preliminaries to stopping, as, seeing danger and THINKING of stopping, applying the brakes. The slowing distance depends upon speed, good brakes or "passing brakes". A man doing 20 m. p. h. goes 22 feet before he can start to use brakes. It takes another 21 feet to stop completely, with good tires and on favorable roads. The average driver takes 3-4 second to decide it will be necessary to stop. Most Burkburnett drivers are careful drivers, but all of us can be more careful.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

GET THE LICE OFF CHICKENS AND SAVE EGGS

When part of the flock of the chickens "goes unthrifty" at this time of the year and starts to let down in egg production, look over a few of the birds in search of lice. Winter or summer, lice always should be suspected when the flock, or part

of it, goes into a slump. The fact is that lice are much more often the cause of flock let-downs than is commonly believed.

HOW TO FIND THE LICE

If present, lice can be observed readily by parting the fluffy feathers beneath the vent, beneath the wings, through the upper thigh, and around the head. It is important to look over more than one chicken. Examine at least six birds.

Lice on chickens often run into the hundreds in number, and many others are being hatched constantly. It is important to destroy both lice and eggs before irreparable damage is done to chickens.

HOW TO KILL THE LICE

The roost-paint method of killing lice is very convenient. The roost application is applied to the roosts and the heat generated by the birds' bodies volatilizes the drug compound, and the rising fumes penetrate the feathers and kill the lice. The principle here is the same as steam rising from water. Roost paints containing nicotine or benzene hexachloride are used successfully by many poultry raisers.

The use of a louse powder is an old, reliable way of killing lice. The most common method of application is the "pinch" method. The birds are held over a pan or newspaper to catch the powder that drops from the birds as it is worked into the feathers. The dip method may be used for the types of louse powder that go into solution, but it should be used only on warm days or in rooms in which the temperature is 80 degrees or higher while birds are drying.

It is declared by doctors to be as healthful as butter and because of its lower price, is the householder's friend, when cost really counts. A Burkburnett man says putting a tax on oleo is about the same as apple growers getting a bill passed to tax oranges. Colored oleo means heavier taxes than the uncolored. Stores selling it must pay more money to handle the colored variety. There are many women who have long felt the pressure of the increased cost of butter and would welcome a reduction in the price of margarine. Repealing the tax will bring this about.

YOU NEVER KNOW

You never know when you will have to stop your automobile suddenly. A truck or bus swings suddenly into your line of traffic, a driver quickly halts without a signal. You need brakes, you need action. Charts are given to show drivers the distance required to stop a car going so many miles per hour. They give the preliminaries to stopping, as, seeing danger and THINKING of stopping, applying the brakes. The slowing distance depends upon speed, good brakes or "passing brakes". A man doing 20 m. p. h. goes 22 feet before he can start to use brakes. It takes another 21 feet to stop completely, with good tires and on favorable roads. The average driver takes 3-4 second to decide it will be necessary to stop. Most Burkburnett drivers are careful drivers, but all of us can be more careful.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

GET THE LICE OFF CHICKENS AND SAVE EGGS

When part of the flock of the chickens "goes unthrifty" at this time of the year and starts to let down in egg production, look over a few of the birds in search of lice. Winter or summer, lice always should be suspected when the flock, or part

of it, goes into a slump. The fact is that lice are much more often the cause of flock let-downs than is commonly believed.

HOW TO FIND THE LICE

If phesent, lice can be observed readily by parting the fluffy feathers beneath the vent, beneath the wings, through the upper thigh, and around the head. It is important to look over more than one chicken. Examine at least six birds.

Lice on chickens often run into the hundreds in number, and many others are being hatched constantly. It is important to destroy both lice and eggs before irreparable damage is done to chickens.

HOW TO KILL THE LICE

The roost-paint method of killing lice is very convenient. The roost application is applied to the roosts and the heat generated by the birds' bodies volatilizes the drug compound, and the rising fumes penetrate the feathers and kill the lice. The principle here is the same as steam rising from water. Roost paints containing nicotine or benzene hexachloride are used successfully by many poultry raisers.

The use of a louse powder is an old, reliable way of killing lice. The most common method of application is the "pinch" method. The birds are held over a pan or newspaper to catch the powder that drops from the birds as it is worked into the feathers. The dip method may be used for the types of louse powder that go into solution, but it should be used only on warm days or in rooms in which the temperature is 80 degrees or higher while birds are drying.

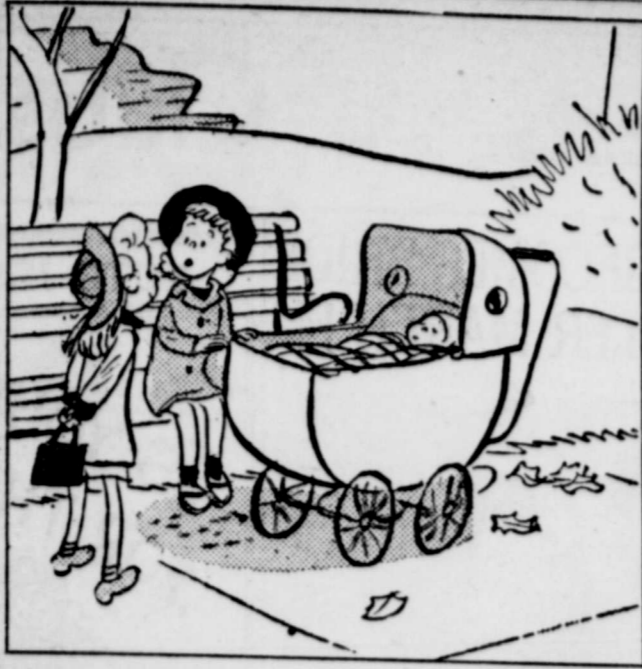

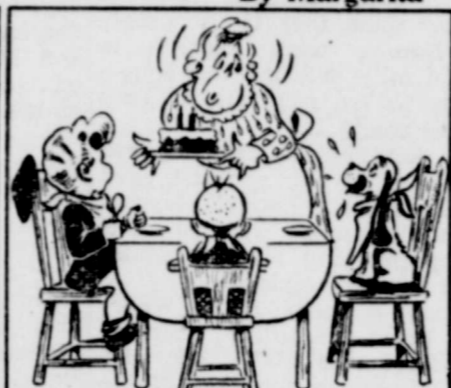

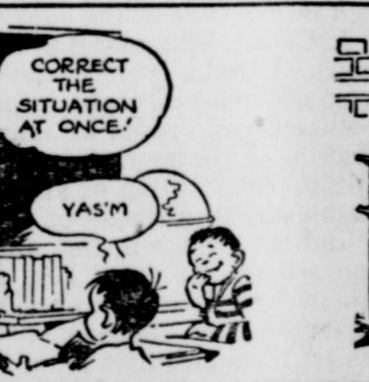

N. Y. Court Decision Holds Test-Tube Baby Legitimate

NEW YORK. — A supreme court justice ruled that a child born as the result of artificial insemination is legitimate. The ruling was made by Justice Henry Clay Greenberg in deciding that the estranged husband of Mrs. Julie Strnad, 31, had a right to visit her daughter, four-year-old Antoinette, who she said was a product of artificial insemination. Mrs. Strnad claimed that her husband, Antoine, 42, was sterile since birth, an allegation he denied. She sought to prevent him from seeing the child on the ground Antoinette was not the offspring of her ex-mate. She had won a separation decree and principal custody of the child last October.

Atomic Danger Zone Posted For Tests on New Weapons

WASHINGTON.—The atomic energy commission has posted a "Danger—Keep Out" notice covering 39,000 square miles of the Pacific ocean surrounding Eniwetok atoll, site of forthcoming "tests of military weapons." "Hazards will exist" in a rectangular area approximately 173 miles north and south and 226 miles east and west, the commission said. The danger will continue throughout 1948.

Plane Crosses Ocean With Dead Motor; Bishop Safe

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA. — An Australian flying boat, carrying 29 passengers and a crew of 8, landed here safely after flying 380 miles across the storm-tossed Tasman sea with one of its four engines dead. Among the passengers were Episcopal Bishop G. Ashton Oldham of Albany, N. Y., and his wife.

Railway Passengers Gassed And Robbed in Romania

BUCHAREST, ROMANIA. — A band of thieves put all the passengers in a railway carriage to sleep by using gas and robbed the night train from Bucharest to Iasi, the newspaper Natuinea said. When the passengers woke up at Iasi station they found all their luggage gone.

Farm Mechanization Boosts Production to Record Level

OMAHA, NEB. — Americans are harvesting 20 million more acres today than they did in 1940, although there are three million fewer people doing it, and on 200,000 fewer farms. Fast-growing mechanization of farms is largely responsible for this feat, Joseph A. Hoban, merchandise manager of B. F. Goodrich company, told members of Midwest Implement Dealers association. He cited the fact that the nation's tractor "population" had doubled, from one million to two million, just since 1940. Praising "the way America's farmers and other food producers had come through to ease tragic conditions in many lands," Hoban cited the following estimates on the nation's 1947 exports of foodstuffs: 392 million bushels of wheat, five times the amount exported in 1939; 88 million bushels of corn, compared to 32 million in 1939, and 328 million pounds of meat products, against 193 million in 1939. The farm market offered "the biggest sales opportunity" for industry in 1947, Hoban said, adding that "there is no question that this market is going forward at as great or even greater pace in 1948." Hoban said that all tractors now made are rubber-tired, and that changing all a farm's rolling stock from steel to rubber tires produced an average saving of 24 working days and 675 gallons of gasoline per year, for each 150 acres worked.

Jeff Moody Goes 30,000 Miles With Youth Revival

The following letter was received by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Adams, telling of the Evangelistic tour made by Jess Moody, who conducted the Youth Revival here last year:

(J. C., pipe this hope to see you some of these days before long. The weather has been too rough to come your way. Power to you, H. F. Moody).

Traveling over 30,000 miles and preaching around 100 sermons, Jess Moody, 22 year old Wacoan and Baylor evangelist,

accompanied by Bob Randall, a Waco musician, covered Britain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Italy, France, Switzerland and Newfoundland in a \$10,000 evangelistic tour that was financed by Baptists of Texas.

Just returned from four months in Europe, the young Baptist leader was ready to say the hope of the world rested in the strength of the pulpit and in Europe the pulpit is misused, often preaching Communism and atheistic doctrines. Europe is a powder keg; the gospel is the only hope.

Moody stated, "No matter what you hear to the contrary, the people over there are starving." Just as 1200 calories a day is a deficit, so is the 600 Baptist missionaries in the world, especial-

ly in Christianity-starved, Communist-filled Europe. "I did not meet one Southern Baptist in Europe," he said. "Let me beg you, let me cry to you to help in establishing churches in Europe. We need churches. We got converts but there was no church to send them to." Contrasted to the almost non-existent Christian activity, the youth leader said he believed that the Communists were the greatest missionaries in the world. Now is the time for Christians to act.

"I do not want to sound pessimistic," he explained, "but over there the people do not ask 'if war is coming, but when'."

More than 2,000 persons heard his message at a rally in Paris' mammoth hall, La Salle Playel, which was the largest non-Catholic meeting ever held in atheistic France.

He also spoke in Paris before 400 Communists in Le Cocq, the hall which was headquarters in the recent Paris strikes. At the close of the meeting 12 persons accepted Christ.

Exemplary of the gratitude of the people in Europe is this statement by a pastor there, "My church will not cease to reap from the Moody-Randall campaign until Jesus comes again."

In England, the youth have a terrible outlook on life: "What's the use; there's no hope; there may be no tomorrow." Rev. Moody says, "There is no doubt in my mind that if the people in Europe were exposed to Christianity and had the opportunity to see it practiced they would accept it."

To help him quickly spread the word of the spiritual need in Europe, six Baptist laymen from Houston, Wharton (his birthplace) and Waco recently gave him an airplane.

Moody is known by his *Where He Leads Saturday Morning* broadcast over KWTX and also KWBU and as publisher of the state-wide religious youth magazine, *THE SHIELD*.

With deep sincerity he says, "God knows my heart. I don't see how it will be possible for me to stay in the states except for me to recuperate and raise money for another tour. This is it... it's now or never for England, Europe, and perhaps the world."

FARM FACTS

WORTH KNOWING

Q. Is there a cure for hog cholera?
A. There is no recognized cure for hog cholera, but outbreaks and losses can be prevented through proper vaccination. Cholera usually spreads rapidly, and when it occurs no time should be lost in calling a veterinarian.

Q. How should lice on cattle be treated?
A. Purina Insect Killer is effective in controlling lice on cattle. Work the Insect Killer into the hair thoroughly and repeat the application in 15 days. Insect Killer can also be mixed with water and used as a spray.

Q. What causes limping and lameness in a flock of chickens, and how can this condition be eliminated?
A. This may be the nerve form of the avian leukosis complex, which can affect the nerves in any part of the body. However, it usually affects the nerves of the legs and wings and was originally described as fowl paralysis. The nerves in the legs and wings are affected to the point where the bird has no control over the wing or in walking. One may notice a lameness or limping and finally a complete inability of the fowl to stand. It may affect either one or both legs.

We recommend removing chickens from the flock as soon as they show any symptoms of this nature. If they are still in good flesh, they can be salvaged for food. At the present time, the most reliable method of control and prevention is a program of selective breeding, isolation and sanitation.

Q. Can lack of a balanced diet cause breeding losses in dairy cattle?
A. Yes. According to J. W. Hibbs, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, underfeeding and insufficient vitamin A content in dairy rations may cause as many breeding losses as infections and malformations.

Soil Conservation District News

Ruben Parish, dairy man and farmer, has completed approximately 13 miles of terraces in the last four months on his farms near Iowa Park. Mr. Parrish owns a whirlwind terracer and constructed his own terraces. The terraces empty into a good buffalo grass pasture. Terracing is one of the first essential steps in controlling erosion. The terraces were run by the Soil Conservation Service.

Contour level borders were run on approximately 10 acres of land on W. T. Ryan's farm of the Government Colony this week. On the bordered land, Mr. Ryan has planted biennial clover for soil conservation and pasture. He overseeded his oats with hubam clover, which is an annual clover. From results received last year from irrigated biennial white, yellow and madrid clovers as soil improvement crops and pasture, they seem very promising, especially for dairy farmers. Cooperators have planted 600 acres in the irrigated valley for this purpose.

R. D. Schleigh, cooperator of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District in the Barwise

Conservation group, cut his alfalfa six times last year. He cut 150 bales per acre from this sub-irrigated field, which is remarkable, considering that last year was so dry. The income per acre at \$1.00 per bale would be \$150.00. He planted more alfalfa last fall. Peas and vetch have planted as other soil improvement crops.

Rumpus Rooms Give Chance for Ingenuity

Developments in modern home design in recent years have seen the wide acceptance of the single story, ranch-style house, and the usefulness of a rumpus room, or play room, for family recreation and relaxation. Only in the last decade has the rumpus room become a part of the average house. Such an area was practically nonexistent in the early 20's, but today, regardless of the style of the house, a separate recreation room is provided if possible.

Rumpus rooms vary from home to home, depending upon the family hobbies and recreational preferences. Since they are designed for relaxation, they are not limited by conventional decorative schemes. This is one room in which even bizarre effects may be used advantageously. Generally speaking, any decorative scheme in keeping with the purpose of the room is satisfactory.

Following are suggested color schemes in keeping with the principal purpose of the rumpus room: Card room: Ceiling, cream with large, black ace of spades stenciled around the central lighting fixture; a single diamond and heart stenciled in red near opposite corners of the ceiling, and a single spade and club stenciled in black near the other corners. Point the near the toward the corners. Walls, upper two-thirds stenciled in all-over card design in black over a cream background and the entire upper wall glazed in burnt umber to subdue the black; lower third of the wall painted cream, glazed with burnt umber. Separate the upper and lower wall with a black band two inches wide. No curtains.

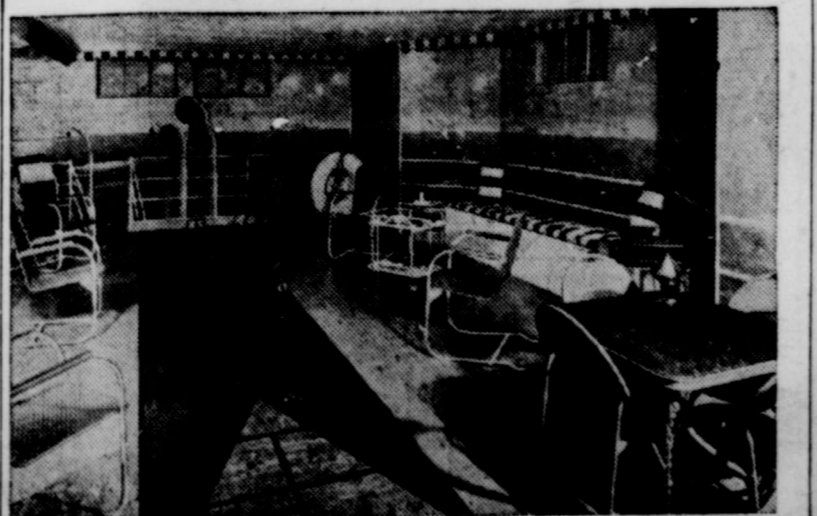
Drapes, light green. Floor painted to imitate tile in black and orange, with one or two large red diamonds painted like an inset in tile. Card tables and chairs, dark oak or walnut.

Game room: Ceiling, light green. Walls, slightly deeper green. Imitation fireplace, brick red. Woodwork, maple stain. Venetian blinds at windows. Floor, covered with red linoleum with black border and insets. Tennis table in forest green. Furniture, some red, some forest green.

Rumpus room featuring a small

bar: Ceiling, cream. Walls, knotty pine-natural. Floor, brown linoleum with black insets, or painted to imitate such a covering. No curtains; drapes, rose figured. Front of the bar, glass brick. Bar top stained with burnt umber and varnished. Furniture, some light green, some rose.

General purpose room: Ceiling and walls, canary yellow. Woodwork, golden oak stain. Floor covering, maroon and black linoleum. Venetian blinds, same as walls. Furniture and mirror, bright red. Picture frames, black.

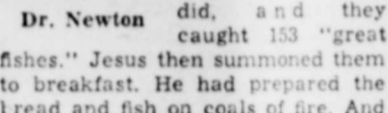

Winter Sports Boom In New England Hills

Skiing Growing Swiftly as the Popular Pastime.

BOSTON.—The winter sports "industry" in the skiing areas of northern New England is in full blast. Usually the winter-time activities reach a peak over Washington's birthday or in March, but this year skiing began in northern Vermont as early as mid-November, and practically every important area is reporting "good" to "excellent" conditions, an unheard-of phenomenon for so early in the season.

Hotels are packed in all but the more remote areas. At North Conway's Eastern Slope inn, 6,000 people fought for the 250 accommodations available. A record-breaking season is reported for the entire area.

The White mountains of New Hampshire, Green mountains of Vermont and the Berkshire hills in western Massachusetts comprise the most intensively developed winter sports region in the country, all within easy reach of populous New York City and southern New England.

In this area some 700 inns in 200 towns throw open their doors for the cold weather business. This year 253 ski tows and lifts—25 per cent more than were in operation last year—are dragging people uphill to risk life and limb on 1,500 miles of downhill ski trails. At present there are believed to be upward of 300,000 skiers in the six-state territory.

Indians Had Rubber Balls When Columbus landed on the island of Santo Domingo on his first voyage he found the young Indians playing with balls made of elastic resin. He took samples of this resin back to Ferdinand and Isabella and it became known in the Spanish language as caucho. Joseph Priestley, the famous discoverer of oxygen, saw a small ball of this elastic gum in 1770. He found that when it was rubbed over pencil writings it eliminated them, so he called it rubber.

An American Discoverer

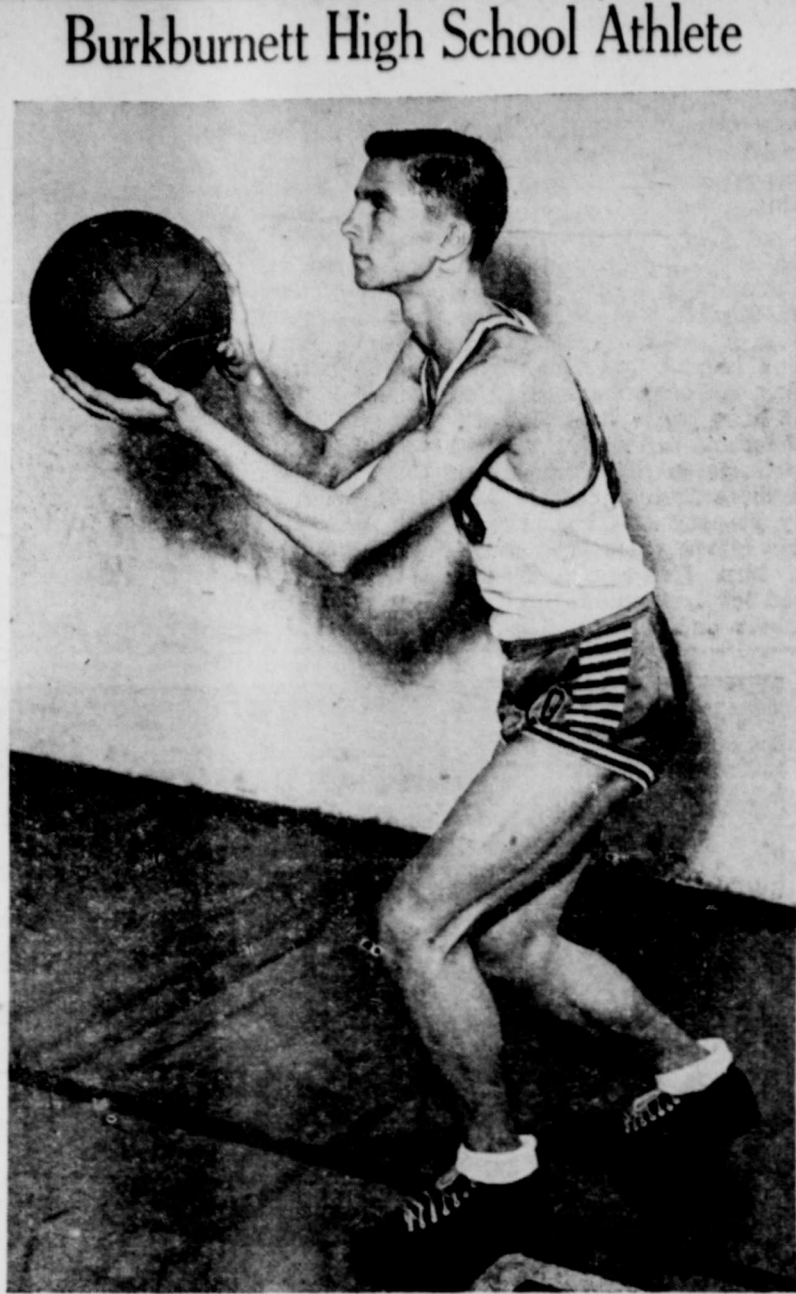

WORTH KNOWING

Q. What causes coughing in a dairy herd? Would this make the milk unfit for human consumption?

A. Coughing may be caused by any one of several things. Dairy hay, for example, will usually make some cows cough, while they have no effect on others. Dusty grain rations will also have a similar effect. Coughing by these means would not affect the milk. However, it is best to call the veterinarian for proper diagnosis and treatment.

Q. What is the greatest individual cause of feed waste in your production?

A. Mouldiness. According to scientific records, the average pig producer does not make more than 25% of the pig farrowed. It has been estimated that each pig died at farrowing time represents a loss of 140 pounds of feed. A mortality of 25% means a loss of 35 pounds of feed. A program of good breeding, sound management, careful sanitation and good feeding can result in sending to market 80 to 85% of the pig farrowed. This has been demonstrated at the National Poultry Show, January 23-26, 1947, at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri.

Q. What causes laying hens to sit the nest?

A. There are many causes, and the often cause by insufficient feed, lack of space, keeping the feed supply empty, too long, unbalanced feeding rations, lack of water, impurities in the feed, or infestation of the nest-boxes by lice or other parasites. If not sure what is causing the trouble, one or two of the birds should be killed and thoroughly examined to see if they are infested with worms.
