Livestock Sale Exceeded Hopes of Most Optimistic

Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock the sale at the Burkburnett Livestock Sales Barn will open with an offering of registered quarter horses. The horses are from some of the best breeders in Texas and Oklahoma. All who wish to do so may inspect these horses in their pens at the barn before the sale starts.

Last Saturday afternoon more than 750 buyers and sellers gathered at the sales barn to witness the first sale. Approximately 650 head of cattle, hogs and horses appeared in the ring for the first selling during the afternoon. Fat cattle brought up to 30c per lb. and hogs sold for \$22.50 cwt. Bidding was very spirited among the large number of buyers here from many neighboring towns, who represented other sales barns and packing houses.

Experienced help in all departments was plentiful to make the initial sale a huge success. Eight auctioneers boomed their chants as the parade of animals passed through the ring.

J. V. Brookshear and Doyle Cook, owners of this newest business venture in Burkburnett, are exceedingly thankful for the wonderful spirit of co-operation from merchants, farmers, stockmen and all others who helped to make last Saturday's opener a success. OIL IS NEEDED

When there is talk of war there arises the vital point of the U. S. oil supply and its future. Today we have an acute shortage and, according to the petroleum industry, this might be solved for a NORMAL demand, if they could get the steel products to expand activities in oil fields, refineries and distribution lines. What is of principal concern, is what would happen if we needed more than a normal supply of oil. The prospect is not cheery.

At the present rate of consumption, by 1954 we will daily be using 7 million barrels and it is estimated that the domestic output then would be but 5 million barrels daily. This nation needs a reserve supply, for emergencies. The only hope is to discover new fields and for old ones to yield more than the estimated flow. It costs more now to explore for new fields and they are generally smaller than the old wells. There lies the hope of drilling oceanic land of the

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

THE IMPORTANCE OF SANITATION

Despite the many advances made recently in poultry diseases prevention and control, nothing has yet replaced effective sanitation as the best weapon for combating the forces of disease. Nine out of ten poultry raisers realize this — yet it is probably true that a lesser number of them take the time or trouble necessary to practice what is accepted as a really effective sanitation program.

Chick Mortality High
This is the season in which di-

sease customarily takes its heaviest toll. With broods of young chicks now being started on so many poultry farms, the disease danger is at its peak for it is among younger birds that mortality is greatest. And it follows that sanitation assumes relatively greater importance where chicks are involved than with a flock of mature fowl.

Soap, water, disinfectants, and other purifying devices are the poultryman's weapon in his war on brooder house bacteria, viruses, and other organisms. Use them liberally where needed, giving special attention to such common seats of contamination as the feeders and waterers. These utensils should be scrubbed and disinfected at frequent intervals. The litter should be dry — disease organisms won't flourish under dry

A good many poultry raisers carry their sanitary practices a step further by using an antiseptic in the drinking water. Among the common antiseptics in use are the quaternary ammonium compounds which are mixed in low dilution in the drinking water.

The antiseptic slows down germ growth in the water, thereby helping prevent the transmission of diseases through this common disease source.

HOME OWNERS' QUESTION BOX

Q—What can I do to keep a meat roast from shrinking in size when I cook it?

A—Don't sear it but cook it slowly at a low temperature. There is less shrinkage in one large roast than in two small ones.

**ASKS CONGRESS
FOR DOG STAMP**

**Legislation in Honor of
"Man's Best Friend"
Sought by Dog-Lovers**

The United States may soon issue a postage stamp honoring "Man's Best Friend," if the efforts being put forth by dog-lovers throughout the country prove fruitful.

John Phillips of California, himself a long-time champion of the dog, to introduce the necessary legislation providing for the issuance of such a stamp.

In a letter to Congressman Phillips, Mr. Miller points out that the United States at the present time has more dogs than any country is ever known to have owned before—one in every three American families owns one or more dogs—and that certainly the dog's contributions of heroism, loyalty and intelligence are worthy of honoring in this manner.

He further states that to date 13 countries have issued postage stamps which either show dogs as the principal point of their designs, or have included dogs as an incidental to the composition. The only U.S. stamp which shows the likeness of a dog is one of 30-cent value issued in connection with the Columbian Exposition of 1893. This stamp shows Columbus with a globe demonstrating to a group of listeners his theories of geography and navigation, while a dog, which appears to be of a large Mastiff type, is shown lying on the floor in the foreground. Mr. Miller feels very strongly that with the country's dog population at the 29,000,000 mark, "Man's Best Friend" is now deserving of a postage stamp of his own and merits more than the incidental

recognition given him on a stamp issued 55 years ago.
"There are several well-known breeds, truly American dogs, which would be eligible to represent the dog family on United States postage," Mr. Miller wrote. "The Chesapeake Bay Retriever, the American Cocker Spaniel, the American Water Spaniel, the Alaskan Malamute, the Boston Terrier and the Black and Tan Coonhound are all pure-breds of undeniably American origin which have been brought to their present perfection by American breeders and dog-owners. If dogs besides native American ones were to be featured on stamps, the breeds which served so gallantly in the K-9 Corps during World War II are entitled to the glory."

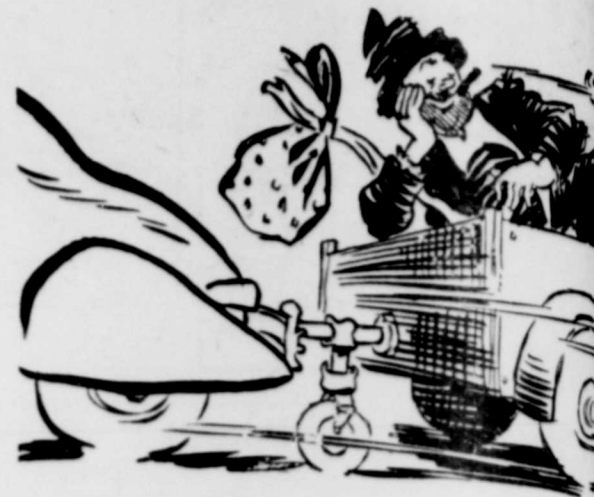

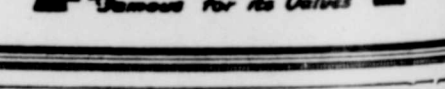

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Truman Calls for Draft, Training To Bolster Resistance to Russia; U.S. Reverses Stand on Partition

REUTERS' NOTE: When Truman called for a draft and training of 400,000 men in his message to Congress, he reversed the U.S. position on the partition of Germany.

THE PRICE Peace and War

"We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

Those words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U. S. Congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation has had for half a century.

Disregarding any political overtones there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of Congress reflected the realization that any successful foreign policy must be based on the fundamental concept of striking a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back up those commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation possessing the strength in military forces and alliances—to follow it consistently at all times and to defend it just as consistently in case of war.

In that connection Mr. Truman specifically asked Congress for power to draft men to build armed strength against the ruthless aggression of Soviet communism.

He asked also for "prompt enactment of universal training legislation," indicating that the draft should be only temporary until universal military training is giving the country the trained men it needs.

Finally, he sought swift passage of the \$3-billion-dollar European recovery program—the Marshall plan for economic recovery of western European nations which is setting the Kremlin's teeth on edge.

Bluntly the President upbraided Russia for making a travesty of peace: "One nation has not only refused to cooperate in the establishment of a just and honorable peace, but—even worse—has actively sought to prevent it."

Under the treaty, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

According to the new "Truman doctrine," the United States would be the principal guarantor of this five-power union. Without such a guarantee of U. S. backing, the western European treaty would be meaningless.

REACTION: Divided

What are the true facts? Just how potentially lethal is the situation with regard to Russia?

Senators and representatives were asking these questions after President Truman's "let's get strong" message. Many of them were demanding answers before they would consent to go ahead with any legislation endorsing a military draft or UMET.

Congress was divided, but the split was not along party lines. It reflected isolationism, discontent with the Truman foreign policy and in some cases an almost unhealthy respect for Russia's power in Europe.

Greatest fear seemed to be that conditions in Europe, as precipitated by Soviet actions, may get out of hand suddenly, despite the efforts of Russia or any other nation to prevent such a development.

Best opinion holds that while Russia is not now seeking war, the Communists have created a kind of Frankenstein monster in Europe that at any moment could plunge out of control and involve the world in another conflict.

The Soviets are motivated by a sense of urgency to act before the European recovery program begins to function and before the union of western European nations is firmly established. Driven by this feeling of urgency, the Soviets may not be able to avert an incident which would lead to a shooting war.

ABOUT FACE: Expedience

To many persons it looked as though the United States, in abandoning its support of the Palestine partition plan, had pulled a "Pontius Pilate" on the same scene where the procurator of Judea had washed his hands not quite 2,000 years ago to sanction the Crucifixion.

In reversing its role in the partition struggle, the U. S. proposed that the Holy Land be made a United Nations' trusteeship, giving Jews and Arabs a chance to reach agreement on their own concerning the future of their country's government.

Warren R. Austin, American delegate to the U. N., said that it was obvious that partition could not be carried out except by force, and the U. S. consistently has demurred against the idea of sending troops to Palestine.

CONVINCING

Closed for 34 minutes with Secretary of State Marshall, Secretary of Defense Forrestal and Secretary of the Army Eyal, the senate armed services committee emerged from the conference to throw its weight behind President Truman's plea for quick action to build up America's military forces.

Sen. Chas. McNary (Rep., S.D.), chairman of the committee, reported that 18 of the group's 13 members were convinced that both a limited draft and universal military training have become an "absolute necessity."

Just what the three secretaries told the armed services committee was not disclosed, but it was undeniably powerful information.

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TRIESTE: Surprise

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U. S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the free territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center, had been made a free state under United Nations' guidance in the all-military Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was, apparently, a strewed and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election.

It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby making their Yugoslav interests in the East.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a repudiation of the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy, and it will may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, just little time in answering the proposal of the U. S., Britain and France. He simply repeated the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav.

Moscow diplomats were calling the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed."

But to those who were working tooth and nail against the spread of communism it looked like a master stroke, one which might keep Italy and all of western Europe out of reach of the Kremlin.

FOOD WASTE: Rats, Insects

Although the world is crying for food, hundreds of thousands of tons of American foodstuffs are spoiled each year by the depredations of rats, mice and insects—and often by the carelessness of some producers.

Food and drug administration officials say the amount of so-called "filthy food" they destroy every year is enough to contribute "very substantially" to the hungry areas of the world.

"Filthy food" is the legal term for food spoiled by contamination of rats, mice, insects or other repulsive foreign bodies. It is the job of the food and drug administration to find and condemn filthy food in the channels of interstate commerce and to prosecute those responsible.

Since FDA's power to condemn filthy foods at their destination was taken away a year ago, officials estimate that, as a result, 20 tons of such food appears in retail outlets every day.

RABBITS: Meat Supply

There is one vast source of meat—maybe an inexhaustible one—that the U. S. public might have to consider seriously if beef and pork become as scarce and expensive as it is predicted they will.

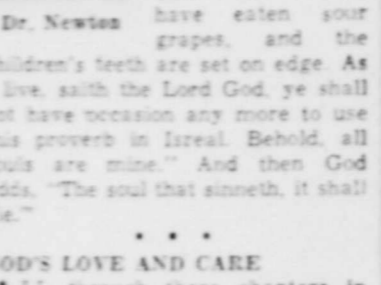
Rabbits. That is a department of agriculture idea. The department suggested that the American people take up the raising of rabbits as a supplementary source of meat to ease out the usual protein fare, destined to become more scarce and costly.

GOD'S LOVE AND CARE

ALL through these chapters in Sunday's lesson, two solemn truths appear—God's love for his people, manifest in unwearied care; and the responsibility of each soul for the sin which such comforts against God.

WHAT GOD IS LIKE

NOWHERE in the Old Testament is the love of God more manifest and compelling than in Ezekiel 34:11-27. I hope that you will open your Bible to this passage.

A NEW HEART

A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you." Ezekiel 36:26.

Here we have, perhaps, the sublimest sentence in the prophecy of Ezekiel. God is speaking; Ezekiel is merely the messenger—the voice, as John the Baptist delighted to describe himself.

Ezekiel has faithfully declared that each individual is responsible unto God, and just as faithfully he has proclaimed God's love and care, and now he adds the third great truth, namely, that God waits to bestow the new heart and the new spirit to every repentant soul.

A new heart and a new spirit. That is what the Jews needed. That is what the world needs today—a new heart and a new spirit. Only God could give a new heart then, and only God can make such gift today.

EZEKIEL'S MESSAGE FOR US WOULD we listen to Ezekiel today? He has the message we need above all other words that may be spoken. He called the Jews to repentance of sin. That is what America needs today. Boys and girls need it. Men and women need it. And just as God waited patiently to bestow the new heart and spirit to Israel in the long ago, so does he wait to grant us today a new heart and a new spirit.

"Our God, our help, in ages past, Our Hope for years to come; Our shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal home."

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Slight Pay Increase Still Leaves Texas Teachers Underpaid

Charles H. Tennyson, director of public relations for the Texas State Teachers Association, has spent quite a lot of time gathering material for the following statistics concerning teachers in Texas:
 Austin, Texas, March 28, 1948 —Texans will continue to have difficulty obtaining the qualified teachers it needs despite salary increases granted by the last legislature, it was predicted today.
 "The high cost of living has more than offset the raises in pay," Miss Emma Mae Brotze of Marshall, president of the

Texas State Teachers Association, declared.
 "We are grateful because the legislature provided a minimum salary scale of \$2,000 annually for teachers with degrees. That has made the average salary of our teachers \$2,500.
 "The fact remains, however, that Texas is still under the average pay for teachers in the United States and that increasing cost of living is forcing many people to look to other lines of endeavor for their livelihood.
 "Obtaining a degree which qualifies a person to teach in Texas schools is a costly process. It is quite likely that the fact that teachers receive 12 per cent less than the average for all employed persons in the United States, including laborers, little inducement for per-

sons to train for and enter the teaching profession."
 Miss Brotze pointed out that conservative figures of the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics reveal that the cost of living has increased 63.8 per cent since before the war.
 "The average salary of Texas teachers, \$2,500, is equal to a paycheck of \$1,526 in the 1935-39 period," the state teacher president said.
 "In purchasing power, that means the dollar will now buy only what 61 cents would before the war.
 "Take home pay of teachers has also decreased due to the fact that federal income tax is now levied on their salaries. That was not done prior to 1936.
 "With income tax deductions, the average salary of Texas teachers is equivalent to only \$1,306 before the war.
 "So long as high prices continue; so long as the federal government pays larger salaries for persons requiring college degrees, and teachers get less pay than semi-skilled workmen, I do not believe the profession will appeal to the type of person we want to teach our children."

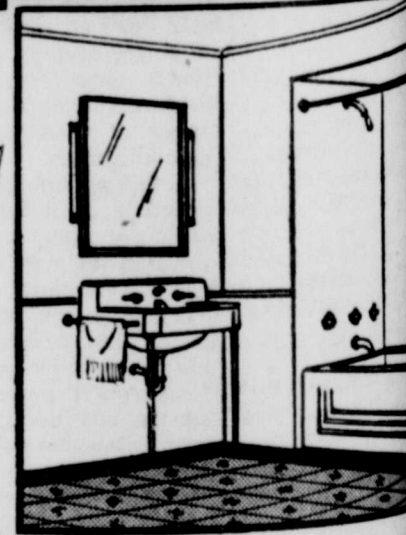

A Car Safety Check May Save Your Neck

That was the terse advice offered by W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, in urging motorists to keep the safety equipment of their cars in tip-top shape.

We are cooperating with safety authorities throughout the nation in a "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February," Chief Elliott said. The law required that your car have certain equipment for safety, and it's there when the manufacturer delivers the car. But it is up to the driver to keep it working properly.

He said National Safety Council figures show that 18 per cent of all vehicles involved in fatal accidents are defective. A recent nationwide police check-up showed one out of three cars defective and one out of seven with bad brakes.

The major safety equipment was listed as brakes, lights, mirror, windshield wiper, horn and safety glass. Many of these items will wear out or become damaged with use, and the motorist must see that they are maintained in good condition.

"Periodic inspection by trained mechanics is the answer, Captain G. L. Marhan of the Wichita Falls Texas, District said. "Professional drivers, such as truck drivers inspect their vehicles before every trip. That's a good idea for every driver, and it would save a lot of lives.

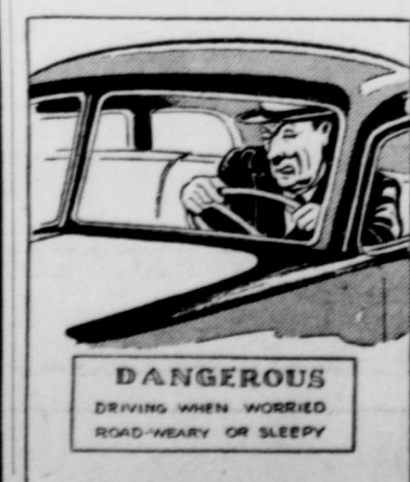
